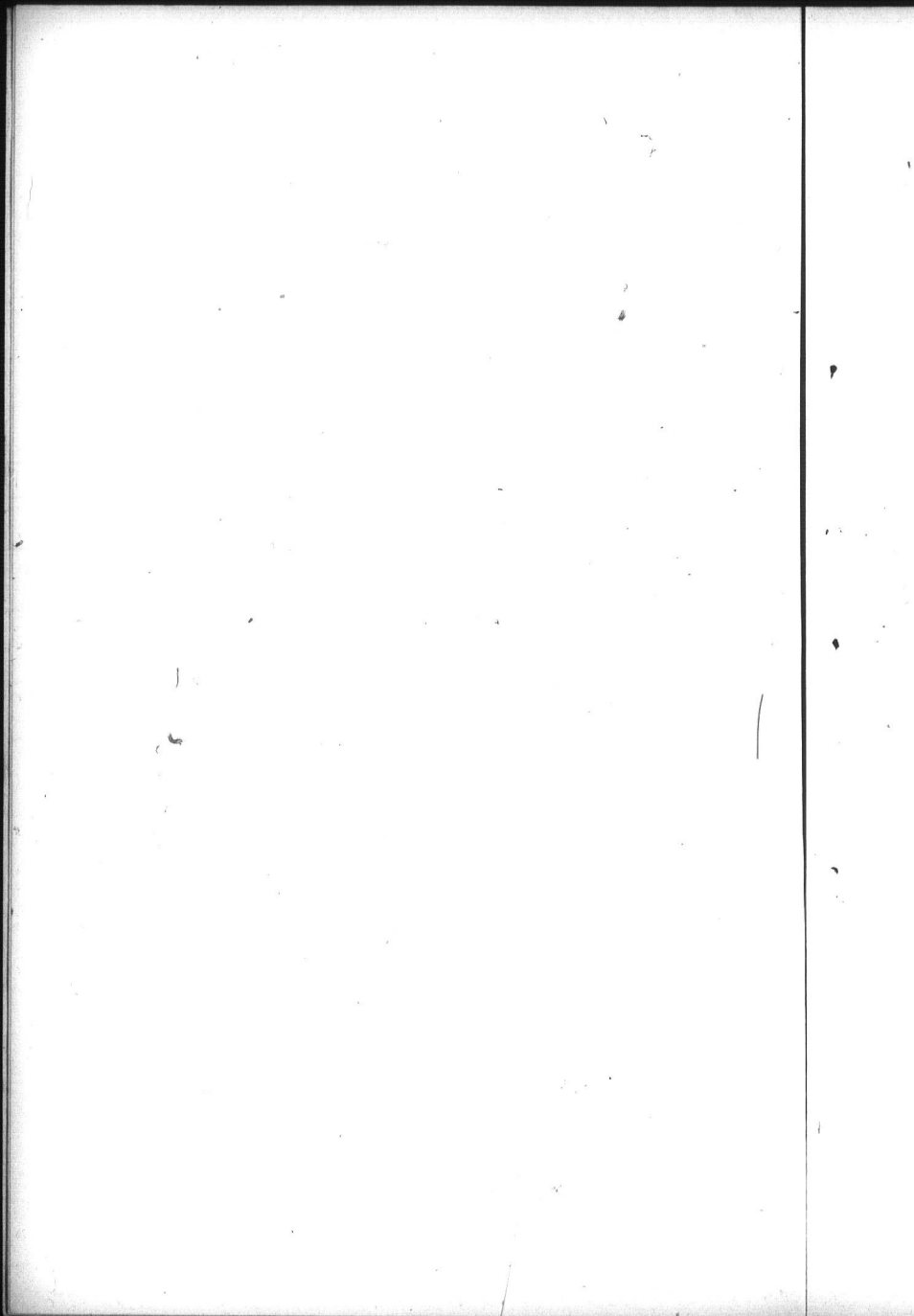

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UNIVERSITY OF TRINITY COLLEGE.

THE UNIVERSITY OF TRINITY COLLEGE was constituted by a Royal Charter, bearing date 15th July, 1852, and was endowed with such powers of conferring Degrees as are enjoyed by the Universities of Great Britain.

THE CONVOCATION of the University consists of the Chancellor, the Provost, the Professors of Trinity College, and all persons admitted to the Degree of Master of Arts, or to any Degree in Divinity, Law, or Medicine in the University, who from the time of their admission to such Degree shall have paid annually the sum of five dollars to the University,

THE CHANCELLOR of the University is elected for a term of five years by such members of Convocation as are members of the Church of England, and such Masters of Arts, Bachelors of Medicine having previously taken the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, Doctors of Medicine, and Graduates in Civil Law or Divinity, as are members of the Church of England, and shall have made an annual payment of one dollar to the University. A Graduate may at any time compound for all future payments by a payment of ten dollars.

No Degree can be granted by the University, unless a Supplicat for that Degree shall have passed the Convocation, having been previously approved by the Caput.

THE CAPUT consists of the Vice-Chancellor and four members of Convocation, to be elected by Convocation at the annual meeting for conferring Degrees in Arts.

The University confers no Degree whatever, unless the candidate, being a British subject, has previously signed a declaration of allegiance* to Her Majesty, the Queen.

BOARDS OF STUDY in the different Faculties, consisting of *ex-officio* and elected members, advise the Corporation through the Executive Committee, as to the nomination of Examiners, changes in the Curriculum, &c., in the respective departments of which they have the oversight.

*For any Degree in Divinity subscription to a declaration of membership in the Church of England, and to the Three Articles of the XXXVth Canon is also required.

Governing Body.

The Government of the University is by the Royal Charter vested in the Corporation of Trinity College, which body by an Act of the Legislature of the Province of Canada (15 Vic. ch. 32) is composed of the Bishops of the five Dioceses into which the original Diocese of Toronto has been divided, of the Trustees of Trinity College, and of the members of the Council of Trinity College. The College Council consists of three classes of members:—*ex officio*, nominated, and elected members. The *ex officio* members are the Chancellor of the University of Trinity College, the ex-Chancellors, the Provost, and Professors in Divinity and Arts in Trinity College. The following members are nominated, four by each of the Bishops of Toronto, Huron, Ontario, and Niagara, from their respective Dioceses, and one by each Medical School or College affiliated with the University. Fifteen members are elected, eight by the same electors as the Chancellor (see page 13), to hold office for four years, two being elected in each year, and the remaining seven by the whole Corporation.

TRINITY COLLEGE, by an Act of the Legislature of the Province of Canada, passed in the year of our Lord 1851, was constituted a body corporate, consisting of the Lord Bishop of Toronto (or, in case of the division of the Diocese of Toronto, of the Bishops of the several Dioceses into which the Diocese of Toronto shall be divided), the Trustees of the College, and the College Council.

On the 1st of January, 1850, an Act of the Provincial Legislature came into operation, constituting the University of Toronto; and, under the provisions of this Act, the Faculty of Divinity was suppressed, and other changes made in King's College, now known as University College.

These important changes in the Constitution of a foundation, which owed its origin mainly to the long continued and persevering efforts of the Bishop of Toronto, appeared to his Lordship, and to the great body of the Churchmen of this Province, to render indispensable the erection of a College under the control of the Church of England, but open to members of other religious bodies, in which secular instruction should not be dissociated from religious teaching.

The Bishop consequently, on the 7th February, 1850, issued a Pastoral Letter to the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese, inviting their co-operation in this good work. This appeal was nobly responded to, and about \$100,000 was subscribed in money, lands, and stock in building societies.

In the same year his Lordship proceeded to England, where he received very liberal assistance in carrying out his great design. The Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts made a vote of two thousand pounds, payable by instalments of two hundred pounds per annum; and also gave seven acres and a half of land within the precincts of the City of Toronto. The Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge granted three thousand pounds; and the University of Oxford five hundred pounds. The subscriptions of individuals exceeded four thousand pounds.

On Wednesday, April 30th, 1851, the foundation stone of the College was laid, and on Thursday, the 15th of January,

1852, the Inauguration took place, and from that day the regular course of instruction commenced.

In the year 1852, the Ven. A. N. Bethune, D.D., Archdeacon of York, raised further subscriptions in England; and in 1852-3, the Rev. Wm. McMurray, D.D., by the appointment of the Bishop, made a tour in the United States, for the purpose of soliciting subscriptions on behalf of the College. He met everywhere with a most cordial reception from the members of the sister Church; and obtained, in books and money, little short of \$10,000.

Within the Diocese successful efforts were at the same time made by the Rev. T. B. Fuller, D.D., and by the Rev. Saltern Givins: the former, by the Bishop's appointment, undertaking the canvass of the Western—the latter, that of the Eastern section of the Province.

In the year 1853, Dr. Burnside placed at the disposal of the College the munificent sum of \$24,000 in lands and money, a portion of which has been devoted to the foundation of two Burnside Scholarships for Students in Arts, in order permanently to associate with the College the name of this noble benefactor.

In the year 1864, the Rev. Wm. McMurray, D.D., D.C.L., Rector of Niagara, was deputed by the Corporation of Trinity College to visit England for the purpose of seeking aid towards the endowment of the College. The result of his laborious and successful endeavours was the realizing of an amount in money, and in books, of about \$20,000. The names of donors are mentioned in the account given of the Library of the University. Dr. McMurray's mission having been interrupted by the necessity of returning to Canada, the Rev. W. S. Darling, in the following year, took up the unfinished work, and succeeded in collecting \$2,526.

In the year 1865, the Hon. James Gordon bequeathed to the College the sum of \$2,000.

In the year 1866, Enoch Turner, Esq., of Toronto, bequeathed to the College the sum of \$8,000, "to be applied towards carrying on the charitable and holy purposes for which the College was incorporated."

In the year 1871, Thomas Clark Street, Esq., bequeathed to the College the sum of \$4,000.

In the year 1876, the family of the late James Henderson, Esq., of Yorkville, being desirous of carrying into effect the intention of their father, for which he had made no provision in his will, gave the College \$4,000.

This sum, together with Mr. Street's legacy of \$4,000, was applied towards the erection of a Convocation Hall, which was formally opened on November 15th, 1877, the occasion of the installation of the Hon. G. W. Allan, D.C.L., as Chancellor of the University.

In the year 1882, in view of the urgent necessity of enlarging the Professorial Staff, the Corporation resolved to appeal to the country for the sum of \$200,000, as a supplemental Endowment Fund, to enable them to found additional Chairs in Divinity, Physical Science, English Language and Literature, Mental and Moral Philosophy, History, and Modern Languages : to encourage post-graduate study, as well as to reinforce the Teaching Staff, by the foundation of two or three small Fellowships : to erect a College Chapel, to complete the existing quadrangle so as to provide increased accommodation for resident students, and to construct an additional building containing a complete set of Lecture Rooms, Laboratory, &c. The response to this appeal has been such as to enable the Corporation to establish two new Chairs, one in Divinity, and the other in Mental and Moral Philosophy, and to endow a Fellowship in Natural Science.

The new Chapel to which the munificent donation of \$10,000 was made by the Henderson family, was opened for Divine Service and consecrated by the Lord Bishop of Toronto on St. Luke's Day, October 18th, 1884.

During the summer of 1884, the Provost of Trinity College and the Rev. R. H. Starr, B.D., were sent by the Corporation to England to solicit aid for the various purposes to be provided for by the Supplemental Endowment Fund. Their canvass was attended with very gratifying success. An anonymous donor, a member of the University of Oxford,

promised £5,000 towards the endowment of the Second Professorship of Divinity, to be called the Keble Professorship of Divinity, and a Chair of Science to be called the Pusey Professorship of Physical Science. The Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge granted £3,000 as follows: £1,500 towards the endowment of three Fellowships on condition that £3,500 was otherwise raised for the same purpose, £1,000 for an additional building to accommodate 20 students on condition that £1,500 more was raised, and £500 to endow a Lectureship in History on condition that £1,500 was raised. Grants were made by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel and by the University of Cambridge, and handsome subscriptions were received from many private benefactors.

Other benefactions to the College will be found mentioned in connection with the Library, or under the head of Scholarships.

FEEES FOR TUITION AND BOARD.

Students are ordinarily required to reside in College, but those whose parents live in Toronto are exempted from such residence, and the same privilege is granted by the Executive Committee in other cases on sufficient cause being shewn.

The Tuition Fees for Resident Students are \$55 per annum, and for Non-resident Students \$65 per annum.

The charge for rent of rooms and board of Resident Students is \$165 per annum.

These fees are payable in three instalments, terminally, in advance, and on payment being made during the first fortnight of term, a discount of 10 per cent. is allowed, thus reducing the annual charges to \$198 and \$58.50 for Resident and Non-resident Students respectively.

The Steward's account for fuel and extras averages \$15 per annum. The heavy furniture is supplied by the College. Students have to provide their own bedding, carpets, &c.

Proceedings in Arts.

BACHELOR OF ARTS.

All Candidates for this degree must be Matriculated Students of Trinity College, and have kept nine complete Terms. They will be required by the University to pass the Primary, Previous, and Final Examinations.

In order that a Student may keep a term he must attend seventy-five per cent. of the lectures delivered in the term by each Professor or Lecturer whose lectures he is required to take, and if resident in College, attend sixty per cent., and if living in lodgings, fifty per cent., of the chapters of the term.

The keeping of terms may, however, be dispensed with in individual cases, in which application to that effect shall have been made to the Corporation, and the grounds assigned by the applicant unanimously approved by the Corporation. In such cases the applicant must not be less than twenty-five years of age, and will be required to pass the Matriculation Examination, the Primary, the Previous, and the Final Examinations at intervals of not less than those which are prescribed in the case of resident Students, and to pay for each Examination which he undergoes, in addition to the fees for Matriculation and Degree, the sum of \$5. The permission to proceed to a Degree in this manner by Examinations only, must be given by the Corporation before the Candidate presents himself for the Matriculation Examination.

Students attending lectures in Trinity College will not be allowed to present themselves at the Primary, Previous, or Final Examination, unless they have passed the Christmas College Examinations, held at the end of the Michaelmas Term, or the Supplemental Examination, held at the end of the Lent Term, of the First, Second, or Third Year respectively. The marks obtained in this Examination by Candidates in the First and Second Years are also reckoned in the awarding of Scholarships in June.

Students attending any Divinity School in connection with the Church of England, will be admitted to the Degree of B.A., on condition of passing the usual Examinations, viz. the Matriculation, the Primary, the Previous, and Final Examinations, at the accustomed times, the Candidate producing on each occasion the necessary certificate from the authorities of his Divinity School, viz. at the Matriculation Examination that he has been admitted as a Student of the School, and at the Primary, Previous, and Final Examinations, that he has kept at least the requisite number of Terms and that he is in good standing. Students who do not reside for so long a period as three years may be admitted to the degree of B.A., on condition of keeping at Trinity College the rest of the Terms required, and of passing the necessary Examinations. Or they may make, severally, application to the Corporation of Trinity College to be allowed to avail themselves of the Statute under which Candidates are admitted to the Degree of B.A. by Examination only.

Students-at-law of Osgoode Hall may be admitted to the Degree of B.A., if, during their Law Course, they have kept three terms in Trinity College, and have passed the Matriculation, the Primary, Previous, and Final Examination for the Degree of B.A.

Undergraduates of other Universities may, at the discretion of the Provost, be admitted *ad eundem statum*, up to the end of the Second Year, provided they have kept their terms by attending lectures and passing Examinations.

In order that a Candidate may pass in the Matriculation, or in any of the other pass Examinations for the degree of B.A., he must obtain 25 per cent. of the marks assigned to each paper, and 33 per cent. of the marks assigned to each department.

I. MATRICULATION EXAMINATION.

The Candidate must have entered his sixteenth year. He must send notice to the Registrar, before June 1st, of his intention to present himself at this Examination, and must

furnish a certificate of good character and conduct, and pay the Matriculation Fee of \$5. Should he fail to pass the Examination, this fee will not be returned, but he will not be required to pay another fee before presenting himself for examination a second time. The Examination will be held in July, and there will be a Supplemental Examination, beginning on October 2nd. A Candidate intending to present himself at this Examination must send notice to the Registrar before September 10th. Forms for giving notice will be furnished on application to the Registrar. The Examination in June will be conducted at Trinity College School, Fort Hope, and at the various High Schools and Collegiate Institutes of the Province, the Examination in October at Trinity College only.

PHYSICS AND BIOLOGY.

Candidates who obtain 66 per cent. of the total marks for pass and honours in any department will be placed in the first class in that department, and those who obtain 50 per cent. in the second class.

Candidates holding Second Class Teachers' certificates will be required to take only Latin and Greek, or its equivalent as above.

By the regulations of the Education Department, Candidates who, in addition to the Departmental Second Class Non-Professional Examination, have passed the Matriculation Examinations of this University with first-class honours in Mathematics, English, and History and Geography, will be awarded a First Class C Non-professional certificate without further examination.

Candidates in the June Examination who fail in not more than three departments (Mathematics being reckoned as two departments for this purpose), may be permitted by the Examiners to present themselves for examination in these departments only at the Supplemental Examination in the October following.

SCHOLARSHIPS AT MATRICULATION.

There are three Scholarships awarded at Matriculation for General Proficiency :

The Bishop Strachan Scholarship of \$200.

The First Dickson Scholarship of \$140.

The Second Dickson Scholarship of \$100.

Candidates for Scholarship will be allowed to count the marks obtained in Pass and Honours in the departments Latin, Greek, Mathematics, History and Geography, and two of the departments Divinity, English, French, German, Physics, Chemistry, or Botany.

The Corporation has also provided that Four Bursaries shall be open every year, tenable from year to year, for a period not exceeding three years, of the value of \$62 per annum. Any Student who shall have passed the Matriculation Examination and shall have satisfied the Corporation that he cannot, without the aid thus afforded, avail himself of the advantage of a University Education, shall be eligible for a Bursary, provided that he is not the holder of a Scholarship or Exhibition. *Ceteris paribus* the sons of Clergymen will be preferred.

The Honour Classical or Honour Mathematical subjects of the First Year Examination in June may be substituted for one of the five subjects—Physical Science, Natural Science, French, German, or Hebrew.

The Honour Classical subjects in June, 1889, will be Horace, Odes, II., III., IV.; Cicero, De Officiis, I., II.; Homer, Iliad, Bks. IX., X.; Euripides, Ion; Translation of Unspecified Passages from Latin and Greek Authors; and Greek Prose Composition.

The Honour Mathematical subjects will be found on page 43.

Candidates for the Scholarship in Science at the end of the First Year will be required to take in Natural Philosophy, Atkinson's Ganot's Physics, and in Natural Science, Bessey's Botany, chapters I.-IX. inclusive.

Candidates holding First-Class Teachers' Certificates, grade A or B, will be allowed this Examination, on passing in Divinity, Latin, and one of the subjects Greek, French, German, or Hebrew.

The Honour Modern Languages subjects in June, 1889, will be :

French.—Corneille, Horace; George Sand, Les Maitres, Mosaïstes; Racine, Iphigénie en Aulide; Gasc, French Composition, pages 1-54; Brachet, Historical French Grammar, Pt. I.

German.—Immermann, Der Oberhof; Schiller, Wallenstein's Lager; Zschokke, Das Wirtshaus zu Cransac; Buchheim, German Composition, pages 1-30.

Candidates for the degree of Licentiate of Theology may substitute Hebrew for Mathematics.

In the case of Women the following alternatives are allowed: French, German, or Italian, instead of Greek, and Harmony instead of Mathematics, and they will be required

to pass in Divinity, Latin, Greek, Mathematics, or Harmony, and two of the five departments—Physical Science, Natural Science, French, German, or Hebrew, other than that substituted for Greek.

In cases where Greek is not taken St. Mark's Gospel in English and Cutts's Turning Points of General Church History may be substituted for St. Mark's Gospel in Greek.

The names of Students who pass this Examination will be arranged in three classes, in alphabetical order; the first class consisting of those who shall have obtained at least 60 per cent. of the total marks of the examination, the second of those who shall have obtained 45 per cent., the third of those who have satisfied the Examiners, but have obtained less than 45 per cent.

Honour Courses have been established in the following Departments: (1) Classics, (2) Mathematics, (3) Theology, (4) Mental and Moral Science, (5) Physical and Natural Science, (6) Modern Languages. A Student who declares for any one of these courses will, during his second year, be exempted from lectures and examinations in all other departments except the pass subjects in Divinity, on condition that he has obtained 60 per cent. of the marks of the Primary Examination, and has passed a satisfactory examination at the end of his first year for (1) in the Honour Classical subjects, for (2) in the Honour Mathematical subjects, for (3) in the Hebrew of the first year. Candidates for Honours in Theology will, however, be required to take the pass subjects of the Second Year in Mental Philosophy, and of the Third Year in Ethics but will not be required to take the pass subject in Divinity in the Second and Third Years.

A Candidate for Honours who has obtained 45 per cent. of the marks of the Primary Examination, and has satisfied the other conditions of the preceding paragraph, will, during his second year, be exempted from Lectures and Examinations in all other departments except Divinity, one of the two, Classics, or Physical and Natural Science, one of the two, Mathematics or Mental and Moral Philosophy, and one of the four, French, German, Hebrew, or History.

Candidates not taking Greek may substitute the Acts of the Apostles in English, and Cutts's Turning Points of English Church History for the Gospel of St. Luke in Greek.

The names of the Students who pass this Examination will be arranged in the same manner as in the case of the Primary Examination.

A Candidate for honours who, having obtained sixty per cent. of the marks of the Primary Examination, has therefore been entitled to claim exemption from certain lectures during

his second year and from part of the Previous Examination, may claim similar exemptions from lectures during his third year and in the Final Examination, provided that he has passed a satisfactory examination in his Honour subjects at the end of his second year, and the required part of the Previous Examination.

A Candidate for Honours who has obtained less than sixty per cent. of the marks of the Primary Examination shall be entitled to the exemptions allowed in the previous paragraph, provided he shall have obtained sixty per cent. of the marks of the Previous Examination which he is required to take, and passed a satisfactory examination in his Honour subjects at the end of his second year.

Those Students who shall have been rejected at the regular Examination of their own year, or who shall have been absent from such Examination, may present themselves, with the consent of the Vice-Chancellor, at a Supplemental Examination which will be held early in October, and those who then fail to pass will be required to attend the same Examination of the succeeding year.

Students who have failed at their annual regular Examination in not more than three departments, or their equivalent (Mathematics being reckoned as two for this purpose), may be permitted, if the Examiners think fit, to present themselves for Examination in those departments only at the following Supplemental Examination.

Students proposing to attend the Supplemental Examination are required to pay a fee of five dollars, which fee, together with a notice of his intention to present himself for Examination, the Candidate must transmit to the Registrar on or before September 10th.

HONOUR EXAMINATION AT B.A.

Candidates may take the degree of B.A. with honours in the following departments: (I.) Classics; (II.) Mathematics; (III.) Theology; (IV.) Mental and Moral Philosophy; (V.) Physical and Natural Science; and (VI.) Modern Languages and Literature. The result of these Examinations will be published in the College Hall, in three classes; the order of merit in each department being determined by the number of marks obtained in this Examination, together with those obtained in that department in the Pass Examination in the case of Classics or Mathematics.

The Examiners in Classics or Mathematics may, at their discretion, add a Fourth Honorary Class to their Honour List, consisting of those who, not being candidates for Honours, have highly distinguished themselves in the Classical or Mathematical part of the Pass Examination respectively.

Candidates for Honours who shall have claimed exemption from any part of the Final Examination, though they have failed to obtain a class in Honours, may be granted the Degree of B.A. on the recommendation of the Examiners.

The Candidate will be expected to shew a reasonable acquaintance with the life and writings of Lessing, and his influence as a critic upon German Literature.

Students who have obtained Honours in Classics or Mathematics, will be allowed to become candidates for Honours in Theology, in Mental and Moral Philosophy, in Physical and Natural Science, or in Modern Languages, in the Examination next but one after that in which they have obtained such Honours.

By the regulations of the Education Department Graduates in Arts who have proceeded regularly to their degree and who, at their final Examination, have taken First or Second Class Honours in Classics, Mathematics, Science, Mental and Moral Philosophy or Modern Languages, shall, on application to the Education Department, receive Non-Professional Certificate, Grade A or B, according as their Honours were First or Second Class.

MASTER OF ARTS.

The Candidate for this Degree must be a Bachelor of Arts of one year's standing.

Proceedings in Divinity.

DIVINITY CLASS.

The following persons may be admitted to the Divinity Class :

(1) Graduates of Arts in Trinity College, or of other Universities in which Classics form a part of the course required for the B.A. degrees.

(2) Undergraduates of Trinity College and of such other Universities aforesaid, being of the full age of twenty-one years, who have attended the Lectures of the Arts Course for one year, and have passed the Examination at the end of the first year of such course.

Graduates of Universities other than Trinity College, must pass an Examination in all Divinity subjects required in the Final Examination for the Degree of B.A. in Trinity College, and Undergraduates of such Universities in those required in the Primary Examination of Trinity College.

Before his admission each Student must subscribe to the Thirty-nine Articles.

The period of Study will be two years ; and no certificate in the Theological Department can be granted within this time except as provided below, and unless the Student has attended Chapels and Lectures as required by the Statutes.

A Graduate in Theological Honours (who has not previously taken Honours in some other Arts department) will not be granted his Letters Testimonial for Holy Orders, until he shall have passed at an Examination of the Divinity Class in the year's work of the Class in Doctrine, Apologetics, Pastoral Theology, and Homiletics, having attended three Terms' Lectures in those subjects after having completed the Theological Honour Course. A Graduate in Honours in some other Arts department who is a Candidate for Theological Honours, may attend these Lectures and pass this Examination *during* his Theological Honour Course.

The course of study in the Divinity Class extends over two years. Instruction is given by the Professors and Lecturers in the following subjects :

LICENTIATE IN SACRED THEOLOGY.

He must (1) have passed the Primary Examination for the Degree of B.A., and two June Examinations of the Divinity Class, or (2) have obtained Honours in Theology and have passed at a June Examination of the Divinity Class in the year's work of the Class in Doctrine, Apologetics, Pastoral Theology, and Homiletics, having attended at least three term's Lectures in these subjects.

BACHELOR OF DIVINITY.

The Candidate for this Degree must be a Graduate in Arts of the University of three years' standing, or in the case of a Graduate admitted "*ad eundem statum*" of at least three year's standing from his first degree. The requirement that the Candidate shall be a Graduate in Arts may, however, be dispensed with by the Corporation, on special application having been made to them in the case of Clergymen who have been in Priest's orders for at least six years, but such Candidate shall be required to pass the Matriculation Examination in Trinity College. The certificate of having completed the Divinity Course in any of the following Theological Colleges, S. Aidan's, S. Augustine's, S. Bees, Cumbrae, Edinburgh, Gloucester, Lichfield, the Theological department of King's College, London, or that of Queen's College, Birmingham, will be accepted in lieu of the Matriculation Examination of Trinity College.

Except in the case hereinafter provided for, the Candidate must pass two Examinations, to be called the First and Second Examinations for the Degree of B.D.

Graduates who have completed the two years' Divinity Course in Trinity College and have passed the two June Examinations of the Divinity Class obtaining at least a

Second Class in each Examination, shall be exempted from the First Examination for the Degree of B.D.

The Examinations in Divinity will begin on October 1st, and Candidates for any Examination must send notice to the Provost not later than July 1st, specifying, where necessary, the part of the Examination for which they intend to present themselves.

Candidates in Australia for Degrees in Divinity will be required to preach a Sermon before the representative of the University in that Colony.

Any Graduate of the University, holding the office of Bishop or Dean in the Church of England, is eligible for the Degree of Doctor of Divinity, *Jure Dignitatis*, upon payment of the accustomed fee for that Degree.

The Candidate must be of the standing of three years from the date of Matriculation, and of the full age of twenty-three years, but the latter condition shall be dispensed with in the case of Students-at-law of Osgoode Hall who have kept three complete Terms in Arts, and passed the Primary Examination.

The Candidate will be required to pass three Examinations, separated by intervals of not less than a year, to be called the First, Second, and Final Examinations in Law. If, however, the Candidate produce a Certificate of his having been called to the Degree of Barrister-at-Law by any Law Society in Her Majesty's Dominions, and be a Graduate in Arts of the University of Trinity College, or of any recognized University (or not being such Graduate, if three years have elapsed from the date of such call) the first two Examinations may be dispensed with, and the Degree of B. C. L. may be conferred after the Candidate has passed the Final Examination only.

Candidates who satisfy the Examiners will be arranged in three classes in order of merit, the standard for the 1st and 2nd class respectively being 70 and 60 per cent. of the total marks of the Examination.

Candidates who fail in the First or Second Examination, may, at the discretion of the Examiners, be allowed to take a supplemental Examination in the following June, *together with* the subsequent Examination, those who fail in obtaining 50 per cent. of the total marks of the Examination being required to take the whole Examination, those who obtain 50 per cent. of the total, but fail in particular papers, being required to take only those papers in which they have failed.

Graduates in Arts or Science shall be required to attend only *three Winter Sessions*, at some recognized Medical School.

During the work of four years, as above mentioned, he must have attended in some recognized Medical School two courses of Lectures of six months each on

Descriptive Anatomy.
Practical Anatomy.
General Chemistry.
Materia Medica and Therapeutics.
Physiology, including Histology.

and one course of three months on each of the following subjects :

Botany.
Practical Chemistry, including Toxicology.

The above Lectures must have been attended before the Candidate can be admitted to the Primary Examination in Medicine.

He must further have attended two courses of Lectures of six months each in some recognized Medical School on

Theory and Practice of Medicine, including Pathology.
Principles and Practice of Surgery.
Midwifery and Diseases of Women and Children.

and two courses of three months each on

Medical Jurisprudence.

and one course of three months on

Sanitary Science.

He must have attended for at least *eighteen* months the practice of some General Hospital and, during two Sessions, Clinical Lectures on Medicine and Surgery.

He must have attended for at least six months the practice of a Lying-in-Hospital, or give satisfactory evidence of having otherwise enjoyed equivalent advantages of gaining obstetrical knowledge, with a certificate of attendance upon at least six cases of labour.

He must have passed two University Examinations, called the Primary and the Final Examinations in Medicine.

Before admission to the Primary Examination, he must produce a Certificate that he has passed the First Year Examination in some recognized Medical School.

PRIMARY EXAMINATION IN MEDICINE.

This Examination may be passed at the end of the Second Year. The subjects are: Anatomy, Physiology, including Histology, Chemical Physics and General Chemistry, Practical Chemistry, Botany, Materia Medica and Therapeutics, and Toxicology.

The Primary Examinations of other recognized Universities, and that of the College of Physicians and Surgeons for Ontario, Quebec, or Manitoba, will be accepted in lieu of the University Primary Examination, provided that the Candidate shall in all cases pay the full fee for the Degree, but if any of the subjects of the Primary Examination do not form part of the Examination allowed, the Candidate shall be required to take such subjects together with his Final Examination.

Graduates in Honours in Physical and Natural Science of at least second class standing of any recognized University, shall not be required to take such subjects of the Primary Examination as they have already passed in their University Honour Examination.

FINAL EXAMINATION IN MEDICINE.

This Examination shall take place at the end of the Fourth Year. The subjects are: Theory and Practice of Medicine, including Medical Pathology, Principles and Practice of Surgery, *Clinical Medicine, *Clinical Surgery, Midwifery and Diseases of Women and Children, Medical Jurisprudence, Sanitary Science.

In order that a Candidate may pass in either of these Examinations he must obtain thirty-three per cent. of the marks assigned to each paper, and fifty per cent. of the total marks of

* These subjects will not be required in 1888.

the Examination. Candidates who satisfy the Examiners will be arranged in three classes in order of merit, the standard for the 1st and 2nd class respectively being seventy and sixty per cent. of the total marks of the Examination.

Candidates who do not pass in at least three of the subjects of Examination in the Examinations of the Faculty of Medicine, obtaining thirty-three per cent. of the marks of each paper, and fifty per cent. of the total marks of these subjects, shall be deemed to have failed altogether in the Examination. Candidates who pass in three subjects at least, obtaining the requisite single and total marks, as above, may be allowed to take the remaining subjects at the next following and subsequent Examinations, provided that a Candidate shall not be given credit for any portion of the Examination unless he shall have obtained at least thirty-three per cent. of the marks of each paper, and at least fifty per cent. of the total marks of such part of the Examination.

Candidates in the First Class of the Final or the Primary Examination in Medicine shall be awarded Certificates of Honour, provided they obtain at least seventy-five per cent. of the marks of the Examination.

The Primary and Final Examinations may be taken together at the end of the Fourth Year.

For Medals in Medicine see page 86.

Registered Practitioners of five years' standing holding British or Colonial Diplomas, who shall furnish satisfactory evidence that they have passed an Examination equivalent to the Primary Examination, shall be exempted from this Examination, and required to pass only the Final Examination. They must pay the full fee for the Degree.

Proceedings in Music.

BACHELOR OF MUSIC.

The Candidate for this Degree must transmit to the Registrar, before Matriculation, the Matriculation Fee and the following papers :

(i.) A certificate of character in the following or some equivalent form :

"I, _____ hereby certify that I have known A. B. for the last _____ years, and that I believe him to be of good moral character."

(ii.) Satisfactory evidence of attainments in the form either (1) of a certificate of some public Examining Body, or (2) of a testimonial from the Head Master of his School, or from a Master of Arts of some recognized University to the effect that he has received a good general education.

(iii.) A certificate that he has employed five years in the study and practice of Music.

N.B.—In the case of Graduates of some recognized University, Clergymen in Priests' Orders, or Barristers, (ii.) and (iii.) will not be required.

The Candidate will be required to pass three Examinations, separated by intervals of not less than one year, to be called the First, Second, and Final Examinations in Music, and before admission to the Final Examination he must compose an Exercise, containing five part harmony as well as fugal treatment, with an accompaniment for the organ, piano, or string band, sufficiently long to occupy twenty minutes in performance, and this Exercise must be approved by the Examiners.

Candidates who present satisfactory evidence of having passed some recognized Examination equivalent to the First Examination in Music may be allowed to take the First and Second Examination on consecutive days.

The Examinations in 1888 will begin as follows, the First and Final on April 4th, and the Second Examination on April 5th, and the Exercises for Degrees and notice for Examination must be sent to the Registrar by February 1st.

Examinations will be held in London, England, simultaneously with those held in Toronto.

DOCTOR OF MUSIC.

The Candidate for this Degree must produce a testimonial of his having studied in this Faculty for the space of three years subsequent to admission to the Degree of Mus. Bac.

He must compose an Exercise containing eight-part Harmony and fugal counterpoint with orchestral accompaniments, sufficiently long to occupy forty minutes in performance, and this Exercise must be approved by the Examiners. He may also be required to pass an Examination in the higher branches of the Science of Music, and also work a paper on the form and scoring of a given work, and containing one or more questions respecting his own work, unless his published works are in the opinion of the Examiners of sufficient merit to entitle him to the degree without further examination.

Candidates must transmit with their Exercise for the Final Examination for the Degree of Mus. Bac., or for the Degree of Mus. Doc. the following statutory declaration :

Admission to *Ad Eundem* Degrees.

Ad eundem Degrees in Divinity, Arts, Law, or Music, are granted to Graduates of Oxford ; Cambridge ; Trinity College, Dublin ; Durham ; King's College, Windsor, Nova Scotia ; the late King's College, Fredericton, New Brunswick ; Bishop's College, Lennoxville, Quebec ; or the late King's College, Toronto ; on paying the admission fee, and making the declarations required.

Graduates in Medicine of the Universities of Oxford ; Cambridge ; Trinity College, Dublin ; London , Edinburgh ; and Glasgow, are admitted *ad eundem statum* in the University, on paying the admission fee, and making the declarations required.

Clergymen of the Church of England, resident within the Dominion of Canada, being Masters of Arts of three years standing of the following Universities : London, Victoria, England ; Aberdeen ; Edinburgh ; Glasgow ; St. Andrews ; Toronto ; Halifax ; New Brunswick ; Manitoba ; McGill College, Montreal ; Laval College, Quebec ; Queen's College, Kingston ; and Victoria College, Cobourg, shall be admitted to *ad eundem* Degrees so soon as they shall have complied with the conditions requisite for the Degree of Bachelor of Divinity, or of Bachelor of Music.

The Professors of Trinity Medical College and of the Toronto Woman's Medical College are in all cases admissible to *ad eundem* Degrees.

Candidates for the Degree of B.A., who have matriculated subsequently to July 1st, 1886, will be required to pay an Examination fee of \$5, for each Examination after matriculation, but in their case the fee for the B.A. Degree, shall be reduced to \$10 at an ordinary, and \$15 at a special Convocation.

The annual payments made by Bachelors of Arts to Convocation will be credited in payment of the fee for M.A.

Candidates for Matriculation, admission *ad eundem gradum*, Examination, or Degrees in the Faculties of Divinity, Arts, Law, or Music, not residing in the Dominion of Canada, shall be required to pay double the ordinary fee.

This shall apply only to the Fees for Examinations (and not for Degrees) in the case of Candidates for Degrees in Divinity in Australia.

The fee for the Degree of M. B., or M. D., C. M., shall be paid by the Candidate as follows: \$10 before presenting himself for the Primary Examination, and \$14 before presenting himself for the Final Examination. Candidates rejected at either Examination shall be entitled to have the fee returned to them less \$5. Candidates conditioned may present themselves subsequently for Examination without payment of any further fee.

The University Library contains about 6,600 volumes, 600 of which were a gift from the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge. Valuable additions have, from time to time, been made to the Library by the following donors : The Government of the State of New York, the University of Oxford, the University of Cambridge, Trinity College, Dublin, the Smithsonian Institute, Columbia College, the First Bishop of Toronto, General Sir Henry Lefroy, the Widow of the late Rev. W. H. Ripley, the late Rev. E. B. Pusey, D.D., the Rev. J. E. Mayor (late Librarian of the University of Cambridge), the late Rev. John Smithurst, the Rev. C. J. S. Bethune (from the Library of the Second Bishop of Toronto), the Royal Irish Academy, the Associates of the late Rev. Dr. Bray, and others.

The Library is open during Term at fixed hours, when the Librarian will issue books to Graduates and Undergraduates.

All books must be returned to the Library on or before each of the four days : March 24th, June 24th, September 30th, and December 24th.

A fine of twenty-five cents for every folio or quarto volume, and of fifteen cents for every volume of a smaller size, not so returned, must be paid ; the fine to be repeated fortnightly until the volume be returned.

Books marked as First-Class-Books must be returned within a fortnight from the time that they are taken out of the Library. A fine of twenty-five cents must be paid for every first-class-book not so returned, the fine to be repeated weekly.

Graduates of the University who do not reside in Toronto, can have books sent to them on application to the Librarian.

They will be required to pay the carriage both ways, and will be subject to the ordinary rules with regard to the dates for returning books and the payment of fines.

THREE SCHOLARSHIPS of the value of \$50 each, awarded at the end of the first year, one for Divinity and Hebrew, one for Physical and Natural Science, and one for Modern Languages.

TWO SCHOLARSHIPS, founded by the late Duke of WELLINGTON, of the value of \$160, tenable for one year, awarded at the end of the second year, one for Classics and the other for Mathematics.

SCHOLARSHIPS of the value of \$50 each, awarded at the end of the second year, one for Honours in Physical and Natural Science, one for Honours in Mental and Moral Philosophy, and one for Honours in Modern Languages.

A SCHOLARSHIP of the value of \$90, founded by the will of the late W. Y. PETTIT, Esq., called the PETTIT SCHOLARSHIP, awarded to the student obtaining the highest position in the first class of the Examination for Theological Honours, held at the end of the second year. Before admission to the Scholarship the holder must sign a declaration that it is his intention to present himself as a Candidate for Holy Orders, and should he fail to do so, he will be held bound to refund to the College such proceeds of the Scholarship as he shall

have received. In case there shall be no Candidate eligible as above in any particular year, the Scholarship may, at the discretion of the Executive Committee, be awarded to the student who obtains the highest marks of the aggregate of the Christmas and June Examination of the Divinity Class of that year.

During the second or third year, two Scholarships may be held by the same student, provided they are not the two Burnside or the two Wellington Scholarships; but should these two Scholarships be awarded to any student, he shall hold one and receive from the other \$50 of the emolument thereof.

A student shall not be awarded a Scholarship in any department unless he shall have obtained at least two-thirds of the marks assigned to that department in the June and Christmas Examinations together, and shall have passed in all the other subjects in which he is required to present himself for Examination both at Christmas and in the University Examination in June.

TWO SCHOLARSHIPS, founded by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, from the Jubilee Fund of the year 1851, of the annual value of \$160, tenable for two years. One of these Scholarships is awarded yearly to the most deserving Bachelor of the year, who has obtained at least second class honours in Classics or Mathematics. On admission to the Scholarship, a declaration must be signed by the holder that it is his purpose to complete the Divinity Course of two years in Trinity College, and to present himself as a Candidate for Holy Orders, and should he fail to do so, he will be held bound to refund to the College such proceeds of the Scholarship as he shall have received.

THE SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF TORONTO provides Exhibitions tenable by Students of Trinity College.

Exhibitioners are also nominated by the DIOCESES OF ONTARIO AND NIAGARA.

C. W. Cooper, Esq., of Mount Pleasant, left by will in 1866, the sum of \$4,000 in City of Hamilton debentures, for the purpose of endowing Exhibitions to be held in Trinity

College, the Exhibitioners to be nominated by the Executors of Mr. Cooper's will during their lives, and afterwards by the Bishop of Toronto. There are two Exhibitions of the respective value of \$200 and \$40; they are tenable for one year, and any matriculated Student of the College, not holding a scholarship, is eligible, with a preference in all cases to the sons of Clergymen. The Exhibitions will be forfeited if the holder fails to keep a term, or to pass any Examination at the regular time.

The Scholarships, Exhibitions, and Bursaries, are held during good behaviour, with the further condition in the case of Scholarships, that the holders thereof shall attend Honour Lectures, and satisfy the Professors in such Lectures.

Annual Prizes.

PRINCE OF WALES PRIZES.

Two prizes of \$24 each, founded by H. R. H. the Prince of Wales, are given annually to those incepting Bachelors of Arts who obtain the highest places in the first class in Classical and Mathematical Honours.

MEDALS IN LAW.

A Gold and a Silver Medal are annually awarded, upon the special recommendation of the Examiners, to the Candidates who obtained the first and second places respectively in the first class at the Final Examination for the Degree of B. C. L.

MEDALS IN MEDICINE.

A Gold and a Silver Medal are annually awarded to the Candidates who are first and second respectively in the Examination for the Degree of M.D., C.M., provided that Candidates take the Primary and the Final Examinations together, and obtain at least seventy-five per cent. of the total marks.

GOVERNOR GENERAL'S MEDAL.

Their Excellencies the Earl of Dufferin and the Marquis of Lorne, during their tenure of office as Governor General, presented annually a Silver Medal to the Student of the second year who obtained the highest place in Mathematics and Natural Science. His Excellency the Marquis of Lansdowne has signified his intention of continuing this gift, and, with his Excellency's consent, it is now awarded to the incepting Bachelor of Arts who obtains the highest place in the First Class in the Final Examination for Honours in Physical and Natural Science.

FERGUSON PRIZE IN LAW.

A prize of \$50 in law books was given by C. L. Ferguson, Esq., B. A., B. C. L., to the Candidate who obtained the first place in the First Examination in Law in 1886.

COMPOSITION PRIZES.

Prizes of the value of \$20 each are annually offered by the College for Greek Iambics, Latin Verse, Latin Essay, English Verse, English Essay, and a Sermon, the last named prize being open only to members of the Divinity Class and to Candidates for Theological Honours under conditions noted below.

THE BISHOP OF TORONTO'S PRIZE.

This prize of \$20 is annually awarded for general proficiency in the subjects of the June Examination of the Divinity Class.

HAMILTON MEMORIAL PRIZE.

The family of the late MRS. JOHN HAMILTON, of Hawkesbury, have founded, in her memory, an annual prize of \$30 in books, under the following regulations :

I. The prize, to be called the HAMILTON MEMORIAL PRIZE, is to be awarded according to the result of the following papers :

(a) A paper or papers on a selected book or selected books illustrative of Scriptive History, Antiquities, and Interpretation.

(b) The papers set in the June Examination of the Divinity Class on the selected Old Testament subjects in English read in lecture.

(c) A paper on general Scripture History to be set in the June Examination of the Divinity Class.

II. All Students belonging to the Divinity Class, as well as all others who have passed through their Theological Course, and have not attained three years' standing from B. A., shall be eligible as Candidates.

III. The Examination in the selected book or books shall take place at the end of the Lent Term in each year, and the marks obtained shall be added to the marks of the June Examination.

IV. The Examiners shall be empowered to withhold the prize, if no Candidate be found worthy.

PRIZES IN THE DIVINITY CLASS.

The following prizes are awarded in the Divinity Class :

A prize of \$12 given by the Rev. W. B. Carey, M.A., and two prizes of the respective value of \$8 and \$4 given by the late Bishop of Niagara, and continued by Mrs. Fuller, for reading the Lessons in Chapel, selected passages of Standard Authors, portions of the Liturgy, and a Sermon ; a Prize of \$10, given by the Rev. W. E. Cooper, M.A., B.D., for an examination in some selected work on Apologetics ; Prizes of \$10 each—(1) for Hebrew and Old Testament ; (2) for Greek Testament ; and (3) for Ecclesiastical History, Pastoral, Apologetic, and Dogmatic Theology, are awarded at the June Examination.

Candidates for Honours in Theology who have previously graduated with Honours in some other department, will be allowed to compete for the Sermon Prize, the Hamilton Memorial Prize, the Cooper Prize for Apologetics, and the Reading Prizes in both years of their course in Theological Honours, but those who have not previously graduated with Honours will be allowed to compete only in the year following their graduation.

Examinations for Candidates from the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons, of Kingston, will be held in Kingston simultaneously with those held in Toronto, provided there are at least three Candidates; but Candidates for the Medals will be required to take the Examinations in Toronto. Candidates examined in Kingston may be admitted to the degree of M.D., C.M., *in absentia*.

Trinity College School

"Beati mundo corde."

The School was first established in the village of Weston, near Toronto, and was opened on the first of May, 1865, under the Head-mastership of the Rev. C. H. Badgley, M.A. During the summer of 1868, the School was removed to Port Hope. In January, 1872, the first portion of the new buildings was completed and occupied. The School premises now consist of over twenty acres of land, affording ample space for large Cricket and Foot-ball grounds, situated on high land outside the town of Port Hope; the large and handsome building, including a beautiful Chapel, presents a south front of about three hundred feet in length, and a west front of eighty feet; it is capable of containing a School of upwards of 150 boys.

Trinity College School was, by an Act of the Legislature of the Province of Ontario, passed during the Session of 1871-2, constituted a corporate body, consisting of the Lord Bishop of Toronto, the Chancellor of the University of Trinity College, The Provost and Professors in Arts of Trinity College, the Head Master of the School, and such other persons as may from time to time be appointed by the Governing Body.

The course of instruction includes all the usual branches of a sound education in Classics, Mathematics, English, German, French, Natural Sciences, Book-keeping, Drawing, Vocal Music, and Military Drill. Pupils are prepared for the Matriculation Examinations of the Universities, and the Entrance Examinations of the Law and Medical Schools, the Royal Military College, the Army, Navy, &c. In the Modern Department special attention is directed to preparation for commercial pursuits. The discipline and general management of the School are based upon the English Public School System.
