Fire Situation In N. B. Serious; Repetition of 1923 Conditions Feared

CAPTAIN OF AZOV HAS PAPERS SUSPENDED

Crusade In U. S. Planned

Former Saint John Student Gives Valedictory Address

ATTENDANCE BIG
Encaenial Exercises Close With Dance Tonight—Addresses Of Interest Given

FREDERICTON, N. B., May 21—The University of New Brunswick, concluding 125 years of existence as an institution of learning, this afternoon conferred 25 degrees. One was honorary, that of doctor of laws being conferred honoris causa upon Rev. George H. Heine of Montreal, the senior graduate present. He was a member of the class of 1867. One master's degree was conferred in course and 23 bachelors' degrees, also in course.

Sir George E. Foster had to leave here today for Halifax, without being able to remain for the encaenial exercises. He had accepted an engagement, before leaving Ottawa, to address the Canadian Club of Halifax, at luncheon tomorrow. There he received he he received there was a night train running between Saint John and Halifax, where by he could leave here in the evening and reach Halifax tomorrow morning.

RECORD ATTENDANCE
The proceedings attracted the largest attendance in some years, due to the fact that many alumni were here to attend the reunion of 1925. The exercises were conducted in the beautiful memorial hall which was dedicated on Tuesday to the memory of the 40 men of the university whose lives were given in the Great War.

The usual programme was followed. At 2 o'clock the academic procession was formed in the Arts building and marched to the memorial hall. His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, was present on behalf of His Majesty, took the chair at 2:30.

Professor Paul Klumpke, who is retiring from the chair of French and German then delivered the address in praise of the founders of the university of medicine, prizes and honor certificates followed and the degrees were conferred immediately thereafter.

Peter J. Hughes, K.C., of Fredericton, himself an alumnus, gave an address to the graduates in the evening. Walter C. Murray, president of the University of Saskatchewan, also an alumnus was then heard in the oration on behalf of the alumni. The valedictory for the class of 1925 then was by Guy D. Snow.

Maguire, and has found the second officer of the Clackamas, James Fraser, to have incurred censure and has given him a warning to exercise better judgment in the future.

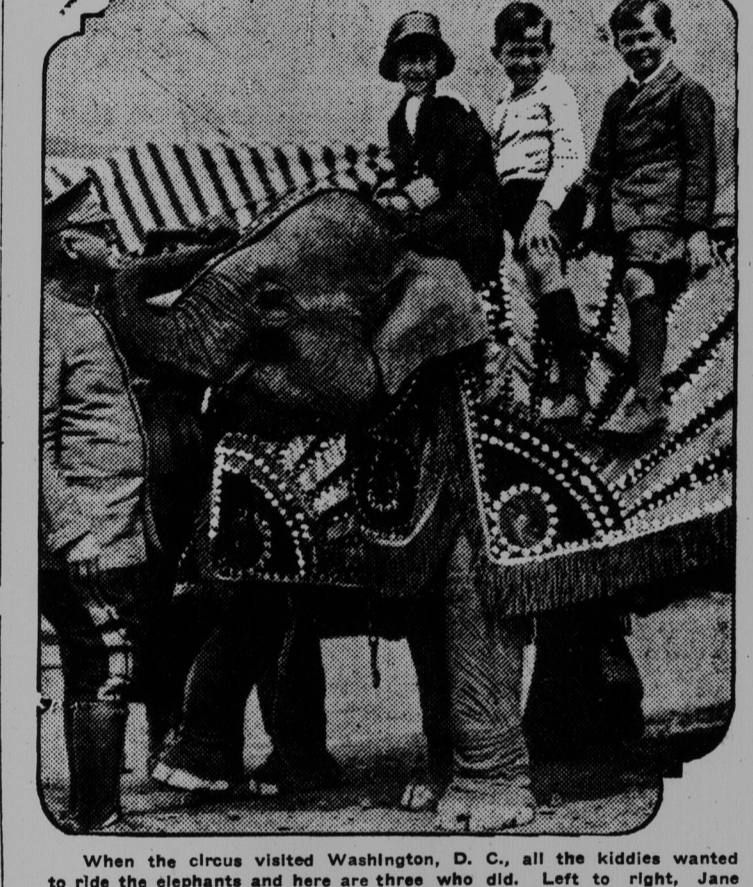
N. B. GIRL WINNER

SAN FRANCISCO, May 21—Dorothy Ellington, 17 year old San Francisco matricide, is sane and must go to trial on a charge of murder, Dr. J. M. Scanlan, medical superintendent of the Napa State Hospital and his staff of seven physicians yesterday presented a report to District Attorney Matthew Brady saying that a close observation of the girl for a period of more than 90 days, had determined that she was in full possession of her faculties, and mentally responsible in every way.

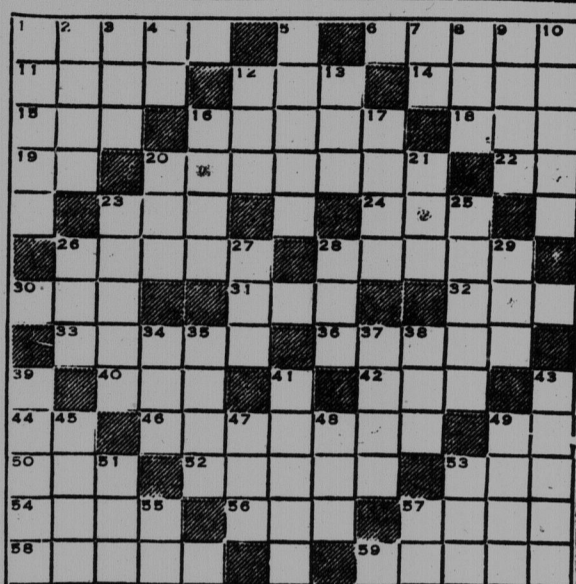

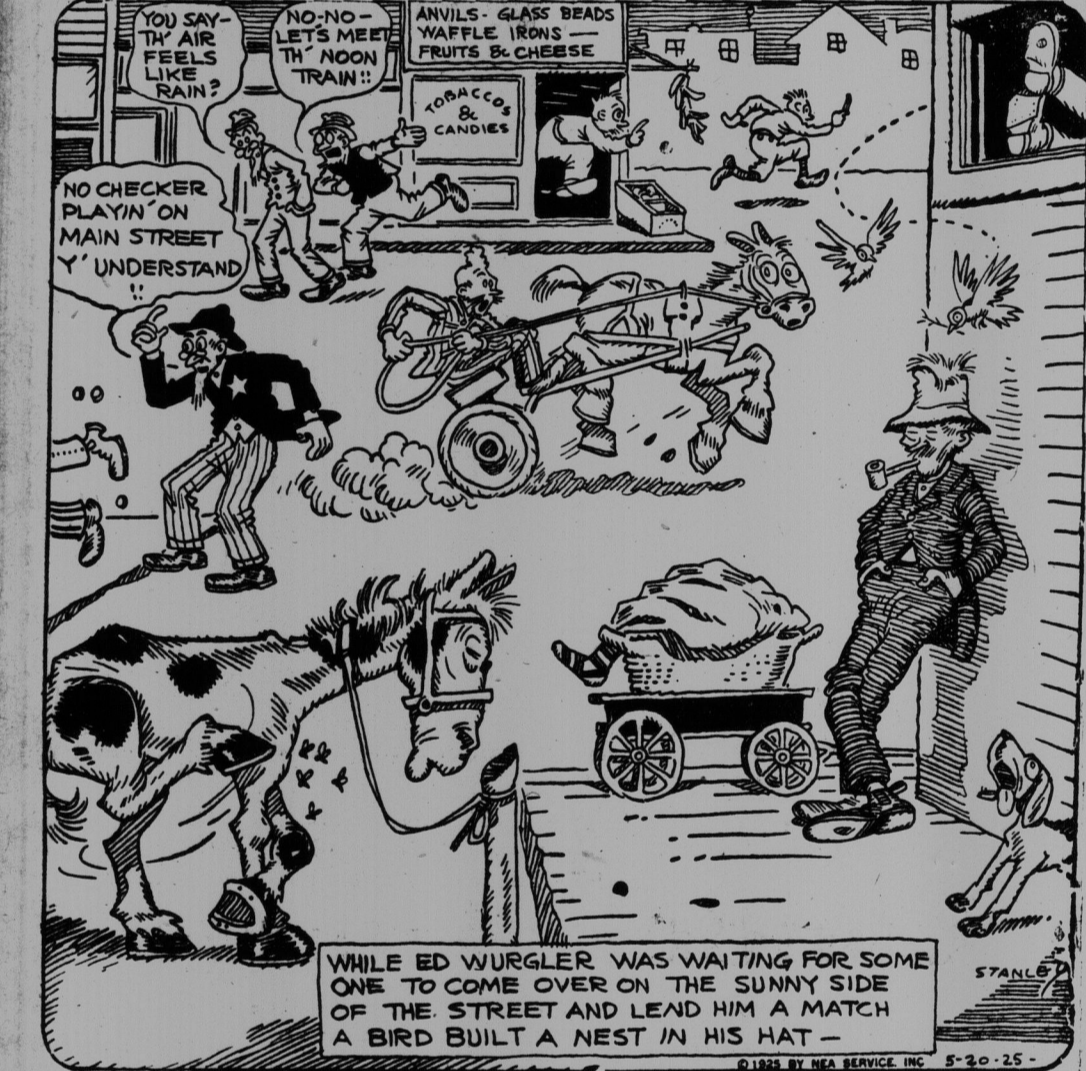

A. J. DOUCET IS CRITICAL OF LEGISLATION

Declares Little of Importance Done in Sixteen Weeks of Present Session

TAKES FLING AT PETERSEN CONTRACT

Charges Duplicity and Lack of Veracity in Carillon Power Matter.

MONTREAL, May 21.—Denunciation of the Federal government, accompanying a review of legislation at the present session, was the keynote of an address delivered here last night by A. J. Doucet, M. P. for Kent, N. B. Other speakers of the evening who dealt briefly with general issues, were Hon. Rodolphe Monty, Hon. Andrew Fairfax, and L. J. Gauthier, former member of parliament for St. Hyacinthe-Rouville.

REVIEWS HOUSE ACTION

Opening his address Mr. Doucet said that although the House of Commons was in its sixteenth week, little legislation of major importance had been brought down.

CHARGES DUPLICITY

The speaker touched on the Carillon Falls power matter, asserting that in this connection duplicity and lack of veracity reigned at Ottawa since a proposed contract was produced knowledge of what had been previously denied.

WILLARD SMITH IS DEAD, AGED 67

Prominent Saint John Shipping Man and Temperance Worker

High in Methodist Church Service—Made Brave Fight for Life.

James Willard Smith, one of the best known men of this city, died last night about 10:40 at his home, Orange street, after an illness extending over several years. He had been operated on several times and put up a gallant fight against the malady with which he was afflicted.

Mr. Smith was one of the leading merchants and shipping men of the city and his name was familiar in all the coastwise ports and many of the overseas havens. Born at Advocate Harbor, N. S., the eldest son of Sydney Smith and Maria Morris, he came to this city when a young man. He has left a deep impression on the business and moral life of the community. He was one of the outstanding leaders in the fight for prohibition in this province.

ACCUMULATED FLEET.

Mr. Smith's first vessel was the "Ethel Granville" which he purchased through his special activities and from this simple beginning acquired no fewer than 40 craft, including the steam-tow boat "Nereid", well known along the harbor front. The Smith fleet was chiefly of the coasting type but several of the larger vessels were utilized in trans-oceanic service, carrying lumber. Practical knowledge of shipbuilding greatly facilitated Mr. Smith's shipping activities and led to his appointment as Advocate Harbor, Port Maitland, Salmon River, Port Greville, and during the late war two splendid craft were launched for him at Hillsburn, N. S. At its most the Smith fleet employed more than 150 men. This scope of shipping business brought the late citizen in intimate touch with the Atlantic seaboard and particularly the Maritime Provinces. Because of his prominence in local shipping affairs, he was for a time a valued member of the Board of Pilot Commissioners in Saint John.

PROMINENT METHODIST.

As prominently as J. Willard Smith's name and life was mixed with the shipping and mercantile life of eastern Canada it was not more so than his personality as identified with Methodism in the Maritime Conference. Early uniting with Queen square church after coming to Saint John, he handled business capabilities with his devotion to the activities of that body and until illness prevented was the general secretary of that branch of the denomination. As superintendent of the Sunday school, member of the central board, secretary-treasurer of the trustees for more than 30 years, a leader and member of the choir, he gave of his time, talent and funds without stint and made church work an integral part of his weekly routine. Such activity as a church worker naturally forced upon Mr. Smith many burdens arising out of denominational affairs in the Maritime field, which he assumed uncomplainingly and bore with efficiency. In the Westfield parish church Mr. Smith, as a summer resident, was a staunch supporter.

HIS TEMPERANCE CAREER.

It was perhaps in the forwarding of temperance matters and during the passage of legislation governing the sale of liquor that Mr. Smith came into the general public eye most prominently. Beginning as a member of The Sons of Temperance and the different federations and alliances organized for the attainment of prohibition, he was keenly active. As far back as 1875 he was secretary of a committee appointed to secure the possible adoption of The Scott Act in Saint John. He was a member of the Anti-Licence League of New Brunswick and of the New Brunswick Temperance Federation, founded in this city in 1905, being its president from 1907 to 1911. In 1895 he joined the Saint John Prohibition Association and also was president for some years of the Saint John Temperance Alliance.

IN FRONT OF BATTLE.

In various plebiscites—1898, 1920, 1921—he was in the forefront of the fight, an effective speaker and a tireless worker. Whatever may be said of the merits of these controversial campaigns the late citizen, it was stated today, will be remembered for his courageous conviction and an unyielding hope of ultimate success. Mr. Smith headed many delegations which appeared before the license commissioners, the City Council, the local government of Premiers Hazen Blair and Pugsley seeking restriction of the liquor traffic and promotion of prohibition. He assisted in the drafting of the prohibitory law now in

J. Willard Smith leaves a family of six children, including Ella L. Smith, prominent as an educationalist in this country and in England; Mrs. Herbert Read, Stonehaven, Mass.; W. Roy Smith, of Annapolis Royal, N. S.; Harold Duncan Smith, Los Angeles, Calif.; Jean E. and Helen M. Smith, residing at home. The children have been at their father's home the last two months of his illness. There are four grandchildren. Mrs. Smith, formerly Frances L. Hanson, of Durham Bridge, York county, died in 1923. Of the deceased citizen's brothers, three survive him, George W. Smith, of Bridgeport, Conn.; Fred Smith, of Staten Island, N. Y.; and Percy Smith, of the home-stead town, Advocate Harbor, N. S. Two other brothers who resided in Saint John were E. Lawson Smith, drowned in the St. John River, and R. Duncan Smith, whose sudden death at his business proved a great shock to the community at large a few months ago.

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436,828 CANADIANS DEPART IN 4 YEARS

742,000 Quit in 1911-1920 Period; 265,173 Return in 1902-1920 Era.

OTTAWA, May 20—The flow of migrants between Canada and the United States was discussed in the House today when a civil government report of \$800,000 for the immigration department was under consideration.

Col. J. Arthur, Conservative, Parry Sound, reading from a report of the United States Department of Labor, gave emigration from Canada to the United States between 1899 and 1910, as 179,226; during the years from 1911 to 1920, as 742,000. During the past four years, he said, 436,828 Canadians had gone across the border. He gave the figures of returning Canadians as 265,173 between 1902 and 1920. During the last four years, 15,312 Canadians had returned.
