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## ECLIPSES IN THE YEAR 1844.

There will be five Eclipses this year—two of the Sun and one of the Moon, as follow:

1. A total Eclipse of the Moon, on the 31st of May, when she will rise about sunset, partly Eclipsed; end of the Eclipse, 7h. 50m.
2. A partial Eclipse of the Sun, on the 15th June, invisible in New-Brunswick. It will be visible in the South Pacific Ocean.
3. A partial Eclipse of the Sun on the 10th of November, visible only in a small part of the great Southern Ocean.
4. A total Eclipse of the Moon on the 24th November—when she will rise partly eclipsed. Beginning, 5h. 16m.; middle, 7h. 6m.; end, 9h. 2m.
5. A partial Eclipse of the Sun on the 9th of December, beginning at 3h. 40m.; greatest obscuration, 4h. 26m.; end, 5h.—Digits Eclipsed, 2.51 on Sun's Northern limb.

Get your tools in order for Spring work, now, while you have leisure. Have a place for everything, and everything in its place. Look over your seeds and see that none of them are suffering for want of care. Continue to cut timber and fencing. Handle your tools without mittens; a cat in gloves catches no mice. Sprinkle brine on your coarse fodder and give it to your cattle before Spring opens. Prepare plenty of fencing stuff. Cut scions for grafting. Dress out flax and hemp and keep your spinning-wheels in motion. Nurse your lambs by judiciously and plentifully feeding your ewes. Keep your cattle comfortable.

Finish cutting, splitting and piling your wood. Overhaul, repair, paint, sharpen, and put in due order all your implements of husbandry. Look to your drains and water-courses. As soon as the snow gets off the ground, busy yourself in repairing your stone walls and mending your fences. Give your sheep with lambs half a gill of Indian corn a-day; this will keep them in good heart, prevent their wool from falling off, and enable the ewes to bear their young.

## APRIL.

All vegetation is now on the spring. Farmers too should be on the alert, and every thing about the homestead should teem with life, and vigor.—Plough your grounds thoroughly and repeatedly.—Set the boys to work, and put your own shoulder to the wheel.—Put in your spring grains, such as wheat, barley, oats, &c. as early as the soil can be made ready, and draw your manures upon the fields.—Be sure to be busy in your garden. Hoe deep, and hoe often, and your land will retain more moisture for it, and consequently give more nourishment to the crop.

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This must be a very busy month for farmers and gardeners. Plant corn, potatoes, beans, peas, lettuce, &c. Prune fruit trees, beginning when the buds have scarcely begun to swell, and ending before the expansion of the leaves. Clear your barn yards, and manure the fields with their contents. Plough it in as soon after spreading as possible, before it loses its fertilizing gases, by the action of the sun and rain. Destroy caterpillars.

## JUNE.

Hail, lovely, lovely June! This is the month in which a continued warfare must be kept up with weeds. Weed your Indian Corn. Hoe beds of beets, carrots, parsley, &c. Cabbage should be often earthed and hoed. Seek and destroy worms. Soap-suds is one of the best antidotes against insects, as well as a good manure. Trees, shrubs, garden vegetables, &c. if showered with this liquid once or twice a week, would not be injured by worms or bugs, and would flourish surprisingly. Cucumbers attacked by black flies and spiders should be fumigated with tobacco smoke.

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Grass will not start again so readily unless it is mown quite close to the ground: and the loss in the crop, when this is not done, is more than is generally apprehended: for, in most kinds of grass, one inch at the bottom of the crop weighs more than several inches near the top. All grass should be cut in the morning. Clover, after it is cut, should remain in the swath till it is dried about two-thirds its thickness. It should not then be spread, but only turned over, and as little shaken as possible.

## AUGUST.

Prepare for harvest. Continue to gather seeds of various sorts, as they ripen, when the weather is dry. Gather herbs. If any of your fruit trees are blighted, apply some hog's dung. Destroy all noxious plants and bushes before they run to seed. If cows be troubled with garget, put tar on the ridge between the horns and on the nose. Keep your sheep with their noses well tarred from the middle of this month to the last of next, it will preserve them from the gad-fly, which causes worms in their heads.

Look well to your Indian corn; cut the stalks, and take care to dry them well, for they are excellent fodder. Every kind of food, proper for swine, will be better for cooking.—Charcoal hastens their fattening. Look again to your feoces.—From the first to the middle of this month is the best time for sowing winter wheat or rye. Fall ploughing saves time and labour in the spring, when the cattle are weak, and the hurry of business presses on the farmer.

## OCTOBER.

No time in this month must be lost. Gather in your Indian corn. Prune and plant forest trees; clean out water-courses.—Gather your winter apples; always pick them off with the hand, that the skin may not be bruised or broken. The cheapest mode of fattening hogs is with apples and potatoes, steamed, always finishing with good sound food, such as corn, peas or barley. Now make your cider. Be sure to have your Indian corn husked as soon as possible after it is gathered in heaps.



Put up your cattle in the barn. Keep your stables and pens well littered with straw; and if you have plenty of it keep your yards in the same condition. Littering adds to the comfort of your animals; it increases the quantity of manure, and it adds to its quality, as it absorbs and retains the fluid parts that are otherwise lost. House your ploughs, harrows, and all your summer tools. Secure your cellars against frost. Thresh out your grain. Reserve straw and your worst hays for the coldest weather, when cattle have the sharpest appetites.



### MISCELLANEOUS SELECTIONS.

**CURIOUS AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENT.**—The following novel and interesting experiment has lately been successfully made by Mr. A. Palmer, of Cheam, Surrey. In July, 1842, he put one grain of Wheat into a common garden pot. In August the same was divided into four plants, which in three weeks were again divided into twelve plants. In September these twelve plants were divided into thirty-two, which in November were divided into fifty plants; and then placed in open ground. In July, 1843, twelve of the plants failed, but the remaining thirty-eight were healthy. On the 19th of August they were cut down, and counted 1,972 stems, with an average of fifty grains to a stem, giving an increase of 98,600. Now, if this be a practicable measure of planting wheat, it follows that most of the grain now used for seed may be saved, and will infinitely more than cover the extra expense of sowing, as the wheat plants can be raised by the labourer in his garden, his wife and children being employed in dividing and transplanting them. One of the stems was rather more than six feet long, and stout in proportion.

**WHY IS THERE NO FROST IN A CLOUDY NIGHT?**—The remark is frequently made that "there will be no frost to-night, for it is too cloudy." A correspondent of the Newark Daily Advertiser thus explains this phenomenon, so familiar to all, but the why and the wherefore of which few have taken the trouble to ascertain:—"All bodies emit heat in proportion as they contain it—two bodies of equal temperature placed beside each other will

mutually give and receive equal quantities of heat; therefore one will not gain of the other. But a piece of ice placed in a warm room will receive much more heat from the surrounding objects than it imparts, and it will therefore gain in temperature and melt. The earth during the day receives much more heat from the sun than it imparts to the surrounding space in the same time. But, during a clear night, the surface of the earth is constantly parting with its heat and receiving none; the consequence is, that it becomes so cold that the humidity contained in the surrounding air becomes condensed and attaches itself to objects in the form of dew, in the same manner that a tumbler or a pitcher containing cold water "sweats," as it is called, in a hot day—the surface is cooled by the water, and this surface condenses the humidity of the contiguous air. If the surface of the earth, after the formation of dew, loses heat enough to bring it to the freezing point, the dew becomes frozen, and we have a frost. But if it be cloudy, then the heat, radiating from the earth, will be received by the clouds, and by them the greater portion of it will be returned to the earth; thus the surface of the earth very nearly retains its temperature, which not only prevents a frost, but almost always prevents even the formation of a dew."

**MIND vs. MATTER.**—A Frenchman by the name of Redelet, by experiments has shown how much power has been gained by the aid of intellect, or knowledge, in moving, by different mechanical inventions, a block of granite, that weighed 1080 pounds.

To draw it over a rough chiselled quarry, it required a force equal to 758 pounds.

To draw it on a plank floor, 682 pounds.

To move it on a platform of wood, 606 pounds.

By soaking the two surfaces of wood, 82 pounds.

Placed on rollers three inches in diameter, 24 pounds.

Substituting a wooden or stone floor, 24 pounds.

By improvements since effected in the invention and use of locomotives and railroads, it has been ascertained that a traction or draft of 8 pounds will run away with 2240 pounds, or one ton—so that a force of less than 4 pounds is sufficient to move the granite block of 1080 pounds. That is, 188 times less than it required without the contrivance of mind. By the aid of mind, animal or muscular force necessary to remove a given weight is thus reduced more than 188 times. Thus mind has by these contrivances given to muscle, or brute strength, 188 times more power than it can exert without it.

The farmer who avails himself of the advantages of science and mechanical inventions in the construction of all his farming implements and other labour-saving machines, adds greatly to his physical power; and yet by far the greatest part of farmers are unwilling to form any partnership between mind and muscle, for the benefit of the latter.—[Connecticut Farmers' Gazette.]

**MILK.**—Having recently seen a litter of fine pigs of four months old, that have increased in weight a pound a day each since their birth, and had been fed exclusively on milk, I was induced to look into the composition of an article which is thus capable of support.

ing animal life without any other food, and of building such carcasses, composed of bones, meat, fat, skin, bristles, hoofs, &c.

Chemists say that cows' milk is composed of the following articles, viz.:—Cheese, 4.48 per cent.; butter, 3.13; sugar of milk, 4.77; salts and mucus, 0.60; water, 87.02—100. And these articles, when analyzed, are found to be composed of carbon, oxygen, hydrogen, nitrogen, and various saline and earthy substances.

A French chemist states, in treating on the phenomena presented from microscopic observation, in the transformation of cream into butter, that the cream consists of the globules of the milk, which rise to the surface from their lightness, and which contain the butter in the form of pulp, enveloped in a white, thin elastic pellicle. The action of the churn, he says, produces nothing more than the rupture of the pellicle, and it is the fragments of the pellicle which whiten the liquid called butter-milk.

When cows are fresh and are fed with nutritious food, the quantity of butter contained in these pellicles is greater, and the covering is thinner, and consequently less agitation in the churn breaks them, and the butter comes much sooner than it does when they are fed sparingly on articles containing but little nutriment.

The sugar of milk is obtained by evaporating the whey to the consistence of honey; the saccharine matter remaining dissolved in the whey after the curd is formed.—[Farmers' Cabinet.

**POULTRY YARDS.**—Every farmer should supply his table with fresh meats from his poultry yard. By proper attention, it may also be made a source of profit in addition. A yard of suitable size, enclosed with pickets, including a poultry house, and a supply of fresh water, and a pond to wash in, are indispensable to the success of raising poultry.—To ensure a plentiful supply of eggs in winter, let the fowls have a warm habitation in which they can remain through the day in cold severe storms, with room to move about. Place a trough about four inches wide and four inches deep, and length according to circumstances, within the yard, with a roof so low as to prevent their getting into the trough; keep this well supplied with feed, that they may have it by them constantly. In summer, let them out once or twice a day to ramble awhile, if you have no crops near enough to be injured by their depredations. As they are somewhat carnivorous, some kind of fresh meat is necessary for them once a day in winter, when they are not supplied with insects.—No poultry is profitable to be kept after three years old. Something depends, however, on the breed, and the manner in which they are kept. The Poland top-notts are considered the best for eggs, and are sometimes called everlasting layers. They are more hardy than most kinds, for the extremes of weather.—*Farmers' Gazette.*

**Eggs in Winter.**—Oats given to fowls should be crushed and soaked in water: this helps digestion; and hens will lay in winter that are so fed, that would not otherwise. Feed your fowls in winter with bones powdered fine, and they will need less oats, and lay as plentifully as at any season of the year. The bones supply the carbonate of lime, which is necessary for the production of

the shell, and a part of the yolk of the egg. Egg-shells, chalk, or unburnt lime answer a similar purpose.—*Enniskillen Chronicle.*

**SAVE YOUR SOAP SUDS.**—There is scarcely a plant that is not benefited by watering with Soap Suds. It furnishes nutritive matter as well as moisture; keeps off insects, and promotes a rapid growth. The Gardener's Chronicle states that while there has been a great failure in the cabbage and cauliflower gardens generally, those watered with soap suds have produced plants of the finest quality, and entirely escaped the injuries inflicted by insects upon others.

**TREATMENT OF HORSES ON A JOURNEY.**—If you would have a horse perform much service you must keep him on hay and grain, or on straw and grain. Horses that go out to pasture cannot be expected to perform much labour. If you intend that your horse shall perform a long journey, you must prepare him beforehand, by letting him be used to hay and grain. You will find it most economical on a journey to keep your horses principally on grain. Oats are less likely to hurt a horse than other grain; there is not so much nutriment in them, but there is enough if you give a sufficient quantity. Some travellers order a half bushel of oats for a supper for a single horse, and these are given him soon after he is put into the stable. He is thus enabled to fill himself with a substantial supper, and have much time to lie down and rest; and he is ready to start in the morning as soon as his driver is ready. When half a bushel is given, but little hay will be eat.

Most people suppose that grain is more apt to injure a horse if given to him when he is warm than other times. But this is not the case; it is hard driving immediately after giving grain that hurts the horse. Many have been ruined in this way, but a case cannot be shown where grain proved injurious merely in consequence of the warmth of the beast when he eats it.—[Maine Cul-tivator.]

**ACID IN WOOD: ITS EFFECTS ON SALT AND BUTTER.**—It has been frequently remarked by those who are in the habit of packing butter, that it kept best put down in stone. The next best is oak or white ash firkins, the wood of which had been boiled for several hours previous to working; and the butter packed in firkins of unprepared wood frequently acquired a strong and disagreeable flavour, which seriously injured it. The reason of this has not been generally understood. Mr. Moir, of Scotland, has been instituting a series of experiments on the subject, which appear to have thrown some light on the matter. He found that most kinds of wood contained considerable quantities of pyroligneous acid, which decomposes the salt with which it comes in contact. The linden or basswood was the only wood he found entirely free; but the other kinds he experimented upon were easily freed from acid by boiling three or four hours, well pressed under water. It is evident that firkins made of staves prepared in this way would be decidedly improved, and as the preservation of butter in a sweet and pure state is an important matter to the dairyman, we think much would be gained by a proper attention to the vessels in which it is packed.—[Saturday Courier.]

**TO DESTROY THISTLES, FERN, AND COLTS-FOOT.**—Having often a pasture-field that seemed one entire bed of common thistles, and having occasion to cart some manure across it to another field, I observed all the thistles completely killed wherever the carts went. I therefore set to and rolled the whole field with a cast-iron roller, once in the latter end of May, and twice in the beginning of June. The field has been free from thistles ever since. Fern and coltsfoot I have exterminated in the same way.—[London Hort. Reg.

**CELLARS.**—As soon as your potatoe crop is in, the cellar should be carefully secured, and protected as thoroughly as may be, from the frost. It is bad policy to defer this business till the snow falls, as is the practice with some.

In banking, choose *light* materials, such as chip-dung, straw, rotten wood, and such-like substances instead of those which are solid and compact. They will not only be much more efficient in promoting the object of the undertaking, but valuable as materials for the compost heap, in the spring. All treading should be avoided; solid substances—or those in which there are comparatively few interstices or pores, being good conductors, and consequently more liable to freeze, than those which are light or more open and permeable to the air. This fact is illustrated by the soils freezing much harder in the road and to a much greater depth, than in the fields where it is less compressed, or trodden by the feet.

—[Maine Cultivator.]

**BEAUTIFUL EXPERIMENT WITH A PLANT.**—The Brooklyn News gives the following interesting bit of information:—"Cut a small branch of Oleander from a thirsty plant, place it in a vial partly filled with rain water, so that the lower end of the branch may be immersed about half an inch in the water. Place this in the sun in an open room, and in about fifteen or twenty days small roots will shoot out from the end of the branch, presenting a beautiful appearance. After these roots have extended two or three inches, the branch may be set out in moist earth, and if frequently watered, it will grow rapidly, and so form a large thirsty stock.—Ladies who are fond of flowers may easily propagate Oleanders in this manner, and in a few months, multiply these beautiful plants to an indefinite extent."

**GUANO.**—Upon the South American shore of the Pacific Ocean, and the adjacent islands, is found a substance called Guano, which is supposed to be the accumulated dung of birds, that in countless myriads range that extensive coast, seeking their prey in the finny tribe of the great ocean. The fertilizing effects of the article are well known to the Peruvians, and have induced its transportation 6000 miles to the shores of England. Occasionally, for the last twenty years, a ship load would find its way to the English ports, and although, perhaps, the production is too limited, and the cost of transportation too great, to permit it ever to become an extensive article of commerce, its extraordinary fertilizing properties render it a subject of extreme interest to the inquiring agriculturist. It sells in England for about five dollars the hundred weight, and from two to four hundred weight is required to the acre.—One bushel is reckoned to be equal to thirty or forty of the best

rotted stable dung. This product has been analyzed, and its constituents have been found to consist of those salts, which modern discovery has shown to be most instrumental in aiding the growth of vegetable products. Indeed, so exactly does this substance seem adapted for the purpose to which it is applied, that an attempt has been made to produce it by an artificial combination of its constituents; and it is hoped that this attempt will lead to a chemical composition, that will afford us an artificial manure with all the properties of the guano, at a much lower price than the natural product can be imported. When this article is fresh, it is said to be of a light greyish colour, but exposure soon gives it a brownish cast. It probably only excels the dung of our pigeons and domestic fowls, because of the animal food from which it is elaborated. A ship load of guano was lately brought into the port of Bahia, where it was sold for seven cents a pound; a friend, who happened to be in the city at the time, was kind enough to bring us a little box of it, a part of which was applied to some geraniums and other plants, by way of experiment. Much as we had heard of its marvellous effects, we were astonished at the magical result upon our flower bed.

We are yet groping in the dark upon the subject of agriculture, but a spirit of inquiry is awakened that we are satisfied will never slumber until the most astonishing and most satisfactory results are obtained.—*Southern Planter.*

**SUBSTITUTE FOR CREAM.**—Beat up the whole of a fresh egg in a basin, and then pour boiling tea over it gradually, to prevent its curdling. In flavor and richness, this preparation closely resembles cream.

The race of mankind would perish, did they cease to aid each other. From the time that the mother binds the child's head, till the moment that some kind assistant wipes the death damp from the brow of the dying, we cannot exist without mutual help. All, therefore, that need aid, have a right to ask it of their fellow-mortals; no one who holds the power of granting can refuse it without guilt.—*Sir W. Scott.*

**RECEIPT FOR MAKING EVERY DAY HAPPY.**—When you rise in the morning form a resolution to make the day a happy one to a fellow creature. It is easily done; a left-off garment to the man who needs it, a kind word to the sorrowful, an encouraging expression to the striving; trifles in themselves light as air will do it, at least for the 24 hours; and if you are young, depend upon it, it will tell when you are old; and if you are old, rest assured it will send you gently and happily down the stream of human time to eternity. By the most simple arithmetical sum, look at the result. You send one person—only one—happily through the day; there are 365 in the course of the year, and supposing you live 40 years only after you commence the course of medicine, you have made 14,600 human beings happy, at all events for a time; and this is supposing no relation or friend partakes of the feeling and extends the good. Now, worthy reader, is not this simple? It is too short for a sermon, too homely for ethics, and too easily accomplished for you to say, 'I would if I could.'

**FRENCH METHOD OF FISHING ON THE GRAND BANK, OFF NEW-FOUNDLAND.**—French vessels, it appears, mostly anchor in lat. 50, N. and long. 49, 20, W. in about 45 fathoms water, veer 90 or 100 fathoms of cable, and prepare to catch codfish with  $2\frac{1}{2}$  inch lines of 300 fathoms long, each. On these, a small cork is placed at every 12 feet, and while metal hooks baited with parts of small fish, (by us called kiplings) are alternately fastened by snoods of 3 feet long, 6 feet apart, and the whole coiled in half bushel baskets clear for running out. Half the number of baskets are then placed in a large strong built lugsail boat, on each side, and at 3 o'clock in the afternoon, both make sail together at right angles from the vessel, and when the lines are all run out straight, sink them within 5 feet of the bottom. *The crew having rested all night they proceed again the next morning at day break, to trip the sinker, and while hauling in lines, unhooking fish, &c. the men left on board, heave in the other end with a wynch.* When in that manner 400 codfish are caught in a night, some are then employed in line-clearing, fish-beheading, splitting, sailing and stowing them away in layers across each other below; livers and refuse boiled to oil put in large casks on deck. Three months seems to be the average time employed, arriving early in July, and departing again in October.

**A NEW FIRE ESCAPE.**—Many plans have been proposed, and models made, for the purpose of saving the lives of those exposed to the horrors of a fire; and every time the calamity visits a particular district, the subject is discussed by parties who have either run the risk of being roasted alive themselves, or have heard the appalling shrieks of those to whom no assistance could be rendered. An ingenious mechanic, Mr. J. Woodhead, of George-street, Blackfriars Road, has, after mature consideration, constructed a machine which appears to possess every means of assisting the inmates, and enabling the most unskillful bystander to render effectual aid. It consists of a light four-wheel carriage, with a ladder, surmounted by a platform-gallery, with hand-rails, &c. These ladders can be made to shoot out from a receptacle to any height, allowing the most timid individual to walk out of a window as on to a staircase; and allowing the firemen to direct a stream of water to any desired point. The machine is contrived that it may be conveyed to any street, however narrow, by two persons. When there is not room to turn the carriage, the machine may be turned to any angle, and, if required at the rear, the machine may be detached, and carried through any ordinary passage, and again re-constructed without loss of time.

A wet silk handkerchief tied without folding over the face, it is said, is a complete security from suffocation from smoke; it permits free breathing, and at the same time excludes the smoke from the lungs.

**Height of Clouds.**—Owing to its rarefaction, the air beyond a certain height is incapable of sustaining clouds. The principal masses of clouds are sustained in the air at a height between 4500 and 7500 feet, the average being rather more than a mile.

**Houses of Unburnt Bricks.**—Within a few months past, the Hon. H. L. Ellsworth, of Washington City, has been making an experimental trial of building a house with *unburnt* brick, and he seems to entertain no doubt of his success.

Corns may be cured by binding them tight at night with a piece of sponge moistened in a solution of pearl-ash. The corn may be brushed off in the morning, having been dissolved by the action of the caustic.

**To remove a Wart.**—Touch it with a clean pen dipped in a little aquafortis. By repeating this daily, the wart will crumble, and come off without pain or trouble. It is an excellent and safe remedy for hard, horn, and callous warts; but if the wart is red, fleshy, and sore to the touch, do not apply the aquafortis.

**Ringworms.**—There is no better remedy for ringworm than mercourial ointment rubbed on at night, and not washed off till morning. It causes no pain, and a few applications will effect a cure.—[Miss Leslie.]

For poison by ivy, apply weak solutions of potash or pearlash.

The American Poultry Book says the Duck is rather a warlike bird, and awkward and clumsy as he appears, is more than a match for the stoutest cock in the poultry yard. The Goose is a quiet, inoffensive bird, and lives to a great age—if he is not killed. There are authenticated statements to the effect that they live to be seventy or eighty years old.

**WARNING TO MOTHERS.**—We copy from the Bangor Whig the following excellent suggestions, which we hope will not be disregarded:—"Cold weather is approaching, and the sitting-room fire has already become necessary in the morning and evening. It is time to think about the appropriate clothing for children and infants. Let the mother see to it, that her infant is not exposed to the pains and dangers of disease by following fashions set by those whose vanity outruns their judgment, or whose ignorance makes sacrifice of their offspring. Let the round plump arms and delicate breasts of children be well covered with comfortable clothing. Let the little ones who can trot about the house be well clad in woollen garments, to shield them from the cold and as a protection against fire. We have been connected with the public press more or less, for nine years, and during that time not a year has passed but we have recorded more or less the deaths of children by their clothing taking fire. What a warning is this to mothers who love their children—what a sacrifice of life is annually made to neglect in clothing children!"

**MISTAKE OF FEMALE EDUCATION.**—Physical inaction produces the most deplorable results, particularly in town; if girls have been taken out to walk, whenever the weather was fine, it is supposed that every thing necessary has been done. But what beneficial effect can arise from a formal walk of this kind, during which they are obliged to hold themselves erect, to take care of their dress, to speak in an under tone, and even to impose a restraint upon their countenances? Their circulation is hardly so much accelerated as to diffuse a slight degree of warmth through their

limbs ; a greater proportion of their muscle remains unexercised ; those especially which are connected with the spine acquire no strength ; the spine itself, weak and flexible, gives way beneath the weight of the head and arms, and a curvature is soon formed in its weakest part. Why is it that this is so seldom the case with boys ? Because when they come out of school, they are allowed to amuse themselves as they like, and their whole body is in continual action. The benefit which they derive from gymnastic exercises is generally acknowledged ; yet, how much more necessary would these seem for girls who are not allowed, as boys are, to jump, leap, play at ball or run races, in their walk.—[Progressive Education.]

**Encourage youth to contend with and overcome difficulties.**

Ovid finely compares a broken fortune to a falling column ; the lower it sinks the greater weight it is obliged to sustain. Thus, when a man's circumstances are such that he has no occasion to borrow, he finds numbers willing to lend him, but should his wants be such that he sues for a trifle, it is two to one whether he may be trusted with the smallest sum.

**To LAW STUDENTS.**—The Law Times, in answer to a correspondent who requests some advice as to an articled clerk, has the following pithy language :—‘ Live like an hermit—work like a slave—learn everything—read men as well as books—mingle in all business—shun all pleasure—for one hour you dedicate to reading give two to reflection, three to observation. Deem no art nor science worthless—accustom yourself to act as well as to deliberate—to speak as well as to think—confirm reading by practice, and improve practice by reading—store your mind with all sorts of knowledge, you never know when it will be required, and even that which is not useful will always prove ornamental—for methods, make your own—adopt those you find most apt—experience in this will be the best teacher : your own habits the best adviser. There is no royal road to knowledge—and but one golden rule—work ! work ! work !’

**A Clever Reply.**—A servant girl in the town of A——, whose beauty formed a matter of general admiration and discussion, in passing a group of officers in the street, heard one of them exclaim to his fellows :—“ By heaven she's painted ! ” “ Yes sir, and by heaven only ! ” she very quietly replied, turning round.—The officer acknowledged the force of the rebuke, and apologized.

**A FINE STAND !**—“ Well, Mister, you have a fine stand for business.” “ Hem ! yes, you may well say that,—it is one very fine stand, for no customers come to make me morn all day.” “ I suppose, sir, you mean to say the times are hard ? ” “ Certainly I do,” replied the store-keeper, with care depicted on his countenance, “ the times are hard, and the world harder, and I fear that very few will get out of it alive.”

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LONDON, which extends its intellectual, if not its topographical identity from Bethnal-green to Turnham-green, (ten miles,) from Kentish-town to Brixton, (seven miles,) whose houses are said to number 200,000, and to occupy twenty square miles of ground, has a population of little less than two millions of souls, or rather mouths. Its Leviathan body is composed of nearly 10,000 streets, lanes, alleys, squares, places, terraces, &c. It consumes upwards of 4,369,000 lbs. of animal food weekly, which is washed down by 1,400,000 barrels of porter annually, exclusive of other liquids. Its rental is at least £7,000,000 a-year duty alone. It has 237 churches, 207 dissenting places of worship, and upwards of 5,000 public houses, and 16 theatres.

**Observations.** 1.—The nearer the time of the moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter are to midnight, the fairer will be the weather during the seven days following. The space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.

2.—The nearer to mid-day or noon the phases of the moon happen, the more foul or wet weather may be expected during the next seven days. The space for this calculation occupies from ten in the forenoon to two in the afternoon. These observations refer principally to the summer, though they affect spring and autumn nearly in the same ratio.

3.—The moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, happening during six of the afternoon hours, that is, from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the wind, as is noted in the table.

4.—Though the weather, from a variety of irregular causes, is more uncertain in the latter part of winter, and the beginning of spring, yet, in the main, the above observations will apply to those periods also.

5.—To prognosticate correctly, especially in those cases where the wind is concerned, the observer should be within sight of a good vane, where the four cardinal points of the heavens are correctly placed.

## READY RECKONER.

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## SIGNALS

*Made at Partridge Island, on the approach of Vessels to the Harbour  
of Saint John.*

- One Ball close, for one square-rigged vessel.
- One Ball, half hoisted, for two square rigged vessels,
- Two Balls, close, for three square rigged vessels.
- Two Balls, separated, for four square rigged vessels.
- A Pendant, of any colour, for five square rigged vessels.
- A Pendant, under a Ball, for six square rigged vessels.
- A Pendant, over a Ball, half hoisted, for seven square rigged vessels.
- A Pendant, under two Balls, close, for eight square rigged vessels.
- A Pendant, between two Balls, separate, for nine square rigged vessels.
- A Flag, of any colour, for ten or more vessels.

[The above are hoisted at the East or West yard-arm, according to the quarter the vessels first appear in, and when their rig can be made out, the following descriptive colours will be hoisted at the mast head]

- A Union Jack for a Flag Ship, with or without a squadron.
- " with a red pendant over, for a two decker.
- " with a blue pendant over, for a frigate.
- " with a white ditto, for a small armed vessel.
- A blue pendant, for a merchant ship or barque.
- A red ditto, for a merchant brig or brigantine.
- A white and blue ditto, for a foreign square rigged vessel.
- A white ditto, without a ball, for a topsail schooner or sloop.
- A flag, blue and white horizontally, a neutral fleet.
- A pendant, white and blue, a neutral man-of-war.
- A blue flag, a neutral merchant ship.
- A red, white and blue flag, an enemy's fleet.
- A red, white and blue pendant, an enemy's man-of-war.
- A Union Jack over neutral or enemy's signals, the vessel is detained or a prize.
- A white flag, over any signal, the vessel bears a flag of truce.
- A red flag, pierced white, for a steamboat from Digby.
- A blue flag, pierced white, for a steamboat from Saint Andrews or Eastport.
- A red flag, with a white square, for a steamboat from Boston.
- A Ball at the mast head, vessel is on shore or in distress;—should immediate aid be necessary, guns to be fired.

In thick weather, a gun will be fired at Partridge Island, in answer to each gun heard at sea. There is a Fog Bell on the Island, which is rung in foggy weather, to warn vessels of their approach to the shore.

When a vessel requires a Pilot, her descriptive pendant will be shewn at the yard-arm, instead of a ball.

### TIME FOR GOING THROUGH THE FALLS, NEAR THE CITY OF SAINT JOHN.

The Falls are level or still water, at about three and a half hours on the flood, and about two and a half on the ebb, so that they are passable four times in twenty-four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them,

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## LIGHT HOUSES.

*Board of Commissioners for the several Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy.—John Ward, Senior, Robert W. Crookshank, John Ward, Junior, Lauchlan Donaldson, W. F. W. Owen, Isaac Woodward, Esquire, Honourable Thomas Wyer, Honourable James Allanshaw, and John Wilson, Esquire.*

*Isaac Woodward, Esquire. Surveyor of those Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy belonging to New-Brunswick; and also of those belonging to Nova-Scotia, which are partly supported by this Province, Office in the Commercial Bank Building, Saint John.*

*Cape Sable Seal Island Light.—The first Light on approaching the Bay of Fundy is on the South Point of Seal Island. This is a plain white Light—elevated about 80 feet above high water mark, and may be seen in approaching the Island from any point of the compass. A very dangerous Rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called *Blonde Rock*, lies about two miles S. S. W. by compass, from the Light House. Between this Rock and the Island there are some dangers—the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.*

*Brier Island Light.—In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof—A plain white Light.*

*Digby Gut Light.—The next Light on the coast of Nova-Scotia, is placed on the West side of Digby Gut—from Brier Island North Eastward. The Coast is very bold and not indented; the Light is, therefore, chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin. A white*

*Gannet Rock Light.—This Light bears from the Light on Brier Island, N. W. & W. 2½ miles. It is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands off Machias, a distance of about 20 miles.*

*Bearings from the Gannet Rock Light House—*

" *Old Proprietor, which dries at ½ ebb, (very dangerous), E. by N. & N. 7 miles.*

" *Black Rock, (always above water 25 feet,) off White Head, N. E. & E.*

" *South West Head of Grand Mann, N. W. & N.*

" *Northernmost of the Murr Ledges, (dry at ½ ebb,) N. W. by W. & W.*

" *Southernmost of ditto, called Saint Mary's Ledge, (always out of water,) S. W. by W. & W.*

" *Machias Seal Island Lights, (distant about thirteen miles, W. by N. & N.*

*NOTE.—Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them always above water, and which extend Westward from the Light House, about four miles; from this range, farther Westerly, about eight miles, lies a dangerous breaker, called the *Roaring Bull*. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan, open. The red glass having been removed from the Lantern, there is now a flash light—WHITE—twenty seconds dark, and forty light in each minute. The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical, black and white.*

*Machias Seal Island Lights.*—There are two fixed WHITE Lights upon the Machias Seal Islands, elevated about forty-five feet above high water, and bear from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W. distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other Lights, upon the Coast, (British or American). Both the Buildings are painted white. The following are the bearings from them, viz.:—

- To the Southernmost Murr Ledge, (St. Mary's) E.S.E. easterly.
- " Gannet Rock Light, E. by S. 4 S. 13 miles.
- " Southern Head of Grand Manan, E. by N. & N.
- " Northern Head of Grand Manan, N. E. & E.
- " N. E. Rock, distant 2 miles, N. E. by N.
- " Little River Head, N. by W.
- " Libby Island Light House, (American), N. W. by W.

Vessels standing in to the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring the Lights into one, as they will be then not more than three-fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the East of the Lights.

*Head Harbour Light.*—Next in order, after passing Grand Manan and the plain white Light (American) on West Quoddy Point, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of Campobello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquoddy;—it enables vessels also, at all times to enter Head Harbour. It is a fixed white Light. The building is painted white, with a Red Cross on it...

*Point Le Preau Lights.*—Upon this projecting head land two Lights are placed, one above the other in the same House, and distant twenty-eight feet.—Both Lights can be seen from every point of the compass, where they may be useful—both are fixed and white. The Light House is painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad each, horizontally.

*Partridge Island Light.*—This light at the entrance of the River and Harbour of Saint John, having been established about fifty years, requires no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed white Light, and the Light House is painted red and white in vertical stripes.

*Beacon Light.*—Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or Bar, which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a Light is established, which is eminently useful to the Coasting Trade of Saint John, and to all other vessels having Pilots on board, as it enables them to enter the Harbour at all hours of the night.—A fixed white Light. The House is painted white and black, in stripes vertically.

*Quaco Light.*—A revolving white Light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute.—This Light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. The Light House is painted white and red, in horizontal stripes.

*Cape Enrage Light.*—On the Point of that name, in Westmorland nearly opposite Apple River Harbour, (N. S.) The House is about 120 feet above the tide mark, and is painted white.—A plain white Light.


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

