C. P. R. CONDUCTOR MAHONEY, OF THIS CITY, KILLED IN BRIDGE ACCIDENT NEAR GUELPH

Track Gives Way Beneath Tremendons Weight and Steel Rails Topple on Members of Construction Crew Killing Two and Seriously Injuring Two Others.

(Special to The Advertiser.) Guelph, Jan. 31.-A disastrous accident, resulting in the loss of two lives and extremely serious injuries to two was the result of an attempt this morning to place in position the second girder of the first span of the new bridge on the Guelph and Goderich Railway over the Grand River at West Montrose, 11 miles from here.

A gang of men, with George Corby, a Guelph and Goderich foreman of construction, and Charles Amey, of the Canada Foundry Company, Toronto, which had the contract for the iron girders of the bridge over the Grand River, have been engaged for some time past in endeavoring to put in the big girders, which will stretch from pier to pier across the river. Ordinarily this is not a difficult or dangerous work. though requiring care and skill, as the newly constructed track gets pretty solid with the frost and easily resists the strain of the heavy machinery and girders, and the operation of lifting. greatly bothered and delayed by the







Brock is well known in Toronto, where he has appeared at a couple of Tankard finals, wearing enough medals to stock an ordinary jewelry store. He has perbably won more bonspiel prizes than any other skip in Canada.

For Brock and his merry tars are well fitted to stand the strain of continuous play. They sail in the summer and curl in the winter-and they work overtime at both. They meet on the rink in the morning and curl all foreneen to decide who will buy dinner; again in the afternoon another game picks the settlers for supper, while the evening game is for pleasure and refreshments. At least these are the tales that come out of the north, and as yet there have been none to deny them.-Toronto Telegram.

Al Kaufmann, the 'Friscan whom Billy Delaney has been pointing for championship honors, seems to be a long way from ready for a battle with anybody who has a titular claim. His fight with Dave Barry, at Los Angeles, the other night, made him look a little better than did his go with Jack O'Brien, who beat Kaufmann in seventeen rounds, but it didn't send him to the front in any startling manner. Barry, who is far from being the best man at his weight in the world, went fifteen rounds with Kaufmann, weakening them so that his seconds were forced to toss up the spenge. Within a year this same Barry has twice opposed Noah Brusso, losing to the Canuck at Spokane, on a decision, in 20 rounds, and being knocked out by Brusso, in the 20th at 'Frisco. The latter is credited with beating up his man pretty badly on both occasions, and Brusso, since he made the mistake of sacrificing his punch for a showy, "clever" style of boxing, is not hitting them as champions must wallop.

"My son, be a sport if you will, but if you will be a sport never-never bet en anything that talks." If the unclean birds of boxing, wrestling, footracing, rowing and kindred sports had befouled their own nests only, no permanent injury would have been done the games of which they were the exemplars, but they were the means of creating a gang of stiffeners, of sure-thing players, who practically made it impossible for a newcomer of talent or ability to be on the level, no matter how hard he wanted to be.—Philadelphia Inquirer.






