BROKEN BONES.

A doctor should, of course, be sent for in most cases, as it is difficult to determine the character of the fracture. But the fracture of an arm bone, especially in the case of children-their bones are not yet brittle-may be like that of a green twig, partly bent and partly broken. In this case, if the arm can be straightened without much if any pain to the child, the parent may bimself bring the parts into place, keep them so with splints and bandages, and
