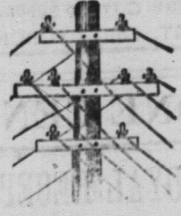

STANDISH IN THE SWINDLE.

The London masonic lottery is smelling worse than ever. Besides being against the law there is a suspicion abroad that its "managers" swindled the public even more than they declared it was their intention to do.

But more discreditable than the going of the ticket holders by the "managers" is the number of persons in authority who have "stood in" with the swindle.

First of all comes the masonic fraternity. That body, while through its grand lodge repudiated the lottery and forbade masons as such to take part in it, still as yet it has raised no objection to its \$100,000 plunder being applied to masonic purposes, and unless it does, in a short time we shall see the grand lodge meeting and being banqueted in the "glorious temple of the ancient rite" located in the now doubly odious city of the west.

Then as to the public authorities. The local ones are culpable to an unpardonable degree. The administration of justice in the municipality is vested in the county crown-attorney, in the police commissioners and in the chief constable.

What have we to say for the central authority for the administration of justice in the province. The attorney-general's duty is to see that the law is administered by the inferior law officers under him all over the province. He is provided with a defective force of his own which he can depend on to any part of the country, if he thinks the local authorities unequal or unwilling to cope with crime, and he possesses the confidence of a legislature that will vote him any money he may wish to vindicate the law.

If the officials we have indicated are not "standing in" with the lottery let them now go to work and vindicate the law. It is not yet too late for Chief Williams to prosecute all "the managers" of the enterprise, and if he fails it is not too late for the attorney general to start special officers to work. If something is not done the lottery mania will sweep the country.
