The general average is 92 per cent of a full average. The potato crop returns are heavier, there are 11 places named with a yield of from 85 to 98 per cent of average, 4 with a full average, and 3 that exceed it. The general average is 95 per cent of a full average.

Tue horrible noise of a fog horn is to be heard no more. By a new invention signals are to be given in musical tones, which carry further than mere noise, and can be made to convey messages. It is surprising this has not been done before, as every musician knows that the penetrating or carrying power of a true musical tone far exceeds a discordant one or mere noise.

WM. QUICK, grocer of Bowmanville, succeeded the firm of Quick & Co., when his father retired in May 1889. He did a fair business; but his means were very small, and his success always dubious. It was locally believed that the father took out all there was in the business, and since then Quick has been looked on as a weak mark for credit. He has now assigned.

E. S. CLARK has been in the grocery business at Toronto and Parkdale for about twelve years. Of late he has become slow in his payments and finally last week he held a meeting of creditors at which he offered 60 cents in the dollar, unsecured. This was refused, and in consequence he has made an assignment. His liabilities will reach \$8,000 and the estate shows a deficit of \$1,000.

MR. ALLEN of Rosemont speculated in grain. He won the first time and this encouraged him to go on. Then he began to lose, but he kept on until he was pauperized. He is said to be in debt now to the sum of about \$9000. He hastily left Mono a few weeks ago. He owed Halstead's bank in Shelburue \$1000 and Manager Silk went in pursuit of him. Silk located Allen in Winnipeg and got out a warrant for his arrest. Allen telegraphed to his father, who is a wealthy farmer near Rosemont who paid the \$1000.

This offer will likely be accepted, as he is only getting deeper into debt every day, and all he has is covered by bill of sale, etc. Against liabilities of \$1,500 he can only show assets of \$500, and consequently his creditors have no option but to take what they can get and be

W. H. BANNISTER, optician of Halifax, is offering his creditors 50 cents in the dollar payable in 3, 6, 9 and 12 months. started in 1885 on a very small capital and in 1889 he had to compromise at 40 cents in the dollar on liabilities of \$6,000. Since then he has had all he could do to make a living, and finally he has decided to give up business and take a situation in a confectionery store.

A. W. EMERSON, general storekeeper, of Bothwell, has assigned. He left the firm of Emerson & Co. early this year, taking out with him the equivalent of \$1,000-mostly in stock. His former partner failed later, which hurt his credit, and he began to neglect his store. His stock was not kept up to the mark, trade fell off in consequence, and the net result is that he has had to assign.

CHARLES CULLEY started a boot and shoe factory in Toronto last September. He then claimed to have two houses and a vacant lot, but it was predicted that his active capital was far too small to admit of his manufacturing successfully in competition with larger and more powerful houses. This opinion has been borne out by the results for, inside of a year, he has been compelled to make an assignment.

GEO. PORTER started a grocery at Wolfville, N.S., last spring. He had previously been in business and had failed, and it was not quite clear whether he was free of his old indebtedness or not. Under these circumstances his credit was necessarily limited, and as he had keen competition to face his ultimate success was not anticipated. This view has been borne out by the news of his assignment with liabilities of \$2,400 and assets valued at \$1,400 only.

A. C. METIVIER, learned his trade at a large co-operative store in England. Early in 1890 he emigrated to this country and tried his hand at garden-farming. This did not turn out a success, and he then started in the dry goods line in Toronto. He had no capital, and although his stand was a good one he had not sufficient money to carry on his business. He has all along been hard pressed, and finally he has been forced to make an assignment.

THE Empire not unkindly, objects to Montreal counting those residing over the mountain amongst its inhabitants. Why not? Our mountain is only one of the public parks of this city, and those residing across its border are just as much entitled to be counted in with the city proper, as those who in Toronto live north of Queens' Park. There is no doubt whatever that there are 250,000 people in this city, and in suburbs that are merely detached from it by a paper fence.

A. E. Brasher, general storekeeper, of Lucknow, has assigned. He claimed to have brought stock with him to the extent of \$3,500 when he left Vienna for Lucknow in the fall of 1889, and he secured the trade of the Patrons of Industry at 15 per cent off for dry goods and 121 per cent off for groceries. But he seems to have been personally unpopular, and as there is no money in trade at these rates, it is not much wonder that he was always regarded as an unsatisfactory account.

E. Meredith, general storekeeper, of Quyon, has been in business some twenty-five years. At one time he was fairly wellto do, but gradually he ran down. Younger men passed him in the race and outstanding balances piled up upon him until he is forced to seek the elemency of his creditors. He is now offering 50 cents in the dollar on liabilities of \$7,000. If he can get security the ofter will be accepted, as the estate would not show this if forcibly wound up; but, pending this, the creditors are merely keeping it under advisement. If it is refused he must assign.

CHAS. E. JACOUES started in the flour business in 1884 with about \$1,000, lent to him, it is said, by his father. In the fall of 1887 he opened a small grocery business from which he retired in a few months. In 1888 he again started a grocery which he abandoned later to devote himself to the flour trade. Last Novabandoned later to devote himself to the flour trade. Last November he formed a partnership with L. H. Coutu to go into the business of manufacturing macaroni. They could not get along together, and last February Jacques purchased Coutu's interest in the business for \$1,000; paying \$200 down, and giving a note payable in 12 months for the balance. The business seems to be a fair one; but he had not the capital necessary to carry it on. His liabilities are \$8,300, and he claims assets worth \$11,000. But, of this, \$4,300 is for the machinery which he purchased for \$1,000, and it is doubtful if it would bring any more than that sum at a forced sale. sum at a forced sale.

A short time ago a boiler was constructed in Manchester, Eng., with a view to testing the practice advised by some, in case of shortness of water being discovered, of turning on the feed water—a somewhat startling method of procedure according to some. In these tests the furnaces were bared of water by opening the blowoff cock and allowing the water to escape while good bright fires were burning, which could not fail to overheat the plates. When sufficiently heated to melt disks of lead, tin the plates. When sufficiently heated to melt disks of lead, tin and zinc, the feed was suddenly turned on through special pipes, which injected the water directly on to the heated plates, but in no case, as is often assumed, was this followed by a sudden generation of steam at an excessive pressure, but in one case actually a reduction of pressure took place. The one mishap which took place proved, it seems, to have been due to the feed not having been turned on soon enough, Again, the hogging upward of the flue tubes, which was accurately ascertained by means of rods, was in some cases found to be as much as one-half inch. THE CENSUS AND OUR TRADE POLICY.

The net result of the recent census is disappointing to the hopes of sanguine prophets. But to all who have kept watch upon the evidences that were cropping up as to the movements, and who weighed calmly the laws affecting, population growth or decrease, there is nothing in the census returns to cause surprise. To attribute to the tariff the falling of the sum total of

our population below the anticipation of guesses, is to make a second guess explanatory of another being wrong. Those who declare that protection has driven our people into the States to escape its burdens, must have a genius for practical joking. Our trade policy is doubtless protective, but not so thoroughly so as is that of the States. So that granting that Canadians fled away from our tariff to place themselves under one double its weight, they were rushing into Scylla to escape Charbdis, or in homelier phrase, jumping out of the frying pan into the fire, or into a river to escape a shower. The increase in Canada from 1881 was about 12 per cent, in the States it reached 24.57 per cent. It is noticeable then that the percentage by which the States increased its population in the last ten years over that of Canada was the same as that between the extent of protection in the States and that of this country. If then we adopt the argument of those opposed to protection, we are driven to this conclusion that population increases in proportion to the extent of a protective tariff. We have also as corroborative evidence of this law, that England under Free Trade, from 1876 to 1886 sent out 2,505,420 steerage passengers, presumably emigrants, of whom over 60 per cent went to share the burdens of ani-Free Trade America. To contend then that free trade would have kept our population at home and increased their fecundity, as is being asserted, is to make a statement worthy only of a place in a new edition of "Alice in Wonderland." The emigration of Canadians to the States, to whatever extent it has taken place, merely illustrates the action of the same general law by which larger bodies attract smaller ones, when that law is not checked by some stronger counteracting force. Our cities have grown at the expense of rural places, because of the more varied and larger opportunities of urban life. The States with their enormous wealth and trade naturally provide similar and greater attractions. So, as the Canadian smaller towns and hamlets send our cities a constant supply of young men to engage in commerce and in more congenial occupations than are provided in small and scattered communities, this Dominion as a whole, with its sparse population, naturally enough sees many of its sons fascinated by the greater richness of the States. Especially are they drawn towards the industrial centres of America by the magnificent and unprecedented developments continually going on there, because of the stimulus given to all manufacturing enterprises by the protective tariff of that country. Those industries have depleted certain of the agricultural States by the same attractive power that has

drawn off many of our people. Comparisons are being made between the growth of population in Canada from 1871 to 1881 and from 1881 to 1891, to show that a greater enlargement took place-before our tariff was made more protective than since. The basis of such a comparison is guess work, as serious doubts exist as to the census this year being precisely on the same lines as those for 1871 and 1881. Admitting that all three enumerations were exact, there is no basis for a comparison of the effects of protection and free trade, for the tariffs from 1871 to 1881 were protective ones. To speak of a 17 per cent tariff as a policy of free trade is mere nursery talk. The same Census differences between 1871 and 1881 and 1881 and 1891 which have inspired a good deal of pessimistic comment, are found in the census returns of the States. In 1870 the population of the States was 38,558,371, in 1880 it rose to 50,-155,783, an increase of 30.08 per cent. From 1880 to 1890 the increase was 12,324,757, an increase of only In Canada from 1871 to 1881 the in-24.57 per cent. crease was 17.03 per cent, and in next decade only 11,52 per cent. That is, the increase in the States in last ten years sank 4.51 per cent below the increase in previous ten years, and the increase in Canada sank 5.51 per cent below the increase in last ten years. It is reasonable to conclude that the same influences which depressed the growth of the States from 1881 to 1891, compared to previous ten years by 4½ per cent, were the same as those that depressed the growth of Canada from 1881 to 1891 compared to previous ten years by 51 per cent. It is only natural that such influences had more force over our small population than over the vast numbers of the States. It is, however, impossible that the National Policy, so-called, of Canada was the influence which depressed the expansion of the States, so that to explain both these phenomena, we must leave out of sight the factor which cannot have had any relation to the larger of them. And, inasmuch as the States has added 24 per cent to its population since 1881 under a protective tariff, it is not reasonable to attribute the increase of Canada by only 114 per cent to a protective tariff. Taking the cities we find that they increased in population in last 10 years 40 per cent, in towns of from 3 to 5 thousand by 41 per cent and villages of 1500 to 3000 people 15 per cent. Grouping all these as urban populations the increase was 38 Now the total of such populations in the Dominion in 1881 was under a million, 990,318 where. as the total population was 4,324,810, leaving 3,334,492 for the populations of the scattered settlements of the

It is that section of our people having not increased as much as hoped for, which accounts for the result of the Census being so generally disappointing. And we believe that this has arisen from the growing reluctance of the present generation of young men to engage in agriculture. But even the enormous capacity of the cities for absorbing fresh additions to their population, has not been enough to take in all those who have left the farming districts because they prefer city life, and attractions, and chances. It is well known that the young people of this Province will not take up new land, they go over in preference to the mechanical occupations of the States. Farms all around this city that have been divided to find some son or sons a separate holding, are being restored to their original size by removal of fences. Lands that might be brought into cultivation are left untilled, because of this unhappy dislike of country occupations. That has affected also the States. There has not been there the same expansion in recent years of farming populations as in earlier ones. The evidence all points to this conclusion, that the main influence which lowered the growth of the States, as pointed out, during the same period as is covered between the two last census takings of Canada, in comparison with previous ones, is the growing preference of urban to country life. That the protective tariff is accountable for the unsatisfactory Census, is too unreasonable to be seriously entertained.

U. S. CRITICS OF CANADA.

.The cynical remark that critics are men who have failed, is finding confirmation in the comments of the American press on the scandals recently revealed. If the authors of those sharp censures of Canada and Canadians, were to look at home they would see that what has roused our people to the highest indignation, is daily, and for long years has been daily on view in the States, where public abuses have so long resisted all attempts at correction, that they have become recognised as part of the political system. Reformers there have failed, hence they turn to the task of abus-The Chicago Inter-ocean of August 23rd has a particularly offensive attack on this country. are charged with having allowed Canada to be "the Botany Bay of American criminals." More's the pity that this is not true, for Botany Bay was once the penal doom of the worst English offenders, and their terror. American criminals would have regarded Canada with horror had our land been a Botany Bay. It proceeds to say "it was not the fault of the English Government that extradition was not secured. The persistent opposition of Canada affords the explanation. As a consequence of affording an asylum for defaulters and plunderers, the country was infested by them. political robbers, bank defaulters, and the like, were brainy men for the most part, and gradually came to exert very considerable influence." That Canada persistently opposed extradition when the States was anxious to reciprocate this policy is wholly false. We have dealt fully with the proof of this in a special article. That any American "political robber, bank defaulter, ort he like," has ever exercised "very considerrable influence" in Canadian public life, is a slander based only a spiteful imagination. It is true that one rascal of American training and experience was mixed up with certain scandals. But it has not been shown that he was the man whose "considerable influence" originated the actions that gave rise to those scandals. Even granting the reverse of this, it is surely hard to blame

Canada for being victimised by a robber who had been acute enough to fleece the wide awake citizens of New York? So far from Canada opposing extradition, there has been no little friction between this country and Britain because of the opposition to such a policy by the States. A certain class of criminals for years made the States a basis of criminal operations against this land and England. The very fact of their being criminals engaged in crime against a foreign country, gave them "very considerable influence" in the States. Both Canada and England have suffered most grievously because those criminals found not only "hospital. ity" in the States, but most active assistance amongst those who wielded "very considerable influence" in the political life of the States. For the Inter-ocean to upbraid us on this score is akin to the shelterers of a burglar attacking one of his victims whose house has been broken into, for allowing his premises to be invaded and robbed. Our critic tells us that our population is "incongruous," hence one cause of our scandals. Now the fact is that America has the most incongruous population of any nation. When therefore the writer says of the French, "When the representatives of these people get out into the world through the door of politics, they are especially liable to be taken in and led astray," we can only conclude that he is measuring our corn in his own measure. When he declares that "the French and the English-speaking people of Canada do not assimilate, they are not homogeneous," we may justly ask, "What about the many millions of citizens in the States who are not even allowed to occupy the same railway carriages as other citizens? Is that a specimen of racial assimilation?" Surely if a country must become the prey of boodlers when its population is "incongruous," and are not "homogeneous," and "do not assimilate," as our critic argues, the United States are in an infinitely worse condition than Canada? He proceeds to ridicule the political position of the Dominion as "neither one thing nor another." "The chain of imperial sovereignty is worn as an ornament. The iron has been washed with gold and serves as a bracelet. Not only is the New Dominion loyal to the crown, but it takes a sycophantic pride in not wanting to be free and independent." The chain worn by Canada is certainly an ornament, but how could it be so if it prevented us being free? Chains are signs of servitude, or are adoraments, they cannot serve both purposes at one and the same time. Our critic should re-write his article and tell us to which use he really thinks the chain is put Such a confusion of similes that is worn by Canada. is worthy of Mrs. Malaprop. We may say of such criticism as the Coster said of his wife's blows, "It amuses she, and dont hurt I." Canada has more political freedom than the States, and enjoys all the independence it needs, sufficient indeed of both to laugh to scorn both the seductive and the threatening efforts of the States to induce us to commit national suicide by exchanging our free life and independence for the "chain," of subjection to the American Republic. We wear the chain of Imperial connection proudly as a wife wears that on which hangs the locket bearing the We are also told that "the portrait of her lord. great calamity of Canada was the Canadian Pacific Railroad. There is really nothing north of the lakes to justify such a road. There is a vast stretch of country which is barren and always will be, and even the arable region is very slow in its development. In the far West there is a wonderfully interesting country, from the standpoint of the tourist, but for practical purposes it is singularly unattractive. Canada should have been content with its original boundaries, and not attempted anything transcontinental. That was one of the gigantic blunders of history, and one which, once made cannot be unmade." We need not reply seriously to such wild assertions, which are merely the outcome of jealousy. That our North West is barren is just now being proved by its harvests yielding heavier crops of wheat per acre than any grown on this continent. If our C. P. R. is for us a "blunder," it is not so at least for the States, for it is found to be the best highway to and from the West for the goods sold and bought by America to and from China and Japan. We advise our critics across the border to avoid exciting reciprocity in such caustic comments on political scandals as they have been indulging in. Canada has been roused to deepest anger at the recent revelations. Here there will be swift retribution on offenders, and a remedy found for these evils, whereas there are worse scandals daily exposed and notoriously known to exist in the States, which are regarded with complacency as a recognised part of the political system of that country. Our American critics know well that the amount of money involved in the Canadian scandals does not equal the extent of "boodle" which their parties fight to keep, or to seize, every four years.

FALL MILLINERY OPENINGS.

The fall millinery openings took place in this city in the early portion of the week and were fairly well attended. The attendance from the country was, perhaps, hardly up to expectations, taking an average of all the houses, but city buyers were present in force, and there was an evident anxiety to see the coming styles.

In shapes the new felts do not vary very much from the now familiar spring straws. The sailor hat is the keynote; and no matter if the crown be almost level with the brim, or stand well above it, it will sell well. A typical hat of this style is the Vassar. It has a crown projecting about an inch above, and half an inch below, the brim, so as to make it more of a face hat. It is usually sold ready trimmed, and it is both cheap and very becoming. It is already selling fast. When the brim of the Vassar is turned up behind and trimmed with a ribbon pompon it is termed a Lenox, and sells almost as well as in its original form. The Narragausett is a hat on similar lines to the Vassar. It has a higher crown, and a 31 inch brim, but it is also a good seller. This shape comes with beaver and velvet tops, and, being ready trimmed, is cheap and convenient for street wear.

A shape which is all the rage in England, is the Brighton. It is a small walking hat with a dented crown and a low turned up brim. It is shown in navy, gray, brown, fawn and mottles, and being a jaunty shape, and very convenient for travelling, it should take well here also. In fact the run this year will be on small shapes. French lines, it is true, still show some large felts; but American lines are all small, and it is from New York that we get our styles. Small turbans and toques with pointed or conical crowns are all that are shown. Very few extreme shapes are to be seen. Only for children will large hats rule; but for young girls a big flat-brimmed felt with a low crown and a 41 inch brim, is selling like hot cakes. A curious shape is the Hixon. It is a flat shape with a rierced brim turned up and fastened to the crown. It is trim-

med with a row of velvet round the brim and another round the crown, and finished with a velvet pompon and an osprey aigrette.

This fall promises to be a great season for velvet covered shapes; although felts will certainly rule for second-best wear. These of course follow the same lines. Beaver and fur-edged hats are again coming in, and any shape with a large brim in front and turned up behind may be said to be within the limits of fashion, although the newest shapes are all as small and as flat as they can well be made. The colors are navy, cardinal, and the tans, fawn and greys; but cardinal will be worn only in the cheaper lines.

In trimmings a bewildering variety presents itself. The dearness of ostrich feathers (which show an advance of nearly 50 per cent in value this year) has naturally stimulated the demand for wings, birds and fancy trimmings. Wings promise to be an excellent line, whether natural or fancy, and white pigeon or natural ptarmigan wings will be run on for trimming tan and brown hats. The birds shown this season are all fancies, and are made up with jet, tinsel, spangles, or with small ostrich mounts. A fashionable line are small birds made up with bird-of-paradise tails. These come on some of the most stylish hats. Osprey is going well this season and jet aigrettes will be an excellent line to carry. Ornaments are hardly so much worn, and the feeling for tinsel is dying out; except for black and gold which is still a favorite combination. In purely mourning lines black silk hops, poppies, roses, and lilacs, are safe investments, and jet in beads, lace, and ornaments, was never more called

In ribbons plain failles will be the best selling line, although there is an evident effort to push plain satin failles into prominence. These lines in frown and Wide fancies are again grey shades are safe sellers. seen this season, particularly on beaver and fur hats. and figured broches have moved out fairly. run is on plain lines, and it looks as if velvet ribbons, and even velvet and satin ribbons, would this year have to rank next to the plain faille. A novelty this year is a binding ribbon of sequins, or small spangles, sewn on braid. It is very expensive, as it is made entirely by hand, and it seems to be intended to take the place of the tinsels of previous years, although it comes only in the deeper metallic tints.

EXTRADITION.

As Canada has been accused of objecting to the extradition of a certain class of offenders who have taken refuge here, we present a sketch of the history of this question which entirely disproves this charge. Until quite recently the extradition of criminals between the U.S. and Canada was regulated by the Ashburton Treaty of 1842. The English Act of 1843 was passed immediately after, to give effect to the treaty. In regard to the colonies it was provided that they should be allowed legislative action, but only for the purpose of carrying into effect the objects of the Imperial Act within the colonial jurisdiction.

Embezzlement, and similar crimes, were not specified in the Ashburton treaty which only mentions murder, piracy, arson, robbery, forgery, and uttering forged paper.

The powers of the local legislation were limited absolutely to the objects of the Imperial Act and could only concern the procedure necessary for the carrying out of those objects.

In pursuance of the powers thus conferred several

acts were passed in Canada which need not be specified particularly. They were all intended to render extradition procedure more efficient, the last one being the Extradition Act of 1877, which as amended is reproduced in the Revised Statutes of Canada cap. 142 and is now in force.

This Act only applies, and can only apply in the case of foreign states with which there is an Extradition treaty (made by Her Majesty with such foreign state) extending to Canada.

The Canadian Government could do nothing more than it has done in the matter, and the fact that defaulters from the U.S. could not till quite recently be extradited, is altogether the fault of the U.S. Government, which has been unwilling to make a new Extradition treaty with Great Britain which would apply to crimes of that nature.

Such a treaty was finally entered into on the 17th of July 1889 and at once brought the crimes therein specified including embezzlement, frauds by a trustee; and crimes of a like nature, within the operation of the Canadian Act.

A still more convincing proof that no blame can be imputed to Canada in this matter is afforded by the Weldon Act passed May 2nd, 1889, before the treaty with the U.S. Government was completed. This Act was the outcome of the general feeling throughout Canada that she should not be made a sort of house of refuge for American absconders, and that whether the U.S. Government accorded us a similar right or not, we should at all events do all we could to get rid of our undesirable visitors.

The Act provides that in case no extradition arrangement exists between H. M. and a foreign state, or in case such an extradition arrangement does not include the crimes mentioned in the Schedule to the Act, it shall nevertheless be lawful for the Minisier of Justice to issue his warrant for the surrender to such foreign state of any fugitive offender, etc., etc.

This act is still in force as regards the U. S. with respect to various crimes not included in the Extradition treaty, which are mentioned in this Schedule to the Act.

HIGHER PRICES FOR SHELLAC.

The low values which ruled for shellac during 1890 had the usual effect of reducing the output of this useful gum. So low did prices fall that many makers in India shut down their factories for the season, and although the markets at consuming points were not stiffened by this action as much as was expected, it was known that stocks were being rapidly reduced in compass. Still buyers held off. The consumption of shellac is small by any one trade, although in the aggregate it amounts to very large figures, and dealers counted on a good crop this year which would still leave control of the situation in their hands.

In this they have been disappointed. The weather turned out extremely unfavorable for the shellac industry. The weakness of the moonsoon currents resulted in a hot and almost rainless June followed by an unprecedentedly hot and rainy July. The lac insects failed to secrete their usual supply. Advices from Mirzapore, which is the commercial centre of the shellac industry, announce that the crop will fall heavily under expectations. The present stock in Calcutta is extremely light, and the result is that no orders would be accepted there for future delivery at present prices. In fact shellac is cheaper in New York than it is at Mirzapore.

To assist in raising prices the consumption of shellac is steadily growing larger. During 1890, 100,000 cases or nearly 20 per cent. more than the ordinary quantity were consumed in England, and, owing to the increasing demand for shellac for electrical purposes, it looks as if the consumption would be far more likely to expand than to contract. A similar condition of affairs prevails in the United States. During the season of. 1890-91 the imports of shellac into New York were 6,-253,380 pounds, or 700,000 pounds more than in any previous year, while during the preceding season they were only 4,739,465, and yet, although the imports of shellac have grown by a million and a half pounds inside of twelve months, the stock in New York whence, Canadian users derive the bulk of their supplies, is smaller at the present moment, than in any previous year. In England the available supply is confined to 3500 cases which are held by three large holders for higher values.

With small shipments from Calcutta, and buying as brisk as it is now, we can hardly expect large stocks, and therefore it looks as if prices must go up here. Octagon B which is quoted at 22 to 23 cents in New York is held at ports of shipment in India at 25 cents, landed, buyer to assume all risks. The other staple brands are equally higher at primary points as the following comparison will show:

This shows distinctly the current of the market. India is the sole source of supply, and it looks as if manufacturers there had learned a lesson from the previous year and determined to regulate production in the future and thus keep prices on a paying basis. Old stocks are now nearly all removed from the market. Consumers are dependent entirely upon the new production and, for once, the Indian maker seems to have the situation in his own hands.

THE AMERICAN QUEEN.

The Queen Insurance Co. of America was formally organized August 27, 1891. The following officers were elected: James A. Macdonald, formerly United States Manager of the Queen, President; E. F. Beddall, United States Manager of the Royal, Vice-President and G. W. Burchell, formerly Assistant Manager of the Queen, Secretary. Among the corporators are such well known names as Roswell G. Rolston, President of the Farmers' Loan & Trust Company; Samuel Sloan, President of the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western Railroad Co.; Frederick D. Tappen, President of the Gallatin National Bank and chairman of the New York Clearing House Association, and William A. Nash President of the Corn Exchange National Bank; while the underwriting interest is well represented by James A. Macdonald, Manager Queen Insurance Company of Liverpool; E. F. Beddall, Manager Royal Insurance Company, and Joseph M. Rogers and J. H. Morton Morris, the managers respectively of the Queen's branches for the West and South. The capital of new Company, all of which has been paid in, will be \$500,000, in 5,000 shares of \$100 each, the subscription price being \$300 per share, which gives the Company a net surplus of \$1,000,000 to start with, or, with both capital and surplus combined, a surplus for policyholders of \$1,500,000. It has not yet been decided when the Company will commence business, but as soon as the laws of the different States can be complied with it will be in shape to start in at once. The present managers, general agents and local agents of the Queen of Liverpool will be retained by the Queen of America. The formalities of taking over the business of the Queen of Liverpool will be complied with as expeditiously as possible, and the Company will be under way very shortly.

SOME CENSUS REVELATIONS.

Although we are not so numerous a people as many fancied, we are a much richer community than has been calculated. At the same time the percentage of debt due by us is greater than we have been supposing, though the discovery of the fact that he owes more in this sense, has not, we believe, given a moment's uneasiness to a single Canadian. The fewer we are the more to our credit are the material and financial achievements of the last ten years. At the same time the discovery of the exact state of our population renders the advice given by this journal some time ago, obligatory upon the Government. We called for a severe and thorough policy of retrenchment in the public expenditure. The Census demonstrates the necessity of this. We have again and again urged the restriction of imports, the reduction of credits to retailers, the need for reducing the facilities for overtrading. We have been acting, it is too much to be feared, under a false impression as to the growth of the population, both as regards the policy of the government, and in matters relating to all forms of business activity. Now that the census facts are known, other facts must be conformed thereto, and after all, we have reason for much national self-congratulation that the country is in so satisfactory a condition. The year proceeding that in which the last census was taken the total exports were \$87,911,458, imports \$86,489,747, a total foreign trade of \$174,401,205, last year the exports were \$96,749,149, imports, \$121,858,241, a total foreign trade of \$218,607,390. This gives us increased amounts per head as follows:-

It looks as though we had been anticipating a much larger addition to our numbers than has taken place, just as we believe the increase of imports soon after the last census was known was caused by its satisfactory exhibit. That we have not advanced in amount of exports per head in 10 years is disappointing, and demands earnest attention by the government, and our whole mercantile body. Turning to evidences as to the comparative wealth and business activity of the people the figures are highly gratifying, as the following shows:

THE TORONTO STREET RAILWAY.

Toronto has handed over its street railway to a company. We hope this step will not put our western friends on the stool of repentance ere long. It is a colossal blunder to grant a monopoly of this kind for a long term of years during which the value of the franchise is certain to be enormously enhanced. And a city fouls it own nest by thus practically declaring that it has not enough business capacity to conduct such an enterprise as profitably as a chartered company. All the necessary appliances for city life, should be under city control, and managed not for making dividends, but to serve to the fullest and most economical extent the interests and convenience of the citizens. No city would dream of farming out its police and roadways to a company to make money for shareholders. The city of Toronto would not even consider a proposal to place its Water Works again in the hands of a company, scandalously as has been that department mismanaged in past years. The street railway might have become either a revenue yielding enterprise on a large scale, or its fares have been reduced so as to be an enormous boon to the great mass of the people, especially the crowds of working men, youths and girls, who are compelled to travel on the cars daily to and from work, out of whose hard earnings the Street Railway company will derive a large income. The Mayor of Toronto deserves the highest praise and the gratitude of the citizens at large for the enlightened prescience he has shown in dealing with this question, and by his endeavors to retain the enterprise in the hands of, and for the benefit of the city. But as Toronto despairs of its ability to do what is done elsewhere, we can only regret that it has set a bad example to other places, and, that it does not estimate its own business capacity as highly as it is esteemed by outsiders, speaks more for its modesty than its shrewdness and wisdom.

TRADE WITH FRANCE.

The Finance Minister on 31st ult. explained in the House that there is a commercial treaty between England and France which will continue in force until 1st Feb., 1892, to be terminated by either party on twelve months' notice to the other. It does not appear to be applicable to British colonies. By this treaty the Customs tariff for goods, the produce or manufacture of either country, is to be regulated by the internal legislation of each, they guaranteeing to each other in all other matters in the United Kingdom, France, and Algeria the treatment of the most favoured nation. By a French law, promulgated on the 27th February, 1882, it was declared that from that date goods of English origin or manufacture should be liable on their entry into France to the same treatment as those of the most favoured nation, with the exception of colonial produce, which, it was declared, would remain subject to the general Custams tariff. France has two Customs tariffs, one, the general tariff, which is applied to the goods imported from such countries as do not enjoy most favoured nation treatment; the other, the conventional or the various special tariffs granted by France to other countries. Corn, live stock, and many raw products not being included in the special tariffs, have to pay the rates of the general tariff, even when imported from countries enjoying most favoured national treatment. The conventional tariff rates are about 24 per cent less than those of the general tariff, and Great Britain enjoys the benefit of the lower tariff by law and not by the treaty of February 28, 1882. This demands the attention of the government. Whatever trade privileges the mother country has should be extended to Canada, which would probably do a large trade with France if placed on the same basis as Great Britain. The very idea of Empire involves such a policy.

CATTLE TRADE PRECAUTIONS.

Some fears having been expressed that there might arise a danger to our cattle trade from the proposal to allow the entrance into Canada of U. S. cattle for purpose of slaughtering and manufacture of products, Mr. Abbott has again explained that the utmost precautions will be taken to avoid risk, as these cattle will be thereby isolated and quarantined. He stated that the British authorities had declared their entire satisfaction with the proposals, as in their judgment no danger would arise. There will be nothing done in this direction until the best experts of the trade are satisfied that the cattle trade is not menaced in any way.

MAIL SERVICE SUBSIDIES.

In explaining the item of \$2,000,000 for carrying the mails the Postmaster General said that the amount paid the Grand Trunk last year was \$329,952, and that this had been increased by \$8,265 for additional service in Wellington, Grey, and Bruce, Georgian Bay, and Lake Erie. The amount paid the Canadian Pacific Reilway last year was \$372,825; for next year the subsidy would be \$483,500. The increase was made up of \$74,936 increased rate between Montreal and Vancouver, \$28,950 increased rate between Montreal and St. John, \$25,670 for the New Brunswick railway, which was not included in the Canadian Pacific railway grant last year, \$2,000 for Prince Albert Service, \$1,081 for Winnipeg and Glenboro branch, \$300 for the Missouri branch, and \$160 for the Great Northern railway. The increase between Montreal and Vancouver brought up the subsidy to \$105 a mile. Previously it had been \$75 per mile. The Grand Trunk was paid at the rate of \$160 per mile for 884 miles, \$124 for 369 miles, with \$25,000 added for increased accommodation between Montreal and Toronto, and \$5,725 for carrying American mails.

For all practical purposes, in making change, ten cent pieces are as good as twenty cent pieces, and this being the case, twenty cent pieces can and should be entirely dispensed with. The four dollar Dominion bill is not desirable, when other notes may be had. The figure 4 is not well executed and might to a near-sighted person appear as the figure one. We have seen this mistake made more than once. Besides this, the note does not prove useful in making change. Moreover, it is found to be an awkward note to handle, and as a matter of fact, it is sometimes returned in the West after heine good surprisingly his to the times refused in the West, after being eyed suspiciously by the payee, with such remarks as these:—"Have you any other notes but that"; or perhaps—"Give me two twos instead of this." Should they not then be withdrawn from circulation along with the twenty cent coins?

STEEL CHIMNEYS FOR MERCANTILE BUILDINGS.

Steel chimneys are being erected for some of Chicago's tall buildings. The Fair building has the tallest under construction. The chimney will be 250 feet high, being considerably higher than any other in the city. The outside diameter is 9 feet 5 inches, while the steel varies in thickness from 5-32 at the top to $\frac{3}{8}$ inch at the bottom. The lower 75 feet of the chimney is lined with fire brick 8 inches deep, formed to fit the shell compactly all around. Above this it is fined with hollow tile. This lining is supported at intervals of 25 feet by angle iron riveted to the steel shell; in other words, the chimney is lined in a manner similar to blast furnaces and foundry cupolas, and no expansion by heat can lessen its strength. The joints are all hot riveted. The steel shell is protected from corrosion and the weather by painting inside and out. The the weather by painting inside and out. The weight of the chimney is spread to the foundweight of the entime yet a spread to the bonda-ations in the same general way as that of the columns of the building, the base or founda-tion on which it rests being constructed in the same manner. The ground is first covered with a layer of cement, then two layers of steel rails in cement and one layer of 1-beams on which the cast iron shoe which takes the shell of the stack rests. The capacity of the chimney is 12 60-inch boilers 20 feet in length. This is the first steel chimney in a mercantile building. Brick has been used almost entirely heretofore, but it was found that the weight heretofore, but it was found that the weight of a brick chimney of this size would be almost 700 tons, while one of steel would weigh, including the livings, a little less than 250. The outside diameter of the present chimney is 9 feet 5 inches, while, of brick it would be 16 feet 6 inches. Another consideration was the time consumed in construction. A brick chimney of this height should not be built faster than 2½ feet a day on account of the settlement and the setting of the mortar, while of steel it can be erected at the rate of 20 feet a day. MONTREAL, THURSDAY EVENING, Sept. 3rd, 1891.

The Board of Trade excursion and the millinery openings attracted a considerable number of out-of-town merchants to this city during the past week, and the result was a satisfactory addition to the over-turn in most of the staple lines. BUTTER AND CHEESE, -High prices for butter have naturally checked business. Exporters are shy of operating at present values and yet farmers seem desirous to hold on for better prices yet. During the week some round lots of dairy, mixed Western and American changed hands at 141c@15c. For export finest August creamery would bring 201 cents while July would sell at 20 cents. Townships dairy is strong in the country but in this market only strictly finest would bring 17 cents and 16 cents is the ruling figure. Low grade stock is scarce and 12@12} cents would be readily paid for it, were it obtainable. There can hardly be said to be a market for cheese at the moment. Holders are endeavoring to educate the English market up to their views but it is very hard work doing so at the moment and it looks as if somebody would drop money before the sesson is out. At prices demanded in the country 10 cents would have to be made here if holders are to get their own and a present nothing over 9½ can be talked. Shippers are skirmishing round picking up stray lots which a little stretch of imagination can make strictly finest and which will come within the limits of their cables, but nnless the English market goes up transactions. The grain market is very dull. Buyers are holding off awaiting the result of

The prices of Russian wheat in the home market do not appear to warrant fears of any scarcity. Corn in London is steady. At Liverpool prices show a fractional decline. Barley and oats are quiet. At this week's market new English wheats were offered at from 48s@48s for whites and from 42s@44s for reds. Old English wheats were offered at from 468@ses for whites and from 428@44s for reds. Old English wheat brought an average of 41s. The prices of foreign wheat were against holders at a general decline of 6d. Flour was dull. Corn was weak, although the spot supplies were meagre. ASEES.—Receipts continue light; and demand has been sufficient to cause a marked improvement in pots. First sort very fine tares sold to-day at \$4.70 and \$4.75, and second have been sold at \$4.00. Pearls are nominal at about \$6.25 for first sort. Receipts since lat January, 1728 pots; 125 pearls. Deliveries, 1669 pots; 128 pearls. Stock on 2nd Sept. at 6 p.m., 138 pots; 12 pearls.

Day Goods.—Remittances are still a subject of complaint. Hardly any money is coming in from the country, and the excuse given is either that the farmers are busy in the fields or that they are holding on to their butter and cheese in the hope of better prices. At all events they are not paying their bills, and the storekeepers can only grin and bear it, in the hope that when the farmers do sell they will settle up, and not take the money to buy the next farm or loan it out at high interest to a neighbour. Still retailers speak more cheerly and travellers expect a large sorting up trade. In Manitoba crop reports are decidedly better, An encouraging sign is that storekeepers there are writing to have the whole of their orders forwarded to them at once, and that the demand for grain bags and bagging is a rushing one. In the city the trade is brisker from the opening of the schools and the return of the first flight of summer tourists from their vacation, and in the suburbs the activity in the working classes keeps trade brisk and money receipts up to the average. Throughout the trade the feeling is hopeful, although business at the moment is restricted.

Figu.—A fairly active market can be reported for fish. Salmon still run at 14@160 for British Columbia. Halibut is cheaper, and we can now quote 12c as the jobbing price. Cod and haddook rule at 4@5c. Trout, dorewhitefish and bass run from 8@10c. Pike 5 @6c. Blue fish 10@12c. Lobsters are slow of sale at 14@15c. 

Fruit.—An active market can be reported for fruit, and no matter how heavy the supplies they seem to move off promptly into second hands. Apples are dearer, owing to the reduced quantities coming forward. We quote from \$1@\$2.25 per barrel, according to quality, but good Duchess would bring \$2.50 easily. For plums, both black and green, 750 to \$1 per basket is asked. Canadian peaches rule at \$1@\$1.25 per basket for Early Crawfords. Melons are at 20 cents each. Onions, native, sell at \$2.50 per barrel, Spanish at \$3.50 per case, and Egyptian at \$3 per bag. Bartlett pears bring \$5@\$6 per barrel, Grapes 8 cents per pound. Jamaica oranges bring \$8.50 per barrel, and lemons rule at \$3.50@\$4 per case.

GROCERIES.—A fair trade, with an average volume of orders coming in, can be reported. The rush for sugar has died away, and we now quote a steady movement in granulated at 4#, and in yellows at a range of from 3 ma41c. The trade sale of molasses referred to in our last proved a failure. Out of the 975 puncheons offered, only 100 were sold, and these it is believed were bought in a kind of a friendly deal. The price announced was 37c, nett cash. This would make the ordinary nett cash. This would make the ordinary price 38c for Barbadoes. A good distributing trade in Japanteas is reported at prices running from 14½ to 34 cents, Black teas run from 13½c upwards, Letters from Shanghae state that so far as black teas are concerned there has been an almost total suspension of business owing to the collapse of the London market. Stocks meanwhile, have been accumulating, and holders are at length showing some willingness to make concessions in price, although as usual they make a great parade of yielding half-a-tael, little adequate though it be to off-set the drop in pence. It now looks as though the total export to England would be rather less than last year, in spite of the present figures being rather in excess, viz.

Similarly in green tens the market has been a decidedly quiet one, and at no moment has there been the least approach to excitement on the part of buyers. A dispute with the Tea-Guild, and the consequent "taboo" of several foreign hongs, has no doubt largely contributed to this state of things, and the arbitrary action of natives has thus not been without some well merited retribution. As was the case last year, the London market shows better results that New York, although it can hardly fail to be severely tried when the heavy shipments on the water arrive. Supplies of Pingsueys have been coming forward freely, and there is no longer any pretence of maintaining that the crop will prove short of the previous one; indeed there are suspicious signs that it may be rather larger. Notwithstanding the light enquiry, that stubbornness which is more characteristic of Pingsuey teahongs than of any other class of native teamen, has deterred them from consenting to accept lower prices, except, perhaps, in a very few isolated cases. It seems almost hopeless to look for any appreciable decline, whatever the course of the New York market may be, when natives either hold for a revival or ship-off on their own account, but the quality has certainly been maintained better than usual. Advices from other points are to the effect that fine Moyunes have occupied a very strong position, owing to their scarcity, and had there been anything like the amount of competition which has often been witnessed for them, we should have had some very high quotations to chronicle. As it is, what with some buyers being debarred from offering, and others receiving discouraging advices from New York, together with the warning conveyed regarding Ohina business generally by the large failures which have recently occurred,—something very like weakness has been

exhibited even for such special goods. It already looks as though we had seen the best of the Moyunes, late arrivals exhibiting considerable falling-off in style, which even in early teas left much to be desired. Of Tienkais there is scarcely a chop without the fatal tell-tale flavor, which will cause them to be bodily relegated to the ranks of Fychows, when they get here. In the meantime there is very little enquiry for them at anywhere near teamen's ideas, and increasing stocks will further tend to weaken their position. For rice the price is still \$3.70 at the mills. There is some cutting going on even yet, but steps have been taken to put an end to it which it is hoped will prove successful. Nothing is doing in dried fruits. New crop raisins will not reach here direct until the middle of next month, and what few lots come via London will be fancy goods. In canned fruits we hear of no sales. Canned tomatoes rule at \$1, but we hear of sales at \$7½c, both cash and 30 days. Canned lobsters run from \$7 for inferior stock up to \$9 for best. Canned salmon are still very firm, and we quote \$1.40@\$1.45 according to brand. We draw attention to the new shape in which Telegraph matches are now put on the market in a special notice.

HEAVY CHEMICALS.—No changes in value are to be noted during the week. Business rules fair at steady values. Sulphur is slightly firmer, although not quotably changed and bleaching powder continues in steady demand.

HIDES.—No large sales can be reported, but as fast as hides come in they go out again to the tanners. There is no accumulation and consequently no weakness in the market, although Chicago is weaker, and it might be thought that this would render this market weaker in sympathy. Lambskins are scarce and prices have gone up with a bound. Any to be got at 60 cents would be eagerly snapped up, and the present value is between that figure and 70 cents. This seems too high in comparison with the price of wool, but still it

would be readily paid. Sheepskins and clips are unchanged. Caliskins still rule at 7009c, and move out steadily. Tallow is dull. We hear of sales of prime cake at 5½c, although 6c is still asked for choice.

IRON AND HARDWARE.—A dull and stagnant market is the best that can be said for pig iron No actual sales have transpired, although some 50 ton lots of lighinton and Carnbroe are offered at \$19, and will probably be sold inside of twenty-four hours. We mark down our quotations to these figures. In bar iron we have no change to chronicle. It is still quoted at \$2. We remove Siemens from our list as the Londonderry people are no longer making; it, and are confining their attention entirely to pig. Tin plate is remarkably scarce. But little is arriving. Hundreds are coming out where thousands were expected, and importers here are very firm in their ideas. In fact \$3.75 has been paid for cokes although we still maintain our figures at \$3.65 for cokes, and \$4.25 for charcoals. Tin plates have advanced 3d to 6d in Wales where labor troubles have enforced the closing down some of the leading works. In the States the enormous crops of peaches and every other variety of fruit this year have created a boom in the manufacture of fruit cans, kettles, and all kinds of canning utensils. Manufacturers say they had prepared for a heavy trade, but the demand is greatly in excess of their expectations, and they are unable to keep up with the orders still pouring in. The consequence is that staple sizes of tin-plate are scarce in the States. There are plenty of outsizes; but bread and butter sizes, such as 14 by 20, 12 by 12, and 20 by 28, can hardly be got. The Americans are again buying heavily in England, and it looks as if prices must come up before long. In the meantime where is the much-heralded American tin-plate? 'It has certainly not materialized as yet; and the

only effect of the increase in tariff has been to put up the price of every article put into a tin can or box. Terne plates are in plentiful supply, and the rush for them has died out, and in wrought iron pipe, nails, and similar lines, we have no changes to chronicle. In fact it looks as if the trade were laying on their oars till the frost gets out of Manitoba. Following are the closing prices in London: Tin, spot, £91 10s; three months £91 10s; G. M. B. copper, spot, £52 12s 6d; futures £53 5s; Scotch warrants in Glasgow 47s; No. 3 Middlesborough iron 39s 4½d; soft Spanish lead £12 2s 6d.

LEATHER.—The leather market is decidedly more active. The Board of Trade excursion brought a number of tanners into town and this has freshened things up, although doubtless some of them took advantage of it to sell direct to the shoemen. Still, manufacturers report orders coming in briskly and there is perceptibly more activity in the situation. No large sales can be reported, but there is a steady jobbing demand, and prices are coming up nearer to the level of our outside quotations. In England there is a better feeling, and on this side there is every probability of a good fail trade.

OILS, PAINTS AND GLASS.—There is not much to note this week in oils. Cod oil is dearer, and no small lots either of Newfoundland or Gaspe could be got this week under 42½ cents. Castor oil is firmer, and our prices represent inside figures. Linseed oil is unchanged at 64@66 cents for boiled, and 60@63 cents for raw. Turpentine firmer at 56@57c. Olive oil unchanged. Glass is quiet at \$1,40 for first break, although 100 case lots would sell at \$1,35. Paints are dull, and the volume of trade is under the average for this season of the year, although it is still a little early for the fall trade.

Patroleum.—The demand is active and refiners are kept hustling to supply customers. Crude rules at \$1,34½ at time of writing. No change in prices of refined. Canadian may be quoted at 12@12½c in Petrolia, 14c car loads here, and 15c in single barrels. American 20¾c in car lots, 21½c in 10 barrel lots, and 23c for single barrels, 2 per cent. off for cash; American benzine 22c@26, and Canadian 11½c@15c.

Provisions and Eggs.—The local provision market is quiet and transactions are extremely limited in character. Pork and lard moved out slowly in a jobbing way but there is no life in the market. The heavy receipts and poor quality of the eggs now arriving have broken prices. The demand is limited and although an effort is being made to relieve the market by exportation, stocks are evidently accumulating. Poor qualities are almost unsaleable at 11 cents, the ordinary run bring 12 cents, and for choice candled 13 cents could be secured. In Chicago the market for provisions opened firm on the strength of the stock of ribs having been reduced more than was anticipated. This was helped by the firm tone in corn for a while. But when corn broke provisions came down too, and the market closed very tame at about lowest prices. The Chicago hog market closed 5 cents lower at the following prices:—Light mixed, \$4.50@\$5.60; mixed packing, \$4.50@\$5.40; rough grades, \$4.50 @\$5.60; mixed packing, \$4.50@\$5.40; rough grades, \$4.50 @\$5.90. ZINC IN BOILERS.

The British Institute of Marine Engineers at a recent meeting discussed the application of zinc to boilers for the purpose of preventing cor osion. The impression was general that zinc should be used not only in the water apace, but also in the steam space, while it was stated that the use of kerosene and white zinc are good preventives of corrosion if the steam space is simply painted with the mixture. It was also stated that the greater portion of the corrosion was due to electric action, and that the zinc, which has an electrical effect opposite to that of iron, is in itself not necessary to employ any complicated electrical appliances to bring about this result, as the mere metallic contact of the zinc plates with the iron is sufficiently effective. In practice each square foot of grate would require four or five pounds of sinc.
