ONTARIO'S PREMIER ACCEPTS MABEE'S ENDORSAMENT.

The Globe says Mabee's personality doesn't count in estimating the value of his pamphlet. His book, we are told, stands on its merits. The pamphlet, however, is not presented to the public in that shape. It is put forward as the confession, as it were, of a Conservative, who, having become disgusted with the leader of his party, takes the public into his confidence and warns them against having anything to do with Whitney, a fair or a philosopher. The Globe asks us to pass judgment on the facts and arguments put forward in the pamphlet. As far as the Mabee end of the pamphlet is concerned, there are no facts or arguments in it. The opinions of the author are not his, but those of the public as a whole. It is not presented to the public, not because of the arguments introduced in support of them, because there are none, but because they are family secrets, as it were, which could not have come to the knowledge of anyone outside the fold. Here is a sample of the so-called "arguments" that the public are asked by the Globe to pass judgment on.

Pork Packing Industry at Stouffville Promises to Achieve World-Wide Success.

Stouffville, Oct. 24.—Improved methods of agriculture and a clearer conception of the requirements of our transatlantic friends have gradually brought about a system of farming far in advance of that adopted by our predecessors less than a quarter of a century ago.
