### Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

FROM ALL QUARTERS.

LONDON, May 23. The Germans have replied to the errific French offensive in the Douaumont region with assault after assault, and the deadly combat to the ortheast and northwest of Verdun is still in progress. Heavy masses of German troops have been thrown against the picked French troops, whose successful attacks won for them the greater portion of Fort Dou-aumont and considerable ground ad-jacent to the fort of high strategic value. These newly captured posi-tions the French have tenaciously eld. Particular mention is made by the French War Office of the mainten-ance of the position of Fort Douauont captured by the French on Mon-ay. Fighting at this point is characterized by Paris as a "murderous struggle," each attack being sucdeeded by powerful artillery prepara-tions. Although they were hard held to the northeast, the Germans achiev-ed some temporary success at Le ed some temporary success at Le Mort Homme, where, after having een mowed down by the French ar-illery and machine guns with sanguinary losses, during several attacks, they finally gained a footing in the trenches to the west of this muchbught-for position. Their tenure in the trenches was short-lived, however, for a French counter attack imnediately drove them out.

Italy's first anniversary of her en-

ry into the war found her troops on t least one sector in southern Tyrole orced back by a great Austrian offen-ive upon Italian soil, which compelled a general retirement upon their main lines of defence from the region south of Rovere to Val Sugana southeast of Trent. Rome admits that be-tween Astico and Breuta River and in ugana Valley the Italians have fallen ck upon their main line of defence While Rome asserts the operation was carried out in perfect order after the talians repulsed the Austrian attacks gainst their advanced line, Vienna says that in their retreat from Borgo he Italians were driven across the rder by the Austrians. At this point the French are faced by more than three divisions. German attacks on Fort Douaumont, the cornerstone of Ver-dun, are said virtually to have failed. Notwithstanding the determination of their attacks and what is characterized as most reckless expenditure of life, the Germans succeded only in taking a small part of the French trenches west of the fort.





### Ocean Freight Rates Continue to go Higher.

Ocean freight rates are steadily rising. At present they have reached an unheard of figure, but the end of the course is still not in sight. Despite this thriving condition in shipping circles the inference cannot be assumed that all vessels are making big money. Naturally the majority of them are, but several instances are known of vessels coming to the port of St. John which are tied up with

ante bellum contracts. One case in particular which is cited frequently as a "hard luck" charter, is a collier now under charter to the Dominion Coal Company. The contract was made with the company seven years and a half ago and it has still seven or eight years to run. Cf course when the charter was made the rate must have been fairly good for those times, but at the present time it is ridiculously low in comparison with the rates the freelancers are getting. Now this particular vessel, it is said is being run by the owners at a continual loss. By the time the contract is finished the inflated rates no doubt will have vanished. London, May 17.- James White, son of the late Field Marshal, and fornerly a captain in the army, was remanded to custody at Abordare vesterday on a charge of making statement's likely to cause disaffection and prejudice in connection with recruiting. The prosecution describes White las a "dangerous character" and claimed that it was able to prove that he went to Abordare to induce miners to strike if John Connolly, the rebel leader, was executed.

Documents found in the possession of the prisoner proved, it is charged, that he was consorting with the enemies of Great Britain. White has figured previously in connection with the agitation carried on by Jim Larkin, who organized the street car strike of 1913.


