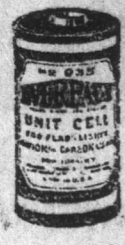

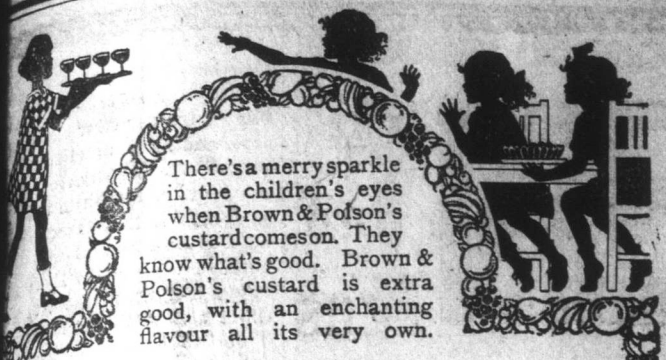

Three Party Conference Considers Nova Scotia Mines Dispute

Germany's Note Engages Attention of Powers--British Cabinet Faces a Deadlock on Cruiser Construction--British Miners Insist on Withdrawal of Owners' Proposals.

SYDNEY, July 22. (AP)—The British Steel Corporation officials, the Mine Workers of America and the Premier of Nova Scotia, the Minister of Works and Mines, E. N. Rhodes and Hon. G. S. Harcourt, respectively, were adjourned until to-morrow afternoon, after the arrival here of J. T. Dewar, Deputy Minister of Mines. The conference is aimed at reaching a settlement between the mine owners and employees and opened on Monday. No statements have been made.

BRAND'S VIEWS NOT SUPPORTED. PARIS, July 22. The Government has begun careful consideration of the German security note presented to the Allies on Monday and will get in touch as soon as possible with the various countries interested to determine the policy to be followed in carrying on. If this is decided, negotiations with the German Government for a security pact guaranteeing the western German frontiers. Exchanges of views will require many days, and consequently conversations with German Ambassadors at London or Paris will not start for some time. The favorable impression made by Foreign Minister Briand's summary of the German note was not maintained after perusal of the text, when it was made public officially yesterday.

CHINA'S DEVELOPMENT. LONDON, July 22. The Labor Party published to-day the text of a 1500 word manifesto, cabled by the Canton Nationalist Government, protesting against and denouncing "the exploitation of China by Imperialist powers," which, it declares, prevents China from developing herself on independent nationalist lines. "Imperceptibly and by degrees," says the manifesto, "the issue is undermining the peace of the world, until a new universal tragedy will be enacted in the Pacific Ocean. It will then be too late for you to help extinguish the conflagration."

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CONFERENCE CONDITIONS. LONDON, July 22. The possibility of a Great Britain coal strike was increased to-day when the miners refused to confer with the owners unless the latter first withdrew their proposal for wage decreases.

DEADLOCK ON THE CRUISER QUESTION. LONDON, July 22. Premier Stanley Baldwin apparently failed at to-day's Cabinet meeting to settle the deadlock caused by conflicting opinions of Cabinet Ministers regarding the building of several new cruisers. The Cabinet session this morning adjourned without it, it is understood, reaching any definite decision.

SETTLING CHINA'S PROBLEM. WASHINGTON, July 22. Substantial accord has been reached by the powers concerning the formula to deal with the whole Chinese problem. Formal acquiescence in some elements of the programme still is lacking, but Peking diplomats are expected to be in a position to submit the formula to the provisional Government of China, at an early date.

U. S. COAL SITUATION. ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. Anthracite operators reported to-day that at a conference with the miners' representatives here this morning, they were assured no strike in the hard coal field was meant in the telegram sent yesterday by Van A. Bittner, leader of the soft coal miners, to Secretary of Commerce Hoover and Secretary of Labor Davis. Bittner's telegram had declared that unless there was some settlement of the wage controversy in northern West Virginia, a general coal strike might result.

EDUCATIONAL DELEGATE DISAPPEARS. LONDON, July 22. A twenty-four hour search by Scotland Yard has failed to reveal even a trace of Professor Joseph Victor Colness of Stevens Point, who is a delegate to the World Federation of Education Associations, meeting at Edinburgh, who disappeared here on Monday.

KILLED BY LIGHTING. AMOS, Que., July 22. R. Gendreau, 13, was instantly killed when a lightning bolt entered his home yesterday afternoon. Another occupant of the house was stunned. The house was slightly damaged.

ROYAL WEATHER FOR ROYAL GARDEN PARTY. LONDON, July 22. One of the most successful and colorful royal garden parties since the war was held in the beautiful grounds of Buckingham Palace on Tuesday with King George and Queen Mary as hosts, to seven thousand subjects and distinguished guests from foreign countries. The hold-up was the work of two unknown gunmen who entered the Club and forced the patrons to line up with face to the wall. The bandits secured about twenty dollars and made their escape after shooting two patrons.

CONSIDERATION FOR HIS VICTIMS. LONDON, Ont., July 22. Leslie Hathaway, held here on a charge of holding up the Thorndale Bank and taking \$8,000 after locking the staff in the safe, told police officers he had returned to Thorndale within an hour after the robbery, having feared that the hold up had not been discovered and that the staff he locked in the safe would suffocate.

Warns Against Marrying Aliens

BRITISH COLONIAL OFFICE SENDS OTTAWA CIRCULAR REGARDING QUESTIONS. GIVES GIRLS ADVICE. MANY DIFFICULTIES REPORTED IN PATH OF UNION WITH COLORED MEN.

OTTAWA, July 11. (C.P.)—The difficulties which confront a Canadian girl, who may happen to contract marriage with a Chinaman, Hindu, Moslem or African Negro, are illuminatingly set forth in a memorandum which has been received from the British Colonial office by the Department of Secretary of State. The communication was forwarded here, in view of recent marriages of English girls into the races indicated. While the memorandum refers particularly to English women, it is pointed out that similar disadvantages attach themselves to Canadian girls who likewise may marry a Chinaman, Hindu, Moslem or Mongolian.

Marriage of a British girl to a Chinaman results in the loss of her British nationality thereby, and the fact that her marriage is valid in British law would not avail to protect her in China from a treatment which does not conform with the rules applicable in Christian countries in regard to marriage. In the case of such a marriage, there can be no actual guarantee that if the husband returns to China he may not, in accordance with the customs existing in that country, take to himself other wives in addition to the first, or even that he may not have already entered into marriage relationships in China.

The marriage of a woman of British nationality professing the Christian faith with a Hindu, even in a case when it is valid in all respects in this country, is not necessarily so when the husband returns to India. In India, he is subject to what is known as his "personal" law, and this law would probably not recognize the marriage at all.

In the case of a Mohammedan, although marriage between Christian women and Moslems are recognized as valid by Mohammedan law, the fact that the forms prescribed by English law only were gone through might place the parties in a position of some difficulty in a Mohammedan law, the husband may, if he desires, take other wives, in addition to the first, without consulting his first wife, whether a Christian or otherwise. Where a marriage-relationship is constituted which the Mohammedan husband may, under Mohammedan law, divorce his wife at will without any legal formality beyond that of repudiating her, and of discharging the mahr, or marriage settlement, agreed upon; while should he return to his own country leaving his Christian wife here, the fact of their being thus locally separated

Worth Knowing

When it is convenient to wash a floor, boards may be cleaned by rubbing silver sand into the grain of the wood, using a short-bristled brush, and working in the direction of the grain. Use a softer brush to remove the sand. Light bamboo and basket-work tables and chairs, when used out of doors, soon get soiled, but they clean easily if scrubbed with a small brush dipped first in warm water and then in kitchen salt. Wipe with clean damp cloths and dry in the sun. Occasionally flat irons should be scoured by washing in hot soda water and soap, scrubbing with a brush. After this they should, of course, be dried. A new iron needs to be broken into work by being heated for several hours and then cleaned. This process should be repeated for three or four days.

Nothing spoils the look of a kitchen more than a discoloured top to the kitchen table. To keep really in first-class condition quite a lot of back-scrubbing must be put into it. The same result may be obtained, but with considerable less labor, if a few drops of ammonia are added to the water in which it is cleaned. It will make it snowy-white, and counteract any tendency towards yellowness that the wood may display. For removing stains from table linen, or from delicate-coloured and

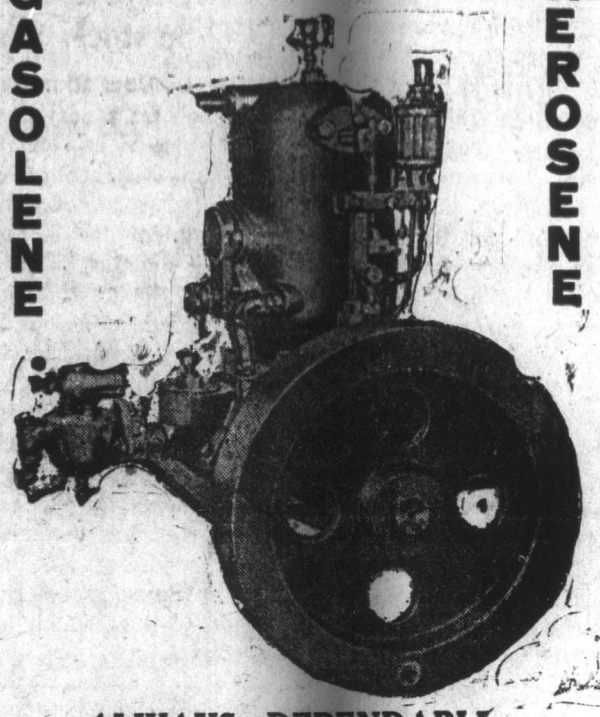

Our Salmon

After a brief visit to the pools of Salmonier River, Mr. Chambers, the Government canning expert, who is here from British Columbia, expresses astonishment at the immense herds of salmon which he witnessed, and while such a cursory investigation would not warrant his giving a definite opinion, he suggests that in our salmon we possess potential wealth which should compare favourably with that of British Columbia.

Speaking from our own knowledge of the run of salmon in the rivers in various parts of the Island, and it is fairly comprehensive, we are convinced that, while the narrowness of Salmonier water and the ease with which the fish can be seen may make the number of fish appear phenomenal, it is by no means an exceptional river in this respect, and in fact the indications are that the run is considerably exceeded in the larger rivers of the West Coast.

The remarks of Mr. Chambers are of sufficient importance to direct greater attention to this fishery, and to justify a thorough investigation into its possibilities. So far, in connection with the fisheries we have been merely content to glean by the simplest means the products within convenient reach, and the consequence has been a hand to mouth existence for the producers. There is no attempt to explore, no attempt to conserve or replenish the stock, and when the supply has failed or has been completely exhausted by our unsystematic and wasteful methods, in resignation we bow our heads and say, "It is the will of God."

Read the past history of the whale fishery in these waters; see what happened in the lobster fishery; trace the waning glory of the seal fishery, and, to turn to another natural source of wealth, can anything be more suicidal than the present policy which permits the ruthless destruction of our timber areas, in order to supply foreign manufacturers with raw material, material that could be utilized with wonderful results at home?

In discussing the possibilities of the salmon canning industry, Mr. Chambers makes a suggestion that will prove a dreadful shock to Waltonians and a good many others besides. It is to the effect that the netting of the rivers, which is at present a heinous offence, should be legalized. On the surmise that the spawning beds may be frequented by more fish than can comfortably be accommodated, he proposes that on alternate nights the rivers should be closed by nets as they are in British Columbia, and claims that by thus restricting the number of fish which reach the spawning ground, the natural increase would be materially augmented. His theory is that owing to overcrowding the fish which are late in arriving destroy the spawn of those which have already made their domestic arrangements.

It is not by any means our intention to suggest that such a reversal of the present regulations should be adopted before the fullest investigation has

been made, and the result of adopting such methods proved beyond peradventure. We are inclined to view the question solely from the angler's standpoint, but the suggestion does open another aspect, and to refuse to consider it through prejudice, or from fear of being regarded as a Philistine, will not help in any way, and we intend therefore to discuss the matter further.

Our columns are open for the discussion of this topic, as we consider it of the utmost importance that all the information available from competent authorities should be secured.

Government Work Sought

The following message from King's Cove was received yesterday by the Telegram:

KING'S COVE, July 22.
Special to Evening Telegram.
Owing to the poor fishery, a great number of men are unemployed in this district from Blackhead Bay to Plate Cove west. In a meeting held here Monday night it was resolved to ask the Government to endeavour to find employment preferably near here, but to find employment anyway. This resolution backed by about 400 signatures will be sent to the Hon. the Prime Minister.

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES

RECRUITING OF SPECIAL POLICE DENIED.

LONDON, July 22.
Rt. Hon. Sir Wm. Joynson Hicks, the Home Secretary, replying to a question in the House of Commons to-day denied that any steps were being taken to recruit special police in London against a possible industrial emergency. It was reported a few days ago that the City Magistrates had been instructed to make preparations for the swearing in of special constables in the event of a great industrial strike.

KRIM'S ADHERENTS SHOW SIGNS OF WEAKENING.

FEZ, July 22.
The French successes in Morocco in the past few days have had a decided effect on the moral of the Rif troops, and there are signs of weakening by Ab-Del-Krim's adherents. The Beni Mesglid tribesmen to-day offered to submit to the rule of the Sultan, forsaking the prophet who has undertaken to lead them into the Promised Land.

FRANCE PREPARES A SMASHING BLOW.

FEZ, July 22.
French reinforcements are arriving in ever increasing numbers and are being equipped without delay. They will proceed to the front where they will relieve the tired troops. Preparations are under way to strike what Premier Poincaré has termed a smashing blow should peace negotiations fail.

VICTORY FOR THE ADMIRALTY.

LONDON, July 22.
All the morning papers to-day say that the Cabinet crisis over the cruiser question ended in a victory for the Admiralty at Wednesday's Cabinet meeting. They assert that the Cabinet decided to comply with the Admiralty's modified demand for the building of four vessels this year and three next year.

BUBONIC PLAGUE SPREADING IN RUSSIA.

MOSCOW, July 22.
Bubonic plague is spreading dangerously in the lower Volga region. Thirty-one deaths from plague were reported last week, bringing the total to almost 100 since the epidemic appeared in June. Special hospital barracks are being built for the isolation of patients and sanitary detachments have been sent out to attempt to prevent a further spread of the plague.

ANTHRACITE MINERS WILL NOT BE A PARTY TO A GENERAL STRIKE.

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J., July 22.
The hard coal fields, so the anthracite miners assured the mine owners at the scale conference to-day, would not be included under present conditions in any general strike such as Yeh A. Bittner yesterday warned Secretary of Commerce Hoover and Secretary of Labor Davis might develop out of the unsatisfactory wage conditions in the Bituminous coal fields. The assurance came from Philip Murray, the Miners' International Vice-President and ranking officer of Mr. Bittner, who is chief Union organizer in West Virginia. Mr. Murray said that the anthracite miners fully agreed with the operators that hard and soft coal are to be kept separate and distinct during the negotiations of the renewal of the wage contract expiring August 31.

ECONOMY GROUP SURRENDER TO SEA LORDS.

LONDON, July 23.
If the morning newspapers are correct, the threatened resignation of the Sea Lords of the Admiralty have been averted by the surrender of the "Economy Group" of the cabinet headed by Winston Churchill, Chancellor of the Exchequer to W. C. Bridgeman, First Lord of the Admiralty and the other Sea Lords.

ANOTHER U.S. CITIZEN KILLED IN CHINA.

PEKING, July 23.
Morgan Palmer, United States citizen, has been killed by bandits at his ranch on Sulmari River near Harbin. Dr. Howard, an eye specialist attached to the Rockefeller Hospital, was captured at the same time.

BOTH ADAMANT.

LONDON, July 23.
Only nine days remain before the expiration of the present agreement on employment in the coal fields, and there is increasing anxiety as each day slips by without a settlement of the differences between the miners and mine owners concerning a new agreement. The miners are adamant in their refusal to meet the owners unless the latter withdraw the proposals for a new agreement, and the owners are equally insistent that they will not withdraw the proposals if the word "withdraw" is to be interpreted as "abandon."

STARTLING REVELATION OF TREATMENT OF INSANE PATIENTS.

TRENTON, N.J., July 23.
A sensational tale of the deaths following operations performed on patients of the New Jersey State Hospital for the insane of this city was revealed before the Bright Investigation Committee at the State House here yesterday by Miss Edith Strong, a nurse, who was discharged from the state service. She reported during the past year five women patients in her ward died and only two or three got well after they had undergone operations. In nearly every case Miss Strong testified the patients opposed operations, but were rushed into a room "like cattle" given an hypodermic injection and operated upon.

ESSEN SOON TO BE EVACUATED.

PARIS, July 22.
It is officially announced that Essen will be completely evacuated by French Troops by July 31st.

POLICEMAN RUNS AMOK.

NEW YORK, July 22.
In a drunken rage Patrolman John Edwards, 30, yesterday shot and killed Mrs. Bertha O'Connor, aged 38, in her East 35th Street apartment in the presence of her two sons. He then shot himself, inflicting a head wound from which he died three hours after. The policeman was married and a close friend of the Connors.

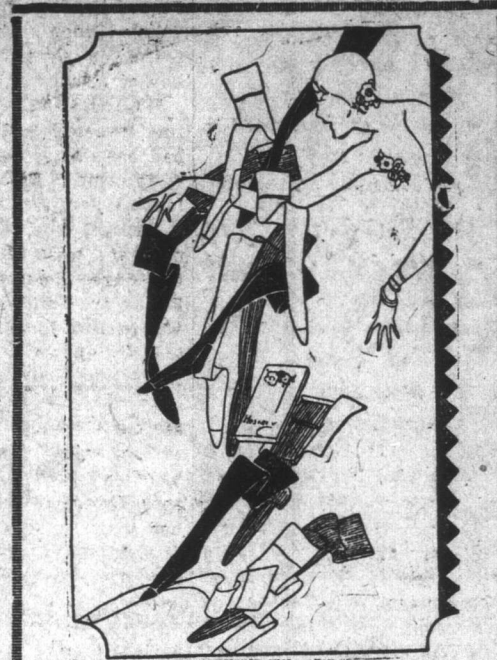

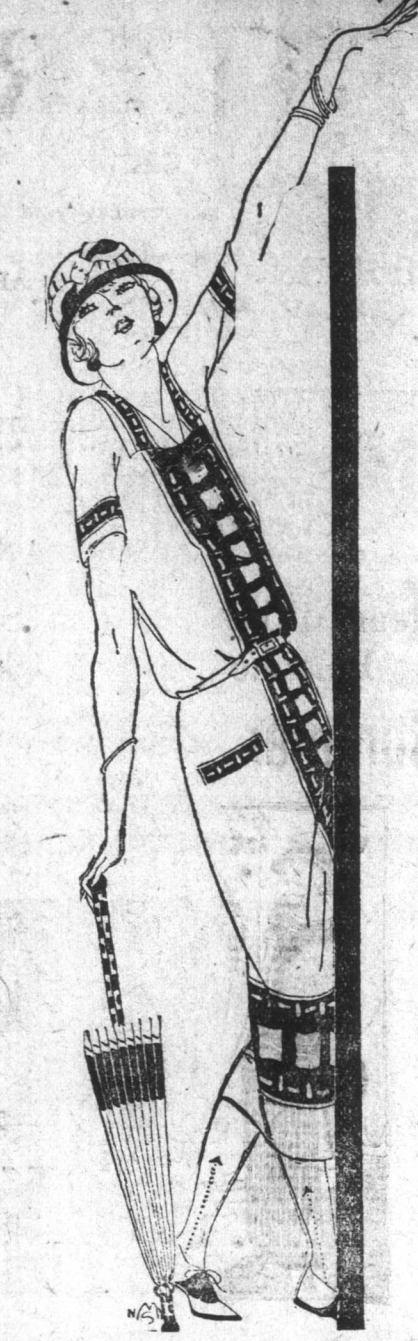

Our Duty to Those Who Sleep in God's Acre

Much of the important history of our city and our country was written in the lives of men and women who now rest in God's Acre by the Lake. The present generation owes a great deal to the nobility of character they displayed, to the unselfishness of their lives and to the loveliness of the example they set to their successors. It is a splendid thing for us of this generation to show by our care of their resting places that we appreciate them at something of their true worth.

Thousands of our city families are represented by the names borne by the monuments in the Church of England Cemetery. Constant pilgrimages are made, when weather permits, to this sanctuary of the departed. The beautiful lawns, well kept paths and shady lanes are never deserted during the daylight hours of the summer months. Those who sleep there are kept in constant and loving remembrance by the thousands of visitors to the Cemetery near the gentle waters of Quidi Vidi Lake.

Representatives of the various city Churches pay constant attention to the condition of this hallowed place. The present Cemetery Committee has displayed a commendable devotion to their duties as supervisors of the place. Under their direction innumerable improvements have been made in the surroundings and an effect is constantly being made to beautify the grounds and all that appertains to them. With these activities all right-thinking citizens are in complete accord and they are especially comforting to those whose dear ones sleep their last sleep in this God's Acre.

During the present summer season the Committee has given a great deal of attention to this precious charge of theirs. The fences of the cemetery have been repaired and, in some sections, renewed. The Little Martyr Chapel, where the last offices of the Church have been said so many times of Her sons and daughters, has been put in nice repair and has been nicely painted. The same sort of attention has been paid the lych-gate. The natural beauty of the cemetery has also been greatly enhanced by improvements to the main entrance, where the roadway has been much improved and has been given a coat of tarvia. The grass bordering this entrance has been nicely trimmed and protected by a chain handrail, supported by iron posts. The walks within the cemetery have been cleaned up, many of the older headstones straightened and a spirit prevails throughout the place of orderliness, eloquent of constant and loving attention.

The Committee have done all that is humanly possible with the finances at their disposal. Improvements recently effected have cost upwards of one thousand dollars. There are other undertakings that they long to take in hand, but which are not possible until further funds are available. They look to their fellow citizens to make the necessary provision, promptly and liberally. The various city parishes are now being appealed to to make this provision. Cemetery Collection Envelopes have been distributed in all the churches and recipients are asked to make good use of these and return them with enclosures to their Clergy or to the Secretary-Treasurer of the Cemetery Committee, Mr. E. S. Pinsent, at the Royal Bank Building. The need is pressing, the general duty is obvious and the Committee are confident that the response to this appeal will be immediate and liberal.

Soaring Price of Rubber

EFFECT OF FOREIGN BUYING.
 During the last few days speculative buying has played no small part in the market advance, but the main reason is the heavy buying from the United States and the Continent and the restriction of supplies by the Stevenson scheme.

The general opinion in Mincing-lane is that there is little prospect of any serious setback in the price for some time, but that temporary fluctuation will be seen.

34d. RISE IN A DAY.
 There has been a significant narrowing of the margin between the forward and spot quotations. The price for delivery from October to December, for example, rose 3d. recently to 44d. per lb. while the quotation for January to March delivery was 34d. higher on the day at 3s. 1d. per lb. buyers.

These sharp rises for forward delivery tend to indicate that the release of increased supplies of rubber under the Stevenson scheme will be insufficient to meet the demand.

Under the scheme, the permissible export from British Malaya and Ceylon as from August 1 will be raised from 85 to 75 per cent. of the standard production.

So long as the price of rubber keeps above 12s. 6d. the percentage will be raised 10 per cent. each quarter, so that by February 1 next year it will be 95 per cent. of the standard production.

Manufacturers are demanding a relaxation of the scheme so that more rubber can be produced.

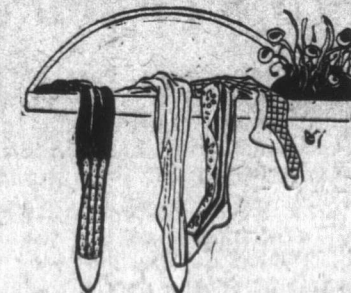

"It is evident that the Government are giving careful consideration to the suggestion that the Post Office should undertake what is known as a cash-on-delivery service. Lord Lucan was unable to tell the House more than that inquiries into the matter were proceeding, but the tone of his speech suggested that the Government were inclined to favour the scheme," says the "Scotsman."

"The principle is simple. A big store, or it may be a primary producer like the farmer, would dispatch goods to the Post Office, naming the price to be charged, and this price would be exacted from the consumer by the postman."

"The plan indicates one method of shortening the chain that binds the producer to the consumer. There is no lack of evidence that the system works satisfactorily in other countries. Lord Denbigh estimated that forty countries had adopted the cash-on-delivery system, among them Australia, India, the United States, Canada, and Germany."

"Probably the system has developed the more readily in these countries because of the long distances to be traversed."

"If the Post Office gave a lead in this matter it might be possible to induce the railway companies to adopt a similar arrangement for the consignment of small quantities of produce to individual consumers on the

American and Canadian model. As regards agricultural produce, there seems to be no reason why butter, cheese and poultry should not be transmitted to the consumer by parcel post for cash on delivery."

"In regard to agricultural produce the system would tend to benefit the town consumer at the expense of the retailer, while in respect of manufactured goods sent out by the great stores, the dweller in the country might benefit at the expense of the village shop."

"It is the fear of this last tendency which has deterred the country from adopting the system."

Hot Weather Clothes

By FONTILL BECKFORD.

Why do Englishmen pay so little attention to choosing clothes for hot weather?

During the recent spell it has been amusing to watch the Londoner crawling round in the most sombre colours and the heaviest materials.

For lounge suits the ideal material is undoubtedly flannel. Any man will tell you that a double-breasted jacket and trousers of thin grey flannel are the most comfortable wear of all, but many do not know how luxurious light-weight worsteds and Saxtonies are, or that they are to be had in tropical weights and colourings especially suited for hot weather.

These thin materials have the drawback that they do not tailor as well as heavier kinds, for the simple reason that there is not so much body in the cloth for the tailor to work up. But gabardines and light-weight whipcords are wonderfully good wearers, and so are Shetlands and homespuns.

From experience in very hot climates I can say that the surest way to keep cool is to avoid the wearing of anything too tight. The man who wears a belt is certain to feel hot.

Undergarments are also of primary importance. Now that the manufacturers are turning out pull-over-the-head jumper undervests woven into a kind of lace or porous material, the upper part of the body can be well taken care of. Trunks of white silk are ideal, though fine white linen, silk-and-linen, and cellular makes are also to be recommended.

For shirts and collars choose thin materials, and for preference wear a stiff collar. A soft one in hot weather loses its freshness readily.

Socks should be thin and if possible have cashmere feet. The frequent changing of footwear during the day adds to one's comfort.

Superstitious Criminals

Criminals are amazingly superstitious. Some—the Italians, for instance—even link up religion and crime. As night begins to fall, sinister and shadowy figures may be seen in the great Church of St. Peter in Rome, praying for Divine blessing on the project they have planned for that night. A similar sight may often be seen in Notre Dame, Paris, but London "crooks" do not frequent St. Paul's or the Abbey.

The apaches of Paris are extraordinarily superstitious. One of their pet beliefs is that to touch a hunchback's deformity will assuredly bring them luck; and there is one gang of

apaches which carried the severed head of a rat. The loss of this gruesome relic caused great consternation.

The thugs and hewits of the East have some queer rites, one being to pour goat's milk on the ground to propitiate the god Devi. The Indian also considers it unlucky to sneeze during the commission of a crime.

English criminals will often give up a burglary if the house is next or opposite a church—although to break into a shop or house near a police-station is considered a lucky enterprise. Charles Peace even lived near a police station while the country was scoured for him.

I have known several burglars who have regularly distributed alms to street beggars and charities, and many temporarily successful criminals who have been punctilious in church-going. Many pickpockets carry pieces of coal or chalk for luck.

Hotel thieves have a horror of robbing a room bearing the number

thirteen. Some criminals will not do "business" on Sunday, and a prison chaplain will tell you that a few days before trial many prisoners will develop religious fervour in the belief that they may thus escape the penalty of wrong-doing.—T.R.

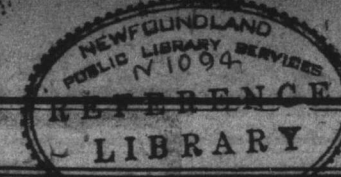

Geneva Child Welfare Congress

Geneva, Oct. 7-10. (By Special Press)—First in the history of the world will be the International Congress on Child Welfare to be held in Geneva from Aug. 24 to 28, plans for which are now almost completed. This great undertaking, organized by the Children Fund International Union, will see a remarkable gathering when representatives of more than 40 nations will convene for the purpose of considering and making plans for the benefit of the children of the world; who will be regarded as the people's first and greatest concern. The Congress will be the first of its kind where the welfare of the child is the main theme of the discussion and the only one where the child's welfare will be what is known as the "Geneva Charter," which Canada has already signed in company with other nations, and adopted by the League of Nations in September. The Charter states that "By the present Declaration of the Rights of the Child, commonly known as the Declaration of Geneva, men and women of all nations, recognizing and affirming it as their duty that, regard- less of all considerations of race, nationality or creed: The Child must be given the best possible conditions for its normal development, both mentally and physically. The Child that is hungry must be fed; the child that is sick must be nursed; the child that is backward must be helped; the delinquent child must be reclaimed; and the orphan and the waif must be succored. The Child must be first to receive of the times of distress. The Child must be put in a position to earn a livelihood and must be protected against every form of exploitation. The Child must be brought up in recognition that its talents must be devoted to the service of its fellow-men. The Congress will deal with the welfare of the child in three sections. The first, concerned with Hygiene and Medicine, will have as President, Dr. Clemens, a Psychiatrist, Director of the Children's Clinic at the University of Vienna; the second, on Social Welfare and Administration, will be presided over by Professor Scelle, Professor of International Law at Dijon; while the third section, on Education and Progress, will be presided over by the business of Aberdeen and Temair. The International Council of Women. The case for the child will be presented by specialists and known authorities to the different sections, and the range to be covered will embrace such subjects as children in the Country of their birth, a condition which has become pressing and painful importance owing to circumstances arising out of the war. Canada has already become interested in the "Children's Charter" through its connection with the International Council of Women. Canada has worked from coast to coast in interest of the child, the Children's Fund and the dominion will be represented at the Congress by Frank G. Canadian representative of the child.

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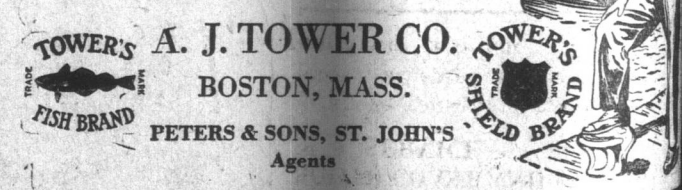
