

Weather So Far Has Been Excellent---August the Crucial

WINNIPEG, July 4—The consensus of opinion throughout the three wheat growing provinces is that the crop is a very "spotty" one, as is usual following late sowing. The worst reports come from Southern Manitoba, where conditions prevail very similar to those in the United States, immediately across the border. One thing, however, is especially worth of note, that there is no mention of green bugs in any mesage received. Conditions are decidedly better in Manitoba along the main line and north of the main line to the boundary of Saskatchewan, and throughout the whole of the Saskatchewan. The worst that can be said of the crop is that it is on the average two weeks later than last year, for the straw will be short. On July 12, last year, 75 per cent of the wheat was headed, this year off that Takte about 75 per cent will be in the shot blade. This condition about the same as that which prevailed in 1897, when Manitoba reaped one of the finest crops on record. In that year there was no frost in August, and should the year 1907 escape an August frost there is every prospect of reaping an excellent crop of all grains.

Conditions are not so rosy as they were at this date last year, but there is no occasion for a panic. Ten years ago, with as doubtful a report fro Southern Manitoba the crop would have been regarded as a failure, but now with the thousands of acres in Saskatchewan sown to wheat is is highly improbable there will be a total failure of the crop in the Canadian west, and certainly there is little danger of it this year.

Sufficient rain has fallen to meet the meeds from day to day, and prospects on the whole are decidedly better than they work at the time of sowing.




