### Essential Preference.

The fear that Imperial Preference may lead to undiluted Protection found forethle expression in the House of Commons debate on June 11th, when an amendment against the Preferential rates in the Budget was defeated by a majority of 105. Sir William Joynson-Hicks showed that while Preference in some cases materially reduced costs to the consumer, it has been of substantial benefit to the Empire producer. Advantages have been mutual. Canada is extending her Preference on British goods, and throughout the Empire the movement is distinctly in favor of fiscal measures which aim at securing the best of all markets on a reciprocal basis. Sir Edward Davson puts in a strong plea for an all-around Imperial Preference of thirty-three and onethird per cent. It would greatly simplify matters if some such arrangement could be egected, and no doubt the pres and cons will be well weighed at the Economic Conference. "Encouraged by the results of 1913 the Brother divided his birds into two flocks. In the one, he practised inbreeding, while with the other he started a new line by introducing Wyandotte blood by means of a good male of that breed. The resulting progeny was of a graceful compact shape and inclined to be shorter in the body. He continued a rigorous selection from the standpoint of egg-production, at the same time trying to improve the breed along other lines from year to year. In 1916 the flock attained a uniformity, and gave an egg-production so remarkable, that he considered his ends practically achieved except for the fact that the birds were not yet heavy enough, and consequently did not give the desired amount of meat.

"Fortunately in the spring of the same year, 1916, he obtained a magnificent pullet, which weighed seven and three-quarter pounds at seven months, and which proved to be a good layer, laying 91 eggs during the four months of November and December, 1916 and January and February 1917. The arrival of this unexpected bird opened up new horizons for the young breed. Brother Wilfred then conceived the idea, rash though it seemed to some breeders, of mating this magnificent pullet with a superb White Plymouth Rock cock weighing ten pounds. He felt that as a result. he could not but obtain heavier and larger hirds, without diminishing the laying capacity. The offspring of this mating proved the force of his contentions.

"The Brother then chose the best cockerels coming from this new mating, and mated them in the spring of 1918 to the best hens of the two lines seen, among the progeny there were a few hens with single combs, but the elimination of these poultry specimens, was more than compensated for by the general improvement of others. He then considered that the new breed was sufficiently fixed in type and general characteristics to be presented to the poultry world."







### Mr. Baldwin on the **English Speaking People.**

At the annual dinner of the Rhode Trustees, the Prime Minister respond ing to the toast of "The British Empire and the United States." proposed by Sir Charles Sherrington, likened England to an orchard which had set forth saplings from old stock to the uttermost corners of the earth; the quality of the fruit may be different but the fruit is none the less fragrant. He instanced "four chief qualities, persistent, consistent, among the English speaking people." These are (1) from long inheritance, an innate sense of justice; (2) that real democratic feeling which values a man for what he is; (3) a sense of political freedom which neither degenerates into license nor retrogades into tyranny-and the price of that liberty is eternal vigilance; (4) the belief that men can worship in their own form and manner, the belief in God and in the responsibility not only of the individual but of the nation for his and their actions on earth.
