

The resolution means nothing and was intended to mean nothing; but those who framed it were perhaps not far astray in their estimate of the so-called Tory temperance vote. A fair sample of the Tory temperance man is Mr. Hoyle, M. P. P., who announced that he was perfectly satisfied with the policy of his party

Dr. Beattie Nesbitt, who has been pesing as a champion of public-ownership, roared as gently as any sucking dove by introducing a resolution, "indorsing the attitude of the Conservative representatives," as shown by the records of the Legislature toward that principle. He asserted that the Opposition was the parent of public ownership, but there is no proof of the relationship. The Temiskaming Railway, the greatest experiment in public ownership the Province has ever known, is the pro-

The resolution in favor of giving every settler a free grant of land, and all the minerals and timber (including the pine), on his lot, is an open bribe. Such a policy would seriously curtail the revenue derived from the sale of land and pine timber, and would play havoc with the great forest wealth of the Province, as many would make a pretense of settling on the land merely to strip it of the pine. The Government gives the settler as much of the pine on his lot as he needs for building purposes and all the other timber; but the surplus pine is a public asset. The resolution was foisted on the conference by some of the New Ontario delegates, who hope to make votes in the next election. Mr. Whitney and his lieutenants should have repudiated it, but it is in harmony with the tactics they pursued in the last campaign.

The resolution in favor of better factory inspection, the labeling of prison-made goods and legislation, for the adjustment of labor disputes sounds well. The reference to labor legislation would have been more consistent if the Opposition had shown some sympathy with the Government's efforts in that direction. When Mr. Preston, of Brantford, three years ago introduced a measure to facilitate conciliation and arbitration. Mr. Whitney derided it saying that it was not worth the paper it was written on. Under that legislation some thirty labor disputes have been adjusted.

PEACE IDEA SPREADS

Fourteen Arbitration Treaties Signed by European Nations.

Paris, Nov. 26. - Reports reaching the foreign office show that fourteen treaties of arbitration have thus far been signed between the various powers of Europe, and by the United States. France has made six treaties, namewith Great Britain, Spain, the Netherlands, Sweden and Norway, and the United States. The texts of all the treaties are

practically identical with that of the French treaty with Great Britain. This ratification of similar treaties is considered as having widespread international significance, as it has the effect of a joint pact to which most of the leading nations adhere. The other treaties are those of Italy with Great Britain, Denmark with the Netherlands, Portugal with Spain, Germany with Great Britain, Portuga with the Netherlands, Russia with Belgium, Great Britain with Switzerland, the United States with Switzerland, possibly others not yet officially

reported. France, Austria and other countries are now negotiating a number of treaties. Those signed or pending represent all the leading powers of Europe and practically the smaller powers, thus showing the universal acceptance of the same principle. It is expected that the movement will extend to South and Central America and the countries of Asia and Africa, exerting international influence, thus giving the chain of treaties world-wide effect.


