

The Provincial Exhibition of 1891.—Sept. 23th.

I do not like barbarisms, and although the word exposition, is correct as applied to the explanation of a text of Holy writ, as applied to a cattle-show it is decidedly a barbarism. However, this is about the only fault I have to find with the very satisfactory display now just closed at Mile-End; for, not only as a whole, but taken in its individual parts, it was the finest exhibition I have seen since I came to Canada in 1858. The weather was brilliant, the sun almost too powerful, the attendance very large, and the people remarkably good-tempered. In fact, if the syndicate came out pretty well as regards money returns, everybody must have been pleased... well not everybody, because, of course, there were here and there to be found some grumblers who were not satisfied with the decisions of Judges.

I had the pleasure of showing a French gentleman round some of the cattle classes, and found it very pleasant to hear his commendatory remarks. He—and I too—was surprised at the small number of shorthorns on exhibition. In France, he tells me, this is the favourite breed; always of course excepting the best of the native breeds, and he seemed to have the different points of the shorthorn at his fingers' ends. The Herefords were not so well known to him, as in his country they are rarely to be seen, their milking powers being inferior to the other breeds; the same may be said of his opinion of the Galloways and Polled-Angus.

A finer lot of Herepords could hardly have been got together. Compton came out bravely, taking 1st and 2nd for old bulls. Mr. Smith's, the best animal I have seen for years, received the diploma for the bulls, and Mr. Cochrane's was a very superior beast indeed. Mr. Fleming, of Ontario,

carried off 7 of the prizes, including diploma for best cow, first for best female of any age, and the herd-prize. Why this class alone had a barrier behind the cattle which prevented any one from getting within eight feet of their heels I do not know. Messrs. Dawes, of Lachine, took 1st prize for yearling bull, and 3rd for 3-year old cow; a very creditable thing for their herd to do, as a month ago all their stock were running loose on the rough pastures on the hill above Lachine and were not prepared for exhibition in any way.

I was sorry to see none of Mr. Vernon's herd competing. I did not know that the terrible fire that destroyed his farmbuildings some two years ago had left him so completely bare of stock. He was so enthusiastic a breeder, that the loss of

his favourites must have nearly broken his heart.

Mr. Fleming's man deserves great credit for the manner he brought out his numerous lot of cattle. After a long journey, in blazing hot weather, they looked as if they had only just left their own stables at home.

I do not feel comfortable at all about the Shorthorns Generally, in writing about exhibitions, I find this breed cccupying the greatest space in my manuscript; but here, all I have to say is, that Mr. Edwards, of Edwardsburg, I suppose, nearly swept the board, taking with the greatest ease all the first prizes, except one for 2-year old bull, as well as diplomas for best bull, best cow, and the herd-prize. The only animal that took my eye was a 3-year old cow, with a charming head.

The Polled-Angus, the second best lot of cattle, in my opinion, in the show, were in fine order. The usual exhibi tors had their herds represented, viz. Messrs Cochrane, Craik, Pope, and Dawes, and divided the prizes, Mr. Cochrane taking diplomas for best bull and cow, and the herd prize. The Dawes took two 1st, for 2-year old bull and bull-calf, and Dr Craik 1st, for yearling bull, besides two or three 2nd and 3rd prizes.

As for the Galloways, good beef cattle as they are, they carry too much meat before the shoulders to be favourites of mine. Only two herds were represented, which came all the way from distant Ontario, from Owen Sound and Guelph. Messrs, Kough won pretty nearly everything, including the

two diplomas and the herd prize.

Of Mr Rudd's Devons all I can say is, that they looked as if a change in the blood would do them no harm. They seem to me to have lost size.

Jerseys were of course a most interesting show. Mr Reburn's fine herd has not been exhibited anywhere this season, and, he told me the reason: it seems his cattlemen had left him just before the close of August, and, as Jerseys are by no means cattle to be played with, he did not feel inclined to entrust such valuable animals to the care of green hands.

Mrs Jones, whom I salute, did not have it all her own way, Messrs Dawes taking first and second for old cows, to Mrs Jones' third. The Lachine herd also took first for yearling bull, seconds for 2-year old and 3-year old cows, and second herd-prize. But, the lady-exhibitor had both diplomas and first herd prize. Where, by the bye, is Mrs Whitfield of Rougement? Has she given up showing altogether?

A very small display of Guernseys, Mr Fisher, of Knowlton alone exhibiting. I must say it is almost a crime on the part of the Prime Minister of the Dominion, that he does

not show specimens of his noble herd.

Mr Fisher's 2-year old buil is the fac-simile of my Guernsey-bull Rufus, a portrait of which was given in the Journal for 1886, p. 89. This superb bull, after standing for service at Sorel for 21 years at \$1 a cow, and netting to his owner the enormous return of three dollars, was finally sold to M. Proulx, butcher at that place, and after being fattened went happy to say it did not come from the stall of my most

to England as meat. A sad thing to reflect upon, considering that, during his short life, Rufus might easily have begotten 30 or 40 heifers, and have thus completely changed the whole of the general cattle-stock of the neighbourhood.

Holsteins were numerous, and came from all over the country. More competition than in any other class of cattle, but the pick of the breed is evidently in the hands of Mr Fletcher, of Oxford Mills, that breeder winning pretty nearly all the prizes, both the diplomas, and the 1st herd-prize. They are capital dairy cows are these Dutch-cattle, in spite of the abuse the Jersey-men shower on them, and are fit for something when their milking-time is over.

In GRADE-cows, Mr McLachlan of Petite Côte, had it

pretty nearly all his own way.

Lastly a few " Canadian cattle" were shown, but as far as I could learn, the majority of them were got by Jersey bulls I had the pleasure of meeting in this division with M. François Dion of Ste-Thérèse, who gave me an account of his herd A propos of this, I find in the French edition of the Journal that the characteristics of pure French-Canadian cattle have been again fully treated by M. Couture, V. S.—v. the number for Sept. 1891. M. Dion's stock are almost all got by Jersey-bulls, and I fancy he will not be long before he tries, as a change, a Guernsey. It is a treat to meet so utterly unprejudiced a man as M. Dion. M. Denis of St-Norbert has two, a black bull and a cow of the same colour, from, I suspect, the same line of blood as that, wonderful cow belonging to the Curé of St-Justin, Maskinongé county, a portrait of which will be found at p. 120 of vol. VI of the Journal. M. Denis says he has tust bought a pure Canadian from Mons. Philibert, of St-Justin, which is guaranteed to produce 13 lbs of butter a week. This breeder entered the only three cows that appeared in the Competition of Registered Canadian Cows for 1890, and their yields were as follows:

The sheep were very good indeed. I do not pretend to be a judge of long wools, but I know one thing, and that is, if we intend to keep on exporting sheep to England, the sooner we take to sending the best quality instead of the worst, the better will be our returns. It was only the other day, that I saw in a Montreal paper a statement to the effect that no more sheep would be sent abroad as the price in the market there is too low to make exportation profitable.

Look at the quotations of the London market, dated

On the day I mention d just now the very finest down wethers, fit for the West-end of Lunion trade, made 18 cents a pound. Old ewes and unca-trated lambs will never pay for the voyage. What is wanted is a short-woolled sheep, with dark or gray faces and leg-, ripe. but not over fat, weighing from 70 to 80 pounds, and the various breeds of Downs just fulfil these requirements. 02 my table appeared, the other day, a joint of lumb as red s blood. I could not explain the cause of this colour before my family, but it was of course from the animal never having been cut. I am sorry to say the butcher who sent it in was highly offended at the meat being found fault with, but I as

obliging fournisseur M. Richard, of Bonsecours market, (1) The Downs at the Exhibition were very good; indeed the pens of Mr. Jackson, of . bington, Ont., were as perfectly turned out as any sheep need be. His shephord knows the use of the shears, where to cut close and where to leave u little longer wool. The great test to my mind is to see the sheep when his head is down on the ground feeding. This shows if there is any fault behind the shoulder, and therein the next pens, the property of Robt. Shaw, of Glenford, Ont., were decidedly inferior to their opponents, though they were very good indeed. Still, there was a finish about the firstcrize sheep that not even a tyro could mistake, and I will go so far as to say that one or two of the lots were as good as I ever saw on my old tutor, Wm. Rigden's farm. The prizes had not been adjudged when I inspected the sheep, so my opinion was formed without any possible bias. Mr. Shaw seemed to be perfectly satisfied with his prospective position of second prize-man, and I am glad to see that the Judges thought his pen of two-shear ewes worthy of a first-prize.

The Cotswolds were as good as usual. Mr. Main, of Milton, carried off all the first prizes, but some Frerch-Canadians secured several seconds and thirds. A hardy heep,

enough, but not the best fitted for exportation.

LEICESTERS, again, went all one way; Mr. John Shake-

speare, of Ontario, nearly sweeping the board.

Mr Oliver, of Avon Bank, and the MM. Ouimet, of St. Lincolns. Legs of mutton possibly catable, but conceive the waste of a loin or neck of a fat Lincoln!

Shropshires very good indeed, as how should they be otherwise in the hands of such breeders as Mr. Cochrane and Mr. Fuller of Capelton. I congratulate the latter as occupying the distinguished position of winner of the 1st prize for the best pen of Shropshires against such competitors as Messrs. Cochrane, Brims, and Hager, of Plantagenet.

I did not see any HAMPSHIRE-DOWNS, and the prizes for ONFORDSHIRES all went to Mr. Henry Arkell, of Arkell, Ont.

The Dorser, which a correspondent of the Witness calls the new breed." I myself have known them for at least 62 years—carried home all the prizes to one house, that of Messrs. Tazwell and Hector, Port Credit, Out, except one second prize, assigned to M. Chas. Bouchard, Montreal. The Dorset ewes as is well known to all my readers, take the ram earlier than any others, and, in consequence, are highly valued as producers of house-lamb for the London, Bath, and other markets, in which people can afford to give a guinea a quarter for precocious lamb.

As for the Merinoes, as we cannot afford to breed sheep as mere wool producers, and as I once-30 years ago, at Chamb'y-tasted their mutton, I cannot say much in their favor. Mr Shaw, Glenford, had much better rest satisfied

with his excellent flock of Southdowns.

The silage cutters and elevators worked well, though the one on the south side of the sile scattered the cut silage much more than the one on the north side. With such a September as we have had, the maize ought to be well forward in the cob, and the silage of this season should be of cry superior quality. M. Beaubien was good enough to nvite me to visit his farm during the week after the Exhibition to see his 10-horse power engine at work on the ensilage but as I saw perfect work done at Messrs Dawes' farm last year and as I have sprung one of the back-sinews of my near bg, I must apologise to him for not accepting his invitation. M. Beaubien says, he has arrived at perfection in ensilement now, and does not need a thermometer or any other guide.

His essay is worth reading-jocular and, at the same time, thoroughly practical.

The RANCHE-HORSES of Dr McEachran are most highly useful animals, and look as hardy as Welsh ponies. Sur-FOLKS poor. Why is it that such excellent farmer's horses as the smaller Suffolk-from 15 hands to 151 hands highable to walk 5 miles and trot 8 miles an hour, and heavy enough in the plough for any land, have never made their mark here?

The writer of the following is a French Canadian gentleman who has passed a good deal of his life in England:

The agricultural Exhibition of 1891 has been very successful, financially, and nearly every body seems to be well pleased. So much the better, may we have lots of similarly successful exhibitions in future. The few words we have to say here, merely concern the equine department, not, that we do not consider it as important or interesting, as any other. It would be a disagreable task to pick out individuals in any class, and dwell upon their weak points, as well as to eulogise the good ones of successful candidates. Besides being a disagreable, this is also a somewhat difficult task, as exhibitors are not fond of allowing would be crities the necessary facilitis for thoroughly judging their animals. On the whole the exhibition of horses, as compared with any middle sized provincial show in England, was disappointing, especially in the François de Salle, took most of the prizes for the gigantic light classes. There were only two thoroughbred stallions on the ground, naturally one got the first prize, and the other the second. We ought to do better than this in the province of Quebec. At a provincial show, the other day in England, there were nine thoroughbred stallions exhibited, and nineteen

hackneys and harness horses in equal proportion:

An English veterinary writer of some eminence divides horseflesh into three categories: 1. Horses of speed e. g. racehorses, 2. horses of power, e. g. draught horses, 3. horses of power and speed, c. g. hunters. It is a great pity that the kind of thoroughbred horse, adapted to the getting of hunting stock, is not better known in the province of Quebec, and that more attempts are not made to procure him, either from England or from the States. It is quite possible to procure him there as well as in England, and the expense and risk of getting him here safely are considerably less. There is a pure American bred, thoroughbred horse, standing in England as a stallion for hunting mares, in a very fashionable hunting county, at the present moment, in England. There was more competition, and the exhibitors were more numerous in the heavy and what I must term the nondescript classes, as I think it is quite an innovation to hear of prizes for, and a class of horse described as, the best horse, in saddle, in harness, and at the plough? Are unsound stallions eligible for prize honours, I mean those unsound from well known hereditary defects, such as spavin, &c? I fancy that some of the horses on the ground, that had been serving as stallions this season, and were competing for honours, were not free from these peculiarities. Evidently, a good many farmers in the province of Quebec, are either ignorant of the consequences of breeding from unsound stallions, or do not mind running the risk, if they can get a stallion at a low ser-C. F. B. vice fec.

Messrs Dawes' Clydes and Shires were good enough for anything. All their stock had been running about between Lachine, Toronto, Sherbrooke, and Montreal for the previous three weeks, and the only wonder to my mind is that they were shown in such excellent order. Bravo, Mr. Tuck !

A bay Percheron: a thing I never saw before !

I forgot the pigs. The prizes for the BERKSHIRES, were

monopolised by Ontario, Mr. Snell, of Edmonton, taking all the firsts, and all but two or three of the other prizes. Upon the whole, I have seen a better show of this breed.

The SUFFOLKS, Mr. Featherstone did not, as he used to do, earry off all the honours, Mr. G. H Lloyd, of St-Lin, winning a first for young sows, Mr George, of Brampton, first for older sow, &c. Mr. Featherstone's pigs, however, are on the whole the best exhibited in the class. Oh! for the leg of one of them, fed on skim-milk and barley meal, weighing 6 lbs at most, and salted for ten days only! In Essex, Mr Featherstone had no competitor. He would have been hard to beat. I have bred Essex, Berkshire, and Suffolk pigs, but I have had no experience in Chester-white, Poland-china, or other large breeds, so I do not pretend to give my opinion as to their merits. The prizes for these two last classes seem to have been pretty equally distributed between the two provinces, but in Chester-whites Messrs George, of Brampton, and de Courey, of Bornholm, seem to have had it all their own way.

One thing I must mention: the excessive carelessness with which smokers flung away the incandescent butts of their cigars. I am a great smoker, but I should never dream of using pipe or cigar in an enclosure so full of combustible matter as the sheep- and pig-pens. Conceive the enormous loss caused by the fire at the Sherbrooke Exhibition grounds a few years ago.

The fat and draught cattle were, very wisely, put under a canvas tent, so that, the sides being raised, a free entrance of air on all sides was admitted. Too hot weather for fat beasts, anyhow. I wonder some of them did not succumb, but I hear of no deaths.

Among the Ayrshires, we had the usual contestants, and I was not surprised to see the herd-prize conferred upon the cattle of Mr Brown, of Petite Côte, Montreal, though Mr James Drummond ran him very close. I was very glad I was not one of the Judges, as they must have had a very difficult task to discharge, particularly in deciding between the two four-year old cows and upwards, 1st Brown, 2nd Jas Drummond.

Now, connected with this breed of cattle, here is a curious

thing:

The Dominion Government offered special prizes—to be competed for at the late Sherbrooke Exhibition—one of \$100 for the ten best butter cows of any breed, and one of \$40 for the four best dairy cows on the grounds. A number of herds entered into this competition, and as the various milkings had to be analysed, the decision was not made known until this week, when both of the prizes were awarded to the Ayrshire cows belonging to Mr Robert Robertson, of Howick, the Jerseys belonging to Senator Cochrane coming in second.

The very last thing I should have expected, that the Ayrshire should beat the Jersey cow in richness of milk, however superior she might be in gross quantity of solids contained in the milk of one day.

EXHIBITION OF THE HORTIOULTURAL SOCIETY OF MONTREAL.

I regret to say that I cannot say so much in praise of this Exhibition as I have just said with regard to the Cattleshow. I am told by those who ought to know, that there was some doubt as to the possibility of clearing away the remains of the Electric exhibition in time to admit of the proper display of the fruit and flowers, and that, in conse quence of this doubt, many intending exhibitors declined to present their articles. At all events, the show of flowers, though not without considerable merit, was poor compared with what we have been accustomed to see in the Victoria rink on other occasions.

As to the prizes, I cannot give an opinion about the propriety of the decisions of the Judges, as some mischievous *Puck* had evidently been at work upon the placards, which were terribly mixed up, particularly among the vegetables.

The APPLES especially the Alexanders, were very fine, but the pears were unripe, as usual, and required a considerable

time of storage to make them catable.

HOTHOUSE GRAPES, the Barbarossa notably, were well thinned out and had the bloom upon them, the absence of which on both grapes and plums from the States so sadly spoils their appearance. Fruit will not travel long distance on rough railroads without been damaged more or less. Two bunches of Barbarossa weighed upwards of 6 lbs each.

Mr Betrix, gardener to Mr Andrew Allan, showed a basket of fruit of various kinds that was indeed, in the words of the prize-list, "Most tastefully arranged." In it was a small cherry, of dark colour, something like our English Morella, which the Americans call Morello, though, as cerasus, in spite of its termination, is feminine in gender, I prefer our spelling: the word is evidently the diminutive Morella, an Italian adjective signifying olackish, and connected with the Latin Maurus, a Moor.

Too late in the season for MELONS, but I was glad to see that my good friend Mr Smith, a Glo'stershire man and gardener to Mr Thomas Dawes of Lachine, took first prizes

for muskmelons and for a new variety.

The Jerusalem artichokes were very poor indeed. To grow these to perfection it is necessary to plant them fresh every year like potatoes. Allowed to occupy the same land continuously, they rarely come to any size.

Smith's (Dawes) LONG RED BEETS were very fine, as were his six varieties of onions, though they were not too prettily turned out, and his 3 varieties of TOMATOES. The specimens of red tomatoes shown by the College of Notre-Dame, were easy winners of the first prize for the best 6.

WINTER CABBAGES were good, and Savoys superb; the RED CABBAGE very fine indeed, but the prize-placards must have been misplaced in some instances, as well as in the CAU-

LIFLOWER class.

As for the WHITE-TURNIPS, the first prize-placard was attached to the very worst specimens in the show, large inside but furry in texture when cut. Mr. Robert Hamilton and Mr. Girdwood showed specimens of excellent quality and quite large enough for white turnips. The SWEDES were not good substance. Salsifis (Smith) very fine indeed.

A collection of potatoes, sent by the Rev. Robert Hamilton,

of Greenville, was about the best and most interesting exhibit in the rink. There were 28 different sorts, all named. A letter that Mr. Hamilton kindly sent me on the subject will be found below.

Talking to Mr. Hamilton and Mr. Wm. Evans on the subice, of potato growing, the latter mentioned that in a certain year some time ago, Mr. Henderson, near Montreal, planted 10 acres of potatoes, which owing to the extraordinary drought of the season yielded hardly any crop. Well, remarked I, if he had kept the horse-hoe going all the time, I think he might have saved himself such an awful loss. "Ah," interposed Mr. Hamilton, "you are right there, for, in that very same year, I had ten acres of potatoes, I worked them constantly as long as I could without the cultivator injuring the tops, and I got 240 bushels an acre." A pretty convincing proof, if any proof were needed, of the advantage of pulverising the soil during the growth of plants.

Leeks, parsnips and carrots, very good indeed! The first really superb.


