HUN EMIGRANTS LEAVE FOR BRAZIL

Montreal, Jan. 5.—A cable to the Montreal Gazette from The Hague says: The first 217 German emigrants to leave Europe since before the war sailed from Rotterdam on Saturday morning for Brazil. They were most unlike the pre-war emigrants. They mostly had the appearance of Bavarian farmers and skilled workmen. Three thousand more are expected soon, also bound for Brazil, and it is expected that Rotterdam will become the great emigration port of the future. More than 100 Germans, who were not allowed to pass the frontier, are camping in a train at Bentheim, awaiting a laissez-passer from the Dutch minister of justice.

THE NEW SPIRIT.

Crop statistics, trade statistics, the small failure record, the building record and all others that indicate conditions of prosperity or otherwise show that 1919 was a profitable year in this province. Merchants at the end of the year found themselves with very moderate stocks of goods, and these in good demand. The new year opens very favorably for them as well as for the farmers, and the large lumber cut proves that confidence prevails in the lumbering industry.

Recognition of the cheerfulness of the outlook does not, however, imply that there is any cause for extravagance in any direction. Conditions generally have not yet got back to normal. The thing to do with accumulating money is to invest it in industry or save it. There is need for thrift as well as for increased production.

Whether 1920 proves to be a prosperous year, marked by much practical growth in New Brunswick, depends upon the spirit prevailing among the people. They can do great team-work if they will, and make a record to which they may point with pride when another year asks for an accounting of their stewardship as citizens. That a new spirit prevails in St. John is obvious to every close observer, and it could not come at a better time.

PROHIBITION.

In seven days, from Dec. 22 to Dec. 29, Fredericton doctors issued 1,387 prescriptions for liquor.

In Woodstock one doctor issued 136 such prescriptions in one day.

In Bathurst one doctor issued 267 such prescriptions in one day.

In St. John just prior to Christmas the number of medical prescriptions for liquor filled by vendors showed a very great increase.

The number of drug stores in the province is increasing more rapidly than usual.

Any person may now import liquor into the province for his or her own personal use.

There is the further well established fact that some public establishments high in the social scale wink at violations of the law.

In fairness to those charged with the enforcement of the prohibitory law these facts must be kept in mind, as well as the other facts that there is a large number of persons not only willing but eager to make money out of the illegal traffic, and many others ready to pay a high price for the goods.

FOR THE BOYS AND GIRLS.

About eighty members of the St. John Boys' Club were guests of the Y. M. C. A. on Saturday evening. It was only necessary to see them on the gymnasium floor, or in the swimming tank, or absorbed in the action of a moving picture upstairs, to realize how much such an evening meant to them, apart entirely from the refreshments served before they went home.

There are, however, very many hundreds of boys in St. John who have no club privileges, because there are no facilities. Neither is there provision for girls' clubs. The reason is that there are not enough older persons willing to forego their own pleasures to find the higher pleasure gained in service for the underprivileged portion of the community.

Even in the well-organized church activities the cry is for leaders and helpers. The Boy Scout movement languishes for lack of leaders. Clever and intelligent young men and women could not better prove their desire to help their native city than by planning to give some of their leisure time to the girls and boys who are to be helped or hindered in their development in proportion to the interest older persons take in their welfare.

The round-up and deportation of Reds is to be continued in the United States. This naturally suggests that in Canada we should be particularly careful as to the class of immigrants permitted to enter the country.

The next week should see hundreds of men and women and working boys and girls registered to join the evening vocational and household economy classes in this city.

Attention in England is directed toward the steadily growing political strength of the Labour party, which some people predict will control the next House of Commons.

When Carranza or Villa or some other agitator cannot get up a disturbance of some kind in Mexico the earth quakes and continues the casualty list. Life in Mexico is never without its thrills of one kind or another.



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EAST INDIES TRY TO MEET DEMANDS

Remarkable Examples of Home Market Expansion Due to War Requirements Are Given.

Recent industrial developments in India provide remarkable examples of home market expansion due to war demands, to the failure of external sources of supply, and to war restrictions on imports which encouraged domestic manufacturers. In Calcutta, for instance, impetus has been given to the tanning industry and to the manufacture of leather goods, and it has been discovered that Bengal has an inexhaustible supply of both vegetable and chemical tanning materials. A very large amount of capital, mainly British, has now been invested in the tanning and leather industries, and the government of Bengal has approved a scheme for a research tannery in Calcutta.

SAYS KAISER IS SPIRITUALLY TORN

Dutch Writer Expresses Pity and Makes Appeal for Former Ruler of Huns.

Berlin, Jan. 3.—The Hague correspondent of the Tagblatt gives a rather unusual picture of the former German emperor.

was only just noticeable, has so increased that it is apparent at a glance and dominates his entire appearance. The Kaiser has become very corpulent, though he eats little.

"The Kaiser's attitude is still soldierly, but he appears to have grown shorter. It is noticeable how slowly he speaks, in contradiction to his old habit. He lives up only when reminiscences of the old days come to him. This often occurs in the middle of a conversation. Only pity can be felt for the Kaiser on such occasions. No one who has seen him at Amerongen and as capable of responsible impression believes that this man, who is spiritually torn and shows it in his body, will ever play an active role in any form whatsoever. By the grinding experiences of war, the blow of a breakdown and worry about his future, which constantly torments him, the deeper impulses of his will are dulled."

In the opinion of the correspondent the former emperor has purchased Doorn

House as proof that he has given up any thoughts of returning to Germany. "He no longer expresses the wish to return to Germany," says the writer. "He believes Germany is lost. More than ever he believes he has been betrayed by his councillors and the whole people."

The former ruler's letters are censored by the Dutch, who are declared to be not inconsiderate and not unaturally severe. The correspondent makes an appeal for the former emperor.

FLOODS IN FRANCE NEAR THE CREST

Paris, Jan. 5.—The Seine has risen more than a foot in the last day, but reports from up the river, with good weather, have caused the government to announce that a few more inches rise will be the maximum, which will continue for two days and then the river will fall. The Marne also is rising, but

the other rivers are stationary or subsiding. Only two deaths are reported. Scores of villages are inundated and probably many thousands of homes flooded.

The people on upper floors are being supplied with provisions by boats. Twelve tramway lines in Paris suspended service yesterday morning in the low-lying sections.

MR. CHURCHILL ON MOTHERLAND POLITICS

London, Jan. 5.—Winston Spencer Churchill secretary of state for war, speaking at Sunderland, declared a return to party government in England at this time would simply mean turning the country over to the Labor party. This party, he charged, was insufficiently schooled in the method of conducting the government, and would bring the country to grief.

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

Settlement has been reached in the dispute between the coal miners and operators in Sydney, N. S. It will be submitted to the MacKinnon conciliation board for ratification.

Sir William Hearst, former premier of Ontario, has been appointed to the International Waterways Joint Commission. The salary is said to be \$8,000 a year.

The last lot of United States soldiers who have been doing final detail work in Paris have left upon their return home.

In three fires in Montreal on Saturday night eleven families were rendered homeless.

The schooner Madonna, from a Newfoundland port for Sydney, N. S., is aground on Petite Point, outside Sydney harbor.

The railway employees in Great Britain were officially informed of the government's proposals as to wages at a meeting in London on Saturday and rejected them as unsatisfactory.

Sinn Fein raided a police barracks on Carrington Hill, Cork, on Saturday, and blew up part of the building besides taking the garrison prisoners. They left after seizing all arms and ammunition.

Six Egyptian princes have joined the Nationalist party in a manifesto just issued asking for the complete independence of Egypt.

The directors of the Nova Scotia Tramways & Power Company have passed the half-yearly dividend amounting to \$132,000. The rate was six per cent. It is understood that a request for a new scale of charges on the tramway will be made soon.

The farmers of Parker's Point and Lower St. Mary's, near Fredericton, have organized a branch of the United Farmers of New Brunswick. There are now more than fifteen branches of the association in New Brunswick.

TWO BRAVE SOLDIER
BROTHERS OF F. E. L.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., Jan. 4.—In St. Paul's Anglican church yesterday, a tablet in memory of the Warburton brothers, sons of Dr. George Warburton of Charlottetown, at present residing in Vancouver was unveiled. Richard was killed in action in France. Hugh, a Rhodes scholar, who had been in the service of the British government in Rhodesia and had seen service against the Germans in the Kamerons, was drowned when returning to Liberia after a furlough, his ship being torpedoed.

James A. Brannen, a Canadian, has been appointed British vice-consul at Boston. Capt. Gloster Armstrong, British consul at Boston, is to become consul general at New York. The British vice-consul, J. B. Keating, of Portland, has been appointed consul for Maine.

HEREBY Require all persons liable to be rated for the year 1920 forthwith to furnish to the Assessors true statements of all their personal estate and income, which is assessable under "The St. John City Assessment Act 1918," and true statements of wages or salaries paid to employees, and hereby give notice that blank forms on which such statements may be furnished may be obtained at the Office of the Assessors, and that such statements must be perfected under oath and filed in said office within thirty days from the date of this notice. EXTRACTS FROM "THE SAINT JOHN CITY ASSESSMENT ACT 1918"

30. (1). Every person liable to taxation under this Act, shall make the following returns:

(a). A return of his personal property located in the City of St. John and taxable under section 5 of this Act.

(b). Income taxable under section 6, and the particulars thereof, except when the total taxable income is included in the return of an employer as provided in sub-section 2 of this section.

(c). Earnings or receipts taxable under section 8 and the particulars thereof.

(2). Every person employing the services or labor of another person or of other persons shall make a statement giving the name and address of every person employed by him and the amount of wages, salaries, or other compensation paid to such employee or employees. Every firm, co-partnership, or corporation shall make a statement of the salaries, allowances, or other compensation of partners or officers.

(3). The return or statement required by this section shall be made on or before the tenth day of February in each year, in such form as the assessors shall from time to time prescribe, and shall be made under oath which may be sworn to before any assessor, or any Justice of the Peace of the City and County of Saint John, or any Notary Public; and for the purposes of this Act, and of all other laws relating to the levying, assessing and collecting of rates and taxes in the City of Saint John, any assessor and any Justice of the Peace of the City and County of Saint John, and any Notary Public, shall have full power and lawful authority to take affidavits and affirmations, and administer oaths, in any matter whatsoever relating to rates, taxes and assessments in the City of Saint John.

32. If no return, or a fraudulent, incorrect or insufficient return, has been filed by a person required to file a return under the provisions of this Act, and the person in default refuses or neglects, after notice, to file a proper return the assessors shall determine the personal property or income of such person taxable under this Act, according to their best information and belief, and shall assess the same at double the amount so determined. In the case of sickness, absence, or other disability of a person liable to the tax the assessors may allow such further time for filing the return as they may deem necessary.

33. If the assessors discover from the verification of a return filed under this Act, or otherwise, that the income of any person subject to taxation under this Act, or any portion thereof, has not been assessed, they may at any time within two years after the time when such assessment should have been made, assess the same, first giving notice to the person to be so assessed of their intention, and such person shall thereupon have an opportunity within ten days after such notification to confer with the assessors in person or by counsel or by other representative as to the proposed assessment. After the expiration of ten days from such notification the assessors shall assess the income of such person subject to taxation, or any portion thereof which they believe has not theretofore been assessed, and the tax shall be payable fourteen days after the date of such notice. The provisions of this Act in respect to the collection of taxes shall apply to a tax so assessed.

47. No person shall have an abatement unless he has filed with the assessors the statement under oath within the time required; nor shall the Common Council or the Board of Revision in any such case sustain an appeal from the judgment of the assessors unless said Common Council or Board of Revision shall be satisfied that there was good cause why the statement was not filed in due time as herein provided.

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LABOR GAINS
IN STRENGTH AT
BRITISH POLLS

London, Jan. 3.—Laborites were elated by the surprise result in the Spen Valley by-election, where the workingmen's candidate, Tom Myers, carried the seat against such a strong parliamentary as Sir John Simon, former secretary for home affairs. Even the most fervent supporter of the Labor party did not foresee such a victory, although prepared for a big poll after the recent elections had shown the unsuspected strength of their adherents in every part of the country, even in the most purely agricultural districts.

The turnover of votes has been very heavy on every occasion where a Laborite has entered the fight during the recent by-elections. This time a Laborite in the Spen Valley increased the poll from 8,508 to 11,862, while in Plymouth, the Laborite vote rose from 5,284 to 9,292; and at Rushmore from 2,824 to 6,412. At Bromley, where hitherto there had been no Labor candidate, in the late by-election the Labor candidate polled 10,077, and at St. Albans, a Laborite, making a bid for a formerly uncontested seat, secured 6,908 votes.

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

**ZIMMERMAN MAY
JOIN THE PIRATES**

Was Suspended by McGraw Last Year—Friend of "Mooney" Gibson.
New York, Jan. 3.—According to information received from a reliable source, Heinie Zimmerman will wear the uniform of the Pittsburgh Pirates next season. It is said that a deal involving the big third sacker now is on between the Pittsburg club and the Giants, but fur-

ther action on the proposed trade or sale will be deferred until the return of John McGraw from Cuba. Zimmerman was suspended by McGraw toward the close of the last season for violating the Giant leader's training rules, and at that time and on several occasions since McGraw has declared that Heinie never again will appear in the batting order of the local club. The report that the Pirates are angling for Zimmerman is significant in that it follows closely on the heels of the appointment of George Gibson as manager of the Pittsburg club. When Gibson was a member of the Giants he and Heinie were room-mates and close friends.

**BIDS \$400,000
FOR BIG FIGHT**

Coffroth's Offer Accepted for Dempsey for 45 Rounds with Carpenter.

Los Angeles, Cal., Jan. 4.—Jack Kearns, manager of Jack Dempsey, announced tonight he had accepted an offer of a \$400,000 purse from James W. Coffroth for a forty-five round fight between Dempsey and Georges Carpentier at Tijuana, lower California.

"It's up to Coffroth now to sign up Carpentier," said Kearns, "and I understand he has a representative, Charles Harvey, in Europe now trying to do just that. "This is the most satisfactory offer we have had. We are willing to accept it on a winner or loser basis, perhaps, \$300,000 for the winner and \$100,000 for the loser.

"Coffroth may not want the motion picture rights, but whether he does or not, we will want a percentage of them and all other privileges." Kearns' announcement was made after he was offered Cochran's \$200,000 bid for a fight between Dempsey and Carpentier. Coffroth is president of the Lower California Jackery Club.

Cochran's Statement.

Chicago, Jan. 5.—Charles Cochran, an English theatrical magnate who proposes to promote in London a world's championship fight between Jack Dempsey and Georges Carpentier, is pushing his plans. He was here on other business yesterday and said he had sent a personal representative to Los Angeles to confer with Dempsey's manager. Cochran has offered Dempsey a guarantee of \$200,000, and says he will guarantee the champion ten weeks of the theatrical engagements in England and France at \$5,000 a week.

He also said that he not only has the French champion's signature to a contract calling for \$105,000 but has advanced \$25,000 to Carpentier. "London is the logical place for the battle," said Mr. Cochran. "It is neutral ground. We have there all the facilities necessary for staging a world's championship and can be assured that our investment will be secure." Cochran will return to New York today.

Los Angeles, Cal., Jan. 4.—Commenting on the Cochran offer, Kearns said: "I will not consider anything less than \$250,000, and his offer of \$5,000 a week does not interest me. Dempsey got \$15,000 a week in this theatrical engagements right here in America. If those European promoters want to get Dempsey for anything, they'll have to pay double."

New York, Jan. 5.—In a conference at the Hotel Billmore, Dr. Mullens, manager of the middleweight champion, Mike O'Dowd, signed an agreement with the Turner-Harris syndicate, composed of eminent theatrical folk, to let O'Dowd meet Georges Carpentier. A purse of \$200,000 is hung up by this syndicate, sixty per cent to the victor and forty to the loser. This offer has been cabled to the Frenchman.



Ferry Which Plies Between Indian town and Pleasant Point.

The ferry steamer E. Ross, which has for years given service between Indian town and Pleasant Point, has been sold to the St. John Drydock & Shipbuilding Co., Ltd., by her owner, Captain James Leonard. This is a serious matter with people who live in Milford and have to depend upon the ferry to bring them to the city, but it is understood that arrangements have been made whereby the E. The drydock company will use the ferry about the harbor and courtesy Bay in towing and for odd purposes in connection with their work.

Dr. H. S. Bridges, superintendent of schools, said this morning that the opening attendance was good, especially in the High school, where all the rooms were well filled. One or two rooms in Centennial school had to be dismissed because the thermometer registered only 40, but otherwise the cold weather had not interfered to any extent.

WANTS TO BUY OUR REFINERY

New York Firm Hears Atlantic Plant is Idle—Refinery Again in Full Operation.

St. John may be only pin point on the map, but her industries are watched with hawk-like eyes by business people in the larger centres as evidence by a letter received from New York by the secretary of the board of trade. In the communication the writer said that he understood there was an idle sugar refinery in the city which might be for sale or for lease, and he asked for particulars as to capacity, ground space, wharf accommodation, etc. It is supposed that the origin of the enquiry was the report published some time ago that the refinery had temporarily stopped manufacturing on account of a delay in the arrival of shipments of raw sugar. It was said today at the refinery, however, that the plant was in full operation again this morning, that a good supply of raw sugar was on hand, and several other large consignments on the way or ready to be shipped. It was also said that the plant is neither for sale nor lease.

MATTER OF KING STREET VAULTS

Action Taken by Council on Letter by Senator Thorne—The Question of Automobile Taxes.

The city commissioners this morning in committee took up the matter of vault spaces in the city, and in King street. Commissioner Fisher moved that a letter from Senator Thorne regarding rental charged by the city for these spaces be acknowledged and Mr. Thorne be advised that the council does not see any unfairness in the city collecting rent for their use by property owners, and that there does not seem to be any record of permission having been granted by the city for their construction and use; and further, that a suggestion be made to Mr. Thorne that the city be willing to relieve from rental charges any vaults or portions of vaults which are used only as passageways for coal or merchandise to or from the buildings, such use to be allowed only until such time as the city may require to place pipes or conduits through or across the vault spaces. The motion was carried.

Mr. Fisher explained that in the case of the Bank of Montreal, the matter was taken up before the police court and a decision given against the bank. The supreme court also decided an appeal against the bank and it was understood that they were now contemplating bringing the matter before the legislature. Commissioner Jones brought up the matter of compensation to the widow of Fred Nice, a member of the water department, who died recently. He said that as the Workmen's Compensation Board under the act apply to the widow \$20 a month, he was of the opinion that it was not necessary for the council to vote any pecuniary assistance. He said that in another similar case recently no action was taken by the council.

A letter received from the common clerk from E. S. Carter was read, advising the council that the government was to meet in Fredericton on Tuesday evening at 9 o'clock and they would meet a delegation from the council to discuss the matter of sharing with the city the taxes from automobile licenses and fines under the prohibition act. The common clerk was instructed to advise Mr. Carter that it would be impossible to send the delegation tomorrow and to ask if a delegation could wait on the government at their next session in St. John, Special Council Meeting.

An amended plan of the West Side shore fishing lots was approved and adopted at a special meeting of the common council on noon today. The plan takes in lots J, K, L, M and N and the changes include a revision of the line of low water, which restricts to original area slightly. The lots are to be sold at public auction at the county court rooms tomorrow morning. Mr. Bullock, in presenting the resolution, said that it was under consideration to use part of this area for the dumping of ballast, but that the matter was taken up further and would be brought before the council later. Commissioner Bygones was authorized to engage an auctioneer to see the fisheries.

OFFER ROAMER TO N. Y. NATURAL HISTORY MUSEUM
New York, Jan. 5.—The body of Roamer, a thoroughbred which set the world's record of 135.5 for one mile, has been offered to the Metropolitan Museum of Natural History for preservation. The offer was made by Mrs. Andrew Miller, widow of a sportsman, who died last Wednesday, the same day the race was killed.
