

A FOOD COMMISSIONER'S

VIEWS ON CANNED GOODS

Harry E. Barnard, food commissioner of Indiana, has this to say about canned goods:—

"Canned goods are not poisonous, and ptomaine poisoning is never the result of eating them, but rather the fresh foods kept in the unsanitary refrigerator—to milk, cheese, ice cream and meat salads. As a matter of fact most canned vegetables do not contain the elements necessary to the growth of the organisms that cause ptomaine poisons, nor does contact with the tin ever produce poisons.

"Wide publicity has recently been given a story telling of the poisoning of an entire family by food prepared in a rusty tin pail. Such a story is absurd, at least so far as the attempt to blame the container is concerned. There is nothing in rusting iron or tin to produce liness. Another fallacy common to the kitchen is that as soon as a tin of food is opened the contents should be poured into some other receptacle.



(Nothing daunted the men of the Anglia, their officers, and the men of other ships kept at the work of rescue and rapidly, though even then, all too slow-ly, the wounded were transferred to boats. Some of the wounded, unable to retain their precarious footing, slipped into the sea, from which they were snatched in the nick of time by sailors, many of whom plunged overboard the better to help in the rescue.

(Others on the Anglia jumped overboard, but all the while the nurses worked with the crew with marked devotion to transfer their patients to the boats.

(Soon the Anglia had settled so far by the head, that one of her propellors was clear of the water. The other, still revolving, gave a circular motion to the domed vessel, adding tenfold to the difficulties of the rescuers. But nothing discouraged them and the sailors kept on, their hopes running high that all would be saved.

(The end came with dramatic suddenness. With wounded, nurses, doctors and sailors still clinging to the stern, the Anglia seemed for one brief second to stand on her bows, and then she disappeared.

(But even now the Red Cross on her mainmast flaunts six feet clear above the troubled waters of the channel, marking the spot where many brave men and women, too, it is feared, sleep in their last sleep."

London, Nov. 17—Both the military and diplomatic situation of the Ailles in the Balkans are disquietins, if not critical, a fact which, doubtless, led to the visit of the British prime minister, Mr. Asquith, David Lloyd George and A. J. Balkour to Paris for a conference with the French cabinet and General Joffre, the French commander-in-chief.







GOLF OUTGROWING ALL OTHER GAMES

Has Become Baseball's Greatest Rival in Canada and United States-Interesting Statistics by

Golf has had such a remarkable growth in the last ten years and the number of new courses is growing at such a wonderful rate that it is difficult to accurately estimate the cost of the game, which is baseball's greatest rival. Jerome Travers, who is in many ways the greatest golfer ever developed in the United States, estimates that there are 1,800 golf clubs in Canada and the United States, with a membership of \$50,000. He estimates that the average membership is 250, though many clubs have a much larger membership. Yet, in spite of this remarkable record, four new courses are to be constructed on Long Island this spring.

Champion Travers has compiled some interesting statistics regarding golf. He figures that the average yearly expense for the man who takes up the sport for the first time is about \$192.50. He proportions it as follows: Initiation, \$50; dues, \$50; balls, \$20; clubs, \$17.50; car fare, \$20; caddies, \$25. With the exception of the initiation fees and dues, this is a reasonable estimate.

Travers estimates that the 350,000 golfers will spend \$42,000,000 and that the initiation will be \$17,500,000 a year more. He says that the average acreage of the 1,300 clubs is 100 acres which is a triffe higher when the number of nine-hole courses is considered. He places a value of \$600 an acre, or a total valuation of \$78,000,000.

hole courses will run over \$10,000 a year. He says that the cost of the club, averaging seven clubs to the bag, is \$6,-125,000. Figuring that each player will buy an average of one ball a year, he estimates a further outlay of \$875,000 for clubs.

Travers believes the average professional earns about \$1,200 a year. This gives a total of \$390,000. He says the caddies earn about \$60 a week, or a total of \$3,000,000 a year. He places the value of the golf real estate at \$100,000,000, and says that \$50,000,000 more is spent each year for laborers and caddles. He says that fully \$00,000 men and boys are employed by the golf clubs. This estimate would give the following table:
