MILLIONS STARVING

lo Crops in Seven Russian Provinces.

n Twenty Others Harvests Are Very Poor -Peasants Suffering for Ten Years-Real Horrors Will Begin in January

ST. PETERSBURG; Dec. 5.—Princes Evoff and Orbelani, the representatives of the Moscow Zemstvo famine relief organization, who have just returned from the stricken districts, have furnished information showing that the crops in seven provinces—Samara, Saratov, Bembirsk, Kazan, Penza, Tambov and Ufa—were practically total failures.

The following definitions and postu-lates among others were posted on the door of the waiting-room at Lamlash In twenty-one other provinces the harvests were very poor. About 20,-000,000 people will need assistance for from four to ten months to stave off 1. All boarding-houses are the same starvation until the new crops are available. In some regions the inhabi-tants have been sufferers from starvation for ten years, passable crops have been gathered in only two out of the ten years. Prince Lvoff believes the government estimate of \$50,000,000 for famine relief is inadequate. The Mos-cow Zemstvo relief organization cal-culates that \$75,000,000 and possibly

more will be necessary.

Though the conditions in the famine regions are now most distressing, the real horrors will begin in January. The Zemstvo organization funds, \$300,000, will then be exhausted and the relief committees will be compelled to cease their efforts to save the lives of the starving peasants.

FORMED PLOT TO RUIN SMATHERS

New York Horsemen Faced A Grave Charge

Dillon Turned Out to be False-The Case Dismissed

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—The Memphis gold cup dispute was officially ended tonight when the Board of Review of the National Trotting Association decided that the trophy had been won on merit and dismissed the charges against Elmer E. Smathers, the New York horseman

horseman.

The case grew out of the alleged drugging of Lou Dillon, at Memphis, Tenn., on October 18, 1904. Smathers, who owned Major Delmar and drove him in the race, was charged with having been cognizant of the ill-treatment of C. K. G. Billings mare, which resulted in the latter's withdrawal from the race and the winning of the \$5.000 gold cup by Major Delmar. When the charges were made suit was brought by the Memphis Association, but was stopped by injunction. Today's hearing was for the purpose of determining the facts.

The case occupied the whole day but

The case occupied the whole day but was soon decided after the board retired for deliberation tonight.

Many affidavits were introduced and several witnesses were examined. Some of the testimony was sensational. One affidavit read was made by Edward Saunders, who originally made the charges against Smathers. Saunders in his earlier affidavit had sworn that Smathers had paid him \$5,000 to inject eight ounces of drug into Lou Dillon's body so as to stop her in the race. In the affidavit read from Saunders today, he said that he was paid to make the charges against Smathers and that

tion.

George W. Spear was the most damaging witness against Smathers. He swore orally that Smathers had requested him to open negotiations with Saunders to see if Lou Dillon could be "fixed." Spear said that Saunders offered to do the job for \$10,000, but Smathers thought that too much and told him to drop the pob. The defense immediately produced witnesses who declared that Spear's character was had "Silent" Parlor Matches

bad.

Though an affidavit Louis Streuber, described in the deposition as a "director of many corporations," said that after the charges were made against Smathers he went to St. Louis and interviewed Ed. Saunders, brother of Lou Dillon's trainer. Edward Saunders, the affidavit states, was formerly Mr. Streuber's betting commissioner and the witness knew he would tell him the truth.

Saunders, said Mr. Streuber, to'd him that he had made the charges against Smathers for a money consideration. He had been approached, he said, by George Spears, Smathers' former trainer, and then was placed in communication with Muray I owe, secretary of the Momphia Trotting Association. tary of the Memphis Trotting Associa-tion. He met the latter in Chicago and received \$5,000 for making an affi-davit that Lou Dillon had been "doped"

before the cup race.

Later Streuber said Saunders wrote him that he regretted he had said anything to hurt Smathers and that he had made a second affidavit to clear Major At the conclusion of the hearing, John Wise, counsel for Smathers, made a bitter arraignment of the men who preferred the charges against his client, mentioning particularly C. K. G. Billings, owner of Lou Dillon, and Murray Howe, secretary of the Memphis Trotting Association.

"It is the same Billings who dined on horseback at Sherry's amid cherry blossoms and La-La-Las," said, Mr. Wise, "who instigated the infamous charges against Mr. Smathers, a man charges against Mr. Smathers, a man of unimpeachable character as a horseman. It is a coward's prosecution."

Edward Saunders' brother, Mallard, with George Spear, Mr. Wise said, ought to be kicked out of the Trotting

Association.

He cased thus: "I feel that we have suffered long and patiently and bitterly. The charges are absolutely unsustained. And as to those others—Billings and Howe—that is a matter for further development, which later we will take under consideration." The case went to the board in executive session after one or two minor cases had been heard. The executive session lasted hardly a quarter of an hour, and then Secretary Cocher announced the decision.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—The annual report of the U. S. civil service commission issued today, states that there mission issued today, states that there is still too great a disposition on the part of persons in the classified service to participate actively in politics in spite of the executive orders issued from time to time.

The sentiment in favor of the merit system is steadily growing, the commission says, not only in congress but among states and cities.

During the year 122,034 persons were examined, of whom 95,035 passed and 41,877 were appointed.

From 40 to 60 per cent of the highest eligibles declined appointments for various reasons, principally on account of the low salaries offered by the government.

Senator Ellis thought the time had arrived when there should be life saving stations all along Canada's coasts where there was water borne commerce. The Canadian coast was now well lighted, and saving stations should be the next step. Economy may have been a good reason why these stations were not established in the past. Now, however, the revenue of the country was so abundant the government hardly knew how to spend it. Senator Ellis hoped the secretary of state would impress upon his colleagues the need of using some of the money for life saving stations. The




