ELECTRICITY IN THE KITCHEN. Electric heating is yet in its infancy, but it is safe to predict that it will thrive and grow with a rapidity which will surprise its most sanguine well-wishers. In heating a home, can anything be more perfect than to have only to turn a switch and let the current do the rest? No fires to attend to, no chimneys to smoke, no dust blown about the room. The only visible sign being the heater, which if placed in the room would be neat and ornamental, ar if placed beneath a register would be out of sight, the only exertion required being to turn a switch on or off as desired. While this alone is a feature which will commend the invisible current to the cooking. In order to secure the best re-sults, we learn from the Baltimore Manu-facturers' Record, each cooking utensil is constructed with the resistance or heating coil as a part of it; thus each is its own stove, so to speak, and may be placed at any convenient point where connection with the current can be had. All manner of cooking appliances, from the all-important coffee pot down through the list of pots, skillets and broilers to the oven, are thus arranged, and once the connection is made and the current turned on, the oper ation of cooking proceeds without inter-raption. In the evening food could be placed in the proper utensils, these con-nected with the house wires, and by a proper arrangement the latter could be led to the bedroom.

A Chicago Boy Smokes Elimsolf to Death with Cigarettes.

Chicago, Dec. 10.—Axel Anderson smcked himself to death with cigarettes. For five years he has been putting pegs into his coffin. He began with three or four a day, gradually increased to a package, and so on until 2, 3, 4 and 6 bundles became his daily average.

Sunday he smoked ten packages, increasing the certainty of his death by inhaling the smoke from the 100 sticks. He went out for a walk, was overcome with dizziness and fell to the ground, striking his head on the pavement, and he died from

the effects.



Crops and Live Stock

Crops and Live Stock.

Bulletin 43 from the Ontario Bureau of Industries contains some valuable information, from which we cull the following:
Crops in General.—Fell wheat still remains as one of the most successful crops of the year, having averaged 21.2 bushels per acre. Spring wheat has turned out very poor, yielding 12.7 bushels per acre; from no part of the Province have we received any very favorable reports. Barley is under the average in yield and the quality on the whole is not first-class. It has been a poor season for two-rowed barley and very little has been said in its favor. Oats, although over 10,000,000 bushels less in quantity than last year, are still above the average in total yield. Rye has done fairly well. Peas are under the average; the "bugs" have been unusually destructive, but the increased acreage has brought up the total yield to a fair amount. Unfortunately many of the earlier indications of good crops have proven misleading, and we are compelled to admit that the yield of good crops have proven misleading, and we are compelled to admit that the yield of farm produce this past year has been dis-

farm produce this past year has been disappointing. From best to poorest we may average the crops thus: Hay and clover, fall wheat, roots, oats, buckwheat, rye, barley, corn, peas, spring wheat, potatoes.

Corn.—The past season was less favorable for corn than 1891. The crop was planted late owing to spring rains and the early growth was retarded, though the late growth was satisfactory. The result is that there is a limited crop of seed corn, but it is of fair quality. Corn on low land was salightly touched by frost in many districts. The acreage of corn planted was greater than in the preceding year and the amount of corn produced for fodder only 10.38 tons per acre.

Beans.—Owing to late planting and

drouth of midsummer the crop is limited in acreage and light in quality.

Buckwheat.—This crop has turned out fairly well, in some sections extra well. It has been somewhat extensively produced in the Lake Ontario district with good yields. Very little injury from early frosts is reported.

Roots.—Rain, drouth and rot, in the

Roots.—Rain, drouth and rot, in the order named, have been playing havoc with potatoes. Owing to early rains much late planting and replanting land to be done, and later on the exceedingly dry weather prevailing prevented a normal development of the tubers. There are consequently many small potatoes. Rot has appeared in almost every locality, and in some instances farmers have left their potatoes undug as not being worth the trouble. Odd fields on high, well-drained sandy soils have done well, but there are not many such. Mangels and earrots were each reported in good condition generally. The planting of turnips was delayed by rains, but spart from injury from "caterpillars" in some quarters and a tendency to become "trooty" on low lands, the crop is considered to be in fair condition.

Fruit and Fruit Trees.—With the exception of the cherry and the plum, which are being rapidly thinned out by black-knot, fruit trees appear to be healthy, and have suffered but little by blight or storms. The curculio has also helped to keep down the yield of plums. The reports on appies show a great variation in different localities. The yield was light in most of the Lake Eric counties and also in Lambton, but in Huron, Bruce, Grey and Simce and several of the West Midland, Lake Ontaria and St. Lawrence and Ottawa counties a surplus was reported. Several correspond-

Lake Eric counties and asso in Lambon, but in Huron, Bruce, Grey and Simcoe and several of the West Midland, Lake Optario and St. Lawrence and Ottawa counties asurplus was reported. Several correspondents in the county of Grey report that buyers could not get enough barrels to pack the fruit in, and hundreds of bushels of apples had to be fed to hogs or to lie rotting in piles which had been made ready for the packers. Prices for selected apples were from \$1.25 to \$1.50 per barrel, though farmers were selling as low as 25 cents a bag in several quarters. There appear to be too many fail or early apples grown. The codling moth was worse than usual and wormy fruit is common. There is also a large proportion of spotted or scabby apples. Pears, notwithstanding blight in some sections, yielded well and will be of good form and size. Grapes suffered but little from mildew and bore fairly well. The absence of fail frosts enabled the fruit to hang on the vines for an unusually late period, thus insuring perfect ripening.

Small fruits were only moderate in yield excepting wild raspberries, which were pleusiful. However, the fall has permitted the new wood to ripen well, and the bushes enter the winter in good condition.

Clover Seed.—The crop of red clover seed will not be up to the average of past years or equal to what the growth of the plant indicated. Owing to unfavorable weather in so many sections, the seed has not filled well and the midge has been destructive all over the Province. From various causes the total yield of clover seed will be light, the most favorable reports coming from Middlesex. Haldimand, Durham and Norfolk. Four-fifths of the correspondents report smaller acreage of clover for seed and light crops. Very little appears to have been grown in the east and north. The reports as to alsike, however, are on the whole quite favorable and they lied will probably be very good.

Pasture and Live Stock.—Correspondents generally have a good word to say of fall pasture. Live stock came off the grass in pretty good condition, although here and there reported a trifle thin. Cattle do not appear to have sulfered from any serious complaint, save that in several counties, but more particularly in the Lake Huron and West Midland groups, the "horn fly" was very annoying. A good number of stockers were disposed of during the season, and farmers were getting ready for stall feeding as reports were made. Save odd reports of scouring in lambs, favorable words only were heard concerning sheep. More fat mutton than usual will probably appear in the market at the holidays. An unusually large number of hogs were sold on foot during the fall. Swine-breeders report peas scarce, but think that the low prices of other grains will enable them to fatten plenty of pork finith that the low pr

Midland and St. Lawrence and Ottawa groups, but elsewhere farmers appear to be chary regarding corn ensilage.

The Dairy.—The season has been a fair one for the dairy, pastures generally being in good condition, and the flow of milk being pretty steady. Cheese factories have been well patronized on the whole, although the cheese industry appears to be declining in favor in the Lake Erie district. Buttermaking appears to have taken an onward stride during the year, and the revival in this branch of dairying has been accribed by several correspondents to the practical experimental work of the traveling dairies. An improvement in quality is reported from nearly every section in the Province, and an advance in price, ranging from 1 to 3 cents per pound is noted by several correspondents. The shorthora grade is the cow most often found on the Ontario farm, although the Ayrshire is a favorite in the

counties along the St. Lawrence. Holsteins and Jerseys are being introduced in various

Poultry.—This is one of the neglected in-Poultry.—This is one of the neglected interests of farming. Very few keep anything but common "barnyard" fowls and most farmers are unable to give any accurate statement of results. In the majority of cases they state that they simply keep a small collection that pick up the refuse and shift for themselves. Opinions are divided as to whether they pay or not. "Very many tate that if improved broods were introduced and comfortable cheap quarters provided they would prove remunerate. The early spring and summer rains were destructive to young broods of chickens and turkeys. At the present time the general condition is excellent. Low prices have ruled for eggs.

Bees. — Very little change need be made Bees.—Very little change need be made in our August report upon bees, except that as the season advanced the condition slightly improved. About two-thirds of our bee correspondents report a good honey yield and good quality, one-third report a yield under the average. Very many refer to the low price of honey and thereby confirm their report of a good yield. Only four reports of foul-brood have been received, three being from Middlesex. This would indicate an improvement upon last year. Our August estimate of 35 pounds per hive is confirmed by the few who this month give actual yields. The number of hives in rural sections is placed at 195.822. hives in rural sections is placed at 195,822, so that the total product is 6,853,770

pounds.

The New Fall Wheat Crop.—Owing to the protracted harvesting of the spring, sown crops and varying conditions of weather, sowing of the new fall wheat crop weather, sowing of the new fall wheat crop was spread over a larger period of time than usual. Most of the sowing was done Sept. I to 15. The early sown looks better than the late sown. Although the growth has not been as heavy as might be desired, on the whole the condition is very good. Very little damage has been observed from any source. While it is difficult to accurately estimate the acreage, the reports indicate about the same acreage sown as last year; there may be a slight decrease. Fall Plowing.—Owing to the late harvest plowing was not begun as early as usual. Although reports from the same sections are often contradictory, operations were fairly well advanced by the long drouth of the early fall. The rains of the first week of November, however, greatly improved the contradiction, of the early fall.

of November, however, greatly improved the condition of these fields and at last ac-

counts plowing was going on with a rush, and in many quarters had been finished.

Threshing and Marketing.—Except in the eastern portion of the Province threshing was far advanced, and in many instances completed when correspondents furnished reports. Peas were scarce and in demand, and found an early market, but wheat and barley were being marketed "reluctantly," to quote a word used by a correspondent, owing to the low prices prevailing. Barley was being fed largely on account of the low market price of 40 on account of the low market price of 40 cents and the scarcity of peas, and some correspondents expressed the opinion that unless something higher was paid for wheat it would be better to feed that too.

Farm Improvements.—In the Lake Erie

Farm improvements.—In the Lake Eric and other western groups a considerable amount of underdraining was done during the scason, and there was pienty of tile, although skilled labor was rather scarce. Very few correspondents speak a good word for the tile draining machines. In

the cost of tile and the difficulty in getting
it. Marked improvement is being made in
fencing. The old "snake fence" is being
transformed into a straight railed fence
with the aid of wire, and wire fencing of
various designs is also in favor. With the
change of fencing there is a noticeable
tendency to larger fields. While some
speak of improvements in the way of placing stone basements for stables, etc., under
the old style barns, and the introduction of
a more modern style of buildings generally,
the bulk of our correspondents express the
opinion that low prices and hard times are
unfavorable to much improvement in farm
property at present.

Farm Labor.—Harvesting came so close
upon haying that in many sections a scarcity of field help was experienced for a
couple of weeks, but during the remainder
of the season there was a sufficiency of farm
labor, although skilled men are becoming
rare. The continued emigration to the
Canadian Northwest and the American
prairies led some correspondents to express
the opinion that farm wages would rise in
the near future, but others claim that the
low prices ruling for farm produce will tend
to lower wages. It is safe to infer, therefore, that there will be but little immediate
change in the rates paid to agricultural
laborers. Domestic servants are apparently
scarcer than ever on the farm, urban life
offering greater attractions to girls. The
comments of correspondents upon the
quality of male and female importations
from the "Homes" is decidedly more uncomplimentary than usual.

Hints to Factorymen.

Creamerymen must insist upon strict
compliance with orders and they must give

the patrons must be watched, not as a cat watches a mouse, but as the principal of a school watches all his teachers and judges of their work by the condition of the pupils. The test bottles contain a sample of each patron's cream. The creameryman must examine these himself. After heating, the nose must be stuck as nearly as may be in the place of the stopper when that is removed. It must be a keen nose, a sensitive nose, a trained nose. After the day's run is done the creameryman must hitch that lively horse to the cart and drive direct to the homes of such patrons as do not furnish good cream from which choice aromatic butter can be made. Don't go at a poky rate. Drive as if you were the doctor, and a patient were bleeding to death. Go spinning right up to the premises, halt and tell your errand with the fewest possible words, tell what is the matter and let the patron distinctly understand that you will not pay for bad cream, get a move on your horse and get out of sight on your road to the next delinquent. Patrons don't like awshining, long-drawnout lecture. They will study up counters charges and expect you to listen to them if you protract your interviews. On reapers and mowers the sections and guards should be always kept in good order. Caponizing Cockerels.

Those who hatched chickens in March and April will soon have a lot of cockerels of sufficient size to caponize. The sooner they are operated upon after they weigh 2½ pounds, the more time they will have to grow for winter and spring markets. Capons to be at their best should have a year or even 14 months in which to develop. It costs but little to keep them the last few months, and yet at the same time they "fill out" and take on a good proportion of meat in three months. The first two-thirds of their lives is devoted to building up a large frame or body, which they will finish off and decorate in fine shape with delicious meat during the remaining third. The operation is very simple. Any bright boy can perform it. A lot of cockerels that are running around werrying the hens and fighting whe each other are got rid of. After they have been caponized they become decile and quiet, lose all their fighting propensities, pay no attention to the nens and pullets, lie around, take life easy and seem to be perfectly contented. As they lose their roving disposition, they begin to grow very rapidly. This remarkable change is noticed in a week after the operation has been performed. Everything they eat and drink goes to form frame and flesh. These are not the ideas of an enthusiast on the subject, but simply the experience of one who has practiced if for a number of years.

It would be most remarkable if one man should have the ill lack to get quite a number of horses that are what he calls "subject to gripes," while his neighbors escaped the purchase of these colicy animals, but this is how he seems to regard it.

Sometimes it is very difficult to point exactly to the fault. The animals are fed on ordinary foods, and the general management seems to be much the same as that usually in the district. The loose screw is commonly a small one, but it is important in its bearings in the efficient working of the whole machine.




