Daily Hints For the Cook

Ribbon Cake. Whites of 2 eggs, 1 1/2 cups sugar, 1 cup sweet milk, 1-2 cup butter, 8 cups flour, 3 teaspoons of baking powder, flavor with almond. Take out two layers, then add 2 tablespoons molasses, 1 tablespoon (level) cinnamon, 1 teaspoon cloves (ground), 1 cup chopped raisins, 1-2 cup citron and 1-2 cup walnut meat.

Hermits

One and one-half cups white sugar, almost a cup of shortening; any clarified drippings can be used, as the spices will kill the taste. Cream together, add 1 egg, 1-2 cup sweet milk, 1-2 teaspoon of cinnamon, same of nutmeg, 1-4 teaspoon of clove. Put 1 heaping teaspoon of baking powder into a cup of bread flour and put 1-2 cup of currants into another cup of flour. Stir these well together and add as much more flour as required. Roll out thicker than sugar cookies and cut quite large. These will keep a long time if put into a stone jar. Will improve with age.

**England Wins on Canal Tolls**

**Reversal of Exemption on American Ships by Congress; Wilson Victory**

(Bangor Commercial.)

Washington, D. C., March 10.—British preference as to Panama Canal tolls will prevail with the American Congress at Washington. That is the topic in the pockets of President Wilson's administration is being rapidly adjusted. Lawyers and law-makers will sacrifice their antagonisms. For the sake of the good opinion of nations across the water, the clause which would permit coastwise vessels of the United States to pass through the canal without payment of tolls is being repealed. Foreign comment on American disregard of treaty obligations is to be checked by vigorous action.

The good will of the English people is desired over here. International complications have been multiplying of late. There has been a feeling in the state department that diplomatic authorities were getting out of sorts with the United States. Railroad legislators, who abound here as well as in European countries, have brought the federal government more or less into disrepute abroad by enactments in conflict with treaties. President Wilson has lately been addressing himself to amending much that these radicals have done with reference to foreign relations. He is meeting with success.

**West Against Platform.**

His special message to congress, delivered in person, and asking for repeal of the canal tolls provision in the platform of the party which he had become the more convention, where the platform was nominated and where the platform was adopted, deemed it best because that coastwise vessels of the United States should be exempted from the payment of tolls. To make the President's task all the more difficult, he has emphasized several times within the last year that he did not intend to make a declaration of the Baltimore platform.

However, the situation is less reassuring to him because eminent Republicans of the senate have asserted repeatedly that the tolls exemption contained in the Hay-Pauncefote treaty, former Ambassador Choate, a Republican, has taken that position; so has Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, a Republican and the greatest authority on foreign relations in American public life. The Republicans will be barred from criticizing the president overmuch for advocating the repeal.

Readers across the Atlantic may not fully appreciate what a remarkable tribute it is to President Wilson that party majorities in senate and house are so promptly reversing themselves on this question. The payment of canal tolls for our own vessels in the coastwise trade was a lively issue in many parts of the country two years ago, when the Panama law was enacted.

The object primarily was to encourage competition against the transcontinental railroads. These railroads, for many reasons, some well founded, are very unpopular. They have undoubtedly practiced extortion over a long period. They fought the building of the canal. It seemed to outraged shippers for many years as though no relief was in prospect. Congress, well aware of this status, sought not alone to encourage competition by water lines from various ports on the Atlantic to ports on the Pacific by saying that these steamboat lines should pay no tolls through the canal, but it enacted a stringent provision by which no railroad owned ships should use the canal. The latter provision struck vigorously at the monopolization of water traffic by the big trunk lines.

**Pill a Bitter One**

But the pill has been a bitter one to swallow, because it is much asserted at Washington that Canadian railroad magnates, who saw embarrassment for their own shipping and, also indirectly for their transcontinental railroads, in the coastwise exemption clause, started the trouble by representations in London. However, President Wilson has asked the congress to repeal the exemption. The house is proceeding to do it promptly and the senate will follow. Probably within a month the law will be upon the president's desk and will have his signature.

PORT ARTHUR AND FORT WILLIAM PORT LEADS CONTINENT

Port Arthur, Ont., March 10—According to figures compiled by Joseph Redden for the Port Arthur board of trade, the combined ports of Port Arthur and Fort William, with shipments of 3,088,229 bushels of grain in the navigation year of 1913, lead all ports on the continent of America in shipments of grain, the nearest ports being far behind.

The figures for the leading ports are as follows: Port Arthur-Fort William—2,083,000 bushels.

Buffalo—1,720,000 bushels. Duluth-Superior—1,120,000 bushels. Montreal—84,000 bushels. Chicago—84,000 bushels.

The above figures are for 1913, the latest available for New York is 84,000 bushels in 1912.

Another fact brought into prominence by the same compilation of figures is the remarkable increase in the shipments from these ports in United States vessels. In four years the amount of grain taken out of Port Arthur and Fort William by United States vessels has increased by about 500 per cent, while the increase in the amount taken out in Canadian vessels during the same period has been ninety per cent.

THE LATE SHERIFF

Death Came Suddenly to S. S. deForest

A PROMINENT CITIZEN

Had Occupied Office of High Sheriff Since August 1911—Previously in Wholesale Grocery Business and Later Insurance Manager

The news of the death of Stephen S. deForest, high sheriff of St. John city and county since August 9, 1911, of which a brief announcement was made in the Times last evening, was learned with sincere regret throughout the city.

Mr. deForest, before his appointment as successor to the late Sheriff Robert R. Ritchie, had been engaged for some years as insurance manager, and had been connected with the wholesale grocery trade for the greater part of his business career, having entered this at the age of fourteen with J. & W. F. Harrison.

been connected with the wholesale grocery trade for the greater part of his business career, having entered this at the age of fourteen with J. & W. F. Harrison. He was afterwards one of the partners of de Forest, Harrison & Co., and had from the year 1888 to 1902 an interest in the firm of Hall & Forster, Ltd. When he left that house he set up in the wholesale grocery trade on his own account, keeping up a business in Dock street for a couple of years, after which he devoted his energies to insurance work, being manager for New Brunswick of the London and Lancashire Fire Insurance Company.

The late sheriff was appointed on August 9, 1911, by the local government to the office which he held till the time of his death, as successor to the late R. R. Ritchie, who had died suddenly on July 31. The appointment was made from a rather extensive list of applicants, among whom were the following: James Cowan, George S. Shaw, J. P. Massey, C. B. Lockhart, A. A. Wilson, K. C. J. A. Sinclair, Col. George W. Jones and S. S. de Forest.

Mr. de Forest was in his fifty-ninth year, and leaves his wife and three children, namely, George, Mrs. Walter Gilbert and Miss Mary de Forest, all of this city. Clarence W. also of St. John, and Harry W. of Boston, are his brothers. Two other sisters also survive him, Mrs. Charles Patterson and Miss E. L. de Forest, both of this city.

One of the four surviving charter members of the Union Club—with Henry J. Ritchie, Colonel Tucker and John McEwen—Stephen de Forest had also been president of the club. He was a member of St. George's Society. As he was universally respected and popular throughout the city where he was so well known the sheriff's death will be mourned by a host of admirers and friends. Among the members of the legal profession were the life and work of Mr. de Forest especially appreciated.

The funeral will take place tomorrow at 3 o'clock from St. James' church, of which he was a member.

A large number of passengers were on board for Halifax, going to the old country, while there were also many for the R. G. R. George, leaving here today. Three cars of mail were brought over the I. C. R. from the west for the same steamer.

WHY THERE WAS NO LIGHT

An explanation was given in the police court this morning regarding a report that John Flood, contractor in charge of the new building being erected by the Royal Bank in Main street, had neglected to have a light on the staging on Sunday night. A son of Mr. Flood said that the man whose duty it was to attend to the lighting had neglected to do so on that particular night. The magistrate said that the man who had neglected to place the light would be liable.

TRIBUTE TO THE LATE SHERIFF

In the police court this morning Hon. R. J. Ritchie expressed deep regret on hearing of the sudden death of High Sheriff S. S. deForest. He referred to him in the following words: "The late S. S. deForest was a worthy son of a very respectable merchant in this city. He was a man of integrity and was honored and respected by all classes. I have known him ever since he was a boy and regret very much to learn of his death. In his dealings with the court he was always kind and courteous and will be greatly missed."

BABY IN COURT

The police court proceedings were disturbed by the crying of an eleven months old baby today. The infant was taken to the station with its mother in the patrol wagon last night when she and another woman were arrested on charges of creating a disturbance in Benjamin Hamilton's boarding house in Mill street. They were also charged with disturbing the peace of the neighborhood. The baby disturbed the solemnity of the court by its cries, while the mother endeavored to pacify her child. The two women were warned by the magistrate and allowed to go as they are on their way to England and will sail on the S. S. Royal George. They arrived in the city yesterday from Edmonton.

Archibald, H. Youngman and A. W. Estey (skip). The winners of this match will meet the winners of the previous semi-final, J. B. Patchell, D. Rivers, P. A. Linton and Dr. W. Wawick (skip).

HON. MR. PUGSLEY HOME; IS VERY MUCH BETTER

Hon. William Pugsley returned to his home here today greatly improved in health after his visit to New York. While not fully recovered, Hon. Wm. Pugsley said that he felt very much better. He plans on returning to Ottawa soon to be present during the rest of the session.

KIRK AGAIN ARRESTED

Hartley Kirk was arrested again last night on charge of being drunk in King Square. The prisoner has quite a record in police circles and only yesterday was given his liberty by Judge Forbes, when he was allowed out on suspended sentence for attempting to escape from the chain gang. Kirk was first arrested about December 1, when he was charged with begging and being a common vagrant. He was then sentenced to three months in jail with hard labor. About a month later he attempted to escape, and after flushing his sentence for the first offence, he was committed for trial about a week ago, and when brought before Judge Forbes he was allowed to go on promise to return to his home in Nova Scotia. When arrested last night the prisoner gave his name as Michael Delaney, but he was too weak to be recognized at the police station not to be recognized.

BOYS TRY TO SAVE FATHER

Police Court Case One of Worst in Magistrate's Experience - \$5,000 Spent in Year

A scandalous case of riotous living in a residential street in the city was brought to light in the police court this morning when it was shown that a man had squandered no less than \$5,000 within a year. His two sons appeared in court and asked that some steps might be taken to protect their father who, they said, had been spending practically all his time in a house, the proprietor of which has lately been reported by the police for keeping a disorderly place. The boys produced a bank pass-book in court showing where their father had had to his credit \$5,000, which had been left him hardly a year ago, while at the present date the books showed a balance of slightly more than \$300, and as they said their father had also received \$300 besides what appeared on the book, he has got rid of fully \$5,000 within a year. To make the case still more deplorable, the money was left him on the death of his wife, and this neat sum represented many years of toil and thrift. Sergeant Scott and Policeman Powers went to the house on Sunday night, when they heard oaths and curses coming from within. They reported the proprietor for keeping a disorderly house and it is probable that some action will be taken by the police. Some time ago the boys had their father's name placed on the interdict list and since he cannot buy liquor in the bars he goes to this house, where the boys say that there is no doubt he gets all he wants. As an explanation of the quick disappearance of the money, the boys say that their father gives the proprietor of the house a large-sized bill with which to buy liquor for him, and when he gets the bottle he never thinks of looking for his change. It was shown by the bank-book that \$30 had been drawn out a few days ago, while only three days previous to that \$20 had been withdrawn. The boys are anxious that something should be done to bring to justice those who are supplying liquor to their father. The magistrate said it was the worst case that had ever come under his notice.

FURTHER PLANS FOR BOYS' CONFERENCE

The weekly meeting of the City Teacher Training Institute was held last evening in St. David's church with a special attendance. F. S. Porter gave the first of a continued series of addresses on the duties of the Master Teacher. Last evening he dealt more especially with his preparation for his work. He emphasized the fact that Jesus stood among the people of His day as an example to a teacher, and so such He was authoritative, original, spiritual, pity and practical. The institute is preparing for the coming year as a teacher, such as His life in Nazareth, His institution of the Sabbath and the synagogue, the town of Nazareth itself and His beauty, His seclusion, His industry and composure, and His surroundings as they were with historic memorials.

BUILDING IS IN THE NAME OF EXPRESS COMPANY

Contract For King Street Remodelling Awarded to Carleton Mac A start was made today on the work of remodeling the building on the corner of King and Germain streets for the use of the C. P. R., the Dominion Express Company and the C. P. R. Telegraph Company. Instead of being purchased by the C. P. Railway Company as was generally supposed, the building has been taken over in the name of the Dominion Express Company, and the title will be in its name. Architect F. Neil Brodie, who has prepared the plans for remodeling the building, announced today that the contract for the whole undertaking has been awarded to J. M. Belyea of West St. John. Mr. Belyea will look after the carpenter work himself, and has awarded the various other sub-contracts as follows: - Masonry, B. Mooney & Sons; plumbing and heating, J. Harry Doody; painting and glazing, J. H. Pullen. The contract includes the entire remodeling of the present building to meet the requirements of the new occupants and owners, and the addition of an extra story. Mr. Belyea will start today as soon as the contract was awarded, and expects to have the ground floor ready for occupancy by the middle of July, and the whole contract completed by October 1.
