

LANSDOWNE LETTER PROVOKES DISCUSSION

Plea For Revision of Allies' War Aims and Attempt For Peace Before World Ruined

London, Nov. 29—The strongest impetus to a renewal of the heated discussion of the rival schools on the war accy of the allies was provoked today from a most unexpected quarter by the publication of a long letter from the Marquis of Lansdowne, strongly pleading for a revision of the allies war aims and an attempt to secure peace before "the prolongation of the war leads to the ruin of the civilized world." His letter gives formal adhesion to President Wilson's policy of a league of nations and he asks: "What would be the value of blessings of peace to nations so exhausted that they can scarcely stretch forth a hand to grasp them?"

Lord Lansdowne contends that an immense stimulus would probably be given to the peace party in Germany if it were understood:

"First—That the annihiliation of Germany as a greet power was not desired."

"First—That the annihiliation of Germany as a great power was not desired.
"Second—That we do not seek to impose upon the German people a form of government against their choice.
"Third—That except as a legitimate war measure, we do not desire to deny to Germany her place among the great commercial countries.
"Fourth—That we are prepared after."

"Fourth—That we are prepared after the war in concert with the other powers to examine the international problems connected with the freedom of the seas.

"Fifth—That we are prepared to enter into an international pact under which ample opportunities will be afforded for the settlement of international disputes by peaceful means."

Lansdowne's long and intimate connection with foreign affairs and diplomacy lends unusual authority to such a pronouncement at the moment of the meeting of the inter-allied conference at Paris and because of Clemenceau's recent declaration against a league of nacent declaration against a league of na-tions, including Germany and already there are indications of an embittered

controversy over it.

It is authoriatively announced that the government had no previous knowledge of the letter, and the strongest supporters of the government in the evening press suggest that the letter is very unwelcome to the government.





MRS. STOBART SPEAKS OF WOES OF SERBIANS

Deeply Interesting Lecture Given Before Large Audience in Cen-

An audience which completely taxed the capacity of Centenary church school room last evening heard Mrs. St. Clair Stobart's interesting lecture on Serbia and incidents relating to the war in that country. The lecture, which was under the auspices of the Women's Canadian Club, was illustrated with views of Serbia and the Montenegro mountainous country, lasted more than two hours. She held the audience intensely interested from start to finish.

Mrs. G. A. Kuhring, president of the Women's Canadian Club, was in the chair and those occupying seats of honor in the front of the hall were Lieutenant. Governor and Mrs. Pugsley, General Macdonell, Mayor Hayes, Lody Tilley and officers from the Serbian draft now stationed at Sussex. Before introducing

stationed at Sussex. Before introducing the speaker, Mrs. Kuhring put in a strong plea for all present to contribute to the Victory Loan.

In opening her address, Mrs. Stobert showed how for years the Germans had planned to overrun the whole world, and how in places where they had conquered, Hun rule was a hell. She made a strong plea for Canadians to do everything in their power to prevent German autopower to prevent German auto-and militarism from ruling in the cracy and militarism from ruling in the world. She said that those who wanted peace were either ignorant fools, pro-Germans or profiteers who looked for-ward to another war later on. The German government was not, she asserted, alone to blame for the war, but the Ger-

ment in every way.

After outlining her work in connection with the Belgian Red Cross, she told how, shortly after opening a hospital in Brussels, that city was captured by the Germans. She with several oth demned to be shot within twenty-four nours, how she was dragged through the streets under guard and put in prison.

Then, learning of the Serbian need for nurses, she organized a band of brave women and some male nurses and assistants and set out for that country Mrs. Stobart was appointed to the rank of major by the Serbian government. People came in thousands some from nearly one hundred miles, to be treated at her hospitals, which were scattered all along the roadsides. More than 30,000 people in all received medi-cine from these tents and many fever cine from these tents and many fever patients were nursed back to life.

The speaker paid a warm tribute to the courage of the English nurses and also to the Serbian priests and their bravery under fire. She said that the wrong impression held of the Serbians by the people of this country previous to the war, had come from German and Austrian sources. She stated that the Austrian sources. She stated that the Serbian soldiers were brave, generous, orderly under fire and dignified in retreat. A coarse word had never been heard from a Serbian soldier while, in

Concluding, she said that the enemy were doing their best to exterminate the Serbian nation, and had bragged that Serbian nation, and had bragged that Serbia may exist but there will be no more Serbians. The people had, in some instances, been placed within wire enclosures on the edges of pits, shot down in hundreds and buried in the pit. Children had either been killed or sent to Austria and Asia Minor to be educated and denationalized. Serbia has sacrificed her country, in fact everything she has prized, but Serbia is fighting on.
Canadians who know what freedom is, should, she thought, help Serbia.
Mayor Hayes, in moving a vote of thanks to the lecturer, said that the trials of Belgium and France were not the second of the service to be compared with those of Serbia, and that those in more fortunate countries should press forward with a great-er determination to win the war. 



The lord chancellor, in proposing the toasts to Canada and Newfoundland, said that, regarding Newfoundland, all had been impressed with the part that colony had played in contributing men to the British navy and also in sending contingents to fight our battles on land. Mr. Blondin, he said, had a most distinguished career and had shown in the most conspicuous way his devotion to the great imperial interests of the empire to which his fellow countrymen belonged. Referring to the elections, the lord chancellor said it was very difficult for any speaker here to say anything about such a contest, but it was the greatest possible satisfaction to Britons to know that all parties in Canada were united in the determination to do everything possible to help the mother country in the great struggle for freedom.

The effect of this is that in the month of January the wife or other dependent of every soldier hitherto in receipt of \$20 per month will recive \$30, the extra \$10 representing the increase for the two months of De-cember and January and in each month
