



The authors of this fable would like to spread the report that Britain's reserves of men are exausted. This is entirely fictitious fillions are stated to be in reserve this country and include all men ained and training to be in readiness provide British drafts in the five theatres of war; also sick and wounded, those unfit for service, training staffs and labor and administrative units necessary at the main base of the Empire. As regards the comparative efforts of the Motherland and ominions, in the actual war areas. excluding troops garrisoning India and defending ports throughout the orld, the proportion of troops of the otherland to the troops of the Doons is between five and six t It must be borne in mind that this preponderance of troops of the Motherland is natural, since the proportion of the white male population of the United Kingdom to that of the Dominions is over three to one. Some had thought that the Dominions roops were being more freely used han those of the Motherland. This was a fallacy. The proportion of the Motherland troops and casualties on he western front is higher than that of the Dominions. Following are the figures in the four big battles of the Somme, 'Arras, Ypres and Messines The divisions engaged from the Motherland and Dominions respectively are: At the Somme, five to one: Arras, three to one: two to one at Ypres and seven to one at Messines. Two to one is the ratio of the casualties per division of the Motherland and Dominions respectively:' At the Somme, five to four; Arras, seven t six; Ypres, five to one, and Messines eleven to thirteen
