General Intelligence.

HON. A. R. ANGERS' SPEECH.

The following speech was delivered in the City of Quebec on the evening of Monday, May 18th.

Hon. Mr. Angers, who was received with loud applause, said that it was too late, perhaps, for him to take up all the questions of interest now occupying the public mind. He had remarked, with pleasure, the interest with which Sir Charles had been followed. He himself had now returned, having accomplished the task allotted to him, with as much love for his native city as ever. Proceeding, he spoke of the construction, under his Government, of the North Atlantic Railway, and of the final fulfilment of all the pledges then entered into. Mr. Angers contrasted the two political parties now asking the suffrages of the people, and spoke of the traditions handed down to the Conservative party by its leaders for decades past, one of the most distinguished of whom was Sir Charles Tupper. He asked if the Opposition had ever achieved anything of note and reviewed its opposition to the entry of British Columbia into Confederation, to the construction of the C. P. R., etc., and to the vote of \$750,000 for the last Atlantic service, claiming that it would be money thrown into the sea, since the country had not trade enough to support it. Mr. Laurier had also dwelt upon the dangers of the St. Lawrence and upon the impolicy of running 20 kays and all passing the Gulf. The Opposition had, likewise, always devoted themselves to unjust criticism of the National Policy, on the grounds that the manufacturer had all the profit and the laborer none. On the contrary, out of each dollar of value added to the raw material when manufactured, the laborer received 50 cents, the rest going to pay the wear and tear of machinery, rent, interest on capital, insurance and a thousand other things. How could any charge of monopoly be founded upon such figures? The laborer knew all this and he consulted his own good by keeping in power the Government that encouraged such a state of affairs. Strikes, too, are unknown in this country, another proof of its prosperity. The Liberals though do not live for their country. They try to stir up discord in its borders and turn their eyes for dreams of blissfulness to the United States, failing to see that nowhere is living cheaper or happier than in Canada, where there is less of taxes than anywhere else. Commercially, Canada is infinitely superior to the States, since, head for head, Canada exports more than the States. Yet this is not a result, a country which exports 85 per cent. more than the States, which the Liberals so assiduously hold up to us as an example! The speaker then exposed all the commercial schemes of the Opposition and showed that they must result in the ruin of the country and in giving the United States, with its larger population, the balance of power over us. Canada would have nothing to gain and everything to lose by free trade with the States, for the products of the States are precisely the same as those of Canada. Moreover, where with free trade would we get the money for the conduct of public business? It would have to be raised by taxing articles now free and by direct taxation. There is not a bank, nor is there any stock in Canada which would be worth 50 cents in the dollar if the Liberals got into power and work all their boasted trade reforms, while all industries and manufactures would undoubtedly go to pieces. Justice to Manitoba was another subject upon which Mr. Angers touched. Would the people, he asked, prefer to have Mr. Laurier attend to it or would they rather have Sir Charles see to it? (Loud applause and cries of "Tupper.") Mr. Angers then traced the history of the Manitoba School case, up to its decision by the Privy Council in the sense that the Government was now following. The highest tribunal in the Empire had decided that the rights of the Catholics of Manitoba had been infringed upon and the Government was determined to restore them. This, however, did not suit Mr. Laurier who wanted an equal verdict, and he now proposed to have Commissioners settle the matter. (Ironical cheers.) The Government in accordance with the Privy Council's ruling introduced a bill to do justice to the minority in Manitoba. Mr. Laurier, however, moved the six months' hoist. (Cries of "Shame, shame.") He had not even the manliness to propose a substantive motion showing why the bill should not pass, and he refused when in Committee of the Whole to take advantage of the opportunity of suitably amending the bill. No, he preferred obstruction and managed to talk from three Monday afternoon until midnight.

Saturday so as to prevent the bill from passing. ("Shame," "Shame.") Mr. Laurier then directed Mr. Laurier on this subject. Mr. Angers then took up the cases of Messrs. Beausoleil, Geoffrion, C. Carboneau, McShane and others who had thought the bill through and pledged support to it. He announced amidst deafening applause that a man who had announced himself as a candidate of Mr. Laurier's could be in favor of the Remedial Bill. It was for the minority that he spoke, in no matter whether that minority were Catholic or Protestant.

THE BRITISH PARLIAMENT.

SEVERAL MEMBERS' NAMES.

LONDON, May 22.—At noon to-day the house of commons was still in session and had been sitting 21 hours with the prospect of further weariness for the members. The dead lock began yesterday after the discussion of the agricultural rating bill, providing for the reduction of the rates of agricultural land. The house was in committee of the whole from four o'clock yesterday afternoon, and at 3 o'clock this morning the closure was moved, but several members refused to enter the division lobby, whereupon the speaker, Mr. Wm. Courtenay, was summoned and he named Mr. John Dillon the anti-Parnellite leader, Dr. Tanner, Mr. Donald Sullivan, Mr. David L. Lloyd, George Saur, Mr. John Herbert Lewis, the latter two being Welsh.

members, for disobeying the chair. The conservative leader, Mr. Arthur J. Balfour, first Lord of the treasury then moved the suspension of the members named and the motion was carried by a vote of 250 to 98. Michael Davitt and Daniel MacCarthy members for South Mayo and North Monaghan respectively presented a petition, whereupon the sergeant-at-arms was summoned by the speaker at 10 o'clock. This was done in the usual form and manner. Messrs. Davitt and MacCarthy repudiating any intention to go to the speaker for the chair. Sir Wm. Vernon Harcourt, the Liberal leader, thereupon moved to adjourn the debate, claiming the house was not in a fit condition to keep up the discussion, but the speaker declined to accept the motion and the discussion was continued. Mr. Balfour said the government proposed to keep up the sitting until the bill was completed. The secretary of state for the colonies, Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, Mr. Balfour, the under secretary of foreign office, Mr. Gies N. Curzon and the secretary of state for India, Lord Geo. Hamilton, occupied the treasury bench all night long in the evening they were the physical and mental laborers through the night. Through the night the night supper were in progress in the coffee room and from the fact that 2000 eggs alone were consumed, it may be judged that the appetites of the members were sharpened considerably by their stay in the house.

At 5 o'clock this morning the manager of the office room made a sortie and succeeded in purchasing the entire contents of a fish store located in the neighborhood of the house. He then started on a foraging expedition and eventually returned with two cabs full of fresh bread, butter, milk, coffee, tea, rolls, sausages, bacon, ham, etc., and the prospects of starvation for the members soon vanished.

Everybody enjoyed a good breakfast, sooner or later, and this seems to have been sufficient to restore good humor among the commons for they began to look at the agricultural bill rating in a more favorable light and amiable discussion was resumed. At 1:30 p.m. as the members were getting hungry again and longing for luncheon, with the manager's aid, they began preparing for another reconnoitering expedition, all the clauses of the bill were agreed to, and with many sighs of relief the house adjourned until 11 o'clock and the members hurried away to their clubs or homes.
