Clayton deposed to having missed his horse and eart after the night of the 3lst ult, and had been in search of them until last night, when he tound the horse in the swamp in the rear of Mr. Hooper's, part of the harness being still on the horse. The cart was found near Allan's Bridge. He (Clayton) kept his horse in the stable belonging to the Bull Frog, by permission of the proprietor. While searching for the horse he had asked Johnson for information as to its whereabouts, but without reseiving any satisfactory answer until yesterday, when Clayton, having searched all over, Johnson asked him if he had been in the disrection of the York Road. He went there, and finding his property, his suspicion at once was fastened upon Johnson and also upon Thorne, who, it seems, is in the habit of frequenting the Tayen.

Thomas Conkey and Charles Taylor were brought forward as witinesses, and testified to having been at the Bullfrog in company with Thorne and others on Monday or Tuesday evening. Johnson was trading bar and seemed to have the management of the establishment. After remaining there for some time drinking, they started towards Guelph, riding in a butcher's cart, drawn by a bay horse, of which Johnson was driver. Conkey, Taylor and others got out of the cart when near the Eramosa. Bridge, leaving only Johnson and Thorne in the cart, who turned round and drove back again towards the tavern. Johnson seemed to have the management of the horse.

C. C. Kelly testified as to the arrest of the parties.

Johnson was committed to stand his trial but Thorne was displayed.

On Wednesday night, James Brennan, who used to be employed about the Albion Hotel, informed Chief Constable Kelly that he had been robbed of \$10. It seems that about nine o'clock at night he was returning from Guelph to the place where he was living, near Blyth's Hotel, on the Elora Road. About the outskirts of the town he was overtaken by a waggon, in which he was men. They asked him where he was going and offered to give him a ride, on, which he jumped into the waggon. When they came to the cross road leading up by Mr. John Pipe's farm, the driver, instead of going straight on, turned into this road, and when a little way up, the men seized hold of Brennan, rifled his pockets of \$10, and then turned him out of the waggon. He returned to town and gave Mr. Kelly the above information. He does not know who the men are, but the police are investigating the case, and we hope they will be successful in finding them. As far as we know, no violence was done to Brennan.

Kelly & Day, of the Burlington Marble Works, York street, for a tablet to be erected in the building, to the memory of those who were either killed or died of wounds received at Ridgeway in the well-remembered fight with the Fennans in 1866. This tablet was finished yesterday, and this morning was forwarded to the congregation and subscribers, who will in a few days have a general gathering and formally inaugurate the memorial, which will occupy a very prominent position in the chapel. The tablet is of white marble, indented in the top, and has a mourning border around the inscription, which is in black letters, first cut into the stone and then painted. The design is neat and chaste, and is from the pen of the Committe appointed in the matter, and improved upon by the marble workers. Beneath the first line of the epitath are a soldier's shake, above a rifle with a fixed bayonet, and a drawn sword crossing it. The inscription is as follows:—

SACRED TO THE MEMORY OF THE RIDGEWAY MARTYRS, who fell in defending their country in th tempted Fenian invasion of June, 1866.

Hugh Matsheson, Brancis Lakey, Corp'l, Queen's Own Died of wounds. WILLIAM SMITH, Queen's Own, Killed.

CHRISTOPHER AL-DERSON, Queen's Own, Killed. WM. FAIRBANES TEMPEST. Queen's Own. Killed.

ther climb of a quarter of a mile brought us to the level of an upper hraum, wilder and more desolate than that of Thingvalla.

Mr. Taylor thus described the great Geyser, er Spouting Springs:

The cone of the Great Geyser is not more than 20 feet high, and appears to have been gradually formed by the deposit of the silicious particles which the water holds in solution. The top is like a shallow wash-bowl, 30 feet in diameter, full to the brim, and slowly overflowing on the eastern side. In the centre of this bowl there is a well, indicated by the intense blue-green of the water, and apparently eight or ten feetjin diameter. It has been sounded, and bottom—or, at least, a change in direction—reached at the depth of 55 feet. At the edge, where the water is shallow, one can dip his singers in quickly without being scalded. Small particles placed in the overflow are completely incrusted with transparent silex in a day or two. Sometimes it spouts up to an altitude of 120 feet. Prof. Steenstrup informed me that the water has important healing properties. The steam has an odor of sulphureted hydrogen, but the taste thereof is so soon lost that where the stream becomes cold, we used it for drinking and making coffee.

I shall never forget that calm sublime day at the Geysers. After reading many descriptions, I was never less prepared for the reality of the scene. Instead of a drear, narrow volcanic valley, here was a landscape bounded on the west by mountains, but on the north, east and south, only to be spanned by a radius of fifty miles. Near us, a quiet, grassroofed farmstead; towards the sea, meadows and gleams of rivers; in front, the broad green plain, its inclosing hills and Heela rising lonely above them; northward, a church and neighboring byres, a smooth grassy ridge beyond, the snow-streaked pyramid of the Blaijall (Blue Mountain), and far in the distance the luminous, icy peaks of the Arne and Kotluga Jokulls. 
