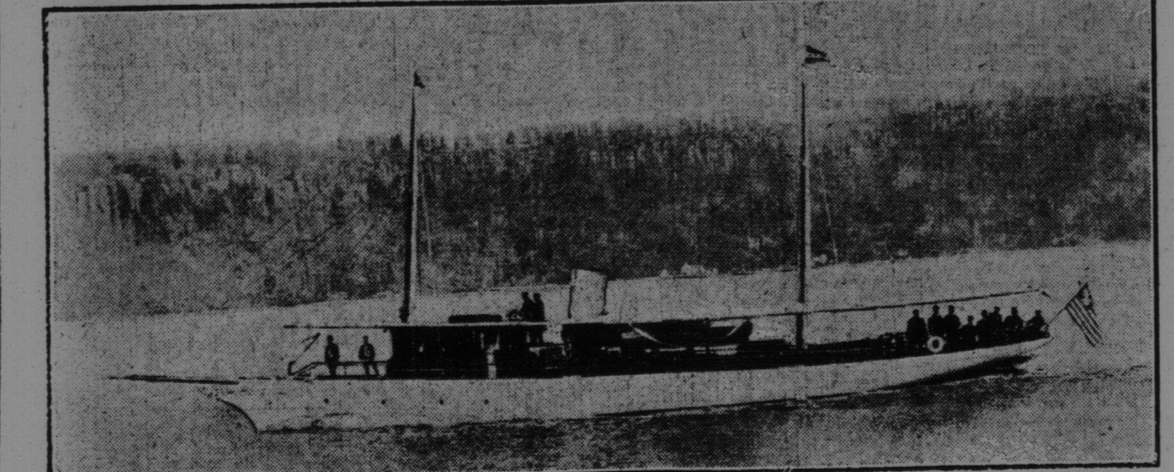

Mr. Harvey came to Chicago, in 1853 and engaged in the lumber business. In 1859 he built in Michigan the first logging railroad ever constructed to transport logs from the camps to the streams and hills.

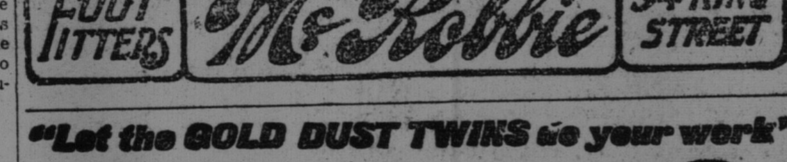

BOY'S LEG TORN OFF BY CARRIAGE WHEEL

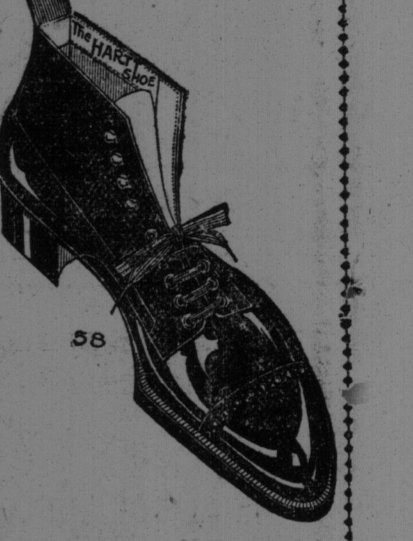

MICHAEL BURKE IS FOUND DEAD

Michael Burke, a laborer, was found dead on Long wharf shortly after 7 o'clock yesterday morning. While walking on the wharf Jacob Brown noticed him lying on his face near a pile of lumber and thought that he was sleeping. He met Policeman McNamee and told him about the man. The officer accompanied him to the wharf and when he turned Burke over to Sergeant Kijpatrick, who notified Coroner Roberts. When the coroner arrived he gave permission for the removal of the body to Fitzpatrick's undertaking rooms. It seems that Burke had not been seen since leaving his home Saturday afternoon. Whether he lay on the wharf all night or not is not known. He is said to have not been a hard drinker and was not in the habit of staying out all night. There was no evidence of foul play and he had been complaining about his heart; it is probable that while on the wharf he was seized with an attack of heart failure. The deceased was about thirty-eight years of age and had been employed as a longshoreman for a number of years. He was at work on Friday and was working around the wharf Saturday morning. He was last seen about 5 o'clock Saturday afternoon when he was talking to some of the men near the wharf. Coroner Roberts said last night that he would not give permission for the removal of the body until he had investigated the matter further.
