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ANOTHER CAMPBELLTON BOY MAKES SUPREMACY SERVICE WHILE FIGHTING IN FLANDERS.

It was with deep sorrow that Campbellton learned on Monday that Pte. George McKee had died of wounds. The word was received by his mother Mrs. Mary McKee in a despatch from the records office.

The deceased was a general favorite here. He enlisted with the 182nd Battalion and was later transferred to another New Brunswick battalion, where he has been "carrying on" for some time. He was 21 years of age. He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Mary McKee, two brothers, Fred and Allen, both of Campbellton, and four sisters, Annie at home, Mary in Montreal, Mrs. G. R. Fielder, Westmount, and Mrs. Thos. Nevin of New York. He is also survived by a half brother, David E. McKee of town.

Deceased worked for a number of years on the I. N. B. with the late Thos. Mahon, but threw up his job to fight for his country. He was also a valued member of the Campbellton Fire Brigade.

NOMINATION DAY PROCEEDINGS HERE

Returning officer for Restigouche and Madawaska, T. Robinson opened his court in the Town Council Chamber here at noon on Monday for the nomination of candidates in the Federal election to be held on December 17th. Two names were placed in nomination.

The nomination papers of Mr. P. Michael of Edmundston were filed by Mr. A. T. LeBlanc while Mr. H. A. Carr performed a like service for Mr. D. A. Stewart. A poll was demanded and granted. The returning officer then adjourned his court.

Announcement was made that a public meeting would be held at the Opera House at 2.30.

Public Meeting

At the appointed time the large auditorium was filled with electors eager to hear something of the various issues of the contest.

Hon. Wm. Currie called the meeting to order and stated that in a meeting of this kind it was the custom to appoint joint chairmen, and he proposed Mr. V. R. Violet of St. Leonards and Mayor A. A. Andrew of Campbellton as such. This was seconded and carried.

His Worship in a few remarks asked all to give the various speakers a good hearing and British fair play.

Mr. P. Michael

Mr. Michael was the first speaker introduced, and addressed the meeting in part as follows:—

Mr. Chairmen, ladies and gentlemen, electors of Restigouche and Madawaska.

I attended his speech pleasure to address them for a short time, first in English and later in French.

Two years ago at a convention of the Liberals of Restigouche and Madawaska he had been unanimously chosen as the standard bearer of the party at the next election, and in answer to that call he was present today. Over ten years ago he had been elected by acclamation for Victoria and Madawaska. In 1908 he was elected over his opponent by over 1000 majority. In 1911 he was again elected by a majority of 1845 votes. This, Mr. Stewart, was his record, and it was now his (Mr. Stewart's) opportunity to beat it.

He had been a follower of the grand old chief Sir Wilfrid Laurier for over ten years and would continue to be a follower of him—Applause.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier is the only man who can save the country at the present time.

While the Conservative-Unionists are doing all in their power to disrupt the country he is endeavoring to bind the people together. Sir Wilfrid Laurier is in favor of rule by the masses, you people, not the classes, the big interests, the millionaires.

This Union government consists of three quarters Conservatives and one quarter Liberals, and you are asked to endorse this combination. If you endorse them and thus endeavor to apply a coat of whitewash, it will not stick. It will be impossible to gloss over all the corruption of the Tory party. But the people are going to speak and speak plainly as to what they think about the way the Borden government has endeavored to win the war. This Union is a scheme to elect a thoroughly discredited party, a party who made millionaires of a few and now are advising the common people to conserve food, and in order to do this to lighten their belts and cut their loaves. Does Sir Joseph Flavelle call that? Why during the period since the war Sir Joseph has made over eight million dollars. Just think of that, over three hundred dollars a day while our boys who are fighting in France and Flanders are getting \$1.10 per day.

If the Liberals are returned to power it will be just such men as this that we will get after. We will convert the wealth of the millionaires and leave Sir Joseph \$100.00 per day. He ought to be able to live on that in war time. It is those privileged

EXEMPTION BOARD WORK DELAYED

Cannot Deal With Cases Unless Medical Sheet is On Hand.

The Exemption Board have been sitting since November 12th for the consideration of Claims for Exemption. Before the Board can determine intelligently upon any claim for exemption, the Medical Sheet of each applicant must be in evidence and the Board are asking that every person in the matter of applying for exemption should forward their Medical Sheet, or appear in person with it, and make known the grounds of their claim for Exemption.

It is very important that this matter should be completed very soon and all persons who have registered should get examined by the Medical Board, and when they have been examined should forward their Medical Sheets at once. A delay in forwarding the Medical Sheets to the Board only complicates the whole situation. There is an uncertainty amongst the people and a delay in the carrying out of the provisions of the Act.

There has come before the Board up to date about 330 names and the Board has only been able to decide upon 101 up to this time. This delay is mostly caused by the lack of reports of their medical examinations. A number have been exempted because of their value to the State in their present capacity. The railroads are demanding a certain number of men and their claims cannot be ignored. To keep up the farming conditions of the country and to raise the food necessary, claims certain men, and the Board are doing their best to determine between the different needs.

Mr. Michael also spoke in French and his remarks were frequently interrupted by applause.

D. A. Stewart.

Mr. D. A. Stewart was the next speaker and spoke in part as follows:—

Mr. Chairman, ladies and gentlemen. He thanked them for the honor conferred upon him in choosing him as the Union Government candidate. He felt that at the beginning it would be necessary to make some explanation as to why he was there. He had not sought the nomination. When Union government was formed that took away whatever right he had to call a meeting. Patronage was immediately dropped. He thought he could say this because he had been the dispenser of patronage here up to that time and he defied any man to say that he had given a recommendation to a government position to any man after that announcement was made. Time went on and any day they expected to hear from Hon. Mr. Carvell who was the New Brunswick leader in the Union government, but they could not reach him. A few of their friends, Liberals as well as Conservatives met and realized the necessity of doing something. Two Liberals and two Conservatives were appointed to interview Hon. Mr. Carvell and that committee met him and he (Mr. Carvell) assured them that any candidate chosen by a duly called Union Convention would have the support of the Union government. Now there was little time to have a convention called. A committee of a few friends from both parties met and notices calling a convention for Friday evening, Nov. 14th at Campbellton, were sent out to the different parishes in Restigouche and St. Leonards. A representative convention was the result of that call. Hon. Mr. LaBillette's name was submitted to the meeting, but he refused. A few other names were mentioned, among them that of Lt. Col. A. E. G. McKenzie, but owing to legal technicalities his name could not be put in nomination. If Col. McKenzie's nomination paper could have been filed then he (Stewart) would not be there asking for votes for himself.

Mr. Michael had evaded the real issue before the people. He had spoken of the high cost of living, but that had not prevented Hon. Mr. Carvell from laying aside his politics and entering the Union government.

A voice—He got a job.

At this point there was considerable interruption.

QUARTER MILLION MARK PASSED

Victory Loan Figures Are Mounting—Good Work in All Sections.

Hurray for Restigouche! Again she is in the lead! When the Victory Loan campaign was being conducted it was thought that if Restigouche county subscribed a quarter of a million dollars toward the Victory Loan that would be all that could be expected. But in the second week of the campaign, to be exact the first nine days, over that amount had been subscribed and the bonds are still going strong.

In some parishes no returns have yet been sent in, but they will be heard from.

An effort is being made to reach the half million mark and if all those who have money in the savings banks would only stand to be convinced that Victory Bonds are just as safe and a much better investment, that amount would surely be reached.

The following amounts from the different parishes have already been reported:—

The real issue before the electors today was "will we continue in the war or will we not." That was the whole issue. Canada had sent of our best young men over 400,000. Of these over 100,000 had been killed, wounded, captured or returned to Canada. At first under the volunteer system men came forward faster than they could be equipped, but such was not the case now. Look at the list of those applying for exemption and you will see that the volunteer system has outlived its usefulness.

If we wish to help our boys at the front and keep them from being annihilated we must send reinforcements. This is what the Union government is pledged to do while Sir Wilfrid Laurier is pledged to stop reinforcements.

When the first effort was made to form a Union government Sir Robert Borden offered Sir Wilfrid Laurier a 50-50 representation in the cabinet if he would agree to the passing of the Military Service Act. Sir Wilfrid refused.

Mr. Harquail—When was this effort made?

Again there was considerable interruption, some of the audience being determined that Mr. Harquail should not ask the question or receive an answer.

Mr. Stewart continued.

If Sir Wilfrid Laurier is returned to power the Military Service Act will be repealed. Parliament will have to be convened and the promised referendum taken. This would mean at least a year's delay by which time the ranks of the Canadians would be seriously depleted. If a referendum voted against conscription then few more Canadians would go to the front as the day of voluntary enlistment had passed.

It had been said that Liberals were not invited to attend the Convention held Friday evening. This was not so. Notices of the meeting were sent to every part of the County. The President of the Liberal Association and the Secretary were called upon the telephone and asked to be present. The fact that many Liberals were today supporting the Union government was no sign that they had renounced their Liberal principals. Political principals were just laid aside until the end of the war.

Why were they doing in Carleton? Why Hon. J. K. Flemming and Hon. B. Frank Smith had smothered party politics and were nominating Hon. Frank Carvell.

D. A. STEWART CHOICE OF SO CALLED UNION CONVENTION

Meeting Held Here Friday Night Chooses Union Standard Bearer—Not Much Enthusiasm and a Quiet Meeting

A convention to choose a Union candidate was held in the Town Council Chambers here Friday evening and about sixty persons were present in the hall. The partisans of Durham and Colborne were largely represented, but other sections outside the Town of Campbellton apparently took little interest in the meeting or the representative electors of these sections were not notified. In this matter of advertising the meeting those in charge made a sorry mess of matters.

At 8 o'clock Mr. D. A. Stewart called the meeting to order and Mr. W. R. McMillan of Durham Centre was chosen chairman and H. B. Anslow Secretary.

Mr. D. A. Stewart said that this meeting of electors had been called for the purpose of choosing a candidate for the constituency of Restigouche and Madawaska in the interests of Union Government. Those interested in calling the meeting were late in issuing the call because they were waiting for a report from Mr. W. S. Montgomery who, two weeks ago went to Ottawa. Unfortunately while Mr. Montgomery was in Ottawa, Mr. Carvell, the New Brunswick leader of the Union Government was in the Maritime provinces and so could not be interviewed. When Mr. Montgomery returned they immediately got together and decided to hold a convention.

Tuesday morning Mr. Carvell was going through on the Limited and a delegation composed of Messrs. D. E. Richards, Alex. McLennan, S. S. Harrison and himself waited upon Mr. Carvell. Mr. Carvell stated that any candidate chosen by a duly called convention would have the support of the Union government. This he put in writing. Now convention had been called and was open for business.

Mr. D. McAllister moved, seconded by O. Smith, that nomination be made

by ballot.—Carried.

Mr. Alex. McLennan suggested that the candidates be named in open convention and then balloted. The suggestion was adopted.

H. M. McLennan moved that Hon. C. H. LaBillico be a candidate. This was seconded by Mr. H. C. Gillis.

Mr. D. Champoux stated that shortly before the meeting Hon. Mr. LaBillico had called him up and stated that he could not offer as his health was such that he could not stand the work of a campaign.

Mr. P. M. Shannon moved that his name be submitted with others and if chosen a committee wait upon him.—Carried.

Mr. O. Smith moved, seconded by Mr. Nathan McDavid that D. A. Stewart be a candidate.—Carried.

W. S. Montgomery moved the nominations close.—Carried.

Messrs. D. McAllister and A. Marchie were named to provide ballots.

Mr. D. A. Stewart said that this convention had taken a peculiar turn, and he would certainly not allow his name to go before the convention until Hon. C. H. LaBillico was brought to the meeting and set clearly before the convention his stand as regards to Union government. If Mr. LaBillico was not man enough to come out in the open and declare himself he (Stewart) would not allow his name to be voted upon. The man who was chosen tonight was as sure of defeat as he was of going home. Let Mr. LaBillico come out and tell where he stands.

Mr. O. Smith said according to his view Mr. LaBillico's name was not before this convention.

Mr. Shannon said that he would like to see a committee wait upon Mr. LaBillico and endeavor to persuade him to allow his name to go before the meeting.

Mr. Champoux again stated what LaBillico had told him.

H. M. McLennan suggested that a committee of two Conservatives and two Liberals be chosen to interview Mr. LaBillico.

Mr. H. C. Gillis moved that such a committee be appointed to wait upon Mr. LaBillico.—Carried.

Messrs. Montgomery, D. E. Richards, Gillis and Alex. McLennan were chosen such committee.

A recess was then taken to enable the committee to interview Mr. LaBillico.

Upon the meeting being called to order Mr. Montgomery reported that Hon. Mr. LaBillico had positively declined to allow his name to go before the convention.

The suggestion was made that the meeting be thrown open for further nominations.

Mr. Montgomery said that with the permission of his seconder he would withdraw his motion that nominations close.

Mr. C. S. O. Crockett suggested the name of Mr. Montgomery, but that gentleman refused.

Mr. N. McDavid moved that Mr. Stewart's nomination be made unanimous.

Mr. Stewart said that he would rather the meeting be re-opened for additional names.

Mr. M. A. Kelly said there was one outstanding name, one who had done more for the county of Restigouche than any other, one who was fighting our battles at the front. He had much pleasure in naming Lt. Col. A. R. C. McKenzie—Applauded.

Mr. Montgomery asked if Mr. Kelly had any confirmation from Col. McKenzie that he would accept. Could he be nominated without personally signing the nomination papers and affidavit.

Mr. Kelly replied that he had no positive knowledge that Col. McKenzie would accept nomination, but if we could do honor him let us do so. He hoped that within a year, perhaps six months Col. McKenzie would be coming home with the laurels of victory about his shoulders. In the meantime he would do without a representative at Ottawa in favor of the "Big Train." Mr. Kelly then proposed

Restigouche has had no representative at Ottawa, and why the rush.

Mr. Montgomery said he would be very sorry to put Col. McKenzie up against a forlorn hope. When Col. McKenzie comes home Restigouche will no doubt honor him.

Mr. Kelly—If this is a forlorn hope why put a candidate in the field at all. Why create turmoil and strife here if there is no hope of victory.

Mr. Montgomery stated that he felt sure Lt. Col. McKenzie could not be legally nominated. He wanted no hitch in the nomination.

Mr. Kelly stated that there might be difficulties in nominating Lt. Col. McKenzie. But surely there was a man in the counties of Restigouche and Madawaska who had never run an election campaign who would be acceptable as a Union Candidate. So far as he was concerned he was not in favor of Mr. LaBillico or Mr. Stewart or any other partisan. What we wanted was a man of business ability but who had never been mixed up with either political party. He suggested Mr. Alex. McLennan's name.

Mr. McLennan refused the honor.

Mr. C. Cook moved that Mr. Stewart's nomination be made unanimous. Mr. Stewart then addressed the convention. He said he was glad to see such a representative gathering of both parties and thanked them for the honor conferred upon him. He assured the Liberals that they had nothing to fear from him. At the announcement of the formation of a Union Government he had decided to drop party politics. During the time at his disposal he would not be able to visit all personally but hoped all would work for his election. He pledged himself to stand behind the Union government as long as there was a Union government.

Mr. Montgomery assured Mr. Stewart that his time was at his disposal. The fight was not so hopeless as many supposed. Throughout Madawaska there was a large number of voters of military age who had not registered and had thus forfeited their franchise. Every one of these votes was a vote for their opponent, and they should see that not one was polled. He felt sure there was a fighting chance and asked all to give Mr. Stewart every support. If we do not win we will at least keep Mr. Michael from going into any other constituency to help defeat Union candidates.

The meeting then adjourned with the singing of the National Anthem and cheers for Mr. Stewart.

OBITUARY

Mrs. Harry Campbell For the period of five months (with the exception of a young child) an interment had been made in the newly re-erected cemetery of New Richmond until the afternoon of Wednesday, the 14th inst., when the remains of Ruth Waddington Brash, beloved wife of Harry Campbell were laid to rest.

Great has been the sorrow over the early death of this winsome girl wife. She was the eldest daughter of the late John Brash, and was only twenty-one years of age. Fifteen months ago she was married to Harry, son of J. A. Campbell of New Richmond.

During the long weeks of her illness, hope was entertained that she might be spared, but it was ordered otherwise and to-day an entire community sympathizes with the grief-stricken friends.

To a large number she was a personal friend for she had the ability of being loved. At school she was studious and attentive, and a successful teacher in several schools.

THAT UNION CONVENTION.

Some Liberal friends have criticized the Graphic for stating that the convention called for Friday evening of last week was not a Union Convention; that leading Liberals had not been consulted or even invited to attend.

In reply we wish to state that so far as our enquiries have gone we have yet to find a Liberal of the executive of the Restigouche Association who had been notified of such a meeting up to the time of the Graphic's going to press.

The friends Mr. Stewart mentions in his remarks of Friday evening and Monday afternoon who decided to call the convention met Tuesday evening after consulting with Mr. Carvell. Wednesday the notices were issued and mailed yet neither the Tribune or the Graphic were notified.

A little boy approached a canvasser and wanted to buy a bond. He had saved \$5.00 and was greatly disappointed because his wish could not be granted.

Then there are the stories of the farmer who will not trust any institution but the saving bank, not even the Dominion of Canada, but allows his money to remain in the bank at 3 per cent when he could get 5 1/2 per cent from the same government that protects his savings.

Altogether the Loan is going nicely and the majority of the people have a warm welcome for the canvassers.

THE VICTORY LOAN.
The following paragraph is from the November number of the Shoe and Leather Journal:—
"A prominent fur dealer stated the other day that his firm had never in its history sold as many or as expensive furs. The automobile industry is taxed to its capacity to produce machines of all classes to meet the demand of the spending public. Makers and sellers of luxuries of all kinds tell the same tale of feverish spending that is evidenced in over-crowded places of amusement and increased travel."

Under such conditions there ought to be an abundance of money for the Victory Loan. Luxury should not run riot in a country whose sons are giving their lives to save it from spoliation by a brutal and relentless enemy. Those who lend to Canada at this rate are making an investment entirely in their own interest. Canada needs money, all the money it can secure, from the people of Canada, for the protection of their interests, and while it is a patriotic duty to place all available funds at the country's service, the fact that the interest rate is high and the security absolute, makes the lending a business proposition of the most attractive nature. Lending to Canada now helps Canada and helps the lender.

The consequence was that when the convention met here there was a very large representation from the lower end of the country, while the up-river parishes were not represented so far as we could learn. In looking over the assembly we could recognize only one Liberal from outside the towns of Campbellton and Dalhousie. We do not say there were no others, but if they were present they were the kind of Liberals that take no active part in election contests. From Campbellton there were not over a dozen Liberals, and most of these were uninvited, but with two or three exceptions after signing up the delegates refused to take any active part.

When Hon. C. H. LaBelle was mentioned and the meeting insisted that his name go before the Convention what did the Liberal see. Although Hon. Mr. LaBelle had informed one of the Conservative workers that he

could not accept the nomination, they saw Mr. Stewart get up and in some very ungentlemanly remarks abuse Mr. LaBelle for staying away from the meeting. Then when Lt. Col. A. E. G. McKenzie's name was mentioned Mr. Montgomery threw clouds of doubt about the legality of his being nominated. Such tactics were enough to disgust any Liberal with Unionist tendencies. As one Liberal speaker said it was too bad that Restigouche and Madawaska had not an upstanding man without the stain of party politics who would offer at this momentous time.

Now Mr. Stewart claims he was chosen by a duly called Union convention. We leave the matter with our readers to decide.

SOME PECULIAR PEOPLE
The Victory Loan canvassers without divulging any names are telling some amusing stories and some pathetic ones too, of the people they have come in contact with.

One man reputed to be worth from twenty to thirty thousand dollars refused to loan his money to the government for 5 1/2 per cent. He says his making from 8 to 10 per cent. This man should be classed as an alien enemy and his money taken from him. He is a Union Man too.

Another story is told of a widow, the mother of a soldier who had only \$50 which she cheerfully subscribed for a Victory bond to help bring her brave boy home.

The funeral service was held on Wednesday and a large procession followed the remains to Flat Lands where interment was made. Rev. James R. McKay officiating very acceptably at home and grave.

Pte. M. E. Harken, who enlisted with the 26th Battalion and was for twenty two months at the front returned home Sunday and is being warmly welcomed. He says the boys were given a great send off when sailing from England.

Pte. Bernatchez is also home. He enlisted with the 8th Royal Rifles in Quebec, and was later transferred to the 25th in New Brunswick. He has been wounded.

Pte. J. Bernard of Dalhousie, enlisted with the 65th and after fourteen months in the trenches was wounded.

DALHOUSIE
Daniel Mercier one of the oldest residents of the town is very ill at his home. He had a paralytic stroke while walking down the slippery sidewalk on Kenner street and was carried home unconscious.

The Banker Social that was held last week in the skating rink was well patronized. Several young people from Campbellton were present and generally encouraged the affair.

One of Dalhousie's popular girls Miss Mary Eleanor LeTourneau is to be married to-morrow to Mr. Desime Willett of Trois Pistoles, P. Q. The couple reside in Springfield, Mass. for twelve years and then worked for four years in the Ross Rifle factory Quebec, where she commanded a high salary by her skill. Mr. Willett is an employee of "The Dalhousie Lumber Co." After a wedding tour to Quebec they will make their home in Dalhousie and will reside in the pretty little Cosens cottage on Benrue Street.

Despatches from the War Office, Ottawa, announce the death of the front of Thos. Buttler and Alex. Frohate of Dalhousie. The late Thos. Buttler is one out of four brothers who enlisted here to serve their country. Those reported wounded to their families by despatch are: Leo. Troy, Sydney Jamieson, Geo. Eisiger and Wm. McTrain. They went overseas as assistant paymaster of the 132nd. When he reached England he decided to go to the trenches and his friends were glad to learn that his wounds are not serious.

Mrs. George McKenzie of Campbellton, spent the week end in Dalhousie the guest of Mrs. W. A. Meek. Mr. Charles Stewart has returned from Sackville where he was visiting his daughter Mrs. Woodworth.

Miss Jennie Forbes who has been teller in the Bank of Nova Scotia, Dalhousie, has been promoted to a position at the head office of the Bank in Toronto. She left here by limited last evening with the good wishes of many friends.

ELECTION CARD.

To The Electors Of The Electoral District of Restigouche and Madawaska

Ladies and Gentlemen:—

On December 16th 1915, at a convention held at Saint Leonard's, I had the honor of receiving the nomination as a liberal candidate for the united counties of Restigouche—Madawaska. On the occasion I laid before you my political platform and it received your unanimous approval. Since, owing to certain circumstances, the political life of our country has been somewhat changed and the party lines have been altered. I think that it is my duty to give some explanations in regard to the stand which I take on political issues now before the country.

1. I approve of and support the political platform of Sir Wilfrid Laurier as laid down in his Manifesto to the people of Canada.

2. My views in regard to conscription are well known to you. I voted in the House of Commons against the conscription Bill of Sir Robert Borden and supported the resolution of Sir Wilfrid Laurier asking that the question should be decided by the people by a Referendum before it should be put into force. To-day, I maintain the same attitude which I took in Parliament, and if I am elected as your representative, I hereby undertake to vote in Parliament for a Referendum to the people of Canada on the important question of conscription.

3. I do not approve of Union Government as presently constituted as I believe that this Union has not been brought about with a view of uniting Canada, but I believe it is a Union of big interests against the laboring classes. The main object of this Union is to cover the tracks of the misdeeds and scandals of the late Tory Government since its formation on the 21st day of September 1911. You are well aware that during the last three years, the Borden Government has most obnoxious, maladministered the public funds of the country, has burdened the poor under heavy taxes and has favored solely the Big Interests while our soldiers were offering their lives on the battle field and enduring hardships for the defence of liberty, justice and freedom. Unfortunately, the political Manifesto of Union Government does not offer any remedy for such abuses. I promise, if I am elected to support all measures tending to better the conditions in which our gallant soldiers now live, and also to establish the finances of the country on a solid basis and remove the same from the hands of a few political friends of the present Government.

4. You are all well aware that since the late Mr. Clemens Silva and Mrs. Silva of Dalhousie. Mr. and Mrs. Richardson left shortly after the ceremony for a trip to Montreal followed by the best of wishes of many friends, for many happy years of wedded life.
