



somewhat briefly and vaguely the British government's intentions of reversing the policy of the late Mac-Donald government, which, on the ground that they were of a protective tendency, abolished a number of war duties imposed on various commodi-ties under the safeguarding of indus-

Mr. Baldwin repudiated the idea of using the safeguarding of industries act as a wedge to introduce a protective tariff, and admitted that taxation of food was not practical politics. He also stipulated that any industries requiring to be safeguarded must prove themselves important and efficient and to be suffering from exceptional competition through despreciated exchanges, bounties, subsidies or debased labor conditions in competing countries.

The premier suggested submitting in Mr. Baldwin repudiated the idea of

competing countries.



# PLANNED BY BODY

Revision of Traffic and Parking Regulations Is Talked.

Plans to make a traffic survey of he downtown district of London were discussed last evening at the final meeting of the 1924 traffic committee of the city council. The need for revision of parking restrictions and traffic systems was emphasized by the members of the committee. It was recommended that the curb and sidewalk on Clarence street, be-tween Queen's avenue and Dundas street, be cut so as to provide a wider thoroughfare. 
