To Our Beloved and Faithful the Senators of the Dominion of Canada, and the Members elected to serve in the House of Commons of Our said Dominion, and to each and every of you,—GREETING:

And the Clerk having declared Mr. Sproule duly elected, he was conducted to the Chair by Mr. Borden and Mr. Foster, when he returned his humble acknowledgments to the House for the great honour they had been pleased to confer upon him by unanimously choosing him to be their Speaker;—then the Mace was laid upon the Table.

Then Mr. Borden moved, seconded by Mr. Foster, That this House do now adjourned until To-morrow, at Three o'Clock, P.M.

MR. SPEAKER,

His Royal Highness the Governor General desires the immediate attendance of this Honourable House in the Chamber of the Honourable the Senate.

Accordingly, Mr. Speaker, with the House, went up to the Senate Chamber;—and then Mr. Speaker spoke to the following effect:—

May it please Your Royal Highness:

The House of Commons has elected me their Speaker, though I am but little able to fulfil the important duties thus assigned to me.

If, in the performance of those duties, I should at any time fall into error, I pray that the fault may be imputed to me, and not to the Commons, whose servant I am, and who, through me, the better to enable them to discharge their duty to their King and Country, humbly claim all their undoubted rights and privileges, especially that they may have freedom of speech in their debates, access to Your Royal Highness's person at all seasonable times, and that their proceedings may receive from Your Royal Highness the most favourable consideration.

The Honorable the Speaker of the Senate then said:—

MR. SPEAKER,

I am commanded by His Royal Highness the Governor General to declare to you that he freely confides in the duty and attachment of the House of Commons

to His Majesty's Person and Government, and, not doubting that their proceedings will be conducted with wisdom, temper and prudence, he grants, and upon all occasions will recognize and allow their constitutional privileges.

I am commanded also to assure you, that the Commons shall have ready access to His Royal Highness upon all seasonable occasions, and that their proceedings, as well as your words and actions, will constantly receive from him the most favourable construction.

Ordered, That Mr. Borden have leave to bring in a Bill respecting the Administration of Oaths of Office.

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and same was received and read the first time.

Mr. Speaker reported His Royal Highness's Speech from the Throne, and read a copy thereof to the House, which is as follows:—

Honourable Gentlemen of the Senate:

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

It is with much satisfaction that I meet, for the first time, the Parliament of Canada, and avail myself of your advice and assistance in the fulfilment of the important charge which has been entrusted to me by His Majesty the King. I can

assure you that I esteem it a privilege to be called upon to administer the affairs of this prosperous and growing Dominion, and to associate myself with you in the important duties which you are about to approach.

It affords me great pleasure to congratulate you upon the continued and increasing prosperity of the country. Our trade, both with British and with foreign countries, is rapidly expanding, and there is every prospect that its volume in the present year will be largely in excess of that attained at any time in the past.

Although there has been some damage to the crops in certain districts, the harvest has on the whole been abundant, and it is believed that the returns to the husbandman will exceed those secured in any previous year.

The results of the census taken during the present year will be laid before you, so far as they have been tabulated. While the increase in population has not fulfilled all the sanguine expectations that had been formed, yet it has been substantial and encouraging.

You will be pleased to learn that the revenues for the current fiscal year have, up to the present, largely exceeded those during any similar period in the past, with every prospect that this increase will be maintained.

The advantages that would result from a wider exchange of products between the various countries of the Empire are undoubted, in view of the wonderful variety and extent of those productions, and negotiations have been opened for improved trade arrangements with the British West Indies and British Guiana, which should prove advantageous to those colonies as well as to this Dominion.

The importance of providing our country with better highways is manifest. A Bill will be introduced for the purpose of enabling the Dominion to co-operate with the Provinces in the accomplishment of this desirable object.

It is essential to recognize that, in a country possessing so great an area of fertile land as that with which this Dominion is happily endowed, the great basic industry is agriculture. My advisers are convinced that the time has come when greater aid and encouragement should be given to those who are engaged in the cultivation of the land. To this end, a measure will be introduced under which it is hoped that there may be co-operation between the Dominion and the various Provinces, for the purpose of assisting and encouraging our farmers to secure the best results in production, and at the same time preserve the fertility of the soil.

A measure will be introduced revising and consolidating the Acts relating to the inspection of grain and providing the means by which the Government can secure, through a commission, the control and operation of the terminal elevators upon the Great Lakes.

A Bill will be introduced to establish a permanent Tariff Commission, whose duty it shall be to ascertain, by investigation and enquiry, such information as will furnish a more stable and satisfactory basis for tariff legislation than has heretofore been available.

Bills will also be laid before you with respect to the Department of External Affairs, the Archives and other subjects.

The selection of the best route for the Hudson Bay Railway is engaging the attention of my advisers, and an announcement will be made to you of the result of their enquiry.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

The accounts of the last year will be laid before you.

The balance of the estimates for the current fiscal year, as well as the estimates for the coming year, will be submitted for your approval at an early date.

Honourable Gentlemen of the Senate:

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

I commend the subjects, which I have mentioned, to your best consideration, and I trust that your deliberations, under the blessing of Divine Providence, may tend to the welfare and good government of this Dominion.

Resolved, That a Special Committee be appointed to prepare and report, with all convenient speed, Lists of Members to compose the Select Standing Committees of this House under Rule 10, said Committee to be composed of Mr. Borden, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and Messieurs Reid (Grenville), Monk, Pugsley, Stanfield and Pardee, and that that portion of Rule 10, limiting the number of Members of the said Committee, be suspended in relation thereto.

Mr. Speaker communicated to The House the Report of the Joint Librarians of Parliament on the state of the Library of Parliament, which is as followeth:—

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIANS FOR THE YEAR 1911.

To the Honourable the Speaker of the House of Commons:

The Joint Librarians have the honour to report as follows for the year 1911.

The long and valuable list of documents covering the history of reciprocal relations with the United States, which was published in our last annual Catalogue is not repeated this year; but a supplementary list bringing the subject up to the latest date possible has been prepared and will be published as soon as possible. All the material has been for some time in the hands of the printers.

The Librarians have endeavoured to anticipate the demands of Members for information of a practical character, but owing to the unusual demands made by Members for such information, during two sessions past, the purchases for the lighter side of the Library have had to be curtailed.

Owing to the manner in which appropriations have been voted, the accounts of the Library have become long overdue, and it is not deemed advisable to go on purchasing as freely as usual, till settlement has been made. Under the circumstances, the Librarians ask for the consideration of Members till the beginning of the next financial year.

The work of marking card catalogues, begun last year, for the Canadian section has been pursued during recess, and will be resumed after the present session.

The Librarians have endeavoured to re-classify as much as possible the books on the shelves so as to facilitate references for those who have access to them.

An easy and convenient arrangement of books becomes more and more difficult with the constant additions in the already extremely congested state of the Library. Almost every section has a double row of books on every shelf.

The Librarians may be permitted in this connection to call the attention of the government and of Parliament to the necessity of providing extensive accommodation for the Parliamentary Library. The subject has been for years pressed again and again on the notice of Parliament, and with no result.

A simple and efficient plan had been prepared by the Chief Architect of the Department of Public Works in 1904. This plan, which the Librarians considered as the best to give prompt relief would—for a comparatively modest sum—have given shelf space for nearly 200,000 volumes. The Library Committee had on several occasions given their approval to this proposed plan, but unfortunately, it was never acted upon. It would have enabled the Librarians to devote all the first floor in the rotunda, to works in constant use by Members of Parliament, and relieved the galleries to a large extent. It is to be hoped that Parliament will see their way to give the Library this much needed space.

In the meantime, the Public Works Department is preparing some rooms in the Senate basement to relieve the congestion on the floor of the Library. This addition to our space will be most welcome.

That moreover respondent personally paid money to voters of said electoral district, for the furtherance of said election, to wit, for the cost of organizing com-

That said respondent was not legally and duly elected at said election, and that said election was and is null and void.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR ROYAL HIGHNESS:

We, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the House of Commons of Canada in Parliament assembled, beg leave to offer our humble thanks to Your Royal Highness for the gracious Speech which Your Royal Highness has addressed to both Houses of Parliament.

And, the question being proposed, Sir Wilfrid Laurier moved, seconded by Mr. Pugsley, That the said motion be amended, by adding to the proposed Address to His Royal Highness the Governor General the following words:—

We beg to represent to your Royal Highness that by resolution of this House, adopted the 29th of March, 1909, it was affirmed that;

"This House fully recognizes the duty of the people of Canada, as they increase in numbers and wealth, to assume in larger measure the responsibilities of national defence."

"This House will cordially approve of any necessary expenditure designed to promote the speedy organization of a Canadian naval service."

BANKING ACT AMENDMENT.

MR. SPEAKER,—Referring to the Bill intituled: "An Act to amend the Banking Act," which the Honourable Member for St. John and Iberville (Mr. Demers) has given notice, I am of the opinion, after an examination of the measure, that it should be introduced upon Resolution.

Previous to 1874 the practice in this regard had been somewhat unsettled; but in that year Mr. Speaker Anglin decided (See Bourinot, 3rd edition, page 634) that general Banking Bills are to be based on Resolutions. It is added that this position was in accordance with the practice of the English Parliament. The case in which this Question arose was of a Bill similar to that now under consideration. See Canadian Commons Journals, (1874), pages 142-3. In 1890 the Government Bill to extend the charters of the several Banks in Canada and to Amend the Banking Act,

was introduced upon Resolution. See Canadian Commons Journals (1890), page 209.

I, therefore, decide that similar action should be taken with the Bill proposed by the Honourable Member.

Ordered, That Mr. Stevens have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the Criminal Code.

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was received and read the first time; and ordered to be read a second time at the next sitting of the House.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR ROYAL HIGHNESS:

We, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the House of Commons of Canada in Parliament assembled, beg leave to offer our humble thanks to Your Royal Highness for the gracious Speech which Your Royal Highness has addressed to both Houses of Parliament.

And the proposed motion of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in amendment thereto,—That the said motion be amended, by adding to the proposed Address to His Royal Highness the Governor General the following words:—

We beg to represent to your Royal Highness that by resolution of this House, adopted the 29th of March, 1909, it was affirmed that;

“This House fully recognizes the duty of the people of Canada, as they increase in numbers and wealth, to assume in larger measure the responsibilities of national defence,”

And further:

We respectfully submit to your Royal Highness that it is a fundamental principle of constitutional government that the advisers of the Crown shall be heartily in accord on all important questions of public policy, and that the inclusion, by the Prime Minister, in the present cabinet, of Members holding such diametrically opposite views on a question of the highest importance to the Dominion and to the Empire, is contrary to the well understood principles of responsible government and

DECISION OF MR. SPEAKER ON BILL NO. 19, INQUIRIES ACT.

MR. SPEAKER—On Thursday last I asked that Bill, to amend the Inquiries Act, be held over to give me an opportunity to look into the point raised by the honourable Member for St. John City (Mr. Pugsley), as to whether or not the bill should be preceded by a resolution, under Rule 77 of this House.

An examination of cases shows that this Rule has sometimes been given a wider application than the Rule itself seems to justify. Bourinot, at page 638, states that "it is the invariable rule that all measures, involving a charge upon the people, should be first considered in a Committee of the Whole." A discussion of the point also appears on pages 566 to 573.

The Bill applies both to Part I and Part II of the Inquiries Act, which is a consolidation of two previous Acts, neither of which was preceded by a resolution. Part I was a Bill introduced in the Senate in 1868 and Part II was a Commons Bill introduced in 1880.

It has been urged, that though the present Bill does not deal with the question of payment of the persons to be engaged by the Commissioners, they might, under its terms, incur expenses which would be payable out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, and thus be a charge upon the people, without parliament making any provision for their payment by a resolution in supply.

This objection could certainly have been urged, with at least equal force in the case of the two Acts which this Bill seeks to amend. And yet, as pointed out, no resolution was deemed necessary as a condition precedent to their enactment.

An English precedent, referred to in Bourinot, note (n), page 643, was a motion for leave to bring in a Bill to enable the Government to acquire lands for public purposes, but not providing funds for the same. On objection being taken that the Bill "involved a charge upon the public," answer was made that the Bill only proposed to give the Government power to buy land, but for that power to be of any use an estimate must be voted in committee; that the Bill would not enable the Government to purchase any lands until the House, in Committee, had considered the Estimates and agreed to them; that the Bill did not authorize any public money although the expenditure was contemplated. The Speaker ruled that the object of the Bill was to take ground for certain purposes. It did not give them power to purchase the property. The funds should be voted afterwards in Committee of the Whole.

The question is not free from difficulty. Mr. Bourinot in his observation seems to have extended the scope of the rule rather beyond the terms in which it is worded. What those terms cover is "a motion for any public aid or charge upon the people." This Bill does not constitute such a motion. The most that can be said is, that under its provisions, something may be done which may rise to a claim against the Government. If this be sufficient to bring it within the rule, then it would have to be held that every Bill conferring a power upon the Government in the exercise of which expense might be incurred, comes under the rule. This, in my opinion, would be giving altogether too extensive an interpretation to the words "a motion for any public aid or charge upon the people."

While the authorities are not absolutely reconcilable, I am not disposed to attach to the rule this very enlarged meaning. I am therefore of opinion that no resolution is necessary.

(*In the Committee.*)

Resolved, That it is expedient to provide for a Tariff Commission consisting of three members, to be appointed by the Governor in Council, whose duty it shall be—

1. To make, under the direction of the Minister of Finance, in respect of any goods produced in or imported into Canada, enquiry as to—

(a) the price and cost of raw materials in Canada and elsewhere, and the cost of transportation thereof from the place of production to the place of use or consumption;

(b) the cost of production in Canada and elsewhere;

(c) the cost of transportation from the place of production to the place of use or consumption, whether in Canada or elsewhere;

(d) the cost, efficiency and conditions of labour in Canada and elsewhere;

(e) the prices received by producers, manufacturers, wholesale dealers, retailers and other distributors in Canada and elsewhere;

(f) all conditions and factors which affect or enter into the cost of production and the price to the consumers in Canada;

(g) generally, all the conditions affecting production, manufacture, cost and price in Canada as compared with other countries, and to report to the Minister.

2. To make enquiry into any other matter, upon which the Minister desires information, in relation to any goods which if brought into Canada or produced in Canada are subject to or exempt from duties of customs, and to report to the Minister.

3. To hold, when empowered by the Governor in Council, an inquiry under section 12 of The Customs Tariff, 1907, in the same manner as the Judge of the Exchequer Court or any other Judge therein referred to may hold enquiry when so empowered.

4. To enquire into any other matter or thing in relation to the trade or commerce of Canada which the Governor in Council sees fit to refer to the Commission for enquiry and report.

That the Commissioners shall have the power of summoning before them any witnesses and of requiring them to give evidence on oath or on solemn affirmation and to produce such documents and things as the Commissioners may deem requisite to the full investigation of the matters into which they are appointed to examine, with such power with regard to enforcing the attendance of witnesses and compelling witnesses to give evidence as is vested in any court of record in civil cases.

That there be employed in the service of the Commission a secretary, and such officers, clerks and employees and persons having technical or special knowledge as may be necessary.

That the chairman of the Commission be paid an annual salary of seven thousand five hundred dollars, and the other two members an annual salary of seven thousand dollars; that the secretary be paid an annual salary to be fixed by the Governor in Council, not exceeding three thousand dollars, and that all salaries and

expenses, incident to the carrying out of the provisions of any Act founded on these resolutions, be payable out of any appropriation granted to His Majesty by Parliament for the purpose.

Resolved, That it is expedient to provide for a Tariff Commission consisting of three members, to be appointed by the Governor in Council, whose duty it shall be—

1. To make, under the direction of the Minister of Finance, in respect of any goods produced in or imported into Canada, enquiry as to—

(a) the price and cost of raw materials in Canada and elsewhere, and the cost of transportation thereof from the place of production to the place of use or consumption;

(b) the cost of production in Canada and elsewhere;

(c) the cost of transportation from the place of production to the place of use or consumption, whether in Canada or elsewhere;

(d) the cost, efficiency and conditions of labour in Canada and elsewhere;

(e) the prices received by producers, manufacturers, wholesale dealers, retailers and other distributors in Canada and elsewhere;

(f) all conditions and factors which affect or enter into the cost of production, and the price to the consumers in Canada;

(g) generally, all the conditions affecting production, manufacture, cost and price in Canada as compared with other countries, and to report to the Minister.

2. To make enquiry into any other matter, upon which the Minister desires information, in relation to any goods which if brought into Canada or produced in Canada, are subject to or exempt from duties of customs, and to report to the Minister.

3. To hold, when empowered by the Governor in Council, an enquiry under section 12 of The Customs Tariff, 1907, in the same manner as the Judge of the Exchequer Court or any other Judge therein referred to may hold enquiry when so empowered.

4. To enquire into any other matter or thing in relation to the trade or commerce of Canada which the Governor in Council sees fit to refer to the Commission for enquiry and report.

That the Commissioners shall have the power of summoning before them any witnesses and of requiring them to give evidence on oath or on solemn affirmation and to produce such documents and things as the Commissioners may deem requisite to the full investigation of the matters into which they are appointed to examine, with such power with regard to enforcing the attendance of witnesses and compelling witnesses to give evidence as is vested in any court of record in civil cases.

That there be employed in the service of the Commission a secretary, and such officers, clerks and employees and persons having technical or special knowledge as may be necessary.

That the chairman of the Commission be paid an annual salary of seven thousand five hundred dollars, and the other two members an annual salary of seven thousand dollars; that the secretary be paid an annual salary to be fixed by the Governor in Council, not exceeding three thousand dollars, and that all salaries and expenses, incident to the carrying out of the provisions of any Act founded on these resolutions, be payable out of any appropriation granted to His Majesty by Parliament for the purpose.

The said Resolution, being read a second time, was agreed to.

Ordered, That Mr. White (Leeds) have leave to bring in a Bill to provide for the appointment of a Tariff Commission.

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was received and read the first time; and ordered to be read a second time at the next sitting of the House.

The Order of the Day being read, for the second reading of the Bill respecting Grain.

The Bill was accordingly read a second time; and committed to a Committee of the Whole House.

Resolved, That this House do immediately resolve itself into the said Committee.

That, in the opinion of this House, wherever a telephone system exists, or is hereafter established, in any rural section of Canada, a telephone should be placed in each Post Office in such sections by the Post Office Department.

Mr. Speaker,—My attention has been drawn to this resolution, and, after looking up the authorities, I must say my verdict is that the resolution is out of order, inasmuch as it implies the purchase and putting in of telephones, which must be paid for out of the revenues of the country.

I think I would be bound to rule on it, for two or three reasons. In the first place all proposals to this House, calling for the expenditure of public money, must come from the Ministry of the Crown and not from a private Member; also, the consent of the government must be given to the consideration of such proposals. The second reason is that all resolutions which involve a charge on the public revenue must be considered in Committee of the Whole House, not by motion, as it is proposed to do in this case. Bourinot's Parliamentary Procedure, page 567, third edition, says:—

“It shall not be lawful for the House of Commons to adopt or pass any vote, resolution, address or Bill for the appropriation of any part of the public revenue, or of any tax or impost to any purpose that has not been first recommended by a message of the Governor General, in the session in which such vote, resolution, address or Bill is proposed.

“The constitutional provision which regulates the procedure of the Canadian House of Commons in this respect applies not only to motions directly proposing a grant of public money, but also, to those which involve such a grant.”

Mr. Armstrong (Lambton) moved, seconded by Mr. Blain,

That, in the opinion of this House, a Commission should be appointed to investigate the systems of National Telegraphs and telephones, wireless telegraphs and cables; also, postal conditions, laws and regulations, parcel post, means of collecting and distributing mails, with a view to submitting such data and information to the Post Office Department as would help to improve existing conditions in all the above; and to further enquire into postal facilities in rural districts in other countries, in order that a better system of rural free mail delivery may be inaugurated.

And a Debate arising thereupon;

And it being Six o'Clock, P.M., Mr. Speaker declared The House adjourned till To-morrow at Three of the Clock, P.M.

TELEPHONES IN RURAL POST OFFICES.

Mr. Speaker,—Having been called upon yesterday suddenly to consider a motion upon the order paper *re* telephones in rural post offices, I gave a ruling that, upon more careful and mature consideration, I am quite sure, would not be held to be well founded. I based my ruling of yesterday upon a motion of the Honourable Member for Peel (Mr. Blain) regarding the placing of telephones in rural post offices, mainly on the general principle that this resolution appeared to involve a charge upon the revenue and must be considered in Committee of the Whole. A careful examination of cases both in England and in this House shows that where the expenditure of public money is not directly involved, and the resolution merely expresses an abstract

opinion on a matter which may necessitate a further grant, it may be introduced directly by a private Member.

In looking at the authorities I find, in Canadian Commons Journals, 1892, page 133, on a motion moved by Mr. Denison relating to the deepening of canals which was of a very similar character and was afterwards withdrawn, no ruling was given. In Canadian Commons Journals, 1897, page 59, a motion is presented advocating a bonus on creameries. In that case it was a somewhat similar motion but would tend more strongly towards a violation of the rule as it proposed that a cent a pound at least should be given upon all butter manufactured in creameries. After that motion had been considered the debate was adjourned and no objection was taken to it. In Canadian Commons Journals, 1899, page 85, we have a motion with reference to indebtedness for seed grain. Mr. Davin, I believe, proposed the motion, which after being debated, was withdrawn and no point of order was raised. These, with a number of other precedents that I have looked up, justify me in saying that my ruling of yesterday was not exactly sound, but while saying that, I would like to quote Bourinot's remarks on the point, because, it is a matter that I think the House should take cognizance of in the future. He says:—

“A practice has grown up in the House of allowing the introducing of resolutions by private Members, when they do not directly involve the expenditure of public money, but simply express an abstract opinion on a matter which may necessitate a future grant.”

Then he says—Gives the cases I have quoted here and proceeds—“as this is a question not always understood, it may be explained that such resolutions, being framed in general terms, do not bind the House to future legislation on the subject, and are merely intended to point out to the Government the importance and necessity of such expenditure.”

Referring to this right of Members to move such abstract resolutions, all authorities agree that it is one “which the House exercises, and should always exercise with very great reserve, and only under peculiar and exceptional circumstances.” Such resolutions are considered virtually “an evasion of the Rules of the House, and are on that account objectionable, and should be discouraged as much as possible.” Nevertheless, neither the English nor Canadian House of Commons has ever agreed to the adoption of a rule to fetter their discretion in regard to the entertaining of such propositions.

Therefore, I presume the custom has grown up in that way. It would be in order for the Honourable Member who had that motion in charge to move to have it reinstated on the order paper, as otherwise it would be dropped.

On motion of Mr. Blain, seconded by Mr. Armstrong (Lambton),

Ordered, That the following proposed Resolution be restored to the order paper among Notices of Motions in its proper place:—

“That, in the opinion of this House, wherever a telephone system exists, or is hereafter established, in any rural section of Canada, a telephone should be placed in each Post Office in such sections by the Post Office Department.”

Mr. Hazen moved, seconded by Mr. Hughes (Victoria), That this House do, on To-morrow, resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole to consider a certain proposed Resolution respecting pay to the Harbour Commissioners of Montreal.

Mr. Hazen, a Member of the King's Privy Council, then acquainted the House, That His Royal Highness the Governor General having been informed of the subject-matter of this Motion, recommends it to the consideration of the House.

Resolved, That this House will, on To-morrow, resolve itself into the said Committee.

Mr. White (Leeds) moved, seconded by Mr. Monk, That this House will, on To-morrow, resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole to consider a certain proposed Resolution to authorize the payment out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of such sums as may be sufficient to discharge the obligations of His Majesty the King, acting in respect of the Dominion of Canada.

Mr. White (Leeds), a Member of the King's Privy Council, then acquainted the House, That His Royal Highness the Governor General, having been informed of the subject-matter of this Motion, recommends it to the consideration of the House.

Resolved, That this House will, on To-morrow, resolve itself into the said Committee.

The House, according to Order, proceeded to the further consideration in Committee of the Whole of Bill respecting Grain, and, after some time spent therein, Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and Mr. Blondin reported, That the Committee had made further progress, and directed him to move for leave to sit again.

Resolved, That this House will, at its next sitting, again resolve itself into the said Committee.

The Order of the Day being read, for the House to again resolve itself into the Committee of Supply.

Mr. White (Leeds) moved, seconded by Mr. Monk, That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair.

Mr. Maclean (York) moved, in amendment thereto, seconded by Mr. Lennox, That all the words after the word "That" in the proposed motion be struck out, and the following substituted therefor:—"this House is of the opinion that the expansion and extension of the parcel post system would be in the public interest."

And the Question being put on the amendment:—It was resolved in the Affirmative.

On motion of Mr. Monk, seconded by Mr. Pelletier,

Resolved, That the House do forthwith resolve itself into the Committee of Supply.

Ordered, That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair.

The House accordingly again resolved itself into the Committee of Supply.

and any other person, and the Minister of Railways and Canals, relating to the re-opening of that portion of the railway of the said Company between Hillsborough and Albert, and the supplying of rails and other materials for the purpose of repairing and improving the same; and also, of any Orders in Council, agreements and other documents relating thereto.

72a. Return to an Address to His Royal Highness the Governor General of the 4th December, 1911, for a copy of all papers, Correspondence and Orders in Council in connection with the awarding of the contract for the building of the Hudson Bay Railway, and of all Orders suspending work on the same.

72b. (c) dividing the First-class Clerkships into Division "A" and "B" with maximum salaries of \$1,800 and \$1,600, respectively, and increasing the minimum of the First-class Clerkships from \$1,200 to \$1,400, and creating a new class of clerks, to be known as Chief Clerks, in the City Post Offices, subject to certain restrictions;

(d) improving the position of Office Superintendents in City Offices, and changing what was formerly a fixed salary of \$1,800 to a minimum of \$1,800 and a maximum of \$2,500;

(e) providing for the employment of temporary clerks in the above named offices, for a period of not more than one year, at a fixed salary of \$500, and temporary helpers to meet the exigencies of the service, at a salary not exceeding \$2.50 a day;

(f) increasing the salaries of certain Inspectors, Assistant Inspectors and Superintendents of Railway Mail Service, in recognition of years of service;

(g) increasing the minimum of the salaries of Inspectors and Superintendents of the Railway Mail Service from \$1,600 to \$1,800.

Resolution to be reported.

And also, presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 31st January, 1912, for a copy of all papers, statements, letters, telegrams, statement of claim and application, minutes of the evidence taken on any investigation held, with all reports thereon, and all other documents in any way relating to a claim of Earl Ash, for damages caused by, and resulting from, the destruction by fire of property owned, occupied and possessed by the Claimant, alleged to have been caused by fire and sparks from a locomotive of the Intercolonial Railway of Canada, and operated by said railway.—(*Sessional Papers, No. 115.*)

On motion of Mr. Barker, seconded by Mr. Middlebro,

Ordered, That the Bill from the Senate, intituled: "An Act to incorporate Révillon Frères Trading Company, Limited," be now read the first time.

The Bill was accordingly read the first time; and ordered to be read a second time at the next sitting of the House.

Mr. Borden, for Mr. Reid (Grenville) moved, seconded by Mr. Foster (Toronto), That this House will, on Wednesday next, resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole to consider a certain proposed Resolution respecting the amendment of the Civil Service Act and the Acts in Amendment thereof.

Mr. Borden, a Member of the King's Privy Council, then acquainted The House, That His Royal Highness the Governor General, having been informed of the subject-matter of this motion, recommends it to the consideration of the House.

Mr. Hughes (King's, P.E.I.), from his place in the House, asked leave to move the adjournment of the House for the purpose of discussing a definite matter of urgent public importance, and stated the subject to be: "the inadequacy of the train service in connection with passenger transportation, between Prince Edward Island and the Mainland."

He then handed a written statement of the matter proposed to be discussed to Mr. Deputy Speaker, who, having read it to the House, put the question: Has the Member leave to proceed?

Objection being taken;

Mr. Deputy Speaker requests those Members who support the motion to rise in their places; more than 20 Members having supported the motion, Mr. Deputy Speaker accordingly called upon the Member to propose his motion.

Resolved, That it is expedient (a) to extend the limits of the Province of Manitoba so that the boundaries of the province shall be as follow: Commencing where the sixtieth parallel of north latitude intersects the western shore of Hudson Bay; thence westerly along the said parallel of latitude to the northeast corner of the Province of Saskatchewan; thence southerly along the easterly boundary of the Province of Saskatchewan to the International Boundary, dividing Canada from the United States; thence easterly along the said International Boundary to the point where the said

International Boundary turns due north; thence north along the said International Boundary to a certain monument thereon, at or near the northwest angle of the Lake of the Woods; thence continuing due north along the westerly boundary of the Province of Ontario, by virtue of "The Canada (Ontario Boundary) Act, 1889," Chapter 28, of the Statutes of 1889, of the United Kingdom, (the said westerly boundary being the easterly boundary of the said Province of Manitoba) to the most northerly point of the said boundary common to the two Provinces, under the said Act; thence continuing due north along the same meridian to the intersection thereof with the centre of the road allowance on the twelfth base line of the system of Dominion Land Surveys; thence northeasterly in a right line to the most eastern point of Island Lake, as shown in approximate latitude $53^{\circ} 30'$ and longitude $93^{\circ} 40'$ on the railway map of the Dominion of Canada published, on the scale of thirty-five miles to one inch, in the year one thousand nine hundred and eight, by the authority of the Minister of the Interior; thence northeasterly in a right line to the point where the eighty-ninth meridian of west longitude intersects the southern shore of Hudson Bay; thence westerly and northerly following the shores of the said Bay to the place of commencement; upon such terms and conditions as may be agreed to by the Legislature of Manitoba and by Parliament;

(b) to authorize the Governor in Council, inasmuch as the Province was not in debt at the time of its establishment, to pay to the said Province an annual sum of \$381,584.19, being the equivalent of interest at five per cent on \$7,631,683.85, the difference between a principal sum of \$8,107,500 and \$475,816.15, hertofore advanced by the Government to the Province for Provincial purposes; such annual sum to be paid as and from the first day of July, 1908, but subject, however, as to payments due upon the coming into force of any Act founded upon these resolutions, to the deduction of certain sums received by the said Province by way of interest on capital allowance in lieu of debt;

(c) to authorize the Governor in Council to pay to the said Province, in lieu of ownership of public lands, an annual sum based upon the population of the said Province, as ascertained by each quinquennial census thereof, such annual sum to commence with \$562,500 (less certain deductions in respect of what are known as swamp lands and university lands) and not to exceed the annual sum of \$1,125,000 (less equivalent deductions); the same to be paid as from the first day of July, 1908, but subject, however, as to payments due at the time of the passing of any Act founded upon these resolutions, to a deduction of the aggregate of certain sums received by the Province on and after July 1st, 1908, on account of indemnity in lieu of public lands;

(d) to authorize the Governor in Council to pay to the said Province, one-half on 1st July, 1912, and one-half on 1st July, 1913, the sum of \$201,723.57 towards the construction of public buildings.

Resolution to be reported.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and Mr. Blondin reported, That the Committee had come to a Resolution.

(4) If the person mentioned in Sub-section 2 hereof owns, manages, operates or is in any way interested in any terminal elevator other than a terminal elevator or elevators coming under the provisions of Sub-section 2 hereof, he shall not be exempt from the provisions of Sub-section 1 hereof.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee, and, after some time spent therein, Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and Mr. Blondin reported, That the Committee had made some progres, and directed him to move for leave to sit again.

Resolved, That this House will, at its next sitting, again resolve itself into the said Committee.

The Order of the Day being read, for the second reading of the Bill to incorporate the Winnipeg and St. Boniface Harbour Commissioners.

The Bill was accordingly read a second time; and committed to a Committee of the Whole House.

Resolved, That this House do immediately resolve itself into the said Committee.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee, and, after some time spent therein, Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and Mr. Blondin reported, That the Committee had gone through the Bill, and directed him to report to same without any amendment.

Ordered, That the Bill be read the third time at the next sitting of the House.

By leave of the House,

Mr. Blain, from the Select Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines, presented to the House the Thirteenth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

The House accordingly proceeded to take the Bill into consideration.

Ordered, That the Bill be read the third time, at the next sitting of the House.

(In the Committee.)

Resolved, That it is expedient to amend *The Dry Docks Subsidies Act, 1910*, and to provide (a) for the construction of Dry Docks for Naval and general purposes, costing for the purposes of Subsidy calculations not more than \$5,500,000, being Dry Docks other than Floating Dry Docks of dimensions to be prescribed in a Bill to be based upon this Resolution; and (b) that the Subsidy payable in respect of such Dry Docks shall be a sum not exceeding three and one half per cent of the cost of the work, as fixed and determined under the provisions of *The Dry Docks Subsidies Act, 1910*.

Resolution to be reported.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and Mr. Blondin reported, That the Committee had come to a Resolution.

Ordered, That the Report be now received.

Mr. Blondin reported the Resolution accordingly, and the same was read, as followeth:—

Resolved, That it is expedient to amend *The Dry Docks Subsidies Act, 1910*, and to provide (a) for the construction of Dry Docks for Naval and general purposes, costing for the purposes of Subsidy calculations not more than \$5,500,000, being Dry Docks other than Floating Dry Docks of dimensions to be prescribed in a Bill to be based upon this Resolution; and (b) that the Subsidy payable in respect of such Dry Docks shall be a sum not exceeding three and one half per cent of the cost of the work, as fixed and determined under the provisions of *The Dry Docks Subsidies Act, 1910*.

The said Resolution, being read a second time, was agreed to, and referred to a Committee of the Whole on Bill to amend the Dry Docks subsidies Act, 1910.

The House, according to Order, resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole to consider certain proposed Resolutions to authorize the granting of Subsidies in aid of the construction of lines of railways and bridges therein mentioned.

(*In the Committee.*)

1. That the Governor in Council may grant a subsidy of \$3,200 per mile towards the construction of each of the undermentioned lines of railway (not exceeding in any case the number of miles hereinafter respectively stated) which shall not cost more on the average than \$15,000 per mile for the mileage subsidized, and towards the construction of each of the said lines of railway, not exceeding the mileage hereinafter stated, which shall cost more on the average than \$15,000 per mile for the mileage subsidized, a further subsidy beyond the sum of \$3,200 per mile of fifty per cent on so much of the average cost of the mileage subsidized as is in excess of \$15,000 per mile, such subsidy not exceeding in the whole the sum of \$6,400 per mile:—

1. For a line of railway from Liverpool, *via* Milton to Caledonia, Nova Scotia, in lieu of subsidy granted by chapter 40 of 1907, section 1, item 5; not exceeding 30 miles.

2. For a line of railway from St. John to Grand Falls, New Brunswick, exclusive of a railway bridge across the Kennebecasis River, at or near Perry point, and two railway bridges across the St. John River, one at or near Mistake, and one at or near Andover; in lieu of the subsidy granted by chapter 51 of 1910, section 1, item 12; not exceeding 228 miles.

3. To the L'Avenir and Melbourne Railway Company, for a line of railway from Melbourne to Drummondville, in lieu of the subsidy granted by chapter 51 of 1910, section 1, item 22; not exceeding 28 miles.

4. To the Ha' Ha' Bay Railway Company for the following lines of railway:—

(a) from a point on the Quebec and Lake St. John Railway, in the Township of Jonquières, at or near St. Mathias, to Ha' Ha' Bay; not exceeding 20 miles;

(b) from Labrosse Junction to the Saguenay River, northerly, through the Town of Chicoutimi; not exceeding 5 miles;

(c) from La Terriere Junction, southerly, to Lake Kenogami, *via* La Terrière Village; not exceeding 12 miles;

(d) from a point on the Ha' Ha' Bay Railway, at or near Bagotville Village, easterly, to the village of St. Alexis; not exceeding 3 miles; the said subsidies sub-items (a), (b) and (c) being granted in lieu of the subsidy granted by chapter 51 of 1910, section 1, item 27; and the subsidy sub-item (b) being granted in lieu of the subsidy granted by chapter 51 of 1910, section 1, item 19, sub-item (a); not exceeding in all 40 miles.

5. For a line of railway, at or near Ste. Agathe des Monts station, towards the Township of Howard, in the County of Argenteuil, passing near Lake St. Joseph and St. Mary, in a southerly direction, in lieu of the subsidy granted by chapter 63 of 1908, section 1, item 26; not exceeding 15 miles.

6. To the Interprovincial and James Bay Railway Company, for a line of railway from a point on the Lake Temiscamingue Colonization Railway, at or near Tisiskaming to or towards the De Quinze River; in lieu of the subsidy granted by chapter 43 of 1906, section 1, item 42; not to exceed 50 miles.

7. To the Canadian Northern Quebec Railway Company, for a line of railway from a point at or near Arundel, to a point in the Municipality of the United Townships of Preston and Hartwell, in lieu of the subsidy granted by chapter 51 of 1910, section 1, item 17; not exceeding 30 miles.

8. To the Quebec and Saguenay Railway Company, for the following lines of railway:—

- (a) from St. Joachim, northeasterly; not exceeding 62.8 miles;
- (b) from a point 62.8 miles, northeasterly, from St. Joachim towards Seven Islands; not exceeding 107.2 miles; the said subsidies being granted in lieu of the subsidy granted by chapter 51 of 1910, section 1, item 25; not exceeding in all 170 miles.
9. For a line of railway from a point at or near Montreal, to a point at or near Mile 837 west of Moncton, on the National Transcontinental Railway, in lieu of subsidy granted by chapter 51 of 1910, section 1, item 45; not exceeding 200 miles.
10. To the Algoma Central and Hudson Bay Railway Company, for the following lines of railway:—
- (a) from Sault Ste. Marie to a point on the Canadian Pacific Railway, between White River and Dalton Stations, in the District of Algoma; not exceeding 200 miles;
- (b) from Michipicoten Harbour, Lake Superior, towards the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway; not exceeding 25 miles;
- (c) from a point on the Canadian Pacific Railway, northerly, towards the National Transcontinental Railway; not exceeding 50 miles; the said subsidies being granted in lieu of the subsidies granted by chapter 51 of 1910, section 1, item 30; not exceeding in all 275 miles.
11. To the Algoma Eastern Railway Company (formerly the Manitoulin and North Shore Railway Company) for the following lines of railway:—
- (a) from a point on the said Company's line of railway, between Little Current and Sudbury, westerly, towards the Algoma Central and Hudson Bay Railway; not exceeding 76 miles;
- (b) from a point at or near Sudbury, northerly, not exceeding 30 miles; the said subsidies being granted in lieu of the subsidies granted by chapter 51 of 1910, section 1, item 29, sub-items (a) and (c), respectively; not exceeding in all 106 miles.
12. To the Tillsonburg, Lake Erie and Pacific Railway Company, for a line of railway from Ingersoll to Stratford, or to a point on the Grand Trunk Railway between Berlin and Stratford, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 40 of 1907, section 1, item 12; not exceeding 35 miles.
13. To the Lac Seul, Rat Portage and Keewatin Railway Company, for a line of railway, from a point at or near Kenora, to the National Transcontinental Railway, in lieu of the subsidy granted by chapter 51 of 1910, section 1, item 32; not exceeding 22 miles.
14. To the Toronto, Lindsay and Pembroke Railway Company, for a line of railway from Golden Lake to Bancroft, in lieu of the subsidy granted by chapter 51 of 1910, section 1, item 38; not exceeding 51 miles.
15. To the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, for a line of railway from a point at or near Teulon, to a point on the Icelandic River, in lieu of the subsidy granted by chapter 43 of 1906, section 1, item 27; not exceeding 35 miles.
16. To the Vancouver, Westminster and Yukon Railway Company, for a line of railway from Vancouver, via Second Narrows of Burrard Inlet, northerly, in lieu of the subsidy granted by chapter 63 of 1908, section 1, item 55; not exceeding 100 miles.
17. To the Kootenay Central Railway Company, for the following lines of railway:—
- (a) from Golden, via Windermere and Fort Steele, to a point on the British Columbia Southern Railway, at or near Jukeson; not exceeding 175 miles;
- (b) from a point on the British Columbia Southern Railway, at or near Caithness, towards the International boundary; not exceeding 25 miles; the said subsidies being granted in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 51 of 1910, section 1, item 43; not exceeding in all 200 miles.

18. To the Kettle Valley Railway Company, for a line of railway from a point at or near Grand Forks, to a point 50 miles up the North Fork, and East or West Fork of North Fork, of Kettle River, in lieu of the subsidy granted by chapter 63 of 1908, section 1, item 1; not exceeding 50 miles.

19. To the Esquimalt and Nanaimo Railway Company, for the following lines of railway:—

(a) from Wellington to Alberni; not exceeding 60 miles;

(b) from a point at or near McBride Junction to or towards the village of Sandwich; not exceeding 45 miles;

(c) from the village of Sandwich to Campbell River; not exceeding 38 miles; the said subsidies being granted in lieu of the subsidies granted by Chapter 40 of 1907, section 1, item 20, and chapter 63 of 1908, section 1, item 35; not exceeding in all 143 miles.

20. For a line of railway from a point on the Esquimalt and Nanaimo Railway, near Campbell River, towards Fort George, on the line of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, in lieu of the subsidy granted by chapter 63 of 1908, section 1, item 54; not exceeding 100 miles.

21. To the Fredericton and Grand Lake Coal and Railway Company, for a line of railway, from a point on the Intercolonial Railway, at Gibson, to a point at or near Minto, together with a branch line from a point on the above-mentioned line to Marysville; not exceeding 35 miles.

22. To the Great Northern Mining and Railway Company, Limited, for a line of railway from Little River, through Belle Marche, to Eastern Harbour; not exceeding 3 miles.

23. To the Southampton Railway Company, for a line of railway from a point at or near Millville, to a point on the St. John River, near the Pokiok Bridge; not exceeding 13 miles.

24. To the Northern New Brunswick and Seaboard Railway Company, for a line of railway from Drummond Mines, at Austin Brook, a branch of the Nipisiguit River above Great Falls, in the County of Gloucester, to a point on the Intercolonial Railway, and from such point to Alston Point, on the north side, or to Caron Point, on the south side, of the entrance to Bathurst Harbour in the said county; not exceeding 26 miles.

25. To the North Shore Railway Company, for the following lines of railway:—

(a) from a point at or near Adamsville, in the County of Kent, to a point at or near Snowshoe Lake, in the said county, connecting with the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway; not exceeding 20 miles;

(b) from Beersville, in the County of Kent, via Rexton, to a point at or near Richibucto Head, in the said county; not exceeding 20 miles; not exceeding in all 40 miles.

26. For a line of railway from a point at or near Albert Mines, in the County of Albert, via Hillsborough, to the City of Moncton; not exceeding 22 miles.

27. To the Quebec Central Railway Company, for the following lines of railway:—

(a) for an extension of its line of railway from a point (30 miles from St. George) in the Parish of St. Justine, County of Dorchester, to a point in the Parish of St. Sabine, in the County of Bellechasse; not exceeding 1·34 miles;

(b) for an extension of its line of railway from a point (31·34 miles from St. George) in the Parish of St. Sabine, County of Bellechasse, to a point in the Township of Dionne, County of L'Islet, not exceeding 50 miles; not exceeding in all 51·34 miles.

28. To the Canada and Gulf Terminal Railway Company, for a line of railway from Matane, easterly, to Gaspé Basin; not exceeding 200 miles.

29. To the Grand Lake and Bell River Railway Company, for a line of railway from a point on the National Transcontinental Railway, at or near Bell River, thence following the direction of Bell River to Twenty-one Mile Bay, an arm of Grand Lake, or to Rabbit Lake, on the Ottawa River, in the County of Pontiac; not exceeding 45 miles.

30. To the St. Charles and Huron River Railway Company, for a line of railway from a point on the main line of the Quebec and Lake St. John Railway, at Indian Lorette station, thence up the valley of the St. Charles River, in a northerly direction, to Stoneham; not exceeding 7.5 miles.

31. For a line of railway from a point on the National Transcontinental Railway, at or near Mile 837 west of Moncton, in a northerly and northwesterly direction, to a point at or near the mouth of the Nottaway River, on James Bay; not exceeding 300 miles.

32. To the Simcoe, Grey and Bruce Railway Company in respect of fifty miles (50 miles) of their proposed railway, between the Towns of Kincardine and Orillia, said fifty miles to include that portion of said line connecting the towns of Owen Sound and Meaford.

33. To the Algoma Central and Hudson Bay Railway Company, for a line of railway from a point fifty miles northerly from the junction of its line of railway with the Canadian Pacific Railway, northerly, to a junction with the National Transcontinental Railway; not exceeding 65 miles.

34. To the Rainy River Radial Railway Company, for a line of railway from a point on the northern boundary of the State of Minnesota, at or near the Town of Fort Frances, to a point on the Lake of the Woods, at or near the mouth of Little Grassy River; not exceeding 50 miles.

35. To the Lake Erie and Northern Railway Company, for the following lines of railway:—

(a) from the Town of Galt to Port Dover; not exceeding 58 miles;

(b) from the Town of Paris (on the line from the Town of Galt to Port Dover) to the Village of Aye; not exceeding 10 miles; not exceeding in all 68 miles.

36. To the Bruce Mines and Algoma Railway Company, for a line of railway from a point on its line of railway, at or near Rock Lake Mine, in a generally northerly and easterly direction, to or towards a point on the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, near the crossing of the said railway of the Winneboga River; not exceeding 50 miles.

37. To the Manitoba and North Western Railway Company, for a line of railway from a point at or near Hamiota, to a point at or near Birtle; not exceeding 30 miles.

38. To the Alberta Pacific Railway Company, for a line of railway from a point at or near the town of Cardston, in a north-westerly direction, via Pincher Creek, to a point on the Crow's Nest Pass Branch of the Canadian Pacific Railway, at or near Lundbreck, thence northerly and west of the Porcupine Hills towards Calgary; not exceeding 100 miles.

39. To the Burrard Inlet Tunnel and Bridge Company, for the following lines of railway:—

(a) from the town of Eburne on the Fraser River, to a point at or near the mouth of Seymour Creek, on the north shore of the Second Narrows; not exceeding 10 miles;

(b) from a point at or near Seymour Creek, on the north shore of the Second Narrows, to Deep Cove, on the north arm of Burrard Inlet; not exceeding 5 miles;

(c) from a point at or near Seymour Creek, on the north shore of the Second Narrows, to a point on Horseshoe Bay; not exceeding 14 miles;

(d) from a point at or near Pender Street, in the City of Vancouver, to a point

at or near lot 264, North Vancouver; not exceeding 3 miles; not exceeding in all 32 miles.

40. To the Caribou, Barkerville and Willow River Railway Company, for a line of railway from a point on the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, at or near Eagle Lake, to a point on the Caribou Road, at or near the town of Barkerville; not exceeding 107 miles.

41. To the Naas and Skeena Rivers Railway Company, for a line of railway from the Nasoga Gulf, or some other point on the waters of the Portland Inlet or Naas River, to or towards the anthracite coal deposits, on the Skeena River, near Ground Hog Mountain; not exceeding 100 miles.

42. To the Kettle Valley Railway Company, for a line of railway from a point at or near Penticton, on Okanagan Lake, to a point on the International boundary; not exceeding 50 miles.

43. To the Calgary and Fernie Railway Company, for a line of railway from a point at or near the City of Calgary, in the Province of Alberta, in a south-westerly direction, via Kananaskis Pass and the headwaters of the Elk River, to or towards the City of Fernie, in the Province of British Columbia; not exceeding 100 miles.

44. To the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company, for a line of railway from Harte, south-westerly, into the City of Brandon; not exceeding 25 miles.

2. That the Governor in Council may grant the subsidies hereinafter mentioned towards the construction and completion of the bridges, also hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:—

1. To the Vancouver, Westminster and Yukon Railway Company, towards the construction and completion of a railway bridge across Burrard Inlet, in lieu of the subsidy granted by chapter 63 of 1908, section 2, item 6; not exceeding \$350,000.

2. To the Canadian Pacific Railway Company (lessees of the Calgary and Edmonton Railway Company) towards the construction and completion of a bridge over the Saskatchewan River, connecting Strathcona and Edmonton, 15 per cent upon the amount expended thereon, in lieu of the subsidy granted by chapter 63 of 1908, section 2, item 2; not exceeding \$126,000.

3. To the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, towards the construction and completion of a bridge over the Saskatchewan River at Outlook, Saskatchewan, 15 per cent upon the amount expended thereon; not exceeding \$115,000.

4. To the Kettle Valley Railway Company, towards the construction and completion of a railway bridge over the Fraser River, near Hope, British Columbia; not exceeding \$250,000.

5. To the Caribou, Barkerville and Willow River Railway Company, towards the construction and completion of all its railway bridges (about twenty in number) over the Willow River, 25 per cent upon the total amount expended thereon; not exceeding \$95,000.

6. To the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company, towards the construction and completion of a railway bridge over the Assiniboine River, at the City of Brandon, 25 per cent upon the amount expended thereon; such bridge to be completed without unnecessary delay.

3. That unless the context otherwise requires, the expression "cost" means the actual, necessary and reasonable cost, and shall include the amount expended upon any bridge, up to and not exceeding \$25,000, forming part of the line of railway subsidized not otherwise receiving any bonus, but shall not include the cost of equipping the railway nor the cost of terminals nor the cost of right of way of the railway in any city or incorporated town; and such actual, necessary and reasonable cost shall be determined by the Governor in Council, upon the recommendation of the Minister of Railways and Canals, and upon the report of the chief engineer of the Department of Railways and Canals, certifying that he has made or caused to be made an inspection of the line of railway for which payment of subsidy is asked,

and careful enquiry into the cost thereof, and that, in his opinion, the amount upon which the subsidy is claimed is reasonable, and does not exceed the true, actual and proper cost of the construction of such railway.

4. That the subsidies hereby authorized towards the construction of any railway or bridge shall be payable out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of Canada, and may, unless otherwise expressly provided in this Act, at the option of the Governor in Council, on the report of the Minister of Railways and Canals, be paid as follows:—

(a) Upon the completion of the work subsidized; or

(b) By instalments, on the completion of each ten-mile section of the railway, in the proportion which the cost of such completed section bears to that of the whole work undertaken; or

(c) Upon the progress estimates on the certificate of the chief engineer of the Department of Railways and Canals that, in his opinion, having regard to the whole work undertaken and the aid granted, the progress made justifies the payment of a sum not less than thirty thousand dollars; or

(d) With respect to (b) and (c), part one way, part the other.

5. That the subsidies hereinbefore authorized to be granted to companies named shall, if granted by the Governor in Council, be granted to such companies, respectively; the other subsidies may be granted to such companies as establish to the satisfaction of the Governor in Council their ability to construct and complete the said railway and bridges, respectively; all the lines and the bridges for the construction of which subsidies are granted, unless they are already commenced, shall be commenced within two years from the first day of August, 1912, and completed within a reasonable time, not to exceed four years from the said first day of August, to be fixed by the Governor in Council, and shall also be constructed according to descriptions, conditions and specifications approved by the Governor in Council, on the report of the Minister of Railways and Canals, and specified in each case in a contract between the company and the said Minister, which contract the Minister, with the approval of the Governor in Council, is hereby empowered to make. The location also of such subsidized lines and bridges shall be subject to the approval of the Governor-in-Council.

6. That the granting of such subsidies and the receipt thereof by the respective companies shall be subject to the condition that the Board of Railway Commissioners for Canada may at all times provide and secure to other companies such running powers, traffic arrangements and other rights as will afford to all railways, connecting with the railway and bridges so subsidized, reasonable and proper facilities in exercising such running power, fair and reasonable traffic arrangements with connecting companies, and equal mileage rates between all such connecting railways; and the said Board shall have absolute control, at all times, over the rates and tolls to be levied and taken by any of the companies, or upon any of the railways and bridges hereby subsidized: Provided always that any decision of the said Board, made under this section, may be at any time varied, changed or rescinded by the Governor in Council, as he deems just and proper.

7. That every company so receiving a subsidy, its successors and assigns, and any person or company controlling or operating the railway or portion of railway so subsidized, shall each year furnish to the Government of Canada transportation for men, supplies, materials and mails over the portion of the lines in respect of which it has received such subsidy, and, whenever required, shall furnish mail cars properly equipped for such mail service; and such transportation and service shall be performed at such rates as are agreed upon between the Minister of the Department of the Government for which such service is being performed, and the company performing it, and, in case of disagreement, then at such rates as are approved by the Board of Railway Commissioners for Canada; and in or towards payment for such

charges, the Government of Canada shall be credited by the company with a sum equal to three per cent per annum on the amount of the subsidy received by the company hereunder.

8. That as respect all railways and bridges, for which subsidies are so granted, the company at any time owning or operating any of the railways or bridges shall, when required, produce and exhibit to the Minister of Railways and Canals, or any person appointed by him, all books, accounts and vouchers showing the cost of constructing the railway or bridge, the cost of operating it, and the earnings thereof.

9. That the Governor in Council may make it a condition of the grant of the subsidies herein provided that the company shall lay the railway with new steel rails and fastenings made in Canada and shall purchase all materials and supplies required for the construction of the railway and bridges, and the rolling stock for the first equipment of the railway, from Canadian producers, if such rails, fastenings, materials, supplies and equipment are procurable in Canada of suitable quality and upon terms as favourable as elsewhere, of which the Minister of Railways and Canals shall be the judge.

10. That whenever a contract has been duly entered into with a company for the construction of any line of railway hereby subsidized, the Minister of Railways and Canals, at the request of the company, and upon the report of the chief engineer of the Department of Railways and Canals, and his certificate that he has made careful examination of the surveys, plans and profile of the whole line so contracted for, and has duly considered the physical characteristics of the country to be traversed and the means of transport available for construction, naming the reasonable and probable cost of such construction, may, with the authorization of the Governor in Council, enter into a supplementary agreement, fixing definitely the maximum amount of the subsidy to be paid, based upon the said certificate of the chief engineer, and providing that the company shall be entitled to be paid, as the minimum, the ordinary subsidy of \$3,200 per mile, together with sixty per cent. of the difference between the amount so fixed and the said \$3,200 per mile, if any; and the balance, forty per cent, shall be paid only on completion of the whole work subsidized, and in so far as the actual cost, as finally determined by the Governor in Council upon the recommendation of the Minister of Railways and Canals, and upon the report and certificate of the said chief engineer, entitles the company thereto: Provided always—

(a) that the estimated cost, as certified, is not less on the average than \$18,000 per mile for the whole mileage subsidized;

(b) that no payment shall be made, except upon a certificate of the chief engineer that the work done is up to the standard specified in the company's contract;

(c) that in no case shall the subsidy exceed the sum of \$6,400 per mile.

Resolutions to be reported.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair, and Mr. Blondin reported, That the Committee had come to several Resolutions.

Ordered, That the Report be now received.

Mr. Blondin reported the Resolutions accordingly; and the same being read a second time, were agreed to.

Ordered, That Mr. Borden have leave to bring in a Bill to authorize the granting of Subsidies in aid of the lines of railways and bridges therein mentioned.

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was received and read the first time; and ordered to be read a second time at the next sitting of the House.

The Order of the Day being read, for the second reading of the Bill to amend the Militia Act.

The Bill was accordingly read a second time; and committed to a Committee of the Whole House.

Resolved, That this House do immediately resolve itself into the said Committee.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee, and, after some time spent therein, Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and Mr. Blondin reported, That the Committee had gone through the Bill, and directed him to report the same without any amendment.

Ordered, That the Bill be read the third time, at the next sitting of the House.

Mr. Speaker acquainted the House, That a Message had been brought from the Senate by their Clerk, as followeth:—

The Senate have passed the Bill, intituled: “An Act respecting the Imperial Loan and Investment Company of Canada,” to which they desire the concurrence of this House.

On motion of Mr. Sharpe (Ontario), seconded by Mr. Stanfield,

Ordered, That Bill from the Senate, intituled: “An Act respecting the Imperial Loan and Investment Company of Canada,” be now read the first time.

The Bill was accordingly read the first time.

And then The House, having continued to sit till One of the Clock on Tuesday morning, adjourned till Eleven of the Clock, A.M., this day.

Resolved, That it is expedient (*a*) to confirm an Order in Council, dated 17th February, 1912, authorizing the sale and transfer to the Province of Manitoba, for the sum of \$200,000, of certain lands in the City of Winnipeg, consisting of the Fort Osborne barracks and drill shed property; (*b*) to authorize the making of an agreement with the said Province, in accordance with the terms of the said Order in Council; and (*c*) to authorize the payment of the proceeds of such sale for the purchase of sites and the construction of buildings thereon for drill sheds and armouries for the active militia in the said city, and for barracks and other military purposes in or adjacent to the said city.

2. That the subsidies hereby authorized shall be payable out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of Canada, at the option of the Governor in Council, and may be paid upon the certificate of the Chief Engineer of the Department of Railways and Canals as to the mileage constructed, in such manner and in such amounts, and subject to such conditions, if any, as the Governor in Council deems expedient.

1. That the Governor in Council may grant to the Government of the Province of Ontario a subsidy not exceeding \$6,400 per mile, not exceeding in any case the number of miles hereinafter respectively stated:—

(i) For the line of railway from North Bay, on the Canadian Pacific Railway, to Cochrane, on the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway; not exceeding 252·8 miles.

(ii) For the following branch lines of railway:—

(a) From Englehart to Charlton; not exceeding 7·8 miles;

(b) From Cobalt to Kerr Lake; not exceeding 3·9 miles;

(c) From Iroquois Falls to Timmins; not exceeding 33·16 miles;

(d) From Nipissing Junction to North Bay; not exceeding 2·18 miles;

2. That the subsidies hereby authorized shall be payable out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of Canada, at the option of the Governor in Council, and may be paid upon the certificate of the Chief Engineer of the Department of Railways and Canals as to the mileage constructed, in such manner and in such amounts, and subject to such conditions, if any, as the Governor in Council deems expedient.

The said Resolutions, being read a second time, were agreed to.

Ordered, That Mr. Cochrane have leave to bring in a Bill to authorize the granting of subsidies to the Government of the Province of Ontario in aid of the construction of the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway.

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was received and read the first time; and ordered to be read a second time at the next sitting of the House.

The House, according to Order, resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole to consider certain proposed Resolutions to authorize the granting of a subsidy to the Canadian Northern Pacific Railway Company in aid of the construction of the railway therein mentioned.

(In the Committee.)

Resolved, That it is expedient to provide as follows:—

1. That the Governor in Council may grant a subsidy of \$12,000 per mile to the Canadian Northern Pacific Railway Company, towards the construction of a railway from a point at Yellowhead Pass to Vancouver and the mouth of the Fraser River; not exceeding 525 miles.

2. That the said subsidy shall be payable out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of Canada and may, at the option of the Governor in Council, on the report of the Minister of Railways and Canals, be paid as follows:—

(a) upon the completion of the work subsidized; or

(b) by instalments, on the completion of each ten-mile section of the railway, in the proportion which the cost of such completed section bears to that of the whole work undertaken; the cost for the purposes of this paragraph to be determined by the Governor in Council; or

(c) upon the progress estimates on the certificate of the Chief Engineer of the Department of Railways and Canals that, in his opinion, having regard to the whole work undertaken and the aid granted, the progress made justifies the payment of a sum not less than thirty thousand dollars; or (d) with respect to (b) and (c), part one way, part the other.

3. That the said railway, unless already commenced, shall be commenced within two years from the first day of August, 1912, and completed within a reasonable time, not to exceed four years from the said first day of August, to be fixed by the Governor in Council, and shall also be constructed according to descriptions, conditions and specifications approved by the Governor in Council, on the report of the Minister of Railways and Canals, and specified in a contract between the Company and the said Minister, which contract the Minister, with the approval of the Governor in Council, is hereby empowered to make. The location of the said railway shall be subject to the approval of the Governor in Council.

4. That the said Company, its successors and assigns, and any person or company controlling or operating the said railway or portion thereof, shall each year furnish to the Government of Canada transportation for men, supplies, materials and mails over the portion of the railway, in respect of which it has received such subsidy, and whenever required, shall furnish mail cars properly equipped for such mail service; and such transportation and service shall be performed at such rates as are agreed upon between the Minister of the Department of the Government for which such service is being performed and the Company performing it, and, in case of disagreement, then at such rates as are approved by the Board of Railway Commissioners for Canada; and in or towards payment for such charges the Government of Canada shall be credited by the Company with a sum equal to three per cent. per annum on the amount of the subsidy received by the Company hereunder.

5. That as respect the railway for which such subsidy is granted, the Company at any time owning or operating it shall, when required, produce and exhibit to the Minister of Railways and Canals, or any person appointed by him, all books, accounts, and vouchers, showing the cost of constructing the railway, the cost of operating it, and the earnings thereof.

6. That the Governor in Council may make it a condition of the grant of the subsidy herein provided that the Company shall lay the railway with new steel rails and fastenings made in Canada and shall purchase all materials and supplies required for the construction of the railway, and the rolling stock for the first equipment of

the railway, from Canadian producers, if such rails, fastenings, materials, supplies and equipment are procurable in Canada of suitable quality and upon terms as favourable as elsewhere, of which the Minister of Railways and Canals shall be the judge.

Resolutions to be reported.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and Mr. Blondin reported, That the Committee had come to a Resolution.

Ordered, That the Report be now received.

Mr. Blondin reported the Resolution accordingly, and the same was read, as follows:—

Resolved, That it is expedient to provide as follows:—

1. That the Governor in Council may grant a subsidy of \$12,000 per mile to the Canadian Northern Pacific Railway Company, towards the construction of a railway from a point at Yellowhead Pass to Vancouver and the mouth of the Fraser River; not exceeding 525 miles.

2. That the said subsidy shall be payable out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of Canada and may, at the option of the Governor in Council, on the report of the Minister of Railways and Canals, be paid as follows:—

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was received and read the first time; and ordered to be read a second time at the next sitting of the House.

Mr. Speaker informed The House, That the Clerk had laid on the Table the Sixteenth Report of the Examiner of Petitions, which was read as follows:—

Pursuant to Rule 96, Section 3, the Examiner of Petitions for Private Bills has the honour to present the following as his Sixteenth Report:—

Your Examiner has duly examined the following Private Bill from the Senate, and finds that all the requirements of the 91st Rule have been complied with in reference thereto:—

Bill intituled: "An Act respecting the Imperial Loan and Investment Company of Canada."

On motion of Mr. Blain, seconded by Mr. Barker,

Ordered, That the Bill from the Senate intituled: "An Act respecting the Imperial Loan and Investment Company of Canada," be placed on the Order Paper amongst Private Bills for a second reading this day.

The House, according to Order, resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole to consider certain proposed Resolutions to provide aid towards the construction of certain Railway Bridges in the Province of New Brunswick.

(In the Committee.)

Resolved, That it is expedient to provide as follows:—

1. That His Majesty, on behalf of the Dominion of Canada, hereinafter called the "Dominion," may aid and assist the construction of (a) A railway bridge across the St. John River, at or near Andover, in the County of Victoria, in the Province of New Brunswick; (b) A railway bridge across the St. John River, at or near Mistake, in the County of Kings, in the said Province; (c) A railway bridge across the Kennebecasis River, at or near Perry Point, in the said County of Kings, which bridges are to be constructed by a Company, hereinafter called the Bridge Company, incorporated by the Legislature of the said Province for the construction of the said bridges by guaranteeing the principal of the bonds of the Bridge Company in an amount not exceeding the cost (which cost shall be established to the satisfaction of the Governor in Council) of the said three bridges, but not exceeding in the whole the principal sum of one million dollars, together with the interest upon the said bonds at four per cent. payable half yearly for a period not exceeding fifty years from the date of issue of such guaranteed securities; and to provide for the payment of interest on the said Bonds for the first fifteen years of the term thereof.

2. That the said guaranteed securities shall be secured by a deed of trust by way of mortgage or charge to a trustee or trustees approved of by the Governor in

Council, and such deed of trust shall grant a first mortgage or charge upon the said bridges and all other real and personal property, and all rights, privileges, franchises and powers that may at any time belong to the Bridge Company or in respect of which the Bridge Company may at any time have any interest.

3. That the kind of securities to be guaranteed hereunder and the forms thereof, and the form and terms of the deed of trust securing them and the times and manner of the issue of the guaranteed securities and the disposing of the moneys to be raised thereon by sale, pledge or otherwise, pending the expenditure of such moneys for the purposes of the bridges so aided and the forms and manner of guarantee or guarantees shall be such as the Governor in Council approves of, and such terms, provisions and conditions shall be included in the said deed of trust as the Governor in Council deems expedient or necessary.

4. That the said guarantee or guarantees shall be signed by the Minister of Finance, or such officer as is designated by the Governor in Council to sign the same; and upon being so signed, the Dominion shall become liable as guarantor for the payment of the principal and interest of the said securities so guaranteed according to the tenor thereof, and the said payment shall form a charge upon the Consolidated Revenue Fund, and the said guarantee or guarantees, so signed shall be conclusive evidence that the requirements hereof respecting the guaranteed securities and the Deed of trust and all matters relating thereto have been complied with.

5. That the rates and tolls charged by the Bridge Company upon or in respect of any of the said bridges, so aided, shall, before being levied or charged by the Bridge Company, be first approved of by the Governor in Council.

6. That any moneys paid by the Dominion under any guarantee herein provided for, shall be held to be paid in discharge of the liability of the Dominion and not in discharge of the liability of the Bridge Company under the securities so guaranteed or under any Deed of Trust, securing them, and the money so paid shall be held to be still secured by the guaranteed securities and Deeds of Trust and the Dominion shall be subrogated in and to all the rights of the holders of the guaranteed securities, the interest upon, or the principal of, which has been paid by the Dominion, and the Dominion shall, with respect to all moneys so paid be in all respects in the position of the security holders with respect to whose securities default has been made in payment to the extent of the moneys paid by the Dominion.

7. That the said bridges so aided shall be constructed by the Bridge Company in accordance with plans and specifications approved of by the Governor in Council, and the construction and the material used therein, and the manner of construction shall be subject to the direction and inspection of an officer of the Dominion, and up to, and in accordance with, the requirements of the plans and specifications so approved.

Resolutions to be reported.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and Mr. Blondin reported, That the Committee had come to several Resolutions.

Ordered, That the Report be now received.

Mr. Blondin reported the Resolutions accordingly, and the same were read, as follows:—

Resolved, That it is expedient to provide as follows:—

1. That His Majesty, on behalf of the Dominion of Canada, hereinafter called the "Dominion," may aid and assist the construction of (a) A railway bridge across the St. John River, at or near Andover, in the County of Victoria, in the Province of New Brunswick; (b) A railway bridge across the St. John River, at or near Mistake, in the County of Kings, in the said Province; and (c) A railway bridge across the Kennebecasis River, at or near Perry Point, in the said County of Kings, which bridges are to be constructed by a Company, hereinafter called the Bridge Company, incorporated by the Legislature of the said Province for the construction of the said

bridges by guaranteeing the principal of the bonds of the Bridge Company in an amount not exceeding the cost (which cost shall be established to the satisfaction of the Governor in Council) of the said three bridges, but not exceeding in the whole the principal sum of one million dollars, together with the interest upon the said bonds at four per cent. payable half yearly for a period not exceeding fifty years from the date of issue of such guaranteed securities; and to provide for the payment of interest on the said Bonds for the first fifteen years of the term thereof.

2. That the said guaranteed securities shall be secured by a deed of trust by way of mortgage or charge to a trustee or trustees approved of by the Governor in Council, and such deed of trust shall grant a first mortgage or charge upon the said bridges and all other real and personal property, and all rights, privileges, franchises and powers that may at any time belong to the Bridge Company or in respect of which the Bridge Company may at any time have any interest.

3. That the kind of securities to be guaranteed hereunder and the forms thereof, and the form and terms of the deed of trust securing them and the times and manner of the issue of the guaranteed securities and the disposing of the moneys to be raised thereon by sale, pledge or otherwise, pending the expenditure of such moneys for the purposes of the bridges so aided and the forms and manner of guarantee or guarantees shall be such as the Governor in Council approves of, and such terms, provisions and conditions shall be included in the said deed of trust as the Governor in Council deems expedient or necessary.

4. That the said guarantee or guarantees shall be signed by the Minister of Finance, or such officer as is designated by the Governor in Council to sign the same; and, upon being so signed, the Dominion shall become liable as guarantor for the payment of the principal and interest of the said securities so guaranteed, according to the tenor thereof, and the said payment shall form a charge upon the Consolidated Revenue Fund, and the said guarantee or guarantees, so signed, shall be conclusive evidence that the requirements hereof respecting the guaranteed securities and the Deed of Trust and all matters relating thereto have been complied with.

5. That the rates and tolls charged by the Bridge Company upon or in respect of any of the said bridges, so aided shall, before being levied or charged by the Bridge Company, be first approved of by the Governor in Council.

6. That any moneys paid by the Dominion, under any guarantee herein provided for, shall be held to be paid in discharge of the liability of the Dominion and not in discharge of the liability of the Bridge Company under the securities so guaranteed or under any Deed of Trust, securing them, and the money so paid shall be held to be still secured by the guaranteed securities and Deeds of Trust and the Dominion shall be subrogated in and to all the rights of the holders of the guaranteed securities, the interest upon, or the principal of which has been paid by the Dominion, and the Dominion shall, with respect to all moneys so paid be in all respects in the position of the security holders with respect to whose securities default has been made in payment to the extent of the moneys paid by the Dominion.

7. That the said bridges so aided shall be constructed by the Bridge Company in accordance with plans and specifications approved of by the Governor in Council, and the construction and the material used therein, and the manner of construction shall be subject to the direction and inspection of an officer of the Dominion, and up to, and in accordance with, the requirements of the plans and specifications so approved.

The said Resolutions, being read a second time, were agreed to.

Ordered, That Mr. Cochrane have leave to bring in a Bill to aid the construction of certain bridges on the Railway of the Saint John and Quebec Railway Company, and to confirm an agreement between the Company and the Governments of Canada and New Brunswick.

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was received and read the first time; and ordered to be read a second time at the next sitting of the House.

The House, according to Order, resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole to consider certain proposed Resolutions respecting aid towards the construction of the Canadian Northern Alberta Railway.

(In the Committee.)

Resolved, That it is expedient to provide as follows:—

1. That His Majesty, on behalf of the Dominion of Canada, hereinafter called “the Dominion,” may aid and assist the construction and completion of a line of railway of the Canadian Northern Alberta Railway Company, hereinafter called “the Company,” extending from a point on the line of the railway of the Company 150 miles westerly from St. Albert, thence in a westerly direction to the boundary of the Province of British Columbia, at or in the Yellowhead Pass, for a distance not exceeding 115 miles, by guaranteeing the principal and interest of the bonds, debentures, debenture stocks and other securities hereinafter called “securities,” secured as hereinafter mentioned, of the Company, to the extent of \$35,000 per mile of the said line of railway so aided, not exceeding in all 115 miles; the interest upon the said securities to be paid at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. per annum, payable half yearly, the principal to be payable in fifty years.

2. That the said securities so guaranteed shall be secured by a deed or deeds of trust by way of mortgage or charge to a trustee or trustees, approved of by the Governor in Council, and such deed or deeds of trust shall respectively grant a first mortgage or charge upon the said line or railway so aided, and the right of way, station grounds, or other real estate and interest therein, buildings and other structures and improvements, rolling stock and equipment, plant, machinery, tools, supplies, materials and other personal properties, present and future, acquired for the purposes of the said line so aided, and in connection with operating, repairing and maintaining it, and the tolls, incomes and revenues of the Company arising and to arise from the said line, and the rights, privileges, franchises and powers of the Company, now or hereafter held with respect to, and in connection with, the said line and the operation, maintenance and repair thereof.

3. That the kind of securities to be guaranteed as aforesaid, and the forms thereof, and the forms and terms of the deed or deeds of trust securing them, and the times and manner of the issue of securities and the disposition of the moneys to be raised thereon by sale, pledge or otherwise, pending the expenditure of such moneys, for the purposes of the line of railway so aided, and the forms and manner of guarantee, shall be such as the Governor in Council approves, and such terms, provisions and conditions may be included in such deed or deeds of trust as the Governor in Council deems expedient or necessary.

4. That the said guarantee shall be signed by the Minister of Finance or such officer as is designated by the Governor in Council to sign it; and upon being so signed the Dominion shall become liable as guarantor for the payment of the principal and interest of the securities so guaranteed, according to the tenor thereof, and the said payment shall form a charge upon the Consolidated Revenue Fund.

5. That any moneys paid by the Dominion under any guarantee herein provided for shall be held to be paid in discharge of the liability of the Dominion and not in discharge of the liability of the Company, under the securities so guaranteed, or under any deed of trust securing them, and the moneys so paid shall be held to be still secured by the said securities and deed of trust, and the Dominion shall be subrogated in and to all the rights of the holders of such securities, the interest upon or the principal of which has been paid by the Dominion, and the Dominion shall, with

respect to all moneys so paid, be in all respects in the position of security holders with respect to whose securities default has been made in payment to the extent of the moneys paid by the Dominion.

6. That the decision of the Governor in Council as to the length of the mileage of the said line of railway so to be aided shall, for the purposes hereof, be final.

7. That the books of the Company shall at all times be open for inspection for and on behalf of the Dominion by any person named in that behalf by the Governor in Council or the Minister of Finance.

8. That the Canadian Northern Railway Company, shall by guarantee included in the said deed or deeds of trust, or in some other instrument agreed to by the Governor in Council or the Minister of Finance and the last named Company, in such form as the Governor in Council approves, guarantee to the Dominion the due payment by the Company of the principal and interest of all securities issued and guaranteed under the provisions hereof, according to the tenor and effect of such securities respectively, and in accordance with the terms of the said deed or deeds of trust, and shall also guarantee to the Dominion the due payment by the Company of all loss or costs which the Dominion may sustain or be put to in enforcing after default, the provisions of the said deed or deeds of trust against the line of railway and premises thereby mortgaged and charged.

Resolutions to be reported.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and Mr. Blondin reported, That the Committee had come to several Resolutions.

Ordered, That the Report be now received.

Mr. Blondin reported the Resolutions accordingly, and the same were read, as follow:—

Resolved, That it is expedient to provide as follows:—

1. That His Majesty, on behalf of the Dominion of Canada, hereinafter called "the Dominion," may aid and assist the construction and completion of a line of railway of the Canadian Northern Alberta Railway Company, hereinafter called "the Company," extending from a point on the line of the railway of the Company 150 miles westerly from St. Albert, thence in a westerly direction to the boundary of the Province of British Columbia at or in the Yellowhead Pass, for a distance not exceeding 115 miles, by guaranteeing the principal and interest of the bonds, debentures, debenture stocks and other securities hereinafter called "securities," secured as hereinafter mentioned, of the Company, to the extent of \$35,000 per mile of the said line of railway so aided, not exceeding in all 115 miles; the interest upon the said securities to be paid at the rate of 3½ per cent per annum, payable half yearly, the principal to be payable in fifty years.

2. That the said securities so guaranteed shall be secured by a deed or deeds of trust by way of mortgage or charge to a trustee or trustees, approved of by the Governor in Council, and such deed or deeds of trust shall respectively grant a first mortgage or charge upon the said line of railway so aided, and the right of way, station grounds, or other real estate and interest therein, buildings and other structures and improvements, rolling stock and equipment, plant, machinery, tools, supplies, materials and other personal properties, present and future, acquired for the purposes of the said line so aided, and in connection with operating, repairing and maintaining it, and the tolls, incomes and revenues of the Company arising and to arise from the said line, and the rights, privileges, franchises and powers of the Company, now or hereafter held with respect to and in connection with the said line and the operation, maintenance and repair thereof.

3. That the kind of securities to be guaranteed as aforesaid, and the forms thereof, and the forms and terms of the deed or deeds of trust securing them, and the times and manner of the issue of securities and the disposition of the moneys to be

raised thereon by sale, pledge or otherwise, pending the expenditure of such moneys for the purposes of the line of railway so aided, and the forms and manner of guarantee, shall be such as the Governor in Council approves, and such terms, provisions and conditions may be included in such deed or deeds of trust as the Governor in Council deems expedient or necessary.

4. That the said guarantee shall be signed by the Minister of Finance or such officer as is designated by the Governor in Council to sign it; and upon being so signed the Dominion shall become liable as guarantor for the payment of the principal and interest of the securities so guaranteed, according to the tenor thereof, and the said payment shall form a charge upon the Consolidated Revenue Fund.

5. That any moneys paid by the Dominion under any guarantee herein provided for shall be held to be paid in discharge of the liability of the Dominion and not in discharge of the liability of the Company under the securities so guaranteed, or under any deed of trust securing them, and the moneys so paid shall be held to be still secured by the said securities and deed of trust, and the Dominion shall be subrogated in and to all the rights of the holders of such securities, the interest upon or the principal of which has been paid by the Dominion, and the Dominion shall, with respect to all moneys so paid, be in all respects in the position of security holders with respect to whose securities default has been made in payment to the extent of the moneys paid by the Dominion.

6. That the decision of the Governor in Council as to the length of the mileage of the said line of railway so to be aided shall, for the purposes hereof, be final.

7. That the books of the Company shall at all times be open for inspection for and on behalf of the Dominion by any person named in that behalf by the Governor in Council or the Minister of Finance.

8. That the Canadian Northern Railway Company shall, by guarantee included in the said deed or deeds of trust, or in some other instrument agreed to by the Governor in Council or the Minister of Finance and the last named Company, in such form as the Governor in Council approves, guarantee to the Dominion the due payment by the Company of the principal and interest of all securities issued and guaranteed under the provisions hereof, according to the tenor and effect of such securities, respectively, and in accordance with the terms of the said deed or deeds of trust, and shall also guarantee to the Dominion the due payment by the Company of all loss or costs which the Dominion may sustain or be put to in enforcing, after default, the provisions of the said deed or deeds of trust against the line of railway and premises thereby mortgaged and charged.

The said Resolutions, being read a second time, were agreed to.

Ordered, That Mr. Cochrane have leave to bring in a Bill respecting aid towards the construction of the Canadian Northern Alberta Railway.

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was received and read the first time; and ordered to be read a second time at the next sitting of the House.

The House, according to Order, resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole to consider a certain proposed Resolution to provide for the payment of a certain sum of money to those who were called for active service in the militia, during the years 1866 and 1870.

(In the Committee.)

The Montreal Central Terminal Company may, within two years after the passing of this Act, commence the construction of the works mentioned in section 2 of chapter 109 of the Statutes of 1909 and expend fifteen per cent of the amount of its capital stock thereon, and may, within five years after the passing of this Act, complete the works mentioned in sections 2 and 3 of the said chapter; and if, within the said periods, respectively, such commencement and such expenditure are not so made, or any of the said works are not completed and put in operation, the powers of construction conferred upon the said Company by Parliament shall cease and be null and void, as respects so much of the said works as then remains uncompleted."

2. After clause 2, insert the following as clauses A, B, C, D and E, respectively:—

Clause A.

"3. The Company shall not construct or operate its line of railway, bridge or tunnel along any highway, street or other public place, (whether under or over the surface), without first obtaining the consent, expressed by by-law, of the municipality having jurisdiction over such highway, street or other public place and upon terms to be agreed upon with such municipality."

Clause B.

"4. No part of the bridge or tunnel or approaches thereto situate in the city of Montreal and which the Company is authorized to construct shall be used by the Company for the purpose of urban passenger service, or for the passage of pedestrians, vehicles, cars or carriages used for urban service, without the consent of the said city expressed by by-law and setting out the conditions of such consent."

Clause C.

“5. In addition to the powers contained in *The Railway Act*, which are hereby declared to apply to the tunnel and other works authorized by the several Acts relating to the Company, the Company may, for the purposes of such tunnel and works,—

- “(a) expropriate and take an easement in, over, under or through any lands;
- “(b) in reduction of the damage or injury to any lands taken or affected by such authorized lines and works, abandon or grant to the owner or party interested therein, any portion of such lands or any easement or interest therein or make any structures, works or alterations in or upon its works for such purposes.”

“2. If the Company, by its notice of expropriation or some subsequent notice, prior to the first meeting of the arbitrators, specify its decision to take only such easement or undertake to abandon or grant such lands or easement or interest in lands, or to make such structures or works or alterations, the damages (including damages, if any, resulting from the change in the notice of expropriation) shall be assessed by the arbitrator or arbitrators appointed pursuant to the provisions of *The Railway Act* in view of such specified decision or undertaking, and the arbitrator or arbitrators shall declare the basis of their award accordingly and such award, as well as such specified decision or undertaking of the Company, may be enforced by the Board of Railway Commissioners for Canada.”

Clause D.

“6. The Company may before and after the commencement of its works,—

- “(a) enter into and upon any lands, buildings or structures proximate to such works, for the purpose of ascertaining the state of repair thereof and for devising the best means of avoiding any possible damage which the execution of the works might occasion thereto;
- “(b) make upon or in connection therewith any works, repairs or renewals, for the purpose of preventing or mitigating any such damage.

“2. The Company shall make compensation in the manner specified in *The Railway Act* to all persons interested for the damage sustained by them (if any) by reason of the exercise of the powers in this section contained.

“3. Section 216 of *The Railway Act* shall apply to the exercise of the foregoing powers so far as is necessary to enable the Company to carry them into effect.”

Clause E.

“7. In the event of any disagreement between the Company and any municipality as to the terms and conditions upon which the Company shall construct, maintain or operate any of the works authorized by the Acts relating to the Company, the matters in question shall be decided by the Board of Railway Commissioners of Canada; but this section shall not apply to section 4 of this Act.”

If the Company, by its notice of expropriation or some subsequent notice, prior to the first meeting of the arbitrators, specify its decision to take only such easement or servitude or undertake to abandon or grant such land or easement or servitude or interest in land, or to make such structures or works or alterations, the damages (including damages, if any, resulting from the change in the notice of expropriation) shall be assessed by the arbitrator or arbitrators, appointed pursuant to the provisions of *The Railway Act* in view of such specified decision or undertaking, and the arbitrator or arbitrators shall declare the basis of their award accordingly and such award, as well as such specified decision or undertaking of the Company, may be enforced by the Board of Railway Commissioners for Canada.

Clause B.

11B. The Company may, before and after the commencement of any of its authorized works,—

- (a) enter into and upon any lands, buildings or structures proximate to such works, for the purpose of ascertaining the state of repair thereof and for devising the best means of avoiding any possible damage which the execution of such works might occasion thereto;
- (b) make upon or in connection therewith any works, repairs or renewals, for the purpose of preventing or mitigating any such damage.

2. The Company shall make compensation in the manner specified in *The Railway Act* to all persons interested for the damage sustained by them (if any) by reason of the exercise of the powers in this section contained.

3. Section 216 of *The Railway Act* shall apply to the exercise of the foregoing powers so far as is necessary to enable the Company to carry them into effect.”

Clause C.

11C. In the event of any disagreement between the Company and any municipality whose consent is required under sections 10 and 11 of the said Act as to the terms or conditions upon which the Company shall construct, operate or use any of its authorized works, the points of difference shall be decided by the Board of Railway Commissioners for Canada.”

The said Amendments, being read a second time, were agreed to.

THOMAS S. HOWE, called, sworn and examined.

By Mr. Meighen:

Q. Mr. Howe, you are Clerk of the Public Accounts Committee?—A. I am.

Q. Have you, in pursuance of a motion passed by this Committee on the 22nd of March, instant, the motion being made by myself, issued a summons or subpoena to R. C. Miller, former President of Diamond Light and Heating Company, Limited, Montreal?—A. At three o'clock on the afternoon of 22nd March, I wired R. C. Miller, 48 Turkish Bath Hotel, Montreal, the usual form of telegraphic summons. At five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day, I registered, addressed to him at the same address, a letter containing a full summons.

Q. A full summons in the legal form issued by this Committee?—A. Yes, addressed to him at 48 Turkish Bath Hotel, Montreal.

Q. Is that his address?—A. Yes, Mr. Ames' secretary hunted it up for me in the telephone book.

Q. Can you give any evidence as to whether or not those summonses reached him?—A. I had a conversation with the Post Office Inspector over the phone here half an hour ago and he said they had traced the summons to Montreal, that it had arrived there at seven o'clock on the morning of the 23rd, but they have not any further information at present and he thinks it will probably be One o'clock before he obtains further information.

Q. Have you any report from the telegraph company as to whether the telegraphic message was delivered?—A. I did not ask them.

Q. That is to say the summons has reached Montreal, but you can give no evidence from the information you have received from the Post Office Department as to whether or not Mr. Miller has taken it out from the Post Office?—A. No, that is what the Inspector is endeavouring to ascertain now. He is using the long distance telephone for that purpose. I told him that the matter was before the Committee and that it was very important to ascertain as quickly as possible.

That this House concurs in the First, Second and Fourth of their Amendments to the said Bill;

And that the Third Amendment be disagreed to, for the following reason:—

“Because the special enquiry called for by the said Amendment is not relevant to the purposes of the Bill, except in so far as it is already provided for by the other provisions of the said Bill and is unnecessary.”

And the question being put on the said motion; It was resolved in the Affirmative, on a division.

Ordered, That a Message be sent to the Senate to acquaint their Honours therewith.

Ordered, That the Clerk do carry the said Message to the Senate.

The House, according to Order, proceeded to take into consideration the Amendments made by the Senate to the Bill, intituled: “An Act respecting Grain,” and the same were read, as follow:—

1. Page 4, line 8.—In sub-section 2 of clause 6, after “secretary” insert “or any officer”.

2. Page 6, line 5.—Leave out clause 16.

3. Page 6, line 11.—Renumber clause “17” as “16”.

4. Page 6, line 17.—Insert the following as clause 17:—

“17. Any oath, the taking of which is hereinafter authorized or prescribed, may be administered by one of the commissioners appointed under the authority of this Act, or by the secretary of the Board, or a notary public, a justice of the peace, or any public officer authorized by law to administer oaths.

2. Every such oath shall be signed by the person who makes it and be transmitted to and filed with the Board, and the person who administers the oath shall keep in his custody a copy thereof certified by him as such.

3. A copy of any oath, certified by the secretary as such, shall be *prima facie* evidence of such oath.”

5. Page 8, line 11.—For clause 29, substitute the following:—

“29.—Every officer shall, before acting as such, take and subscribe to an oath of office in the form or to the effect following:—

“I, A.B., do solemnly swear, that I will faithfully, truly and impartially, to the best of my judgment, skill and understanding, execute and perform the office of (*give title of office held*) and that while I continue to be such (*give title of office held*) I will not directly or indirectly, by myself or by any other person or persons, deal or trade in any grain on my own account, or upon the account of any other person or persons. So help me God.”

6. Page 10, line 14.—For “and each of them” substitute the following:—

“42. Each member of any such Board.”

7. Page 10, line 24.—Leave out clause 42.

8. Page 13, line 14.—After sub-section 3 of clause 57 insert the following as sub-section 4:—

“4. Sub-sections 2 and 3 of this section shall only come into force upon proclamation by the Governor in Council in *The Canada Gazette*, but the said proclamation shall not be so made unless and until the Governor in Council is satisfied that the proper conditions exist for bringing the said sub-sections into force.”

9. Page 14, line 19.—Leave out “subscribe to an oath of office, and”.

10. Page 16, lines 25, 28, 29 and 30.—In clause 75 for “inspector or deputy inspector” substitute “officer”.

11. Page 26, lines 1 to 19.—Strike out all paragraphs under the heading “Corn” and substitute therefor the following:—

“No. 1 white corn shall be white, sound, dry, clean and in all other respects No. 1 corn, and shall contain not more than 16 per cent. moisture.

No. 2 white corn shall be white, sound, dry and reasonably clean, and shall contain not more than 16 per cent. moisture.

No. 3 white corn shall be white, sound, dry and reasonably clean, but otherwise unfit to be graded No. 2, and shall contain not more than 19 per cent. moisture.

No. 1 yellow corn shall be yellow, sound, dry, clean and in all other respects No. 1 corn, and shall not contain more than 16- per cent. moisture.

No. 2 yellow corn shall be yellow, sound, dry and reasonably clean, and shall contain not more than 17 per cent moisture.

No. 3 yellow corn shall be yellow, sound, dry and reasonably clean, but otherwise unfit to be graded No. 2, and shall contain not more than 19 per cent moisture.

No. 2 corn shall be mixed corn, sound, dry and reasonably clean, and shall contain not more than 16 per cent. moisture.

No. 3 corn shall be mixed corn, dry and reasonably clean, but otherwise unfit to be graded No. 2, and shall not contain more than 19 per cent. moisture.

All corn that is damp, dirty, in a heating condition or from any other cause unfit for the preceding grades, shall be graded as rejected.

All corn that has been tested for moisture shall be entered in the inspecting officer's books with his notations as to quality and condition."

12. Page 27, line 22.—Leave out "equal to No. 3".

13. Page 27, line 23.—Leave out "not". For "44" substitute "45".

14. Page 30, line 44.—Leave out "free from frost".

15. Page 31, line 2.—Leave out "equal to No. 3"; and for "44" substitute "45".

16. Page 39, line 26.—Leave out "the owner of such receipt or".

17. Page 39, line 31.—Leave out "owner or", and for "may" substitute "shall".

18. Page 63, line 17.—Leave out paragraph (e) of clause 207.

The said Amendments, being read a second time, were agreed to.

The House, according to Order proceeded to the further consideration in Committee of the Whole, of Bill to amend the Inspection and Sale Act, and, after some time spent therein, Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and Mr. Blondin reported, That the Committee had gone through the Bill and made Amendments thereunto.

Ordered, That the Bill, as amended in the Committee, be now taken into consideration.

The House accordingly proceeded to take the Bill into consideration.

Ordered, That the Bill be now read the third time.

The Bill was accordingly read the third time.

Resolved, That the Bill do pass.

Ordered, That the Clerk do carry the Bill to the Senate, and desire their concurrence.

The Order of the Day being read for the House to again resolve itself into the Committee of Supply;

Mr. White (Leeds) moved, seconded by Mr. Foster (Toronto),

That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair;

And the Question being put on the Motion; It was resolved in the Affirmative.

Ordered, That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair.

The House accordingly again resolved itself into the Committee of Supply, and after some time spent therein, Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and Mr. Blondin reported, That the Committee had made some progress, and directed him to move for leave to sit again.

Resolved, That this House will, at its next sitting, again resolve itself into the said Committee.

A Message was received from the Senate informing this House that, for the following amongst other reasons, the Senate doth adhere to the fourth Amendment made by the Senate to Bill to encourage and assist the Improvement of Highways:—

“1. Because the right of the Senate to amend a Bill is not impaired by the proceedings which may have taken place during the progress of the Bill through the Commons:

2. Because the Amendments made by the Senate to the third clause of the Bill, and accepted by the House of Commons, provide that the grant in aid of highways shall be paid to the several Provinces of the Dominion, instead of to any Province, as was provided by the clause in its original form; and the sub-clause 2, proposed by the Senate, indicates the reasonable principle upon which such payments should be made:

3. Because the method of distribution provided for by the said fourth Amendment is that announced by Members of the Administration in the Senate and House of Commons as contemplated and has been actually adopted in the Supplementary Estimates for the ensuing financial year:

4. Because the Bill undertakes to make certain permanent provisions as to the aid to be given to the construction and improvement of highways in the several Provinces; and it is only reasonable that the principle of equal distribution, in proportion to population recognized by the present administration, should be permanently secured by enactment in the Bill, as otherwise if this principle were abandoned in future, the Senate would have no other recourse than to reject the Supply Bill:

5. Because, if the principle upon which the apportionment of such grant is to be made is fixed by a permanent enactment, the task of deciding upon the items to be inserted in the Supply Bill will be simplified; and

6. Because the administration of the day, by adopting the principle of the said fourth amendment for the ensuing fiscal year, have indicated that it is neither unnecessary nor undesirable.”

And also, that the Senate doth adhere to its seventh Amendment, for the following, amongst other reasons:—

“1. Because section 6 of the Bill empowers the Minister to undertake the construction or improvement of highways in any Province, which would be a contravention of the letter and spirit of *The British North America Act, 1867*, and of the uniform practice under that Act, for which contravention no sufficient cause has been shown:

2. Because the said Amendment affirms in effect that it is undesirable that the Minister or the Dominion Government should usurp the rights and functions of the Provincial Administrations in the building and maintenance of highways and bridges:

3. Because the said Amendment will not unduly hamper the Administration in carrying out its policy and in applying the funds placed in the estimates for that object; sufficient provision being made in earlier clauses of the Bill for co-operation between the Federal and Provincial Governments.”

Mr. Pelletier, a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 11th March, 1912, for a copy of all letters, requests, complaints, depositions, reports of enquiry and every other document whatsoever, relating to the dismissal of Mr. J. O. Dauphinais, as Postmaster of Sorel, County of Richelieu; and also, of all letters, requests or other documents relating to the appointment of the new Postmaster at Sorel.—(*Sessional Papers, No. 79III.*)

And also, presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 11th March, 1912, for a copy of all documents, letters, papers, requests, enquiries and reports respecting the dismissal of Mr. Joseph Cloutier, Postmaster of St. Adolphe de Dudswell.—(*Sessional Papers, No. 79mm.*)

Mr. Middlebro, from the Select Standing Committee on Public Accounts, presented to the House the Fifth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

We have also proof of the delivery of the telegram to Miller himself, and since that an Order of this House has been sent down to Mr. Carpenter, chief of detectives in Montreal, with a view to having it served upon him (Mr. R. C. Miller), and Mr. Carpenter replies this morning:—

SIR,—Referring to letter which I yesterday evening received from Mr. O'Brien, Law Clerk of the House of Commons, I have the honour to inform you that I have been unable to effect service on Mr. R. C. Miller, and have reason to believe that he has left the city with a view to evading service. I have been trying since yesterday morning to locate him, but thus far have been unsuccessful.

Resolution 520 being read,

Mr. Monk moved, seconded by Mr. White (Leeds), That the said Resolution be amended as follows: Item 31, "Hansport—Wharf" to read as follows: Hansport and Walton Wharves, \$16,000; and also, item Whycomagh—Repairs to Wharf and Warehouse, \$1,500, be struck out;

And the question being put on the main Motion:—It was resolved in the Affirmative.

Resolution 520, as amended, was read the second time and concurred in.

Resolutions 521 and 522 were read the second time and severally concurred in.

Resolution 523 being read,

Mr. Monk moved, seconded by Mr. White (Leeds), That the said Resolution be amended as follows: Item 21, "Kincardine—Harbour at north end of north pier," to read as follows: "Kincardine—Extension and repairs to pier, further amount required, \$10,000,"

And the question being put on the Motion:—It was resolved in the Affirmative.

Resolutions 523, as amended, was read the second time and concurred in.

Resolutions 524, 525 and 526 were read the second time and severally concurred in.

Resolution 527 being read,

Mr. Monk moved, seconded by Mr. White (Leeds), That the said Resolution be amended by striking out the item 32, "Surf Inlet Wharf—Revote, \$5,000,"

And the question being put on the Motion:—It was resolved in the Affirmative.

Resolution 527, as amended, was read the second time and concurred in.

Resolutions 528 and 529, were read the second time and severally concurred in.

Resolution 530 being read,

Mr. Monk moved, seconded by Mr. White (Leeds), That the said Resolution be amended, as follows: Item 2, strike out the word "City" and insert the word "river" instead thereof,

And the question being put on the Motion:—It was resolved in the Affirmative.

Resolution 530, as amended, was read the second time and concurred in.

The remaining Resolutions were read the second time and severally concurred in.

The House, according to Order, again resolved itself into the Committee of Ways and Means.

(In the Committee.)

1. Resolved, That towards making good the Supply granted to His Majesty, on account of certain expenses of the Public Service, for the financial year ending the 31st March, 1912, the sum of \$3,224,759.47 be granted out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of Canada.

2. Resolved, That towards making good the Supply granted to His Majesty, on account of certain expenses of the Public Service, for the financial year ending the 31st March, 1913, the sum of \$141,652,018.77 be granted out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of Canada.

Resolutions to be reported.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and Mr. Blondin reported, That the Committee had come to several Resolutions.

Ordered, That the Report be now received.

Mr. Blondin reported the Resolutions accordingly, and the same were read, as follow:—

1. Resolved, That towards making good the Supply granted to His Majesty, on account of certain expenses of the Public Service, for the financial year ending the 31st March 1912, the sum of \$3,224,759.47 be granted out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of Canada.

The said Resolutions, being read a second time, were agreed to.

Mr. Blondin also acquainted the House that he was directed to move, That the Committee may have leave to sit again.

Resolved, That this House will, at its next sitting, again resolve itself into the said Committee.

Ordered, That Mr. White (Leeds), have leave to bring in a Bill for granting to His Majesty certain sums of money for the Public Service, of the financial years ending, respectively, the 31st March, 1912, and the 31st March, 1913.

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was received and read the first time.

Ordered, That the Bill be now read a second time.

The Bill was accordingly read a second time; and committed to a Committee of the Whole House.

Resolved, That this House do immediately resolve itself into the said Committee.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee, and, after some time spent therein, Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and Mr. Blondin reported, That the Committee had gone through the Bill, and directed him to report the same without any amendment.

Ordered, That the Bill be now read the third time.

The Bill was accordingly read the third time.

Resolved, That the Bill do pass.

Ordered, That the Clerk do carry the Bill to the Senate, and desire their concurrence.

Mr. Speaker acquainted the House, That a Message was received from the Senate to acquaint this House that the Senate doth adhere to its third amendment as well as its other amendments, made to the Bill to provide for the appointment of a Tariff Commission, for the following reasons:—

“1. Because the information desired to be obtained, is highly pertinent and germane to the objects for which alone the information of a Tariff Commission is justifiable.

2. Because such information can easily be obtained at the time the other information required by the preceding section is being procured.

3. Because it is highly important in the public interests that the several particulars referred to in the said third amendment should be reported in the case of persons who are endeavouring to secure the imposition of additional taxes on the **whole community**.

4. Because, in the opinion of the Senate, the said special enquiry is relevant to the purpose of the Bill.

5. Because the said enquiry and information is desirable and will not unduly hinder or delay the enquiry provided for by the Bill.

Mr. White (Leeds) moved, seconded by Mr. Cochrane,

That a Message be sent to the Senate to acquaint their Honours that this House, having considered the further Message from their Honours respecting Bill to provide for the appointment of a Tariff Commission, doth adhere to the Message already sent to their Honours, respecting the said Bill, on the thirtieth day of March last;

And the Question being put on the Motion:—It was resolved in the Affirmative.

Ordered, That the Clerk do carry the said Message to the Senate.

Mr. Speaker acquainted the House, That a Message had been brought from the Senate by their Clerk, as followeth:—

Then the Honourable the Speaker of the House of Commons addressed His Royal Highness the Governor General, as follows:—

"MAY IT PLEASE YOUR ROYAL HIGHNESS:

"The Commons of Canada have voted the Supplies required to enable the Government to defray the expenses of the Public Service.

"In the name of the Commons, I present to Your Royal Highness the following Bill:—

An Act for granting to His Majesty certain sums of money for the public service, of the financial years ending, respectively, the 31st March, 1912, and the 31st March, 1913, to which I humbly request Your Royal Highness' Assent.

To this Bill the Royal Assent was signified in the following words:—

“In His Majesty's name, His Royal Highness the Governor General thanks His Loyal Subjects, accepts their benevolence, and assents to this Bill.”

After which His Royal Highness the Governor General was pleased to close the First Session of the Twelfth Parliament of the Dominion with the following Speech:—

Honourable Gentlemen of the Senate:

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

I am glad, at this comparatively early period of the season, to be able to relieve you from further attendance in Parliament.

The diligence with which you have applied yourselves to your public duties, calls for my warm acknowledgments.

The Act to extend the boundaries of Manitoba and to make financial provision commensurate with the requirements of its enlarged area, will, I am sure, be welcomed, alike by the present inhabitants of that Province, and by those who dwell in the added territory now admitted to the advantages of the Provincial status.

The enlargement of the limits of the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec will, undoubtedly, contribute to the progress and development of those Northern territories which hitherto have been little known and which will henceforth form part of those great Provinces.

Highly important and far-reaching advantages should result from the measure to aid and encourage Agriculture, in concert with the several Provincial Governments, which, I doubt not, will materially contribute to the development and progress of that great basic industry.

The Act respecting Grain—a most comprehensive measure—will, it is hoped, assist the farmer in the marketing of his produce, as well as in obtaining better prices, thus relieving him of disadvantages under which he has hitherto laboured.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

I thank you in His Majesty's name for the liberal provision you have made for the requirements of the Public Service.

Honourable Gentlemen of the Senate:

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

I am happy to congratulate you on the many indications of the abounding prosperity of this country, and I earnestly pray that the blessings of Providence may always attend this favoured land.
