SOUTH AFRICAN SLAVERY.

Savagery in the Bolivian and Amazonian Forests.

Extensive Districts in The Interior

Are less known to Man than Central Africa.

I regret very much to have to say that the continent of South America is the most neglected region on the face of the earth and that extensive districts of the interior are less known to civilized man than central Africa. Slavery of the most cruel kind flourishes unchecked in the dark interior and yearly claims its multitude of victims, while the customs of the more savage Indians are fully as horrible as any described in the travels of Livingstone, Stanley or Cameron or other great explorers in the dark continent of the old world.

Thus spoke the Rev. Emilio Olson, who recently returned from a journey of several thousand miles through the very heart of the Bolivian and Amazonian forests, a journey attended by countless dangers and strange and thrilling adventures.

The views expressed by some travelers said Mr. Olson to the New York Herald, "to the effect that the savage Indians of South America are declining in numbers, are, in my judgment, erroneous. From all that I could learn, they are increasing in their dense and almost impenetrable fastnesses, and their hatred of the white man, or, rather, of the Spaniard-American, is becoming stronger and stronger."

"This is not strange when one considers the treatment to which those Indians are subjected who are unable to defend themselves. Thousands of the half civilized Indians are either lured or carried away from their homes every year and enslaved in the rubber forests, where they are kept hard at work until released by death. It is true that the laws of Bolivia and of the adjoining republics do not recognize slavery, but this prohibition is of no effect in the remote regions where rubber is obtained and where the unfortunate Indians may be said to sweat blood for every drop of rubber milk that exudes from the tree."

"How are the slaves obtained? In two ways by violence and by luring them away from their homes. There have been, and I have no reason to doubt, that parties of slave hunters are formed who penetrate the forests and attack the wild Indians unawares in their villages or huts. The fathers and mothers are killed and the children carried off to be slaves. This is nothing new, I am sorry to say, in the interior of South America, for from what I can learn this cruel practice has been going on for many years. Of this I speak from report. As to the luring away or kidnapping of semi-civilized Indians tempted on some pretence to leave their homes I have personal knowledge. An offer was made to me of a high price for any Indians whom I could induce to leave their homes in a section of the country which was known to me as about to visit. It should be unnecessary to say that I spurned the proposition to become a slave trader."

"The condition of these Indian slaves is too sad almost for description. I doubt if one of them has ever returned home to tell the story of his misery and brutality."

"The slave masters of the rubber camps go on the principle that dead men tell no tales, and the poor Indian once in their hands is kept at work in the forest until he dies of hardship and privation, or he is sent down the rivers with a rubber cargo to perish probably in the deadly malarial fevers. The boat right behind me when I was passing through the falls upset, and five Indians were drowned. Their bodies and pieces of rubber from their cargo were floating below the falls. I asked the man in charge of the boat to rescue the bodies of the Indians so as to give them decent burial. He seemed surprised and answered disdainfully, 'Rubber is worth nothing, but dead Indians are worth nothing. So the rubber was dragged on board, and the bodies of the Indians were allowed to float on to be devoured by alligators and birds of prey.'"

"The most powerful or one of the most powerful Indian tribes," continued Mr. Olson, "are the Tobas of the Gran Chaco, who have always preserved their independence. They are as much at-

Leyds Said to be Champion Plotter

He is Very Well Paid For It

How Kruger's Agent Hob-nobs with Royalty

The Boers are not diplomats as Europe understands them, but they are profound schemers. All sorts of stories are circulated through South Africa, some of which find their way into print in apparently authentic form. Dr. W. J. Leyds, the European agent of the Transvaal, is said to be the champion plotter of the century. Probably not one in ten of the things credited to him has any foundation in fact, but anything mysterious about this wonderful man finds ready credence. He receives from the Transvaal government something like \$80,000 a year, and what he does with it causes no end of guessing. It is not in the Boer nature to give something for nothing and the plausible doctor undoubtedly puts much of his alleged salary where it will do the most good.

It is said that some of the most prominent newspapers of France and Germany are subsidized by the Transvaal government, and Dr. Leyds has repeatedly obtained audience with European rulers on apparently warranted by his own importance.

Dr. Leyds is 40 years of age. He was born in Java, where his father was a teacher. The elder Leyds was not satisfied with Java education, however, and sent him to Holland, the land of his own nationality, for education. In school he displayed a remarkable aptitude and made his way quickly through all the junior classes. Before reaching the age of sixteen he passed the final examination in the government College Preceptor. He then took his degree as a doctor of philosophy, which accounts for the title by which he is universally known.

The young man studied law at Amsterdam university, where he graduated in 1884, the year Mr. Kruger first visited Europe as president of the South African Republic. When in Holland, Mr. Kruger offered the attorney generalship of his republic to Prof. Leyds, who declined, and recommended Leyds, and the latter soon found himself the local agent of the Transvaal and its people. In 1888 Leyds was promoted to the state secretaryship, an office of which the holder every four years is elected by the Volksraad.
