### Schwartz Four Months In Bolshevik Prison

WAS PUT IN GAS FILLED AND RAT INFESTED DUNGEON
BECAUSE HE PEEPED—WAS RELEASED BY WIFE'S
HUNGER STRIKE WHICH RESULTED IN HER
DEATH

Berlin, Feb. 5—(By the Associated
Press)—Bolshevik prison methods lack all elements of decency and civilization, says M. Schwartz, California socialists and labor leader who with his wife was attrown into Bolshevist prisons in Moscow for four months after he had failed to voice approval of the Bolshevist government. His wife died of the affects of a hunger strike started while in prison, as he has made known in previous statements.

"My first two months in prison were the worst," Mr. Schwartz said after arriving in Berlin. "My wife, who cold not speak a word of any language but English, was taken from me. I did not know whether she was in the same prison, or what had become of her. Manitoba Plans to Finance Most Provincial Undertakings by Savings Banks.

Winnipeg, Man., Feb. 23.—The majority of the undertakings of the province will ultimately be financed by the provincial savings banks, Hon. Edward Brown, provincial treasurer, states.

Announcement was made recently by E. A. Weir, chairman of the provincial savings banks, that deposits already exceed \$1,750,000. He predicted that the \$4,000,000 mark will be reached before the end of the fiscal year. A comprehensive plan for opening branches in every centre of the province is being drafted and will be carried into effect as soon as conditions warrant the extension of the service. Many new accounts are being opened daily at the six branches operating in Manitoba.




