SEPARATE SCHOOL TAXES.

A Proposition Which Was Discussed in Joint Session Yesterday.

A sub-committee of the City Executive met yesterday afternoon to confer with delegates from the Public and Separate School Boards on the matter of the proposition of the Separate School Board to obtain a proportion of the taxes of the city, the balance to be paid over to the Public School Board. The committee occupied the chair, the other city representatives being Ald. Carleton (St. Thomas), Johnston and Gillespie. The Public School Board sent Frank Somers, H. E. Kent and E. S. Baird. Rev. Father McCann, Dr. Cassidy, William Felt and J. J. Foy, Q.C., were present on behalf of the Separate schools.

Mr. Foy, Rev. Father McCann and Dr. Cassidy placed the merits of the proposition before the meeting, claiming that it would be adopted if it would save an infinity of trouble not only to the Separate School Board, but also to the officials of the City Treasurer's Department. Mr. Felt stated in effect that they did not come to the Council as beggars, but as equals, and that the City to grant or withhold.
