

## LONG DISTANCE SUB PIRACIES NOW PLAN OF RUTHLESS HUNS

"The enemy, during an attack from Voyage of Deutschland To Test Conditions for Fightfulness Campaign in Western Atlantic-Kaiser Prepared To Make Escape in An Underseas Craft.

> [Canadian Press.] London, Oct. 30 .- A "long distance submarine blockade" of Eng-

land in waters far from Europe, such as the U-53 carried out for short time, is sure to be undertaken on a large scale, writes D. Thomas Curtin of Boston, in the Times today. The Deutschland's visit to Baltimore was to take soundings for this blockade.

The trip of the Deutschland was not to get from the United States, a few tons of nickel and rubber,' he writes, "but to test thoroughly the Germans, to report on the effects of submersion in cold waters, such as those off Newfoundland, and to ascertain how many days of surface and submerged traveling were likely to be

Increasing Radius "One fact stands out, that the marines is increasing monthly. A long distance blockade will certainly be attempted. You (Great Britain) will do well to look to your food reserves even if only as a precaution against so much fright-

"Almost the whole political crisis in Germany today surrounds this school of thought. Those who think Germany is certain to win are for ruthlessness. The mob is carefully deprived of news of the loss of submarines, and cannot unlerstand why you are not starved already. The leaders who know be-lieve in the long distance plan. beaten and punished for her crimes call 'hold, enough! Let us make an honorable peace and get what we can, not go down in history as bar-Ruthless von Tirpitz.

'Von Tirpitz nominally leads the ruthless section, backed by Count Zeppelin. The kaiser is cunningly pushing the matter forward. Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg, who paradoxically is also the kaiser's supporter, leads the other party. "It notorious that the German royal family is auxious for its personal safety. 'Even in case of a whisper, 'since the Deutschland experiment the kaiser and his family could escape safely in the event

Germany was invaded.' "The voyage of the Deutschland to the United States was a practical engineering test in preparation for a campaign of submarine frightfulness against allied and neutral shipping in the safe waters of the far Atlantic and elsewhere as soon as enough submarines were ready. do not imagine that the Germans have any compunction about drownwomen and children. The greater part of Germany cordially indorsed the issue of the Lusitania medal struck to commemorate Ger-man defiance of Great Britain and

the United States. "The Germans think that if the Allies cannot be fought to peace by the army and navy, they will be frightened into it by long dis-tance submarining. SS. Marina Torpedoed Off the South Coast of Ireland With Many Citizens of States Aboard-Part of Crew Picked Up But Many Still Unaccounted For-U. S. Govt. Official Starts Investigation at Oueenstown,

Newport News, Va., Oct. 30 .- There were fifty Americans on the British steamship Marina, reported torpedoed without warning in today's dispatches from London, when she sailed from Newport News. The Americans were signed here as horsemen. They were all white, and gave their homes as in various sections of the United States.

Local agents for the owners of the Marina say cable advices reported the vessel leaving Glasgow for Newport News October 25 in ballast.

Consul Frost at Queenstown specified that the information he transmitted was "provisional." Investigation will be made at once to determine the status of the Marina and the nature of the attack, to determine whether any of Germany's pledges to the United States have been violated.

THE FIRST LEAP FROM THE BRITISH TRENCHES ON JULY 1ST, TAKEN FROM THE FILM OF

THE LONDON ADVERTISER on Monday, November 6, at 1 o'clock, will make the first public presentation in this city of the wonderful battle pictures, showing the beginning of the conflict still raging on the banks of the Somme. The first reel deals with the now-famous preliminary bombardment, which crushed the German trenches and the spirit of the guns, which have been made only since the war began, and which are gradually overcoming the resistive power of the enemy, as they have already overtaken his initiative, are shown in action, close up. An idea of the vast amount of munitions needed may be gained from watching these gun crews at work. The men labor and sweat just to keep the guns firing shells in an unceasing stream, one shell leaving the gun while its predecessor is still in full flight.

THE GRADUAL CONCENTRATION of thousands of men and their supplies for the great attack was completed in the last few days of June. The film shows the famous British regiments-Kitchener's army loosed at last-marching up to their positions to be ready for opening the infantry advance on July 1. Loaded with their gear, spades, rifles, bayonets, blankets, greatcoats, steel helmets, gas masks and personal kit, the men march by, smiling and waving their hands at the camera. Many of these men had only a few hours more to live, and all of them knew it. But the soldier's lot is to live while he can, and to worry not. No happier faces in the world could be found than those of Tommies moving "up" into the Battle of the Somme.

ATHENS, Oct. 20 .- Via London .- The Greek Government officially made it known today that following the recent series of visits by the Entente ministers to the royal palace, King Constantine had spontaneously undertaken further to dispel Entente suspicions of his sincerity by ordering what he had previously refused to grant, on the insistence of the French military attache, that is, the transfer of the third and fourth army corps from Thessaly and the sixteenth division from Epirus to the Peloponnesus, the Southern Greek peninsula. 


