The Manitoba school question. The World yesterday gave its readers what we consider a clear exposition of the situation of the Manitoba school question.

1. That the Roman Catholics of Manitoba had no right at law to separate schools, and therefore that the Dominion Parliament could not, by a "remedial law" (as provided for in the Manitoba Act), compel the Legislature of that province to condescend to them.

2. That Sir John Thompson, though he had reported to the Governor-in-Council in April, 1919, that by the Acts of Manitoba, the Legislature of that province had no right to separate schools...

There can, therefore, be no remedial laws. But can there be any kind of law, which is not just what the Catholics at Ottawa are now considering. It has been suggested that while it would be impolitic and unconstitutional to impose separate schools on Manitoba it might be possible and politic to grant the Roman Catholics of Manitoba a certain portion of the school lands held by the Dominion in trust for purposes of education.

The World has heard too little of the details of this proposal to criticize it. The duty at present lies with us who have heard. Such a proposal might justify demands from other denominations, especially the Anglicans, who also appealed against the legality of the act of the Manitoba Legislature, and it might give rise to trouble in other provinces of the Northwest. It is a most difficult problem. But we think we have got this much of the discussion settled, that no "remedial law" in the direction of imposing separate schools on Manitoba is possible, nor will it be attempted.

Who will be Laureate? Now that the poet laureate is dying the people of the British Empire realize that they may not shout, "The king is dead; long live the king," with such sterner assurance as they did when Tennyson became the successor to Wordsworth.

The question as to who shall be Tennyson's successor, is a vexed one indeed. When the urn of Tennyson is placed beside those of Shakespeare and Milton the mighty trinity of English literature will be complete.

A New Move in Fire Insurance. A step has been taken in the United States to organize a system of fire insurance on the same lines as the world-renowned "Lloyds" of London, England.

For some time past there has been a conviction growing in the minds of the public that the cost of fire insurance is altogether in excess of what is needed to provide a reserve for losses and leave a fair dividend for stockholders, after paying all the necessary charges of the business.

The leakage which drains so heavily the resources of underwriting arises from the large percentages paid for commissions, which amount to 20 to 25 per cent, and business carries such a burden, nor is there any rational plea for fire insurance being so costly.

A return just published by an insurance journal gives the gross premium income of 112 companies as \$109,642,000, of which they paid \$21,842,077, or 19.92 per cent, for commissions and brokerage. This shows that if the policy-holders had dealt directly with these companies which had placed their fire insurance risks, the commissions would have reduced their charges for premiums by close upon 20 per cent.

It is the duty of the court singer to sing with enthusiasm the heroic deeds of Englishmen - and Tennyson's patriotic songs have never been equalled - Radford Kipling has done it better than any of the younger singers. Will the English court be driven to accept Kipling as post laureate? He is at any rate the most loyal of living poets. It is not at all unlikely that an agitation will be set up to abolish the office, and while this may not be conceded we would not be surprised to hear that it was allowed to remain vacant for a time.

City Bonds. The recent sale of the bonds of this city at a few points lower than they fetched a couple of years or so ago has brought out a number of comments on the transaction. Some of these are more amusing than helpful as explanations, while others only draw quibblers of the sort.

We are told by one critic that the bonds sold at a low figure because money is so plentiful in Canada that investors would not give as much for 4 per cent bonds as they did in England as they did when the money market was less amply supplied.

What from Canada's standpoint amounts to prodigious sums are on deposit all over England at 2 per cent, and under. According to the argument that this plethora of money has reduced the selling value of 4 per cent bonds, the more money there is working investment the less anxious are investors to secure a better return for their money.

The position of Toronto in offering her bonds is that of a buyer of money, and we are told that because funds are so largely

in excess of demand therefore money is dearer to procure. The theory advanced on the above is that the money which those who are willing to loan money at less than 1 per cent, and who are compelled to accept 2 per cent, or less for their deposits, would jump at securities yielding 4 per cent. If they had the same degree of confidence in their soundness...

The depreciated value placed on our city bonds, then, does not arise from the plentifulness of funds seeking investment, but from the scarcity of confidence in the credit stability of this city. The sale of the bonds flooded a few years ago was made when, so far as the supply of money is concerned, the conditions were less promising for securing a high price for them than they were when the market was in the height of a boom: the position and prospects of the city were, at that time, full of brightness and hope.

The Newfoundlander Conference. Hon. Meara, Bowell, Tupper and Chaplin have been appointed Commissioners to represent the Canadian Government at the proposed conference at Halifax between representatives of Newfoundland and the Dominion towards the close of the month.

Although no program of procedure in adjusting the matters which have been in dispute between the two colonies has been decided upon, it ought not to be a difficult task in view of the present friendly feeling on both sides, to satisfactorily arrange the trade and factory regulations.

The Provincial Board of Education of Nova Scotia has passed a law which provides the boys under 16 years of age, detected with tobacco in their possession, are liable to a fine of \$5, and those that are liable to a fine of \$25 from \$25 should they furnish either smoking or chewing tobacco to their fellow scholars.

Fearman was fined \$20 and costs for selling liquor without a license at the township of Oronago, and failing to pay the fine was imprisoned in Beantford jail. The writ was granted on the ground of technical defects in the warrant.

In the matter of the Queen v. Charles H. Wallis an appeal was made for a writ of certiorari to bring up the conviction, but was refused. The defendant was convicted of unlawfully and knowingly being interested in a house of ill-repute at 33 and 35 Lonsdale-street (in the rear).

The master in chambers made an order on consent that the action of George Southwick against Magistrate Hare of Tilson be discontinued.

An order was made for the foreclosure of a mortgage held by the Bristol and West of England Loan Co. against the Jordan Chambers, on the corner of Jordan and Malton streets. The building was erected and mortgaged by Alan C. Thompson.
