SECOND RACE FOR THE DOMINION.

Crane's Challenger Beaten Over the Twelve Mile Triangular Course by 2 Min. 47 Secs.—Third Race To-Day. Montreal, Aug. 15.—The Dominion, the Canadian boat, won the second of the international yacht races to-day, defeating the American boat by 2 minutes 47 seconds on a 12-mile triangular course, in a light breeze. Though there promised nothing but a dead calm at the onset, there was not anything like the number of boats and steamers on the course that were present on Saturday, though there seemed a great number of smaller craft. Everyone was for the Dominion, of course, and when the Challenger came plunging along with a lead on the first leg of the course, which took her into Beauséjour, there was some consternation, even though the Dominion was so close and caught her rival up so quickly after they had passed the buoy.

The Attorney-General's Fisheries bill met with no opposition at its second reading in the Legislature yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Hardy explained that since the decision of the Supreme Court upon which the bill of 1927 had been based had been greatly altered by the Privy Council, his new bill had become urgent as well as essential.

One of the features not upheld by this court of last resort had reference to the rights to take fish with certain implements, and also to the close season.

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A GOLD-MONING STAMPEDE

Rich Placer Diggings Found on Pine Creek, N. W. Territories.

At Least a Thousand Prospectors Are Hurrying to the Diggings From Juneau and Other Points in Alaska—Mounted Policemen Have the Cross-Canadian Government Claims Reserved.

Juneau, Alaska, Aug. 10.—via Seattle, Wash., Aug. 15.—What is regarded as an important discovery of rich placer diggings is reported to have been made on Pine Creek, a small stream emptying into Adia Lake, a small feeder of the Klondike.

The discovery is located in the Canadian Northwest Territory. The news has caused a great stampede from Juneau and other southeastern Alaska points, and it is estimated that at least 1000 prospectors have started for the locality.

As reported here, the find was made two years ago by George Miller of this city, about the time the Klondike was made known. Miller allowed his discovery to remain dormant and went to the Klondike last June and returned to the Klondike.
