





path of Prof. D. A. O'Flynn.

Newfoundlanders at home and abroad will be grieved to learn that a message was received from Grand Falls terday announcing the death of professor D. A. O'Flynn.

Prof. O'Flynn was born in Harbor grace sixty-six years ago, his father, r Michael O'Flynn, being master earrying on a very extensive trade which gave employment to thirty journeymen. As a small boy Prof. O'Flynn displayed truly wonderful musical talent, inherited, no doubt. from his father, who was also a musician of marked ability. At an early most famous masters of music, amongst whom was Thomas Mullock. brother of the illustrius prelate, Rt Rev. Dr. Mullock, Bishop of St. John's. After finishing his term he returned colesiastical architecture, the Cathe dral of the Immaculate Conception of that town, by the Rev. Dr. Dalton. first Bishop of the diocese. He held the position until the destruction of the beautiful Cathedral, and with it the Grand Organ, on the 2nd September, 1889. He then came to St. John's where he remained until about two years ago, when he went to Grand Falls, where his son holds a respon-

David A. O'Flynn was a gentleman of education and culture, deep research, as well as a brilliant and interesting conversationalist. He was an omniverous reader and his descriptive powers were of a very high order. But it was as a musician that he xcelled, and it may be said that he was born one, and his whole heart was in his work .. One circumstance occurred about forty-five years ago which left a lasting impression upon the mind of the writer of this brief tribute to our talented fellow-countryman (unique in the history of our country), and that was during the celebration of High Mass by the late Rt. Rev. Dr. Dalton. Six of the O'Flynn family, father, three sons and two daughters sang the Gloria, whilst the deceased professor presided at the organ. Truly they were a musical fam-

Whilst in Harbor Grace the professor was instructor to the Total Abstinence Band, and it was nothing unusual to see him take the first instrument to hand and take his place in the ranks. All instruments were alike to him, and many of his pupils, oth in our own cuontry, the United tates and Canada, have been known for their proficiency in music, which was instilled into them by the late professor. As a composer and writer of music he had few equals and no superiors, and one of his last acts in life was to write off and send to our Volunteers of the 1st Regiment, now t Fort George, Inverness, Scotlan the music of our grand old national melody, the "Banks of Newfoundland." For some years he was musical instructor to the Catholic Cadet band and Total Abstinence band, as well as instructor to the pupils of St. Bonaventure's College and organist of St. Patrick's Church, Riverhead, of this nent place he took in the sacred con erts of this city, and the sweet musi hat filled the Cathedral under th agic touch of the talented master It would be a great loss to the country if his vast collection of music (much of it his own composition) were to be lost.

Of the large family of brothers and sisters only one now remains, viz. Mrs. M. Scanlan, residing in New York for the past twenty years. The late learned and energetic parish priest of Little Bay, the Rev. Stephen O'Flynn, who died about twenty years ago, was

a brother of deceased. The deceased gentleman was of a somewhat retiring disposition, but once the ice was broken, his pleasing personality, his rectitude of principle Purity of thought and innate nobility and grandeur of soul drew insensibly towards him all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance as with the greatest charm. He was organist of the church at Grand Falls up to his de-

A fervent and practical son of Holy Church he died fortified by the rites, surrounded by his wife and children, mourned by his numerous relatives, and regretted by his hosts of friends, amongst whom he was such a favorite and who shall miss the kind and pleasing voice of the deceased gentleman, whose only thought was to be of benefit to all and injure none. It is probable that the remains will be rought to Harbor Grace for interment in the family plot in the Roman Catholic Cemetery, to rest beside the emains of his parents, brothers and sisters who have predeceased him.

#### WHAT PRIVATE BROWN SAYS.

A stirring story of an heroic stand on the part of the 2nd Coldstream Guards is told by Private F. Brown, an ex-Maidenhead policeman.

In opening, Brown says: "We had a very rough Christmas. Talk about shaking hands with the Germans! I can tell you that the boys of No. 4 Company of the 2nd Coldstreamers are not so fond of them. I have givn my experience of their outrages on defenceless women to a Special nmissioner. They aren't fit to place

"On December 22nd we received orlers to advance, as the Germans had proken through the French lines. At dawn we let them have it, and drove them back and took their advance trenches. They were reinforced, and a terrible fight commenced, and lasted till Christmas night. We were told that it was important that we should hold their advance trenches, and hold them we did, although God knows

"They had something up their sleeve. As it was getting dark on the 23rd and they found they could not drive us out with bombs, etc., they broke a great dyke and tried to drown us out. But they found that it took more than cold streams to beat the Coldstreams. The water was about four feet deep in our trenches, and they (the enemy) started a night attack, thinking that we should never stick the night in four feet of water and freezing very hard.

"But our boys didn't half let them have it! The German cries were terrible. They tried for about four hours, and then retired beaten. The only thing that worried me was our poor wounded. When they fell I am sorry to say they were drowned. Try as we would we could not save them. The next day our 3rd Battalion came up behind us and dug trenches. They worked like mad, and before dawn they had finished and relieved us."

#### PLAYING HER CARDS, NATURALLY

(From the Philadelphia Public Ledger.)

That Germany is deliberately trying to foster trouble between the United States and Great Britain should occasion no surprise. Tactically it is the logical thing for Germany to do, the thing that the precedents of ages recommends, the thing that England expected Germany to attempt. For months Germany has been looking for some pretext that could be so exaggerated as to arouse resentment in this country against the Allies. And quite naturally, failing to find such a pretext, she will do her utmost to create one. A board of strategy that neither balked nor gagged at letting loose all the Moslem fanatics and dervishes upon the Christian world would hardly hesitate to break the 100 years of peace that have existed among the English-speaking nations. Forewarned should mean forearmed. The Administration cannot be unaware of the motives and hopes that lie behind and control the stage of the present international situation President Wilson's neutrality must be as impartial and real in effect as it was prompt and emphatic in enunciation. The United States has too much at stake, is too essential to the the war is over and is far too wise and just, to be drawn into a false position by the designs of any of the European combatants. America is genuinely committed to neutrality and must not violate it on any terms.

COPPER IN WAR.

An English military writer, enumerating the various uses of copper in war, says: "First and foremost, of course, are the cartridge cases for rifles. The alloy of copper and zinc from which rifle cartridge cases are drawn is so thin that the metals must be very pure to insure against flaws. Then there are cartridge cases for the quick-firing guns. These also require the highest quality copper and zinc, since they must be exact to a 500th part of an inch and gas tight. On shells there are copper bands encircling the steel to insure close fitting in the rifling. Pure copper is the only substance known that gives satisfactory results. For field telephones copper wire is indispensable. Indeed, in the electrical industry generally there is an enormous consumption of copper. The windings on dynamos, for instance, are all copper. Thousands of experiments with alternative substances have been tried, but all have failed."
