ENGINEER SAYS THAT HOLLAND IS SINKING

Dutch, Though, Will go on With the Making of New Land—Drain the Zuyder Zee

London, March 27.—Mr. Blount testifies in the Engineer, suggests that Holland is slowly sinking. His theory is based partly upon the subsidence of Roman buildings.

Such apparent subsidence is known in other countries, but in these cases it is probable that, instead of the buildings sinking, the surroundings or superposed soil has risen. The old Roman street that runs through London is now eighteen feet below Chesham. At Aosta, in North-West Italy, the Roman pavement of the Via Praetoria is eight to ten feet below the present level of the ground. The Cathedral of Notre Dame in Paris was formerly approached by a flight of steps, which are now disappeared. With regard to Holland, a certain number of Roman edifices, the entrance to which must necessarily have been from the level of the ground, have been found to be at a level above the level of the ground. An examination of the foundations shows that they are sunk from five to thirteen feet.

"In certain low-lying plains of Holland that have been drained for long years the level of the ground has fallen a little over a foot in two centuries."

"Finally, the formation of the Zuyder Zee and of the Gulf of Jade, in Northern Germany, leaves no room for doubt as to the subsidence of the soil in that part of Europe in fairly recent times."

But in spite of this gradual sinking of the soil of Holland, the construction of the great works for the drying of the Zuyder Zee will not be allowed to cease. The Zuyder Zee covers 700 square miles. It is estimated that the construction of a dam across the mouth would cost \$187,500,000, and the process of draining another \$65,000,000.

whole province that the people should be permitted to work out their own destinies in their own way and be believed that if sufficient power were given to the young men of St. John their dream and hope of a city of 100,000 would become an actuality within the time they had set and that, moreover, the overflow from the commercial metropolis would find its way into the province and thus the whole of New Brunswick would be benefited.

Mr. Lablache supported the arguments of Mr. Currie and said that the progress in his community had been delayed by a few people holding large acres of land.

There were remarks by J. Roy Campbell, in opposition, and F. R. Taylor in support of the measure, which finally was referred to the corporations committee for consideration in private session at a later date.

The next bill was that from the council providing that land should be taxed at double its valuation and improvements at half.

Hon. Robert Maxwell, who introduced the bill, made a long speech which was considered by some as opposing it and by others as rather seeking to amend and seek on certain conditions.

Mr. Currie, who has a high opinion of the direction of the council at all times and he made a good deal of the passage of the by-law which changed the ferry rates.

Land Tax

Alderman Elliott rather shattered the arguments of the member for St. John. He was opposed to Mr. Maxwell's amendment which would take the fixing of the ferry rates out of the hands of the council and put them over to the legislature. As a matter of fact, he said, the poor man was very little affected by the change in ferry rates. It was the transient people whom the city council was after. They were the ones to make up the deficit.

Mr. Sweeney—"Why not give the people a free ferry?"

Ald. Elliott—"What argument have you for that?"

Ald. McLeod—"You should not charge a man for going from one street to another."

Ald. Elliott—"Then I would suggest that the provincial government pay the cost of a highway between Carleton Place and St. John."

Provincial Secretary McLeod—"The government does not take charge of the highways in cities."

Ald. Potts began an argument in support of his favorite measure.

whole province that the people should be permitted to work out their own destinies in their own way and be believed that if sufficient power were given to the young men of St. John their dream and hope of a city of 100,000 would become an actuality within the time they had set and that, moreover, the overflow from the commercial metropolis would find its way into the province and thus the whole of New Brunswick would be benefited.

Mr. Lablache supported the arguments of Mr. Currie and said that the progress in his community had been delayed by a few people holding large acres of land.

There were remarks by J. Roy Campbell, in opposition, and F. R. Taylor in support of the measure, which finally was referred to the corporations committee for consideration in private session at a later date.

The next bill was that from the council providing that land should be taxed at double its valuation and improvements at half.

Hon. Robert Maxwell, who introduced the bill, made a long speech which was considered by some as opposing it and by others as rather seeking to amend and seek on certain conditions.

Mr. Currie, who has a high opinion of the direction of the council at all times and he made a good deal of the passage of the by-law which changed the ferry rates.

Land Tax

Alderman Elliott rather shattered the arguments of the member for St. John. He was opposed to Mr. Maxwell's amendment which would take the fixing of the ferry rates out of the hands of the council and put them over to the legislature. As a matter of fact, he said, the poor man was very little affected by the change in ferry rates. It was the transient people whom the city council was after. They were the ones to make up the deficit.

Mr. Sweeney—"Why not give the people a free ferry?"

Ald. Elliott—"What argument have you for that?"

Ald. McLeod—"You should not charge a man for going from one street to another."

Ald. Elliott—"Then I would suggest that the provincial government pay the cost of a highway between Carleton Place and St. John."

Provincial Secretary McLeod—"The government does not take charge of the highways in cities."

Ald. Potts began an argument in support of his favorite measure.

The question of dealing with inebriates is attracting a great deal of attention. In England, whenever a reformatory for inebriates is established by a county or a group of counties, and certified by a government inspector, the cost of its maintenance becomes a public charge. There are now ten of these reformatories in England, besides two government reformatories—one for men and the other for women, who are classed as incorrigible. This question is receiving attention at the present time in Ontario. As far back as 1890 a prison reform commission recommended two reformatories, one in the east and one in the west of the province. In 1892 a prison reform conference endorsed this plan. No action, however, has been taken, and it is now being urged that the provincial government take up the matter and seek legislation to authorize the establishment of these institutions.

Canadian Finance of Winnipeg is a merciless critic of financial schemes which are promoted to drag their savings from the pockets of the people. In recent issues it dealt with Wyoming land schemes and Nicaragua banana plantations. In the last issue it takes up the prospectus of a coal mining company on the Pacific Coast and declares that there is no evidence of the company in the case having such mind as will insure its being run on sound lines. Very properly it asks why such a bonanza as this particular proposition is alleged to be should have to go begging to the wage earner and small store-keeper class for development funds, instead of being snapped up by capitalists. The history of Canadian Finance in every city in the country is full of stories of foolish investors who wanted to get rich quick by investment in some far off venture, concerning which they had no accurate information.

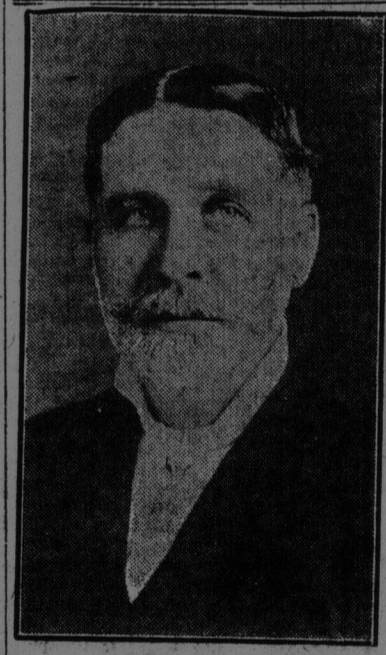

Self-Appointed C. P. R. Detective in Court—A St. Stephen End to the Case

Searl Hanson, aged eighteen who was arrested several days ago by Detective Walsh at Sand Point, and charged with vagrancy, was brought before Magistrate Ritchie in the police court this morning and was fined \$50 or three months in jail.
