





Taking Care of Wrecks. WHAT THE RECEIVER OF WRECK

HAS POWER TO DO. Heavy weather and storms at sea are always followed by shipwrecks. The question of wrecks is a big one, nvolving the possible loss of life and much property, and has to be attended to at once-for the sake of those on board, and the insurance company who

For this reason the coast-line of the United Kingdom has been divided up into sections by the Board of Trade, and over each section presides a man known as "The Receiver of Wreck." Should a vessel be dashed on to the rocks the Receiver of Wreck for that section goes at once to the scene of the disaster and takes general command over everyone present. Even the captain of the distressed ship is under him, though the receiver must not go so far as to interfere between the captain and crew, unless the former asks

No One Disputes His Word.

The Receiver can call upon any other vessels near by to render assistance in the way of boats and men, and it would be as much as a skipper's post would be worth to refuse to help. The Receiver of Wreck can commandeer any carts, horses or motorcars in the district. For a person to refuse a penalty of one hundred pounds can be imposed.

Also, while carrying out his duties through any private property he may

For the time being all the goods from the ship, whether salved or washed ashore, are under his direct control, and he has full power as to their disposal. Thus, in a case of perishable goods, he can order them to be sold at

Should there be any attempt made to plunder or destroy goods from the Wreck, he has full rights to quell it by force, and until the whole affair has been cleared up the Receiver of Wreck is absolutely King of the Castle -anyone attempting to cross his path being summarily dealt with, and coming off second best to the extent of one hundred pounds or imprisonment. MISCREANTS MADE ATTEMPTS TO

SUFFOCATE 220 MEN. One of the most devilish attempts to by officials of the Dominion Coal Company at their mine at Caledonia vesterday afternoon.

It was a clear case of sabotage, according to mining men and others who investigated the case, and the attempt is admittedly the worst ever known in mining circles in all the Dominion. By spragging two of the doors some forty feet or so from the bottom of the air shaft, the heartless miscreants intended to shut off the supply of air from the working section where some two hundred and twenty men were toiling at their honest labors. Had the spragged doors not been noticed by the officials, there is no doubt that an explosion would have taken place, blot ting out the lives of the unsuspecting miners, resulting in the loss of many

fathers, sons and brothers. This morning officials of the company began an investigation in the hope of bringing home the awful crime to the heads of the guilty parties .--North Sydney Herald, March 30.

Britain Will Accept Boundary.

Found Death Amidst Frost and Snow.

PETROZAVODSK, Russian Karelia. More Red army soldiers were frozen to death than were killed in action in the recent campaigns in the semiarctic Karelian woods, against the Finnish-Karelian insurgents. A report of the army staff says 145 were killed in action and 257 frozen. The warfare was a conficit between fur-clad troops on skiis and snowshoes in the woods.

Oil is the Wonder Fuel.

CUT AQUITANIA'S ENGINE ROOM STAFF FROM 350 TO 63.

More and more it is being realized by shipping authorities that oil is the ideal fuel for ocean liners, and never was it exemplified so much as in the 46,000 ton Cunarder Aquitania, one of the first big ships to be converted from coal burning to oil burning. In a voyage on the Aquitania reently a local shipping expert was saw 3 shifts of men numbering 63, here being 21 on each shift, doing the work formerly done by 350 firemen. The big engine room is now spotlessly clean and, strange to say, quite cool even in the vicinity of the big furnace. The oil fuel with such little fuss drives the big liner through powerful head seas at the rate of 23 knots

an hour for a whole voyage. It was graphically illustrated by this official that the Aquitania goes the distance of from Montreal to Lachine three times every hour for six days without any let up.

She no longer is delayed in port by the work connected with coaling and does not require the work of hundreds of men to clean her afterwards. Her oil cocks are merely connected with the oil tanks at the sier and, in a re-cent record, she was completely supplied with fuel for her trip home in 91/2 hours, to make a turn round that would have been impossible with coal. There is no vibration on the big ship.

In her recent trip from Newcastle to Southampton after being renovated and converted to oil the Mauretania carried hundreds of people from all parts of England, the guests of the Cunard Steamship Co., and reports are now being waited for here as to whether she is still the fastest liner afloat. It is thought now that her traisatlantic record made before the war will never be beaten.-Ex.





Instruments Made on a Lonely Island.

Cablegrams to Australia have been considerably expedited by the recent inventions of a former Rugby man, Mr. K. C. Cox, station electrician at the Auckland, New Zealand, office the Pacific Cable Board.

While in charge of the lonely Norfolk Island relay station in the South Pacific Mr. Cox fitted up a lathe and made the first instuments embodying his ideas. He perfected them in London on a recent visit.

Russian Pendulum Swings Back

MOSCOW, (Associated Press)-The dulum of the Russian Soviet clock is swinging, this winter, as far to the right as it once swung to the left, but the Communist party keeps the key to the works and accelerates its movements or retards them as it sees fit. From a country where, one year ago, private wealth was considered a crime prohibition of liquor was a state policy and gambling was sometimes punishable by death, Russia has changed to a land of open speculation, where people drink wine legally and openly, and bet on horse-racing by means of betting machines from which the government takes a profit. These are just a few of the changes since the Kronstadt revolt last March prompted Premier Lenine to inaugurate a new policy. In moving toward a state of capitalism, the government, since the Ninth All-Russian Soviet congress closed a few months ago with approval of Lenine's plans, has taken surgical short cuts in an effort to change within a few months the conditions prevalent for years.

NEW SURPRISES DAILY.

Moscow awakes each morning to a new surprise. It seems only yesterday that private banks were prohibited. Today, a few strokes of the pen of the Commissar of Finance, and private banks may operate at every corner. Yesterday, hearding of gold was a punishable offense. To-day, another decree and trading in it, making jewels of it, or anything one could want to do with it are legalized. "Radical cures for radical diseases" seems to be the government rule. A dezen sessions of the Congress of the United States couldn't accomplish the alterations made daily in the life of a Muscevite by the busy scribbling of the 17 pens of Russia's 17 commissars.

When Was Rouge First Used?

Rouge itself has not been in use for very long, but people have "reddened" themselves from the dawn of history. Short lengths of hollow bone, stained with a kind of red earth, have been discovered in the ancient dwellings of cavemen. And all through history we find references to the use of "raddle" or "ruddle"—the red stuff with which modern farmers mark their sheep. The ancient Egyptians used it, so did the Eburians before the days of Rome.

In the sixteenth century men and women alike "raddled" openly, and the colouring was obvious and exaggerated. In the days of Queen Anne, an additional "beautifier" was introduced in

the "beauty spot." A few years later the carefully prepared cosmetic from sullflower or carmine, now called rouge, was introduced, at first in France, and later in

Its use to-day is greatly modified, for while even half a century ago great ladies, and occasionally great men, rouged ostentatiously (for instance, the famous Lord Beaconsfield). the modern art of rouging is to conceal the art!

History in the Making.

SEVENTEENTH CENTURY NAU-TICAL RELICS.

LONDON .- Remnants of a wreck believed to date back to a Dutch-Spanish battle in 1641 have been brought to the surface by salvage workers in Lerwick harbor. Four ancient cannon, each seven feet long with a threeinch bore, have been salved and these have been supplemented by massive oak timbers, which are in a good state of preservation. It is believed that the wreck is that of a Dutch warship which, with three East Indiamen, was attacked by 10 armed ships of Dunkirk (then Spanish), in Bressay Sound, on June 13, 1641. After a flerce engagement, two of the Indians were sunk and the third escaped, while the Dutch warship was compelled to sur-

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
