**WEEKLY MEETING.**

The regular weekly meeting of the Municipal Council took place yesterday afternoon, Mayor Cook presided. The full board was present. The minutes of the previous meeting being read, the following business was transacted:

Deputy Minister of Public Works asked for repayment of the sum of \$50,000 advanced the Council in the early part of last year in connection with relief.

Consideration will be given the matter at the earliest opportunity.

Messrs. Budden, Connolly and other owners of buildings on LeMarchant Road West, wrote asking what action the Council intended taking in connection with their property. The property in question is out on the new street line and has been the subject of consideration by late councils. The locality referred to would be greatly improved by the removal of these houses and the present Board considers the removal necessary, but before making any definite decision on the matter, ground landfills will be communicated with.

Messrs. Monroe, Hayward and other residents of Forest Road called attention to a shed at the rear of their property that is at present being used as a garage and owing to there being no chimney in the same it constitutes a fire hazard to the entire neighbourhood.

It was ordered that the owner of the shed be communicated with in the matter with a view to having same removed.

off Water Street West, The request was granted.

Messrs. Silverlock and Cullen applied for permission to install a gasoline tank on the South side of Water Street. The matter was referred to the Inspector General.

With regard to the resolutions of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners and also those of the Nfd. Industrial Association which were forwarded to the Council, asking that rules and regulations be passed to protect city workmen who are taxpayers, the Solicitor reported the Council had not the right to dictate to any employer of labour as to the men he should employ.

Joseph Judge and J. F. Ennis offered to sell horses to the Council. Application ordered filed.

A communication was read from W. A. Brown in reference to appraisal on his property, Merrymount Road. The matter was decided by the Court of Revision and the Council could not now interfere.

Plan submitted by T. Hillier to erect bungalow Circular Road was passed subject to the Engineer's approval, while application of P. Neville to erect dwelling on Cockpit Road was refused as water and sewerage are not available in the locality. The request of P. Grouchy to build on Pine Street was also refused for the same reason.

Inspector Rooney reported that the meter at the Newfoundland Atlantic Fisheries had been changed without his knowledge and that considerable waste was going on owing to defective fittings. The Secretary of the Company wrote in reference to the above matter stating that during last winter one of the valves in the smoke house froze and burst and the Chief Engineer had therefore to break open the door of the meter house and shut

off the water, to repair same later and he stated the meter was replaced with a new one. He also stated trouble in this connection would be avoided if the Council would seal a by-pass valve in the meter house so that the Company could shut off the water when required. This request for a by-pass the Council will not agree to, owing to irregularities which have occurred in the past through similar connections. The request of the Company for a boiler feed line as is allowed other manufacturing concerns was granted.

The Majestic Theatre Co. informed the Council that their Theatre during the Lenten Season was being run in the interests of St. Vincent de Paul and Dorcas Societies, and under the Municipal Act taxes on proceeds of entertainments of all kinds given to charity are not levied.

The Sanitary Supervisor was instructed to have Water Street cleaned up immediately and also to make the necessary preparations with the view of a general cleaning up of the city at an early date.

Health officer Brehm reported 2 new cases of diphtheria. There are at present in Hospital 22 patients with this disease.

Application of C. H. Hefferton to repair dwelling on Gower Street was granted.

Medical Health Officer acknowledged cheque for \$1,000 amount voted by the Council towards the Child Welfare Service for 1922.

A lengthy report was read from the City Engineer on the cleaning up of the town, in which he offered suggestions for the speedy completion of the work. The Engineer also reported that contractor Osmond had completed his contract of the piling at Long Bridge.

The attention of the Board was drawn to the fact that the old Fire Hall on the Southside which the Department of Public Works promised to remove last year is still a menace to vehicular traffic in this locality.

After the desposal of a few minor matters and the passing of accounts submitted, the meeting adjourned.

**Profits vs. Losses of Nationalism Debated.**

**WHICH HAS OUTWEIGHED THE OTHER IN CONTRIBUTING TO WORLD PROGRESS?**

What is probably a world-wide discontent with nationalism as we have come to recognize it was voiced at last night's debate at M.C.L.L. Hope for another order, to replace the present, was entertained. The resolution reads: "That the profits of nationalism to world progress outweigh the losses." The subject was debated as from a common ground—both sides deprecated nationalism and submitted or even insisted on its defects and evils. Both sides held out hope for something else that would come upon the world and end the evils which were the fruit of nationalism—in other words, internationalism, the brotherhood of man. Both sides admitted profits to have accrued from nationalism. Both sides admitted losses to have resulted from nationalism. The only point at which they divided was: which outweighed the other?

**SPEAKERS.**

The affirmative side (that which supported the "profits") was led by Rev. R. E. Fairbairn and William White; and the negative by Rev. Dr. L. Curtis and I. C. Morris. In addition to the set speakers the following took part in the debate: R. Cramm, Jos. Moore, R. F. Horwood, C. F. Garland, Fred. Moore, George Peters, S. P. Whiteway, William Dwyer, E. Bursey and J. R. Smallwood. Great light was thrown on the subject by the affirmative speakers. The remarkable feature about the debate was the unanimity of the Institute in recognizing the evils of nationalism and in believing that nationalism would have to give way to internationalism, whether now or sometime in the future.

**AFFIRMATIVE CASE.**

Nationalism meant a specific grouping of men; certain inclusions of men and territory, with its consequent exclusions, explained the affirmative. Nationalism meant that tendency to sectional cohesion and loyalty. It was presumed that the negative would agree to the definition. Now, in the first place the affirmative did not have to prove that nationalism had no evils. Nationalism did have evils, and there had been many losses as a result of it. Neither did the affirmative have to deal with futurity. Anything might come in the future. Neither did the affirmative have to deal with ideals or idealism in this matter. We all had our ideals, our hopes that the present order of nationalism would give way to something better. Many of us believed that nationalism had almost reached the point where its usefulness was outweighed by its defects. But the whole point to be debated to-night was the past—had the profits, in the past, outweighed the losses of nationalism?

The main contention of the affirmative was that civilization and culture had been the product of nationalism. Nationalism had made civilization possible, and without nationalism civilization would have been quite impossible. Society had to be organized in small groups in the early days, because men were incapable of bigger organization. Nationalism itself had been preceded by tribalism. Nationalism did not come until men were ready for it. The tribe had been preceded by the phatris. The phatris had been preceded by the gen. Each successive organization had typified an improvement in civilization and culture. As the race got older and more experienced it was capable of more elaborate organization and grouping. Nationalism was the outcome of many ages of existence, and nationalism itself would be supplanted by internationalism. The fact that the race moved onward and upward, thru each successive stage, was proof enough that nationalism's profits to world progress outweighed its losses. All that we are and have—our civilization and art and science and educa-

**NEGATIVE CASE.**

The negative side based its claim that the losses had outweighed the profits on the fact that all the wars that had ever taken place, with perhaps here and there an exception, were the product of nationalism. From the earliest times war and bloodshed had been the attendant evil of nationalism. From the great wars of the Babylonian times, down to the wars of the Medo-Persians, the Greeks, the Romans, and the wars between Asia and Europe, the Napoleonic wars, the modern wars, the Great War, nationalism had been the fruitful mother of war and slaughter. The Great War alone had destroyed ten million men, and maimed and broken ten million more. Untold wealth had been demolished, and a great debt had been tied round the neck of the nations; so that they still staggered under the weight of it. World progress was being hampered and impeded by nationalism. The misery and murder and horror and suffering and woe that had accompanied nationalism right down the line cried out against the terrible order of things which was being debated to-night. Nationalism made impossible the brotherhood of man and the fatherhood of God. Fellowship was impossible with nationalism. The negative looked forward, with Tennison, to the day when "the war drums throbbed no longer, the battle-flags were furled, in the parliament of man, the federation of the world." Nationalism was a great high barrier keeping apart the multitude of men who should be enjoying the warm bonds of fellowship. The affirmative side won with a good majority.

**Gunning Accident.**

**MAN HAD HAND SHATTERED.**

A man named Martin Torrant, resident of Lawn, was landed from S.S. Malskoff yesterday and taken to the General Hospital for treatment to his hand, which was badly shattered in a gun accident. Several days ago Torrant's younger brother was cleaning his gun, which he had been using the day previous. He was in his bedroom at the time, and the victim having occasion to go in the room, just as the gun went off, received the full force of the charge. Everything possible was done for the injured man, and when he arrived here yesterday he was doing as well as could be expected.

**Wins Billiard Tournament.**

Mr. E. Fox, by defeating Mr. W. C. Pearce in the final last night, won the Masonic handicap billiard tournament, which has been going on for the past two months. Mr. Fox had to make 400 to his opponent's 375. He won by 84 points. The prize, a handsome smoker's cabinet, was presented by Mr. E. G. Gittleson.

## SIDE TALKS.

You have heard the old saying that "truth is stranger than fiction."

I wonder if you know that often it is so much stranger than fiction that a true story might be made good fiction because it would not sound true. People sometimes suggest to the Author that plots for stories, strange things that happened to them, and are surprised, and sometimes offended, when she says that they would not do for plots because they would not sound true.

"What they are true!" they say, quite convinced that he is anything but satirical or stupid.

### They Sound Untrue.

### The Wheat Pool.

The demand presented by Mr. Wood of Alberta, for a renewal of the Wheat Board, is an ultimatum to the King Government. The Government contains members like Hon. W. R. Motherwell, who based his campaign in the West on promises to renew Government control of the market of the crop, and it contains members who are disinclined to get back to the war crisis. The Conservative Opposition has demanded a decision on the matter, and offered to suspend the present debate on the Address in order that the Western farmers may be satisfied, before planting time, respecting the conditions under which

they will market their wheat.

During the campaign, Mr. Meighen offered the West a scheme of a voluntary pool. This was highly commended by many Western business men, among them men who strongly opposed Mr. Meighen politically. The voluntary pool does not invade, to the farmer, as he sees fit with his own produce. The pooling of even a large part of the Western crop would put into operation a strong regulating force, capable of exercising an important influence on international quotations. If Premier King, who dodged a direct stand on this matter when he was in the West last, grant a compulsory pool, such as the Wheat Board operated, he will tread on many tender toes in the West. If he does not, he will have to adopt Mr. Meighen's practical expedient. The official leaders of the Grain Growers' Association may have strong convictions on the benefits of a renewed Wheat Board, but the body of Western farmers is not at all unanimous respecting it. The success of the Wheat Board in making the participation certificates worth almost half of the net prices received by the farmer for wheat during the December and January slump has not deceived the more astute traders respecting the changed conditions under which a Board for 1922 would have to operate.

There is, however, need for some central organization, financed by the

Government of the banks, which will make advances of, say, 75 cents a bushel on wheat at the beginning of the market season, and hold the grain for regulated selling. Millions of dollars could be saved to the producers by a financing system that would prevent dumping of huge supplies at one time on markets that naturally give way. Grain speculators who buy in September, October and December, calculate on good profits in February, March and April from the change in the market pressure. After the crop is out of primary hands, quotations go up. The outlook is for better wheat prices next Autumn, but assurance from the Government of a stable plan for handling the situation would be of immense help in putting the West really to work.—Ez.

### His Courage Evaporated

GIVEN A CHANCE TO KILL HIMSELF, BUT FAILED.

LISBON (Associated Press)—About 20 soldiers, sailors and civilians have been imprisoned on charges of being connected with the assassination of leading government officials last October. The investigation of the crimes continues but the identity of the superior officers who are supposed to have ordered the assassinations or at least to have permitted them have not

been discovered. "Golden Tooth," one of the sailors implicated, has taken to making scenes in court when he is called to be questioned. He has repeatedly declared that if he had a weapon he would kill himself. To test his courage the judge arranged that an unloaded revolver should be placed on the table near where he sat in the court room and when he made the usual threat, the judge said: "Well, do so, there is a pistol near." "Golden Tooth" hesitated and then took up the weapon, pointing it against his temple and laid it on the table, saying that he thought better of it. He threatened that he would kill Cunha Leal, the then Premier, when he was freed.

### THE SPARTAN.



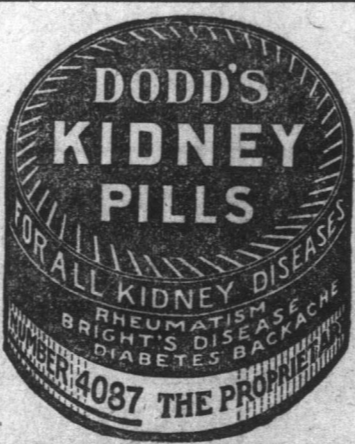

### Napoleonic Smuts.

(From the Louisville Courier Journal.)

There's only one way to deal with anarchy masquerading in the cloak of Bolshevism. Napoleon wrote the prescription in the streets of Paris 123 years ago.

"Can you control the mob?" inquired Barras in trepidation, of the young lieutenant summoned to his presence.

"Sire," said Napoleon, "I always do what I undertake."

Soon thereafter grape and cannon rained upon elements of disorder thronging the streets of the French capital.

The sun went down that night on a quiet city. Theatres that had been closed reopened their doors. The Government had asserted its authority.

General Smuts has the Napoleonic touch or iron in his blood. Alert to detect, sure to conclude, lightning-like to execute his decisions, the South African Premier has not yet learned how to compromise with treason.

His promptitude, his vigor, his policies of instant and stern repression reveal the mettle of the man.

### Giant Liner Comfort.

The Homeric, the first of the big new White Star liners for the Transatlantic service this spring, is a queenly vessel of 25,000 tons, and the largest twin-screw steamer in the world, she was acquired from Germany through the Reparations Committee.

A striking feature of the ship is the great number of unusually spacious staterooms, fitted for one person only, with bed and settee and other furniture, so that one gets the effect of a bed-sitting room. An official at an inspection recently said the Homeric would probably come to be regarded as the "bed-sitting room" liner. She has accommodation for 529 first class passengers, and the chief public rooms being on one deck, there is a wonderful vista of green and gold, white and pink from the dining room at one end to the smoke room at the other.

The New York services this summer, with six of the biggest ships afloat, will surpass all records. The White Star Line will have the Homeric, the Olympic, and presently the 56,000 ton Majestic, the largest vessel in the world; and the Cunard Line will have the popular Aquitania, the re-conditioned Berengaria, and the Mauretania.

Southampton port authorities are considering improvements to the deep-water approaches necessary for the manoeuvring of such great vessels.

### Rajputana.

The fascination exercised by India over those who know her is manifold; yet of all the races which inhabit the peninsula there is none which appeals more directly to the British mind than the Rajputs, among whom the Prince of Wales has lately been an honored guest, says the Manchester Guardian. Their annals are a veritable mine of feudal romance and knightly chivalry.

"There is not a petty State in Rajasthan," says their chronicler, James Tod, "which has not had its Thanes, mooglas, and scarcely a city which has not produced its Iconidas."

Descent from the Sun himself is proudly claimed by the Maharana of Udaipur, who is head of the Soodia clan, and there is no blood in India which is bluer than his. But he is probably even prouder of the fact that his is the only dynasty, saving that of Jaisalmer, which, in defiance of eight centuries of foreign domination, still holds sway over the lands which were won by the strong arm of his ancestor.

He also is the only clan which never gave a daughter in marriage to the Moguls at Delhi.

The city of Udaipur is a dream of beauty, but it is around the fort of Chitor, sixty-nine miles away, that the legends of a glorious past imperishably cling. Four times did Chitor suffer the horrors of sack, and every incident connected with these disasters reflects the unconquerable soul of the Rajput. The first siege by Akbar in 1567 failed, and when the second was about to succeed in spite of the sacrifice of eleven royal princes, each made Rana for the day the fatal Johar was proclaimed. The Rajput women proceeded to an underground cavern and there committed their bodies to the flames. The men, arrayed in bridal robes of saffron, sallied forth and died in arms against the invader. The last conqueror of Chitor was Akbar. In 1629 was the Johar again proclaimed. Thirty thousand of the inhabitants fell victims in that fatal year 1658 to the ambitions thirst for blood of the self-styled "guardian of mankind," and to this day "the sin of the slaughter of Chitor" is a binding spell upon every Rajput.

To this day also the Maharana of Udaipur, in fulfillment of the vow made by his great forbear, Rana Pratap Singh, refuses to set foot in Delhi, and his beard remains untouched by the shears.

The Maharaja of Bundi is head of the Hara Chauhan sect, who, like the Kachhwahas, are agnikulas, or "fire-born." His Highness presents a picturesque figure in his durbar dress which includes a wide flowing skirt. A sister State that of Kotah, which

separated from Bundi in 1579. From 1771 to 1824 the reins of authority in Kotah were in the hands of the Regent Zaim Singh, the Machlavelli of Rajputana, who during the four-score years of his existence could always say "my secret is my own." Despite the blindness which overtook him in later years he was able to circumvent the crafty Maratha, to quell or calm the turbulence of his fellow-Rajputs, and to extort commendation even from the cold and critical Englishman.

### Three Friends' Entertainment.

EUROPE'S "JAZZED" CURRENCY. London, March 23.—Europe's "jazzed" currency became even more jazzed to-day when the mark was quoted on the London Exchange at six a penny, seventy-two times less than its pre-war value. The slump follows Germany's bad reaction to the latest reparations note. Austrian crowns were quoted at 34,000 to the pound.

Many United States business men, who have recently been in Germany, Russia and Eastern European countries, say depreciated currencies, and not mothers-in-law, are now the basis of practically all jokes in theatres, cabarets and humorous periodicals. One American said he entertained three friends at dinner in Moscow several weeks ago, which cost him 1,250,000 rubles, "less than twenty bucks," was the way he described it.

Lord Newton, in House of Lords, recently showed that a stenographer in the Allied Commission in Bulgaria got twenty times the salary of the Bulgarian Prime Minister.

"My expenses in Vienna for three weeks," said a United States business man to-day, "amounted to 400,000 crowns, or \$56. It is certainly jazz finance." An American said to have presented a \$1,000 note at a Vienna bank, just to see how much he could get for it, was told, "as many as you like." The latest quotation on rubles in London, is three million to the pound. Compared with Russian rubles and Polish and Austrian crowns, the German mark has still some pretensions to being called money.

"Born in County Meath in 1828, Pigott made a place for himself in Irish journalism. He had died at fifty he would not have been known as a scoundrel. He owned newspapers. Published patriotism. Milked the Fenian funds to live luxurious days. Ate, drank, and entertained extravagantly. Was semi-popular, unrespected, tolerated as a useful party man.

"Then Parnell came. Having no use for the creature and no pity he refused to buy him at any price. Preferred to destroy him. Boycotted his newspapers and then bought them cheap and let him go to the devil—what he did."

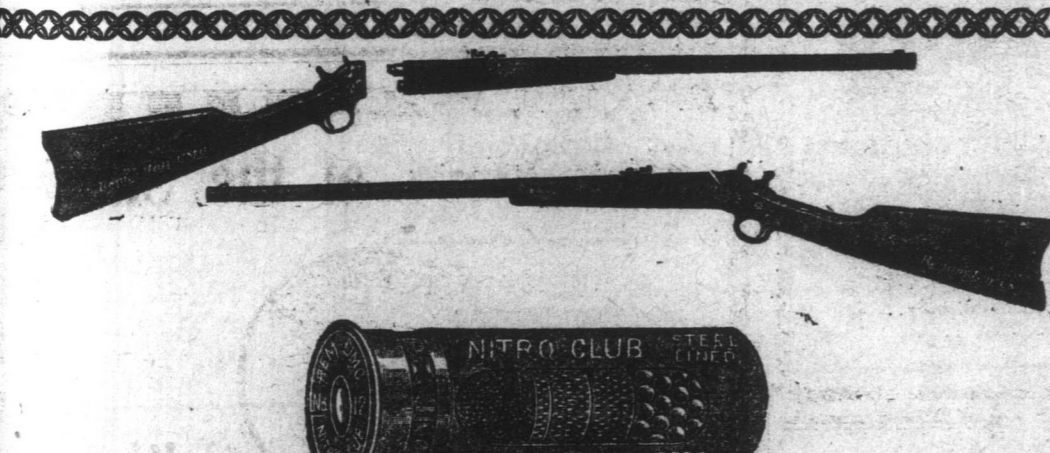

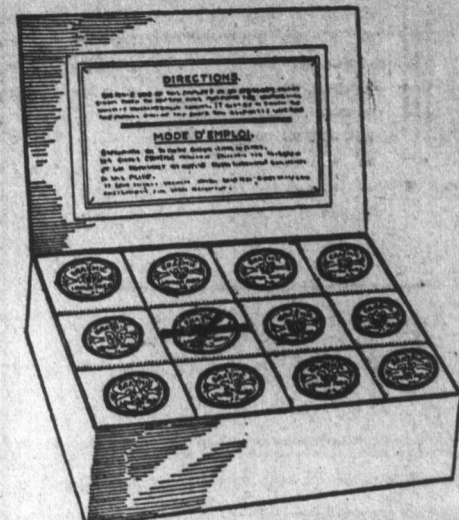

## Big Indoor Meet.

BOXING AND WRESTLING EXHIBITION ATTRACTS LARGE AUDIENCE—EXCITING CONTESTS.

For four hours last night, the eyes of over 2000 people were centred on the ring in the C.L.B. Armoury, where the much advertised boxing and wrestling contests were held. This was the first event of its kind to be staged here for many years and as a result of its success, the N.A.A.A. will probably be urged to hold a similar meet annually. The finals of the wrestling bouts were exciting and only two were decided by falls. The boxing, except in the case of one or two bouts, was tame and showed that our local athletes are not so proficient in this form of sport as in wrestling. The exhibition was held under the rules which governed the Inter-Allied sports meet at Paris. The C.L.B. Band, under Capt. A. Morris, rendered excellent music between the various bouts.

### GYMNASTIC EXHIBITION.

The programme opened with a Horizontal Bar Exhibition by Mr. A. E. Holmes and his class. Mr. Holmes, himself, is a picture of graceful strength and some of his "stunts" showed him to be possessed of a power of endurance, well above the average. His hand balancing feat was particularly good. The class, while not so proficient in the more difficult feats as their instructor, did very well.

### EXCITING WRESTLING.

The first wrestling bout was the featherweight. The contestants were E. Goodland and T. Hall, the latter having an advantage of 3 lbs. Hall won on points. From the start, Goodland gained a momentary advantage which was soon lost. After some strenuous struggling Hall nearly got his man to the mat with a half nelson which he shifted to a scissors hold. The bout ended with Hall holding his man with a scissors on the right arm, and a half nelson.

### A CLOSE CONTEST.

The second wrestling bout was between the lightweight champions, A. Hennebury, who tipped the scales at 128 1/2 and C. Stone who weighed 5 lbs. less. For the first few minutes, neither adversary could gain any advantage. At last, Hennebury got to grips with his man and obtained various holds on him, from all of which Stone contrived to break clear. He secured a half nelson on Hennebury, who breaking clear, in his turn, downed his man with a scissors, securing the first fall in 7 mins. 13 secs. The second part of the bout aroused keen interest but no falls were obtained and Hennebury was declared the winner.

### A LUCKY FIGHT.

Fred Marshall and Art Hammond, two of the best known of local wrestlers, were the contestants in the welter weight bout. Marshall won, securing a fall in 5 mins. 51 secs. with a scissors hold. Soon after the start of the second part of this bout, Marshall fell on his right hand, breaking it at the joint of the first finger. Despite this accident, he held on for the full time. After the bout, Dr. John Grievo dressed the injured hand. This accident debarred Marshall from boxing.

### STRENGTH AGAINST SKILL.

The final bout in the wrestling was that between the two middleweight entrants, A. Martin and P. Gontar. This was a match of skill against strength. Martin won on points. He several times got a hold on his opponent but the latter's strength prevented him from being thrown. On one occasion, while both contestants were standing, Gontar seized Martin around the hips and lifted him from his feet. The bout ended with Martin holding his man with a scissors.

Mr. B. E. Stafford referred the wrestling bouts and Messrs. E. Goodland and J. Campbell were judges.

### GOOD BOXING.

The first bout in the boxing was between two men from the Naval Wireless Station, E. J. Parker and R. H. Bunt. The latter was the only entrant for the fly weights, and therefore pluckily agreed to fight in the light weights. His opponent had an advantage of 11 lbs.

The 1st Round was not very fast. Bunt was at first on the defensive and his light footwork kept him clear of his opponent. Near the end of the round he attacked, landing with his left to the chest and right to the side.

The 2nd Round was Parker's. For the first few seconds it was a case of give and take. Bunt led with his left to the chin, and Parker began to fight wildly, finally flooring his opponent with a right to the chin.

The 3rd Round was an improvement on the others. A jolt to the head sent Bunt to the ropes. Parker following up, Bunt tried for the plexus but was nearly felled with a glancing blow. Coming in again, a punch to the point of the jaw, lifted him off his feet. Parker followed up, and was forcing Bunt to the ropes when the gong went.

The 4th Round. This was Bunt's round throughout. He forced Parker around the ring, getting in several good blows to the face and chin. Bunt was declared to have won on points.

### SAVED BY GONG.

The next bout was a thriller. The contestants were A. Hood, of the Wireless Station, and E. Mansfield, a local boxer. This was the quickest bout Mansfield retiring hurt, after being twice down for a long count in the

first and only round. The contest started at a fast pace, Hood landing with his right on Mansfield's head and following up with a punch to the jaw which sent Mansfield down for the count of 8. No sooner was he on his feet again when Hood came in, and again scored the local man with a left to the stomach and a right to the point of the jaw. At the count of 8, the gong rang, Mansfield, however, complained of an injured arm and Hood was awarded the contest.

### EXCITING BOUT.

F. Burrige took Marshall's place in the welter weight fight. His opponent was M. Churchill. Burrige won on points. There was far too much clinching in the first round, the advantage being with Churchill.

In the 2nd Round, Burrige forced Churchill to the ropes, but slipped, and the latter got in three jabs to the mouth with his left. Burrige retaliated with a left to the chest and a right to the cheek. Near the end of the round, Burrige was floored by a glancing blow. There was very little interest attached to the next two rounds, and as the judges decided the bout was a draw, a fifth round was fought. This was exciting. Burrige landed three lefts to the back of the neck but was pushed off with a right to the head. The gong went as Burrige landed heavily with his left on Churchill's mouth.

### A HUGGING MATCH.

Ern Spry and F. Byrne were the fighters in the middle weights. Byrne was awarded a decision on points, but this aroused much adverse comment as Spry had fought well, and had been fouled twice. Byrne rushed to a clinch whenever he was in danger and on several occasions, jabbed with one arm while holding with the other.

The 1st Round was Byrne's, inasmuch as he landed several blows to his opponent's body, but he was far too fond of a clinch.

The 2nd Round consisted chiefly of clinching with an occasional jab to break the monotony. This was easily Spry's round.

In the 3rd Round, Byrne was twice severely warned by the referee for fouling. Spry forced the pace, Byrne clinching all the time.

The 4th Round was Spry's again. He opened with a blow to the chin. A clinch followed and as Spry broke away, he sent his left to Byrne's chin. Byrne came in, swinging his right to the stomach. They clinched, and as they broke clear, Spry led with his left to the chin. The judges thought the contest was a draw and another round was fought. Byrne gave a right arm jolt to the head, and a left to the jaw. Spry led back with his left to the mouth, and followed it with another to the neck. Byrne swung with his left to the jaw and followed with a jab which closed Spry's eye. The latter's nose had also received a severe blow and bled freely. Byrne was forcing the pace when the gong went.

### EXHIBITION BOXING.

P. O. Allen and P. O. Pascoe of H.M.S. Cambrian next delighted the audience with an exhibition bout. Pascoe is champion in his weight of the North Atlantic Squadron. He gave a beautiful exhibition of in fighting. Three 2-minute rounds were fought.

### DAVID AND GOLIATH.

The next fight was between W. Burns, who weighed 188 lbs., and O. Keefe who weighed 160 lbs. The latter was far too light for his opponent. This bout was most amusing. Burns merely keeping his man off with an occasional jab just to remind him of what might happen if he became too lively. The last two rounds were nothing better than a hugging match.

### THE BEST FIGHT.

The last bout was the final in the lightweights. The contestants were Bunt and Hood, both of the naval wireless station. Hood won in points. Bunt was a plucky fighter and although 12 lbs. lighter than Hood, gave a good account of himself. His footwork was fast and light. The first three rounds were fairly even, the advantage, if any, being with Hood. The fourth round opened with Bunt swinging to Hood's face with his right. Hood retaliated with several body blows, forcing the smaller man to the ropes. Mr. Gordon Winter, who, some years ago was perhaps the finest amateur boxer in the country, refereed the boxing bouts in a manner which gave complete satisfaction. The judges were Messrs. J. Vincombe and P. F. Malone. Parde Nangle deserves great credit for the splendid success of the exhibition.

## Quicker Cables.

New Instruments Made on a Lonely Island.

Cablegrams to Australia have been considerably expedited by the recent inventions of a former Rugby man, Mr. K. C. Cox, station electrician at the Auckland, New Zealand, office of the Pacific Cable Board.

While in charge of the lonely Norfolk Island relay station in the South Pacific Mr. Cox fitted up a lath and made the first instruments embodying his ideas. He perfected them in London on a recent visit.

The most important of his inventions are a selenium magnifier and an interpolator. The former magnifies signals which come from a long distance in too weak a form to be received automatically. By Mr. Cox's device the message operates a tiny circular mirror which throws a beam of powerful light divided into bars on a plate prepared with selenium, a chemical element with electrical properties acutely sensitive to light.

The action of the current representing the message causes the mirror to oscillate and a movement in the bars of light results, producing on the sensitive chemical element changes corresponding in the received signals.

The power from these changes can, if necessary, be multiplied 40,000 times. The message then passes through the interpolator, which cuts the signal into its original elements and also automatically sends the message to the next cable station.

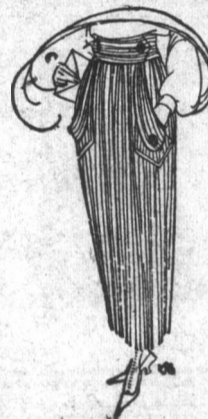
Mr. Cox, who is about 45, has been for about 20 years in the service of the board which operates the Imperial Cable from Halifax, Nova Scotia, to Australia.

## Strange African Superstitions.

MANNERS AND CUSTOMS IN THE CONGO.

LONDON (Associated Press)—

Strange superstitions such as belief that the appearance of a baby's first teeth on the upper jaw was an ill-omen to the community, and that it had, therefore, to be murdered, were described by Dr. M. Horn, Councillor of State for Belgium in an address here on "Belgian Colonial Administration in the Congo." This practice, as well as others like mutilation and cannibalism, is now punishable by law. The law also interfered, he said, with native matrimonial customs. While a man may acquire a wife either by means of a dowry paid to her family, by inheritance, purchase, exchange or force of arms, no legal bond is deemed to exist between the alleged husband and the woman acquired

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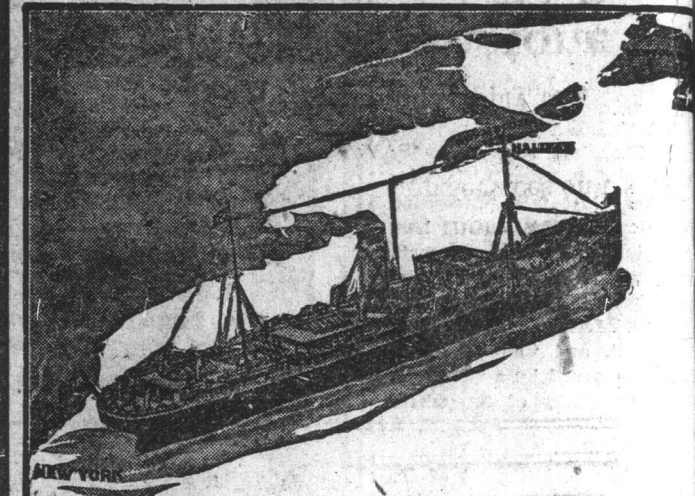
