This brings the salary list of the two big leagues up to the astounding figures of \$1,414,500, nearly a million and a half. But those are not all the figures by a long shot. The report of Secretary Far-rell, presented at a meeting of the Na-tional Association of Minor Leagues, show-ed that \$907,000, only a shade less than a full million dollars, was paid out by the minor base ball leagues throughout the country in salaries. 
