BUILDINGS BURNED.

PARIS, Sept. 14.-A decided feeling of PARIS, Sept. 14.—A declared reeling of uneasiness has been caused in diplomatic and financial circles here by the receipt of a dispatch announcing that Sigri, on the west coast of Mitylen, an island belonging to Turkey near the coast of Asia Minor, and within easy steaming distance of the Dardanelles, has been occupied by a detachment of British

steaming distance of the Darametes, nas been occupied by a detachment of British troops or marines, who landed there from a British ironclad. PARIS, Sept. 14.—Upon the opening of the Bourse here this morning there was a gen-eral weakening of price, due to the report-ed action of Great Britain in landing troops at Sieri

at Sigri.

THE LANDING AT SIGRL

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 14.—A detachment of bluejackets and marines from a British iron-clad, accompanied by a battery British iron-clad, accompanied by a battery of light field pieces and several Gatling guns, was landed yesterday morning at Sigri on the island of Mitylene, formally occupying that place in the name of the Queen of England. There is a good harbor at Sigri and it is supposed the British officers at Mitylene intend to fortify the island and make it a coaling station and rendezvous for the British Mediterranean flect.

DISCREDITED.

An intimation of the intention of the British Government to occupy an island giving a point of vantage near the Dardanelies was first heard of in the inner diplomatic circles of Berlin and Vienna soon after Sir William White's audience with the Sultan on Friday last. Nothing about it, however, appeared in the European newspapers till the Constantinople feports startled the bourse and public to-day. The reports were at first treated as incredible, and are still held to be of doubtful authenticity, or at least exaggerated.

BUT NOT IMPROBABLE.

It can be stated on high authority, however, that Sir William White asked the Sultan to assent to British occupation of some point within striking distance of the Straits, and offering a good harborage for the fleet. The offer made to the Sultan revived the request which the British Government made in 1877, prior to the acquisation of Cyprus, to purchase an island near the Dardanelles. This project was long the subject of negoriations, and was abandoned in the signing of the Anglo-Turkish convention in June, 1878. The seizing of Sigri, therefore, cannot have occurred without the connivance of the Sultan.

FURKEY AND GREAT BRITAIN IN HARMONY. An official announcement issued in Constantinople yesterday stated that a complete entente had been arranged between Sir William White and the Sultan, but the terms of the restored harmony were not neutioned. The intimation that the seizure of the island would be followed by its fortification is modified by a Berlin report to night that Lord Salisbury does not contemplate a permanent occupation of the Island, but has designed the movement rather as a demonstration to checkmate the French and Russian Governments. Alluding to the Russian plea to seize Constantinople by a coup de main, the Pester Lloyd quotes a document prepared by Czar Nicholas in 1853, minutely detailing plans by which a force of 16,000 infantry and 32 guns could force the passage of the Bosphorus and carry Constantinople. The Pester Lloyd says it has become known from words dropped here and there recently at St. Petersburg that these coup de main prospects have been revived in high official circles there, and that various plans of capturing Constantinople have been discussed in view of their great feasibility owing to the advantage of modern war equipments.

ONTARIO AND MICHIGAN Ontario and Michigan are two divisio of territory that more nearly resemble once another than do any other Province and State in the respective countries. Taken as a whole, however, in its natural condition, Ontario is the more favorably cir-1 00 cumstanced of the two. Her agricultural lands are better than those of Michigan; they yield larger crops, including a barley that is unequaled in America. Ontario has magnificent timber resources; so has Michigan, but the depletion of the forests possessed by our neighbors is much further advanced than is the cutting down in this Province. Michigan has good water power in various localities. Ontario has many streams that are admirably adapted for use stretch at Rat Portage and Welland Canal, both of which are capable of vast extension Michigan has some splendid mines that have been developed in the last 30 years. They bring vast sums of money into the State for the support of labor. Ontario has rich mineral resources, as yet almost wholly undeveloped. This is a fair summary of the respective merits of Ontario and Michigan. How do the two territories contrast in point of progress in the last ter years? ANY NAME WILL DO. THE MARCH OF DEMOCRACY.

Modern democracy dates back to Olive Cromwell and the early Independents. The great principles upon which all present-day society is based did not begin to be prac tically realized until the time of the Inde pendents, who gave up their lives on gallows and battlefield for the expensive privilege of transforming the laws and institutions of their native land. The Independent Church was the beginning of modern democracy. A week or two since there assembled in London the first International Council of the Independents, an occasion that lends new interest to the religious sect to which the world owes so nuch of its emancipation from old-time feudalism and intolerance. The Independents were first known as Brownists, under Robert Browne, who about 1580 stirred up the Eastern Counties by preaching the doctrine of every sincere democrat of every nationality. preached the gospel of religious liberty— the doctrine that Christ is the head of his Church, and all its members are equal. Such a radical creed was quite sufficient to turn the attention of existing sects from the occupation of slaying each other for the love of God and zeal for pure religion, and leading them to unite their forces in order

to compass the extinction of independency. The believers in the principle that the only monarch is Christ and the only aristocracy real worth were not suppressed by gallows, dungeon or exile. They played the leading part in the three greatest achievements of our race in the last hundred years: The establishment of modern democracy, of religious liberty, and of the American Republic. They live in history as the men who smote down the Stuarts, beheaded the first Charles and founded the Commonwealth, thereby establishing for the first time th principle of the government of the people by the people for the people. Their leader, Cromwell, whom Milton called "our chief of men," cared, as Cardinal Manning said, with passionate earnestness for the welfare of the common people." The sect, poor and persecuted as it was in the latter part of the eventeenth century, has given to English iterature the great names of Milton, Bunyan and Detoe, the author of Robinson Crusoe, and in our own century the Independents of England and America have taken a leading part in the great humanitarian movements of the day.

STOCK FOR THE COLLEGE FARM During his visit this season to England, Hon. Mr. Dryden, Provincial Minister of Agriculture, made some important selec tions of stock for the Experimental Farm in connection with the Agricultural College at Guelph. The importation included speci-mens of seven breeds of sheep, viz., Shropshires, Hampshires, Oxfords, Leicesters, Suffolks, Southdowns and Horned Dorsets. They are said to be excellent representatives of those breeds. Several Tamworth pige were also brought out. Specimens of severa breeds of cattle have also been purchased These, however, have not been shipped owing to difficulties in connection with disease in Great Britain. CROPS are short in France, Germany and other central European countries. In many parts of Russia famine faces the poor peasantry, and in the adjoining northern countries the harvest prospects are so deplorable that bread has already gone up 80 per cent., and famine prices are feared for the winter. In Central Sweden the result of the constant rain has been to lay some of the lower valleys for weeks under water. In Denmark the condition of things is no better, and in both countries the wheat crop is reported to be entirely destroyed. The damage is not confined to wheat, which is the least important of Scandinavian cereals. Agricultural losses in Denmar are estimated at \$15,000,000, and as half the cultivated area in Sweden is under cereal crops the loss there can hardly be less. How thankful Canadians should be that their crops are plentiful, while so many nations of the earth are in danger of starvation from famine. If our producers were permitted to make the most of their earnings, and the cormorants at Ottawa were sent about their business, we would have one of the most prospe ous countries on the face of the earth.

There was a time when I felt I wanted to be somebody else, but now it thank God for being what I am and nothing less. It's a grand thing to be that way, and it took rie some time to find it out. 
