England To Take Measures To Exten minate Rodent.

London, Feb. 7.—The lord mayor presided yesterday over an influential meeting, which had been called to discuss the question of the extermination of rats in this country. There was perfect unanimity among the large company present as to the fact that it was one of the pressing necessities of the day that rats should be exterminated if possible.

Sir James Crichton Browne said that the rat was a wholesale depredator, and levied its heaviest toll on the agriculturists. Experiments had shown that each rat consumed grain or damage to the extent of a farthing a day.

day. If there was one rat to every act If there was one rat to every acre in England, the agricultural loss due to rats was £15,000,000 a year. If the rats were exterminated England might rescue the importation of grain to the value of some millions yearly.






