HYDRO POWER FOR EASTERN SECTION OF THE PROVINCE Rates as Low as in Towns Served From Niagara Falls

Hon. Adam Beck Makes An Important Announcement at Brockville—Double Source of Supply Will Ensure Continuous Service to Municipalities from Napanee to Morrisburg—Distributing Stations at Brockville, Morrisburg and Kingston.

BLAMES DOMINION FOR TRENT VALLEY MONOPOLY

BROCKVILLE, April 7.—(Special)—Eastern Ontario is about to come into its rights in the matter of cheap hydro-electric power, and as a result of a meeting held here this afternoon of representatives of various municipalities, at which Hon. Adam Beck was the central figure, a new era of industrial development faces this portion of the province, which has long been noted for its hydro-electric potential.

Two Sources of Supply. These two sources of supply, he pointed out, would ensure a continuous service in case of a breakdown, either one of the plants, as connection could be made at the joint distributing station at Kingston, the cost of the High Falls plant would be slightly higher than the other. The total expense necessary to deliver the power from Washington to Brockville is \$1,000,000, and \$100,000 for the distribution system between Napanee and Morrisburg forming the union upon which the commission based its figures would entail a capital investment of \$1,100,000. The company agrees to deliver 5000 horse-power in ten months, and after that in blocks of 100 until the contract limit is reached in eighteen months.

The plan of the Government. In passing, Mr. Beck conveyed to the meeting an idea of the original plan of the government to extend the province from Windsor to Morrisburg. Their efforts in Western Ontario had been crowned with success. Prospects looked bright for the stretch from Toronto to Morrisburg until the Electric Power Co., Ltd., with headquarters in Toronto, appeared in the Trent district, from Toronto to Belleville, and the corporations had practically thwarted the Hydro-Electric Commission. This concern, he held, was a merger which had robbed up the Seymour Power and Electric Co., the Peterboro Light and Power Co., the Peterboro Radial Railway Corporation, the Auburn Power Co., the Trent Electric and Water Co., the Sydney Electric Power Co., the Nipissing Power Co., the Oshawa Electric Light Co., the City Gas Co. of Oshawa, the Cobourng Utilities Corporation, the Northumberland and Durham Power Co., and the Central Ontario Power Co.

The municipalities were tied up with franchises given this company, and working under a Dominion charter, with the right to develop power from the Trent, a monopoly has thus been created with which the province cannot cope. When the commission applied for power to supply the municipalities a reply was given that the controlling company was not in a position to meet the demand, as all the power was reserved to meet their own requirements. With water powers all tied up there is no chance for competition, and the people are at the mercy of the Dominion Railway Board to control and regulate rates.

SAFELY RESCUED ALL OF LINER'S PASSENGERS

Work Was Dangerous, But Not a Life Was Lost—No Panic Among the 1720 Cabin and Steerage Passengers—Liner May Stick Fast for Two Weeks.

LONE HILL, LONG ISLAND, LIFE SAVING STATION, April 7.—In just five hours and ten minutes the 1,720 cabin and steerage passengers on the stranded North German Lloyd liner, Prinzess Irene were transferred this afternoon to the fleet of her sister ship The Prinz Friedrich Wilhelm, and one hour after midnight they were safely on their way to New York.

Not a life was lost, not a case of panic was reported. The first passenger off was a woman, and the second a baby. The cabin passengers, masters of the situation and the language, generally gave precedence to the more timorous ones in the steerage.

As for the liner on the bar, nightfall showed her hard and fast in the grip of the sands, and the rescue party of the Lone Hill Life Saving Station estimates that she will be prisoner at least a week, perhaps two. If the 36 hours since she struck she has been favored with comparatively light weather, but a stiff blow from the south-west might open her plates, crush in her bulkheads and wrench apart her stout steel frame.

Ten small boats, two tugs and the relief ship took part in the rescue today, while a revenue cutter and a derelict destroyer stood by. All the 1,485 steerage passengers were let down by the forward companionway, the cabin passengers directly aboard from a rear companion way. The first tug left at 12:45 p.m., and the last at 5:55 p.m., five hours after the disaster.

When the work was all over Capt. Goddard, the veteran of the Lone Hill station, said he had never handled more delicate life passengers than the most part Greeks and Italians. The life savers had feared hysteria, and perhaps blind panic, but they were soothed the concern of the most clamorous tug Timmons made a special trip as a baggage boat.

Captn. Letten Von Petersen is still standing on his ship with his crew of 380 men. He cannot understand how he happened to be standing ten miles off his course when he struck.

Altho a heavy ground swell was pounding into the beach, the Lone Hill crew made a launching without shipping a drop, but Capt. Rorke's boat was washed back broadside to the beach by a roaring comb that filled her to the gunwales. He had to haul her ashore, dump the water and put out again, this time with better success.

At 12:45 the first life boat put out with a full complement—ten women and their babies. At 1 o'clock the making life had risen far enough to be of some service. The Timmons, seeing her chance, slipped under the stern of the Irene's great bulk lowering above her and, was immediately in safe and comparatively smooth lee water. The Nichols followed, and one lifeboat succeeded another until there were ten of them clustered about the stern of the Timmons' cabin and descending passengers stepped on board the tug direct. Twenty minutes later she had a full load and headed bravely out to sea for the Prinz Friedrich.

The Point O'Woods lifeboat was hauled overland across Fire Island and safely launched to join in the work of rescue. From that period the work went on with precision, and almost with automatic smoothness. It took about fifteen minutes to load a tug, fifteen minutes for her journey to the relief ship, and fifteen minutes to unload her.

SEIZED JEWISH WINE.

Thirty-two cases of Lion Wine Brandy, a drink peculiar to the Jews, is being held by License Inspector Johnston to see if the Ontario Government is going to pass any legislation making its sale legal by the Jews to the Jews.

In yesterday morning's police court Samuel Harris, upon whose premises it was seized, was convicted of illegally keeping liquor for sale, and sentence was suspended by Magistrate Denison, who said that he did not see why the Jews should not be allowed to carry on this trade among themselves so long as the Gentiles had this privilege. This was following the evidence of Rabbi Jacobs, who said that this wine was made by his people for their consumption, and that many of them would not purchase it from Gentiles.

William Wainwright, the vice-president of the Richelieu, is said to be strongly opposed to the consolidation with the Inland Company. He naturally favors a union of the Richelieu and the Northern.

HAMILTON HAPPENINGS

CARPENTERS DETERMINED ON AN INCREASE IN WAGES

If Agreement is Not Reached by May 1 a Strike Will Be Declared.

HAMILTON, April 7.—(Special).—The T. H. & B. Railway will trestle over the proposed extension of Birch-ave., the railway building the abutments, and the city doing the excavating. This was the agreement reached this afternoon at a conference between the controllers and Supt. Adams of the railway company.

The carpenters of the city have decided that they will not allow the boss to ignore their demand for an increase in wages from 33 cents to 49 cents an hour. This decision was reached at a joint meeting of the two unions held this evening in Kennedy's Hall. The men are determined in the step that they have taken in the matter, and it is expected that if an agreement is not reached before May 1, the four hundred carpenters here will go on strike on that date.

Efforts are being made by local association football men to have the Toronto and Hamilton Inter-city League revived. With this object in view, representatives from this city will attend the district association league meeting to be held in Toronto next Monday night.

The 18th Royal Regiment paraded to-night, 500 strong, under command of Lieut.-Col. Mewburn.

plan to prevent mergers and the possibility of electric interests going into close corporations. For the state of affairs in the Trent district the Dominion Government was directly to blame.

Making Payment Easy. Mr. Beck announced to the authority of the government the adoption of a plan to supply both water and power in Ontario whereby municipalities will be relieved of making the first payment of the bonded indebtedness incurred by the installation of electric power until five years have elapsed. This will give the municipalities an opportunity of getting on their feet financially. It has also been provided that those who join after the system has been installed in their districts will enter on equal terms with competitors.

Providing 5,000 horse-power is used in the district, power will cost the municipalities who have applied as follows: Kingston, \$28.45 per h.p.; Napanoc, \$36.23; Lansdowne, \$52.38; Brockville, \$20.48; Lynn, \$22.40; Prescott, \$18.15; Cardinal, \$18.80; Morrisburg, \$18.85; Athens, \$38.07. If 50 per cent. more than this is used, the figures will be: Kingston, \$23.76; Napanoc, \$28.44; Lansdowne, \$34.12; Brockville, \$17.49; Lynn, \$18.83; Prescott, \$15.88; Cardinal, \$16.80; Morrisburg, \$12.92; Athens, \$30.08. If 100 per cent. more than the amount asked for is used the figures will be: Kingston, \$19.20; Napanoc, \$22.09; Lansdowne, \$26.81; Brockville, \$15.37; Lynn, \$16.81; Prescott, \$13.35; Cardinal, \$12.90; Morrisburg, \$11.57; Athens, \$24.69.

Action for the water was left in the hands of an executive committee composed of one member from each of the 19 municipalities represented. It is reported that 10,000 h.p. can be developed at Devil Lake, a short distance from Brockville, and Mr. Beck promised that he would have an engineer report upon that property, which is owned largely by the Tett Bros. of Bedford Mills.

At the public meeting in the evening at Victoria Hall Mr. Beck was greeted by large audience of merchants, manufacturers and citizens generally. He covered much of the same ground as in the afternoon, giving a history of the movement and explaining the mode of operation. He commanded close attention and frequently was vigorously applauded.

PRESIDENT FALCONER'S HINT

City Might Give \$100,000 Towards New Variety Gymnasium.

"Toronto University is worth \$2,000,000 annually to the city," declared President Falconer at the annual meeting of the Alumni Association in McCourey's last night. "There are at least 28,000 students, who may be safely estimated to spend \$300 each year, while many will spend much more. Therefore, it would not seem amiss if the city were to expend \$100,000 on our new gymnasium, and in that way help the institution along."

Continuing, he spoke of the increase of 100 in the arts classes. "Only the medicine class is dropping off," he said, "and we are glad to get rid of them." Sir Edmund Walker, one of the governors, explained in detail the many improvements which the university was planning. New buildings and fine grounds were to be expected in the near future. "Our university grounds and buildings are at present worth on the average of \$16 a head to each of the students," he said.



Gibson; secretary-treasurer, Bro. Andrew E. Wright; directors, Bros. I. W. Miller, T. R. Haig, Andrew Parkin, E. G. Wilson and R. C. Gavin, were among those present on the platform of the beautiful assembly hall, Bro. Ed. J. Freysing, president of the Canadian Foresters' Hall, Limited, in an address of welcome, said that the order had been congratulated in the opinion of a building which was a credit to the C. O. F. and to the city. The letters of regret included one from Sir James Whitney, prime minister of Ontario, and one from Mayor Geary.

An impressive ceremony of dedication was conducted by Bro. J. A. Stewart, high chief ranger, and Rev. W. J. Mowat, high chaplain, Canadian Order of Foresters.

The audience, accompanied by the Whitehall Orchestra, celebrated the dedication of the hall by singing the Canadian national anthem, "The Maple Leaf." Lieutenant-Governor's Address.

There was an immediate protest against any such unwarranted interference with their rights, but a motion was usually exacted by ordinary life insurance companies.

Bro. J. A. Stewart, high chief ranger, of the Canadian Order of Foresters, gave an inspiring address.

Mr. Stewart began by referring to the birth of the order in 1878, under the most humble conditions. At the time of the secession from the parent body there were fewer than 500 members, and there was practically an empty treasury. Since that time the society has gone on and prospered, and each year has been more successful than the one which preceded it.

Of the members of the order, 49,325 were enrolled in the sick and funeral benefit branch of high court. During the year 1910 there were 6132 sick and funeral benefit claims paid, amounting to \$147,234. After paying this amount there was added to the sick and funeral benefit fund the sum of \$28,449, leaving the amount to the credit of the fund at the close of the year \$207,223. Since 1878 the order had paid to members and their dependents about \$7,000,000.

Interest plays a very important part on the rate question. During the year 1910, 28.65 per cent. of all death claims were paid out of interest.

The death rate of any insurance society or association was one of its most important features. In this respect the Canadian Order of Foresters has had a most enviable record.

Mr. Stewart asserted that the present splendid standing of the order was to be accounted for by the fact that a limitation was imposed upon the business operations of the society. Under the provisions of the constitution the society does not, and never has carried on business outside the limits of the Dominion of Canada.

everyday, into a limitless fellowship of thought and beauty.

He believes that all other literatures should be translated into English, all science and all philosophy brought within the reach of all who are capable of availing themselves of such reading. No empire ever before attempted such a thing, but to such empire ever before existed. Half the good things of the human mind are outside English borders, and he would have them all rendered into the vulgar tongue. Honest and able criticism is only to be had in French, scientific knowledge, philosophical thought, good plays, and a knowledge of the contemporary European mind are restricted to the German.

"It would cost amazingly little to get every good foreign thing rendered into English as it appeared," he suggests, but no adequate effort is being made to render the English language universal through its limits and to use it as a medium of thought and enlightenment.

Our United States neighbors have excelled in translation. Longfellow's poetry is very largely translation, and his version of Dante rivals Cary's. Bryant gave a fine rendering of Homer. Bayard Crawford's "Kalevala" opened the Finnish epic to the west. Or standard foreign classics there is indeed no dearth of translations. In such editions as Everyman's they are every day becoming more available.

But it is more especially to contemporary thought in its more ephemeral garb that Mr. Wells' suggestion applies. It is far more important that we know what people think than what they do. Perhaps Mr. Wells will start a paper to give us contemporary translation in a cheap and popular form.

Montreal fully appreciated the Sheffield Choir, but The Gazette of that city had some original comment. "No other body of singers," said The Gazette, "which has ever been heard in Montreal, has exhibited so subtle a force of nuance, so delicate a shading, combined with such terrific climatic effects." son, saying that it was not desirable for him to present to introduce any new element into the situation. He made the definite statement however, that if by Monday night next the two parties had not made a request for a board of investigation, the government would take immediate steps to hold a searching enquiry into the whole matter.

Need No Compulsion

He added, "the minister practically dared us to vote against it. He practically called us cowards. We need no compulsion. I am quite ready to tell the house that I am against this agreement first, last and for all time, and I speak as a farmer desirous of representing the best interests of the farmers and the Dominion."

Mr. Campbell said that when the

Robt. government made promises in regard to legislation affecting the Winnipeg Grain Exchange and elevators these men had stumped the country, telling the farmers that the government was not to be trusted. In both instances the government had fulfilled its promise. They were Grt's first, last and all time, because they could not help themselves.

Dares Minister to Run Against Him.

The terminal elevator question was closely associated with reciprocity, because if the pact came into effect Americans would get control of the market, and there would be mixing of wheat. 

to the woman a few months before called a hussy?" "The influence had changed," replied Dr. McGill.

Such, at Least, is Said to Be the Attitude of a Majority.

The board of directors of the Toronto Electric Light Company held a meeting yesterday afternoon to decide on the attitude they would adopt at the meeting of the shareholders at noon to-day with reference to the sale of the physical assets of the company to the city.

Absolute secrecy was maintained by the members as to what transpired at the meeting of two girls, 15 and 16 years of age, who were identified as the owners of the city's offer of \$125 per share which characterized the remarks of most of them after the decision of the city council had been announced was not in evidence, and a majority will be in favor of accepting the city's bid whatever may be the action of the shareholders.

It is still asserted however by some who profess to be well informed on the situation that the offer of the city will be one of three by the police to be considered by the shareholders to-day. They claim that Electrical Development Company interests will also make an offer and there will be a buyer representing financial interests in the United States.

U. S. GOVERNMENT TO DRIVE OUT BLACK HAND

Member of Chicago Band, With Score of Murders Against Them, Convicted.

CHICAGO, April 7.—The U. S. Government to-day won its first case in the fight it has begun to drive out the Chicago members of the Black Hand, who are said by the police to be responsible for nearly fifty dynamite explosions, and a score of murders. Gianni Alongi was found guilty of using the mails in sending threatening letters to the jury in the United States District Court, bringing in the verdict, after Judge K. M. Landis and Postoffice Inspector James E. Stuart both had received threats of death should Alongi be convicted.

Alongi was accused of having written threatening letters to Carmelo Marsala, a meat dealer on the north-west side of Italian section, near Death Point, where many explosions and murders have occurred. Marsala refused to pay the tribute demanded in the letters, and five bombs were exploded near his shop before Alongi was arrested. Extraordinary efforts were made to prevent the conviction of Alongi. Immediately after his trial being distributed and the signed "Black Hand" and threatening death if the Italian should be found guilty. Secret service men placed a guard on the man's house.

Alongi's office was watched constantly by detectives. In spite of this the guards discovered the next day that a bomb had been placed under his desk. The bomb was harmless, but officers stated it probably was placed there to show the ability of the writer of the letter to overcome the precautions of the government.

FOREIGNERS TROUBLE-MAKERS

Judge Denton Agrees With Grand Jury's View.

The sessions grand jury in their presentment before Judge Denton yesterday severely criticized the treatment of prisoners at Toronto jail, and laid emphasis upon the fact that the greater portion of the prisoners were foreigners.

They considered the case of shoplifting should be severely dealt with, and deplored the fact that the immigration seemed to be on the ascendancy. They censured the Mercer Reformatory for alleged needless harsh treatment of the inmates, some of whom slept under a single blanket.

Judge Denton concurred with the grand jury in their statement, and said he would instruct the clerk of the peace to have copies of the presentment sent to the different institutions. He laid special stress upon the foreign element that had appeared before him at the sessions. He said that half the time occupied by the sessions was taken up with several instances, and the evidence in most of the cases had been given in an alien language.

CAMPAIGN'S LAST DAY

Board of Trade Hopes to Reach Desired Mark of 1000 New Members.

To-day the membership campaign of the board of trade for 1911 will end, the originally suggested ten-day period having elapsed. Up to 6 o'clock last night 753 applications had been filed, leaving 247 yet to be heard from. It is confidently expected that at the luncheon to be held to-day in the National Club at 1 o'clock some of the captains will make announcements which will warrant the statement that the thousand names required have been secured. Several applications have been received from towns surrounding the city, indicating that the good work of building up Ontario, the board has undertaken, is appreciated outside of Toronto.

Two or three captains and committees who were appointed and organized after the campaign started, have asked permission to make returns within the next two or three days, as they have not had the show other captains and committees have had, and express the belief that the prolongation of the campaign, say for the first half of the coming week, would bring gratifying results.

P. W. Ellis' suggestion that members should nominate their sons, who have reached an eligible age, has been acted upon in several instances. One gentleman nominated three and a couple of others two.

Wheat Moves Up Over a Point Distant Futures Not So Strong

Rush of Shorts to Cover Contracts Takes Market Out of Routine Liverpool Cables Higher.

CHICAGO, April 7.—Talk of a possible clash between France and Spain gave wheat an advance today in the price of wheat. New investment was not of corresponding volume, but the close was strong, with gains all the way from 1/8 to 1/4 to 1/2. Latest figures on corn showed a rise of 7/8 to 1 1/8, and for oats 1/2 to 3/4 to 1/2. A one-day trading left the products a shade to 1/16 higher than 12-14 hours previous.

It did not take much to start covering by wheat shorts, who had a profit in sight. It is true they were satisfied to collect all the cash possible and then await the government crop reports, which are due on Monday. Reports of large areas of four at Minneapolis helped turn feeling to the bear side. A cable message regarding Franco-Spanish relations, and finally there was a report of considerable cash being raised, been bought in this market. As a result wheat prices were about the top for the day. May contracts advanced 1/8 to 1/4 to 3/8, with the final 1/2 up, at 8 1/2 to 1/2.

Forecast of unsettled weather had much to do with making corn take an upward swing. It was not until the 11th of the month that it was varied between 1/2 and 3/4, closing strong, 1/2 to 3/4 to 1/2. Cash grain was firm.


CHICAGO RECORD-HERALD SAYS \$50,000,000 STEEL PLOW COMPANY WILL BUILD IMMENSE PLANT IN WELAND THIS YEAR.
Special to The World: The Chicago Record-Herald of March 23 makes the following announcement: "The steel plow company will build an immense plant in Welland this afternoon that plans for the immediate future expansion of Deere & Co. The new manufacturing corporation involves a merger with twenty-two industrial concerns and branch houses, the consolidation to have a single ninety-nine-year charter and a capitalization of fifty million dollars. The name of the consolidation will be Deere & Co., the intention being to retain the name of John Deere, inventor of the steel plow and founder of the mammoth industry. Headquarters of the consolidation will be in Moline, Ill. Concerns in Combine. The following concerns have been signed for membership to date: Deere & Co., Moline, Ill.; Deere & Moline Co., Moline, Ill.; Moline Wagon Co., Moline, Ill.; Marseilles Co., East Moline, Ill.; Knab's Manufacturing Co., Ottumwa, Iowa; and Welland, Ont. Fort Snider Wagon Co., Fort Smith, Ark.; Deere & Webber Co., Minneapolis, Minn.; and fourteen branch plants and houses, all having separate charters at present. While all the other concerns have been more or less closely affiliated with Deere & Co. for some time, the Essex Co. has been independent. It manufactures hay-making machinery. Will Make Harvesters. Deere & Co. have perfected a grain harvester that embodies a number of recent inventions. The machine has been proved a practical success, and it is understood manufacture of these harvesters for the Canadian trade will be begun in Welland, Canada, within a year. A large tract of land has been purchased adjoining the plant of the Deere Co. there, and the harvesters probably will be manufactured in buildings to be erected in the near future. It is needless to mention that when the Canadian plant of this merger is built in Welland this year, it will be the largest manufacturing industry in Canada, and the several thousand men which the Canadian plant will employ means an industrial expansion to the Town of Welland, the like of which probably no other Canadian manufacturing town or city has ever seen. This announcement means that Welland will probably double and triple its population again during the next year or two, as it has during the past two years."
