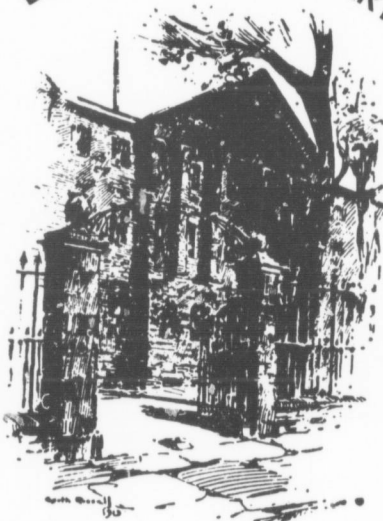

ECLIPSES IN 1821.

There will be two Eclipses in the year 1821, both of the Sun, as follows:—
 1st, the first will be on the 4th of March, at 1 hour 23 min. in the morning, invisible.

2d, the second will be on the 27th of August in the morning, partial and visible, as follows:—beginning at 36 minutes after 8 o'clock; greatest obscuration 47½ min. after 9; middle, 51 min after 9; end of the eclipse 7 min. after 11. Digits eclipsed 5 4-5ths from the sun's south limb.

Venus will be morning star until the 22d May, thence evening star throughout the year.

THE FIXED STARS.

The fixed stars have baffled the skill of all astronomers to measure their distance; various methods have been devised for that purpose, and various conjectures formed, but none of them have extended further than to establish that distance to be immensely great, in which all agree: they are supposed to be so many suns, placed in the boundless regions of space, each of which have their respective planets revolving around them, subject to the laws of attraction and motion, like the system on which we are placed; those which appear larger and brighter than others, are thought to be proportionately nearer; they are distinguished into different degrees of magnitude, from one to seven, and are in number as seen by the naked eye about 1000: but by the assistance of a telescope, they are found to be as innumerable as their distance is great. The famous Dr. Herschel with his telescope in viewing a few degrees of the starry heavens, estimated those which might be seen at the number of 75 millions, they are calculated to set forth the wisdom, omnipotence and goodness of the Creator, and have been a subject of contemplation and wonder in all ages for the thinking mind.

"When I consider (says the psalmist) thy heavens, the work of thy fingers, the moon and the stars which thou hast ordained; what is man, that thou art mindful of him? and the son of man, that thou visitest him?" psalm 8th; and again, psalm 19th, "The heavens declare the glory of God, and the firmament sheweth his handy work." The Almighty when speaking to Job out of the whirlwind, sets forth the constellations as a mark of his power; "Canst thou bind the sweet influence of the Pleiades, or loose the bands of Orion? Canst thou bring forth Mazzaroth in his season, or guide Arcturus with his sons?" Job, c. 38th: and again, the prophet Amos, c. 5th, observes, "seek Him who made the seven stars, and Orion, and turneth the shadow of death into morning." Cold and lifeless must the thoughts of him be, who turns his eyes to gaze on the Heavens, and cannot discover the fingers of the Architect of the Universe, and trace the footsteps of his power and infinity.

M. Cassini in his observations on the dog-star or Sirius, the brightest of all the fixed stars, judges his apparent diameter to be about 5" seconds, and his bulk equal to that of the sun, or about twelve hundred thousand times as

globe of our earth, his distance will then be 32 millions of miles which is further than a cannon ball would fly in 7 millions of years, which staggers our imagination; but when we consider the accuracy and precision, with which the laws and motions of the heavenly bodies are known, the dimensions of the solar system marked out to a degree on the most evident demonstration, and above all the infinite power of the Creator of all Worlds, this conjecture is within the limits of the strong probabilities. Let us consider countless millions of these huge bodies, with their numerous planets and satellites revolving around them as a common centre, travelling with a velocity of many thousand miles every hour; our conceptions are lost in this sea of imagination: but all that our thoughts can conceive, or fancy describe, is no more than the small dust of the balance, or a grain of sand on the shore, to the boundless works of him, whose mighty Fiat spoke them into existence, whose golden compasses described their limits, who direct their motions, and at whose command they must cease to exist.

The Sun and seven Planets.—The sun, with 7 planets, and the moon, is all that can be discovered by the naked eye, of that system in which we are placed, and are in order as follows:

The sun is the centre of the system, each of the planets describing an elliptic circle around him. He is distant about 100 millions of miles, and is about 12 hundred thousand times bigger than the whole globe of the earth.

Mercury is the nearest planet to the sun, is distant from him 33 millions of miles, and is in diameter 2700 miles; his motion is at the rate of 95 thousand miles every hour, nearly 300 times swifter than a ball from the mouth

Venus is the next planet to Mercury from the sun, her distance is 60 millions of miles from the sun; her motion in her orbit 70 thousand miles every hour; both Venus and Mercury are included within the earth's orbit, and are called inferior planets. Venus is the most beautiful of all the luminaries, the sun and moon excepted, and is often seen in full day-light: when she rises in the morning before the sun, she is termed Lucifer, Phosphorus, or the morning star; and when she sets in the evening after the sun, she is termed Hesperus or the evening star—she is never distant from the sun more than 48 degrees.

The earth on which we live, is herself a planet, distant from the sun 100 millions of miles, about 7,900 miles in diameter; travelling at the rate of nearly 60 thousand miles per hour; its diurnal revolution on its axis distinguished the first day, and the first night; its annual motion in the elliptic, measures the seasons and the years, whilst the moon marks out the order of the months.

The moon is a satellite attending on the earth, and is nearest to us of all the celestial bodies, whose dimensions are known; she is in bulk 1-49th part as large as the earth; is distant 240 thousand miles; and moves at the rate of 2290 miles per hour.

Mars is distant from the sun 130 millions of miles; his motion is 48 thousand miles per hour, and is in bulk 1-5th as large as the earth.

Jupiter is the largest of the planets, being 1000 as large as the earth; his motion is at the rate of 25 thousand miles per hour; his distance from the sun 426 millions of miles; the length of his day 10 hours, and revolution in his orbit 12 years.

Saturn is distant from the sun 800 millions of miles; he moves at the rate of 18 thousand miles every hour; his revolution in his orbit is 30 years, and is in bulk 900 times as large as the globe of the earth.

The Georgium Sidus is 1000 millions of miles from the sun; performs its annual circuit in 83 years; its motion in its orbit is about 7 thousand miles hourly; its real diameter is 32,000 miles. Those who have the curiosity to know this planet, will observe, that he will pass the meridian at midnight on the 22d of June this year, with 22 degrees of southern elevation, being the time of his opposition to the sun, when he may be most distinctly observed for some months before and after that period.

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Directions for coming into Halifax Harbour, taken from the printed Directions in the Custom-House at Halifax.

SAMBRO Island and Light House is in latitude 44 deg. 30 min. N. and longitude 63 deg. 02 min. W.

From the westward, bring the light to bear N. E. ; if it bears more easterly, stretch to the southward till it bears N. E. and as much more northerly as you please, there being no shoal or ledge to the southward; then keep it open on your larboard bow; give it more than a mile and a half birth, as much more as you please.

Note—The western ledges lie from the light S. W. distant two miles, the other W. S. W. about one league; the eastern ledges lie in a range nearly, some above water; the outermost one mile and a half from the light, bearing from it F. N. E.

When the light bears north, distant about 2 miles, run N. E. 4 miles, then north will carry you to Chebucto Head, at a proper distance clear of all danger.

When a breast of Chebucto Head, run N. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. for the south point of George's Island.

When within half a mile of George's Island, you may enter the harbour west of it in 12 fathoms, or east of it in 15.

In passing between Sandwich point and Meagher's beach, run nearest the point, to shun a shoal which runs off S. W. from the beach.

There is also a shoal lying one mile south of Sandwich point.

Coming from the eastward, run for the light, and you cannot fail seeing Chebucto Head as you open Halifax harbour; the light being 4 miles distant from the Head to the S. W.

TO TRAVELLERS ;

For the information of Travellers between Windsor and Parrsborough &c. THE Parrsborough Packet sails regularly between Windsor and Parrsborough every week, from the 1st April to Christmas, viz. leaves Parrsborough on Monday, wind and weather permitting so as to be at Windsor on Tuesday; and will sail from thence the first high water that happens at or after eight o'clock in the morning of that day; the Packet frequently goes twice or three times a week when business requires it.

Time of going through the Falls.

THE Falls are level (or still water) about three hours and an half on the Flood, and about two hours and an half on the ebb, which makes it passable four times in 24 hours, about 10 or 15 minutes each time.—No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the river St. John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by winds, and in the proportion to the height of them.
