SEEK X-RAY CLUES IN AGES-OLD TOOTH

Nebraska Discovery Believed to Prove Something Like Human Life 1,000,000 Years Ago.

human type or something entirely different.

This tooth, which is believed by Dr. Milo Hellman to prove that something like a human being lived on this continent above a thousand thousand years ago, is being compared with teeth extracted from the skull of a full-grown gorilla in Washington, and with teeth of human beings, anthropoids and hundreds of other animals.

Dr. W. K. Gregory of the American Museum believes that the tooth resembles most closely that of the chimpanzee. His associate, Dr. Hellman, thinks it closer to the human. It is almost equally interesting to scientists in either case, because there are no other remains indicating that either man or the higher anthropoids existed on this continent except in comparatively recent times.

If subhuman, the tooth is the oldest known relic of anything approaching the Home Sapiens, as man is conceitedly termed by scientists. One British scientist, who had not seen the original tooth, suggested that it might belong to a bear or to a carnivore. The X-ray pictures, however, bear out the theory that it is human or anthropoid.

An Ounce of Prevention.

If a blanket is placed over the hood during the cold winter days and nights it prevents the full chilling of the motor, even after it has remained ide for several hours. The purpose of this is not to make starting easier, but to decrease danger of cracking the cylinders when the intense heat of the ignited gas takes place.

Engine Efficiency.

The greatest amount of efficiency from an automobile engine while in operation is obtained when the cooling water has a temperature of from 170 to 180 degrees. If a lower temperature, the gasoline vapor has a tendency to condense, causing poor engine operation and carbon deposit. If of a higher temperature the water will evaporate quickly and boil.

Battery Care.

When adding distilled water to the cells of a battery, a motorist should always take the car out for a run immediately afterward. Otherwise it will remain at the top and freeze during the cold weather.

Mexico City, Jan. 2—(By Mail From The Associated Press)—Conceived in jest and at first accepted by the nation in the same spirit, the Fascisti movement in Mexico has made such rapid strides during the last few weeks that it is now reckoned as an important political factor which doubtless will figure largely in the presidential elections two years hence.

Starting in the small City of Jalapa, capital of the State of Vera Cruz, it was declared even by its founders to be a mere local society without definite aim and certainly not nation-wide in its scope. The name Fascisti, was adopted more because of its present popularity than because of the ideals sponsored by the Italian organisation. But certain persons who have suffered at the hands of a government which has pressed down rather harshly on property owners during the last ten years, grasped at the movement as a safe and effective means to protest against alleged injustice. It offered an opportunity for the landed classes to fight certain radical reform laws that have been imposed on them during the last few years. Without becoming actual revolutionists against central unthority, they were able through the new society to organize their interests with a view to gaining sufficient strength ultimately to make demands on the Mexico City Government.

Law Introduced in the U.S. Senate Would Make Divorce More Difficult.

riage and divorce law, drafted under the supervision of Mrs. Edward Franklin White, assistant attorney-general of Indiana, was introduced in the Senate this week by Senator Capper, with a resolution which proposes an enabling amendment to the constitution, so that if the law is passed it will meet the tests of the courts. 






