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





The Escorted U. S. Film WAR MINISTER'S STATEMENT,

Territorial C.O. Hoaxed. The Secretary for War (Sir Laming Worthington-Evans) replied to questions in Parliament recently regarding the astonishing spectacle in London last Wednesday, when British Territorial troops, with band, escorted a newly arrived American film from Waterloo Station to Wardour Street, in the West End, where the march developed into an advertising display. The War Secretary's reply, reported fully below, was to the effect that the officer commanding the unit concerned (the Hampshire Heavy Brigade, Royal Artillery) acted without authority and contrary to regulations in agreeing to the film company's prosal, and was made the victim of "a and humiliating hoax."

Stop the Film.

Public resentment was voiced in the questions put to the Minister. It is daily becoming clearer that there is a growing body of opinion in the country which believes that, in view of this unwarrantable exploitation of our national forces, immediate steps should be taken by the British Board of Film Censors (of which Mr. T. P. O'Connor, M.P., is president) to prevent the escorted film from being exhibited in Britain.

This, it is contended, would teach a salatary lesson to those over-enterprising people who, in seeking to "boost" foreign productions, have not even scrupled to attempt to ridicule our Army.

The hoax is the calminating point of many other lamentable episodes in which British public personages have heen exploited to further the interests of United States films, the unceasing fload of which has already crippled our own kinema industry.

THE RESPONSIBILITY. Humiliating and Clever Hoax on Of-

ficer. In the House of Commons recently Sir Laming Worthington-Evans (Secretary for War), replying to several questions about the recent use of British troops to advertise an American film, said that the explanation of the Hampshire Heavy Brigade Royal Artillery (the unit concerned) was that they were approached by the agent of an American film company to assist in a film which, they were given to understand, was of a military character, representing Territorfal soldiers entraining, detaining, and on the march.

They consented to take part, n the belief that a film of this kind would encourage recruiting. No mention was made, added the Minister, of an American film to be met and escorted, and nothing was said to them to make them suspect the real purpose for which they were required. Troops Return Money.

The film company paid the travelling expenses of the Hampshire Artillery and 10s. and 15s. to each man and £25 to the band, which had been return-

The officer in charge of the detachment, said Sir Laming, had reported: Nothing whatever was seen of the film that we were presumed to have been escorting, and we had no knowledge that any film was on the parade. At Waterloo, I was told by the police that the armoured car had received instructions to return to its depot. We proceeded along the route the police had instructed us to follow, by Westminister Bridge, Whitehall, and Trafalgar, Square to Wardour Street, as the representative of the company said the film could only be completed in the studio. (Laughter.)

It was not until we entered Wardbur Street that the real purpose for which the troops were needed became apparent, owing to a banner being unfuried in front of the bahd and handbills being distributed. I, therefore, had the banner immediately removed and refused to take any further part in the proceedings, and, with as little delay as possible, the troops were marched up a quiet street --(laughter)---and then marched back to Waterloo.

The Officer Responsible. "Fortunately," added Sir Laming, "the armoured car company were warned in time of the real object of the march and did not take part. As the agent of the film company had previously applied to the War Office for soldiers to appear in scenes on the arrival of the film and had been told that permission could not be givn, he should not have applied to Territorial units independently, and, in any case, should not have-concealed the true purpose.

"In agreeing to the company's proposal the officer commanding the unit acted without proper authority and centrary to the precise instructions centained in the regulations." This officer had had long service and had worked hard in the interests of the mit, but his judgment on this occation was at fault, and he was made he victim of a clever and humiliating hoax.







Our Duty to Those Who Sleep in God's Acre

Much of the important history of our city and our country was written in the lives of men and women who now rest in God's Acre by the Lake. The present generation owes a great deal to the nobility of character they displayed, to the unselfishness of their lives and to the loveliness of the example they set to their successors. It is a splendid thing for us of this generation to show by our care of their resting places that we appreciate them at something of their true worth.

Thousands of our city families are represented by the names borne by the nonuments in the Church of England Cemetery. Constant pilgrimages are made, when weather permits, to this sanctuary of the departed. The beautiful lawns, well kept paths and shady lanes are never deserted during the daylight hours of the summer months. Those who sleep there are kept in constant and loving remembrance by the thousands of visitors to the Cemetery near the gentle waters of Quidi Vidi Lake.

Representatives of the various city Churches pay constant attention to the condition of this hallowed place. The present Cemetery Committee has displayed a commendable devotion to their duties as supervisors of the place. Under their direction innumerable improvements have been made in the surroundings and an effect is constantly being made to beautify the grounds and all that appertains to them. With these activities all rightthinking citizens are in complete accord and they are especially comforting to those whose dear ones sleep their last sleep in this God's Acre. During the present summer season the Committee has given a great deal of attention to this precious charge of theirs. The fences of the cemetery have been repaired and, in some sections, renewed. The little Mortuary Chapel, where the last offices of the Church have been said so many times of Her sons and daughters, has been put in nice repair and has been nicely painted. The same sort of attention has been paid the lych-gate. The natural beauty of the cemetery has also been greatly enhanced by improvements to the main entrance, where the roadway has been much improved and has been given a coat of tarvia. The grass bordering this entrance has been nicely trimmed and protected by a chain handrail, supported by iron posts. The walks within the cemetery have been cleaned up, many of the older headstones straightened and a spirit prevails throughout the place of orderliness eloquent of constant and loving attention.

The Committee have done all that is humanely possible with the finances at their disposal. Improvements recently effected have cost upwards of one thousand dollars. There are other undertakings that they long to take in hand, but which are not possible until further funds are available. They look to their fellow citizens to make the necessary provision, promptly and liberally. The various city parishes are now being appealed to to make this provision. Cemetery Collection Envelopes have been distributed in all the churches and recipients are asked to make good use of these and return them with enclosures to their Clergy or to the Secretary-Treasurer of the Cemetery Committee, Mr. E. S. Pinsent, at the Royal Bank Building. The need is pressing, the general duty is obvious and the Committee are confident that the response to this appeal will be immediate and liberal.
