THE GREAT QUESTION AGITATING ANGLO-RUSSIAN STATESMEN.

& Conflict With the Afghans Reported to Have Actually Occurred—Will it Form a Casus Belli ?—England's Presents to

LONDON, March 15 .- The terms of the arrangement with Russia explained by Mr. Gladstone meet with nothing but denunciation from the conservatives; even by the sturdiest friends of the government among liberals it is not cordially received. The liberal press admit the arrangement is virtually a surrender to Russia of the frontier demanded. There are numerous evidences that the government has no idea that peace has been secured. Preparations for war are on the most extensive scale. An enormous military transport fleet is being rapidly collected on the Thames, at Portsmouth and at Plymouth. Woolwich arsenal workshops are being hurriedly en. larged. Workmen are on double time.

searcely Calculated to Restore Confidence. LONDON, March 15.—Sir Peter Lums. den, British commander on the Afghan frontier line, has again changed camp. He has fixed it at Zurabat on the Persian side of the Herri-Rood. Sir Peter's present position is in the rear of the Russian advanced outposts, as Russia claims these outposts are inside the boundary line claimed by Russia. Sir Peter's position was made the subject of official representa-tion to the British government. Baron de Staal, the czar's ambassador to England, Staal, the czar's ambassador to England, has asked the British government to order Lumsden's camp moved within undisputed Afghan territory. The request was refused and Sir Peter instructed to keep his present position and maintain from it communication with the Afghans at Robat

LONDON, March 15 .- On the recomme dation of the viceroy of India large grants have been accorded from the Indian treas. ury to Abdurrahman, ameer of Afghanistan, for the curpose of the complete repair of the forts in his territory, and particularly those at Herat. These works of repair will be done under the supervision of English engineers, and the additional guns needed by the fortifications of Afghanistan are to be supplied from Woolwich.

TEHERAN, March 15 .- It is reported that Sir Peter Lumsden has arrived at Herat, and that the Afghans are actively fortify ing the city. Small bodies of Russians hold the wells and the roads between Sarakhs and the Murghab river. There are several hundred Cossacks near Puli, Khatung, which is the most southerly point nearest to Herat, is occupied by the Russians. Hospital in the Late General's Honor to be Erected at Port Said,
London, March 14.—The Gordon me-London, March 14.—The Gordon memorial committee met at the Mansion house to day. The prince of Wales presided. Among the members present were the duke of Edinburgh, duke of Cambridge and Earl Granville. The object of the meeting was to decide upon the form which the Gordon memorial should take. The general meeting which appointed the committee decided that in no event should the memorial be a statue of any kind. The committee to-day decided the memorial should be a great hospital and sanitarium to be erected at Port Said and open to the people of all nations of the earth. The khediye has already granted a site for the proposed memorial.

Gen. Gordon conceded that Zobehr should be restored to power in the Soudan, and said that the ex-slave king was the only man who had enough nerve and prestige to keep the Arabs in subjection. Gen. The Niagara Falis Railway. In order to understand clearly the object tionableness of the bill now before the Ontario legislature to charter a railway from the Falls dewn the river on the Canadian side it is necessary to remember where the road will run. The object is to lay the rails at the foot of the hill on the Canadian aide of the river, close to the water's edge down to Queenston. To many such a pro ject may seem absurd, but there are really no formidable engineering obstacles, as those who have traveled on foot along this part of the stream well know. It is said that the whole distance from Queenston up the river has been done on foot, and wherever this is the case a railway can be

In the first place, to place a railway along the foot of the hill will drive all pedestrians away from the spot, for there is not room for both. No foresight or precaution could prevent numerous accidents in so confined a space, and it would be an arbitrary act to give the railway company sympathy with Dr. Burwash. power to prevent people from walking can be shown that the presence of trains hold along the bank of such a terrific torrent is compatible with the safety of all parties the objection will be partly obviated; but this has not been done, and we trust that the matter will be thoroughly ventilated when it comes up in the house.
