ONTARIO MAN IS ACQUITTED OF CHARGE OF MURDERING WIFE

North Bay, Ont., March 27.—John Marcell of Sturgeon Falls, who was accused of the murder of his wife about a year ago, was acquitted yesterday after a two day trial. The crown charged that Marcell had killed his wife and then set fire to the building to destroy the evidence of his guilt.

The defence contended that the residence of the Marcellis accidentally caught fire, and that the husband was unable to reach the wife to save her, but had saved his niece, nine years old.

The jury decided that the crown had failed to prove that a murder had been committed.





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PROVINCIAL FINANCES.

Provincial Secretary Murray anticipates increased revenue this year from crown lands, motor vehicle and amusement taxes. Looking over the estimates one realizes how few are the sources of provincial revenue apart from the Dominion subsidy and the crown lands. It is estimated that taxes on incorporated companies will yield \$76,000 this year; succession duties, \$75,000; railway taxes, \$37,200 provincial hospital, \$31,000; prohibition, \$40,000; and a few other sources from \$2,000 to \$23,000 each—a small share indeed of the total of \$2,064,880.19 which is the whole estimate for the year. It is to the territorial revenue, estimated for this year at \$699,500, and the Dominion subsidy of \$687,976.16 we must look for the great bulk of the money to be expended.

When we turn to the expenditure we find the largest item to be that of interest, amounting to \$599,600, which cuts a very large hole in the receipts. Of course the great spending department is that of public works, which calls this year for \$441,600; but the people have the satisfaction of knowing that the money spent on roads and bridges is not squandered, and includes not only repairs and improvements but an amount of permanent work in striking contrast to the record of former governments. The chief reason for opposition attacks upon the minister of public works is the fact that he is demonstrating that with a limited appropriation the roads and bridges can be greatly improved.

The next large item is for education, \$298,785, and it is really not large enough. It is very gratifying, however, that there is to be an increased grant for vocational training, which with aid expected from the federal treasury will be of very great benefit in giving vocational training a fair start in New Brunswick. The estimated expenditure of \$127,000 for the provincial hospital is a sad necessity, but the institution is admirably conducted and yields back a revenue estimated for this year at \$51,000. It will be seen that the four items named make up a total of \$1,876,985, of the total estimated expenditure of \$2,064,880.19. There are still the items of agriculture, forest service and many smaller ones, each calling for more or less expenditure. The government finds it necessary to economize in directions where it would desire to give assistance, and the reason is plain. It must cut its garment according to the cloth. Whether it always makes the very wisest apportionment of the revenue to be expended is a perfectly proper subject of debate, but that Premier Foster and his colleagues exercise their best judgment in the interests of the province is recognized by all except extreme partisans who would not give the smallest degree of credit to political opponents.

One extract from the speech of the provincial secretary, telling of last year's greater production, tells a very gratifying story of productive energy and general prosperity. It is as follows:—

"In 1917 the estimated value of wheat grown in the province was \$692,886, in 1918 the total value was \$2,188,700, an increase of \$1,595,814. Oats grown in the province in 1917 had a value of \$4,470,403, while in 1918 the value was \$6,877,400, an increase of \$2,406,997. As for buckwheat there were no statistics available for 1917, but in 1918 the crop was valued at \$2,240,250. The value of barley grown in 1918 was \$298,652. In regard to potatoes the crop in 1917 was valued at \$6,140,849, and in 1918 at \$9,097,800, an increase of \$2,956,951. As for turnips the crop in 1917 was worth \$954,741, while in 1918 its estimated value was \$2,591,000, an increase of \$1,636,259."

AN EXCELLENT SPEECH.

Hon. C. W. Robinson does not often address the legislature, but when he does the house hears a very clear exposition of government policy and the state of provincial affairs. His reply yesterday to the speech of the leader of the opposition not only made clear the state of provincial finances and the very proper method of book-keeping the government has adopted, but neatly exposed the record of the former government in piling up the debt and the expenditure, and in making a mess of Valley Railway affairs. Mr. Robinson said truly that the financial future of the province is a matter of grave concern, because of the debt that has been piled up and the fact that the Valley Railway has not yet been taken over by the federal government, and failure as yet to get a proper adjustment of proper claims against the Dominion. So far as the administration of affairs by the former government is concerned, the member for Moncton disposed of opposition criticisms in a very effective manner. That was a neat rejoinder when he replied to Mr. Tilley's complaint that the government did not take enough suggestions from the opposition. Mr. Robinson had remarked that the suggestion that Valley Railway interests be charged to capital account had been made by the ex-attorney general, and that many good suggestions came from the gentlemen opposite.

"The trouble is you don't take them," said Mr. Tilley. "Well," said Mr. Robinson, "I think we will take that one. Bring along all you have. With such a galaxy of brains in opposition no doubt there will be many suggestions which will assist in keeping the government in power."

DAYLIGHT SAVING

This evening's meeting in the interests of daylight saving should be well attended. The Board of Trade, Rotary Club and Retail Merchants' Association are already on record in favor of daylight saving. If the Trades and Labor Council agrees with that of Montreal it will also support the measure. The American Federation of Labor has shown that its adoption in the United States last year resulted in a great diminution in the number of accidents in factories because there was not so much need for artificial light. If parliament does not adopt the measure the legislature of the province can adopt it for New Brunswick, or it can give centres like St. John the power to do so for themselves. The railways have adopted it and there will be hopeless confusion if the general time does not conform.

THE BOLSHEVIKI.

Col. Raymond Robins makes what he regards as a conclusive argument for hands off the Bolshevists when he says: "The Russian people have the right to have the kind of government that the Russian people want, and no government set up by foreign rifles will ever be maintained except by foreign rifles." Col. Robins will perhaps remember that the German people had the same right to the kind of government they wanted, until that government became a menace to the world. That the Bolshevists are an equal if not greater menace to the world is admitted by Col. Robins himself in another statement as follows: "It is my deliberate judgment that Lenin and Trotsky are sincere international Socialist revolutionists engaged in a world revolutionary enterprise which they have followed sincerely at the risk of their lives and for which they are striking everything in the hope of a world revolution."

Col. Robins admits that their scheme is "economically impossible and morally wrong," and since it menaces the world it is in the German campaign for world-domination. Bolshevism is today a knife at the throat of civilization. The war-weary world is confronted with the simple question whether it will fight now or later, for Col. Robins assures us that Lenin and Trotsky aim at nothing less than world-wide revolution. They have created a situation in central and eastern Europe that is intolerable. The unfortunate part of it is that the Allied nations are not taking the grip with this new enemy as they did with Germany. If they temporize, Lord Milner's remark that army and navy estimates must be kept up is an obvious truth.

The death of Mr. John Reade, of the Montreal Gazette staff, removes an eminent Canadian writer whose literary contributions were for many years a very notable feature of the pages of the Gazette. A clear thinker, of very wide reading and fine literary style, he delighted his readers and made a distinct mark in the Canadian journalism of his time. His passing will be sincerely mourned by all within the circle of those who knew and appreciated his worth.

It is a relief to learn that conditions in Egypt are improving. Britain does not want an Egyptian war on her hands at present, and it would be very bad for Egypt, where irresponsible agitators are seeking to foment rebellion. What Britain has done for Egypt is one of the bright pages in her history, and should be most appreciated by its people.

If the people of St. John want daylight saving, and parliament does not adopt the motion of the member for Vancouver, Mayor Hayes gives notice that there must be an unmistakable expression of public sentiment. Remembering what happened in 1917 the mayor is justified in the stand he takes.

The McQueen report is before the house at Fredericton today. There can be no dodging the issue. The authors of the patriotic potato and Valley Railway deals must face their record. How many members of the opposition will answer the crack of the Standard's whip and support a whitewash?

The Ontario government has submitted a bill to give women the right to sit in the legislature. The creation of a federal board of health will be a distinct forward step of the highest importance to Canada. Ominous conditions in Central Europe are speeding up the work of the peace conference.





MILNER IN CHARGE OF TRIUMPHAL PARADE OF COLONIAL TROOPS

London, March 26.—(By Canadian Association Press Cable)—It is understood that Lord Milner, British secretary of war, is giving his personal attention to the question of the ceremonial parade through London by the dominion troops before their departure for home.

Many newspapers here are constantly expressing regret that the overseas soldiers are being allowed to depart, practically without a send-off.

The transport Canada, which left England on March 24, will probably reach Halifax April 2, with 146 officers, sixty-nine cadets and 1,187 other ranks. The Scotian has left the other side for St. John with thirteen nurses, fifty-four officers, forty cadets and 1,619 other ranks, mostly men from Kimmel Camp. Only 35,000 Canadians now remain in France.

Strikes in Spain.

London, March 26.—A wireless despatch from Madrid says that strikes have been declared in various towns, including Valencia, and that negotiations are in progress in Madrid and Corunna.

CANADIAN MINISTERS SEE BATTLEFIELDS

Trip Includes Brussels, Louvain, Malines and All Famous Lines Held so Gloriously by Canadian Army.

Paris, March 26.—(Cable from Leon Trepanier)—The Canadian ministers attending the peace conference took a flying trip to the Canadian corps headquarters in Belgium, traveling by rail to Lille, and from there by automobile across the frontier to Jodoigne, where the headquarters are located. On the following morning they visited Louvain, which was destroyed by the German soldiers in the early months of the war, after which they attended the sports of the Canadian Corps in Brussels.

At the conclusion of the sports Sir Robert Borden distributed the prizes. Hon. C. J. Doherty, minister of justice, which is a short distance from Malines, and called upon Cardinal Mercier, whose heroic spirit throughout the war did so much to sustain the Belgian people. Cardinal Mercier greatly appreciated the visit, and informed the minister of justice that he intends shortly to visit Canada and the United States.

The Canadian ministers also inscribed their names at the palace, but did not, however, have an opportunity of an audience with King Albert, who was absent

on a visit to the French and American armies.

Returning to Lille, the Canadian ministers on the following day visited the historic battlefields at Ypres, St. Julien, Passchendaele and Messines. After stopping at Camblian l'Abbe, which was an important point on the Canadian lines of communication two years ago, they visited on the following day Lens, Vimy, Arras and Cambrai, as well as many portions of the famous Queant-Drocour lines, which the Canadians broke in September last. They then traveled the country over which the Canadians had fought on their way towards Mons last autumn and arrived at Cambrai early in the afternoon. Later in the day they visited Bapaume, Coarcellette and other famous battlefields in the Somme district, finally arriving at Albert and proceeding thence to Amiens and Paris.

During their visit they were guided and accompanied by Sir Arthur Currie and Canadian generals.

Opposition Leader and Hon. Mr. Robinson In Budget Debate

Fredericton, March 26.—The leader of the opposition, Mr. Murray of Kings, was in better form this afternoon when he continued the budget debate than on the occasion of his speech on the address from the throne. He was more eloquent, more diplomatic, and more impressive in manner, but the material which he had to offer was scarcely of greater value to the province and its people.

Mr. Murray attempted to remedy a breach of etiquette he had committed on the other occasion by extending belated compliments to the former speakers and to the Assessor.

His financial criticism was devoted largely to a somewhat pathetic plea for enlightenment based on his inability to understand the double-entry book-keeping system introduced this year. He dug to the statement of cash receipts and expenditures, published at the close of the year as required by statute, and corresponding to the statements published in other years. Because it did not agree in detail with the statement of the actual business transactions of the year, he confessed himself at sea on a stormy ocean of figures. He had grasped the idea that the latter statement included obligations incurred and money due on the year's business, but in his efforts to reconcile the figures entirely neglected to deduct the transactions belonging to the previous year which appeared in the 1918 cash accounts.

When Mr. Murray attempted to criticize the administration of provincial affairs during the last year, he was met with prompt challenges. He was forced to withdraw or amend more than one statement he had made and others were met with prompt denials.

HON. MR. ROBINSON'S ABLE SPEECH.

Hon. Mr. Robinson, who followed Mr. Murray, promptly rescued the opposition leader from his financial difficulties by explaining in a clear and comprehensive manner the simple but accurate system of bookkeeping which had been adopted last year and, with various illustrations, showed how the cash statement agreed with the statement of the year's actual business when the proper additions and deductions had been made. He announced that the government, in its effort to submit a balance sheet which would be free from any suspicion of being prepared for partisan purposes, or showing the transactions in a light more favorable than facts warranted, or concealing anything which should be shown, had presented as the annual balance sheet the statement prepared by the independent auditors who had audited the books.

In an amiable but effective way he took up various criticisms which had been offered by the opposition and disposed of them by frank statements of the facts of each case. There was so little of actual criticism to answer that this portion of his speech was not lengthy.

Hon. Mr. Robinson had a wider field when he dealt with some of the achievements of the present administration, and his summary of some of these achievements furnished additional reasons why the government should be continued in power.

Mr. Tilley followed Mr. Robinson.

Mr. Michaud moved the adjournment of the debate which was made the order of the day for Friday afternoon.

Government members took a hand in the game of asking questions this afternoon. Among those submitted by government members was one relating to the disposition of a check for \$450 paid out for bridge work in Kings county under the late government. Another inquiry included questions whether the government had taken steps to verify the reports published in a newspaper supporting B. F. Smith, of speeches delivered by the latter in which he had said that he had sent his check to the department for the \$2,400 balance of his potato account and whether a search had been made for this check.


AN AIRSHIP THAT WILL FLOAT ON SEA

Two Sets Named—Temporary Injunction Granted in Boston

Boston, March 27—Litigation has been started in the Massachusetts supreme court in an effort to determine which of two sets of trustees appointed by the late Mrs. Mary Baker G. Eddy has authority over the Christian Science Publishing Society.

On petition of the trustees of the society the court has issued a temporary injunction restraining the directors of the First Church of Christian Scientists from taking any action intended to interfere with the trustees in the discharge of their duties and from attempting to compel any of the trustees to resign.

The trustees of the society, appointed by Mrs. Eddy in 1888, are Herbert W. Eastace of Boston, David B. Ogden of Brookline and Lamont Rowlands of Peabody, Mass. The directors of the church, who also are trustees under laws executed by Mrs. Eddy in 1892 and 1904, are Adam H. Dickey, James A. Neal and Edward A. Merrill, all of Brookline, and William E. Rathvon of Boston. Jointly with them as defendants are John V. Dittmore and Annie M. Knott, both of Boston, each claiming to hold office as trustees and directors with the other defendants.



United States army athletic instructor,
Ankie Burns, a former St. John boy, ar-
rived in the city recently on a visit to
his father and yesterday afternoon drop-

cord books his full record would be
unknown.

England to meet Jess Willard for the
welterweight championship of the world;
he fought a draw with Ortega, a
terrible fighting Mexican-Indian, who
is possible of clinching the middle-
weight championship of the world; that
he defeated such men as Eddie Palmer,
Roy George and Johnny Mc-
Carty, and that he was a participant
in the feature bouts at the big
in Calgary in 1913 when Luther
Arthy was struck over the heart by
ur Pelky and death resulted.

When he mentioned his experiences since
he returned home, Mr. Burns said that he
started work in one of the
establishments there, but became
dissatisfied and accepted an offer to play in
a local league which offered him
remuneration. Later he became

winning a string of aprants he clinch-
ed the championship of the club and was
elected to go forth and seek honors else-
where as a result accepted a chal-

known by sport followers the pre-


