Another meeting was held on April 21, and there were about 24 Liberals present. The third meeting was called by a circular issued by W. T. J. Lee,

From the notices it appeared as it these meetings were under the auspices of the Catholic political organiza-tion in the city. But oficers of the Catholic Registration Association say this is not the case, and are indignant that such meetings should be called under the name of Catholicism.
