

HOW SIR JOHN CARLING AIDED CONFEDERATION

Hitherto Unrecorded Story of meeting on a railway train, that was big with import to the young and struggling How "John A." and Geo. Brown Were Brought To-

gether.

(The London, Ont., Free Press.)

Few people in Canada, and only a very small circle in London, are aware of the part played by Sir John Carling in bring into effect the measure which saved the Canadas to the British crown. This unassuming, quiet, old gentleman, who has served longer than any living Canada in the councils of the nation, seldom speaks of the great part he has taken in the country's affairs. Sir John then, as now was trusted by his opponents as well as his friends, and it was to this fact more than anything else that confederation is due.

Confederation had been urged by politicians for more than two decades, but the extreme bitterness of party feeling and the personal animosity existing between John A. Macdonald and George Brown were insurmountable barriers. If these two great men could be brought together—they had not spoken to each other for several years—confederation might be consummated.



"This system was adopted in Massachusetts over twenty years ago in dealing with delinquent children under sixteen years of age; the results were so satisfactory that it led to its adoption for adult delinquents and drunkards, and the results have been most encouraging. In every criminal court throughout the state one or more officers are appointed by the court, called probation officers, who take the supervision of cases placed on probation on suspended sentences. This officer, although appointed by the court, acts nevertheless, not in the capacity of an informer, but as a friendly visitor. He gives the probationer a helping hand, helps him to secure employment when necessary, and endeavors to place him on a higher plane of life and livnig. At the end of the probationary period the case may be disposed of in one of three ways:
(1) The man may be discharged, (2) the probation may be continued, or (3) he may be imprisoned, according as the report of the probation system has worked so satisfactorily in Massachusetts that it has been adopted in New York, New Jersey, and in a number of the Western states."

King Edward, who is a connoisseur in tobacco, has just placed with a New York firm of tobacco brokers an order for 500 cigars which in point of price will be slightly in excess of what his Majesty paid some two years ago, when his bill for 1,000 cigars was \$750. For the 500 that are to be shipped from Havanna in time to reach England at the beginning of the Easter holidays he will excel, even if they equal the quality, the famous 1,000 which took three months in the making. "There is no exaggeration as to the price or the expense incurred in the manufacture," said a well known American authority on cigars the other day. "King Edward paid £750 for 1,000 cigars, and the margin of profit even at that unprecedented price was exceedingly small. The manufacturer was eager to gain the prestige of having served royalty and went to extraordinary expense. The cigars were eight inches in length, and at the thickest part, in the middle, one inch in diameter. They were made of the finest Vuelta Abajo tobacco. The way in which these royal cigars were manufactured is extremely interesting. Each leaf passed through the hands of two 'selectors,' and it required the examination of thousands of leaves to obtain those that were uniform in color and in size, and free from large veins." 

ROOSEVELT WILL HAVE LONG TRIP

Sheriff to Pay Up-Some Do So He Will Travel 3000 Miles Through the Heart of the African Big Game Country Accompanied by His Son.

> New York, July 3 .- President Roosevelt yesterday experienced a slight taste of the

practically unexplored region beyond the source of the Nile and through German East Africa.

Congressman W. W. Cocks, whe recently returned from a trip of 1,700 miles up the Nile, called on Secretary Looeb yesterday. The congressman said he presumed the President intended to navigate the Nile as far as Lake Victoria Nyanza and make expeditions into the country on both banks. This trip, he said, led through great dangers from wild animals and natives.

The President intends, it is said, to use a water route wherever practicable, and he has plans for a novel sort of light boat, but will not discuss its construction. He is consulting authorities as to the best way to cut his way through the dense growths of lilies and marine plants which, he has been warned, he will find chocking the interior streams and lakes. He has not planned for a permanent set of camp followers, but intends to engage guides to take him from point to point. President Roosevelt has agreed to make a statement regarding his proposed trip when his plans are completed.


