Kingston, Jamaica.—A person acquainted with Kingston, coming here to-day, in the business section at least, would hardly recognize the capital and chief city of the British West Indies of a few months ago.

Occasionally temporary buildings have been erected and others restored. Considering all, very fair progress has been made.

Stores in the line of construction are for the most part of reinforced concrete, with steel girders.

Practically all the merchants have bravely faced the disaster, and are beginning to feel that the worst is over.

Buildings more or less familiar to visitors here still partially standing are the general post office (in use), the Supreme Court and Treasury.

Willie Kingston as yet has no first-class hotel, there is one on the outskirts of the city, and many moderate-priced hotels and boarding houses in the city itself.

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HUSBAND DISCOVERS WIFE SHOT DEAD IN HER BED.

Buffalo Brakeman Returned Home to Find His Young Wife Murdered in His Absence.

Buffalo, Nov. 15.—With a bullet wound in her right temple, her right arm extended as though to warn of threatened danger, Mrs. Katherine Geiser, a really beautiful young woman, was found dead in her bed at No. 375 William street at half-past six o'clock yesterday by her husband, Frederick C. Geiser.

Many Police at Work. Following upon the heels of the strangling of Daisy H. Stauch in an Elliott street house and the assassination of Alexander Young, the crime caused unwonted activity in police circles.

The first inking the police had of the crime was at a few minutes before 7 o'clock last night, when Policeman Edward E. Duerr, whose beat includes the intersection of William and Jefferson streets, near which the Geiser home is situated, was called into the building by Dr. Herman B. Slinger and notified of the murder.

Underneath the covers, her right arm half extended before her face, lay his wife. Blood covered the pillow, which was also darkened by powder stains.

The husband had in the meantime been taken to the William Street Station, where he was examined as to his movements for the day.

The motive for the crime is unknown as yet. Mrs. Geiser lived a rather isolated life so far as her fellow-tenants were concerned.

Visited by Men. Tenants in the house declared last evening that she was visited by several men and went out with them, one especially paying her considerable attention.

tenants. The woman was twenty-five years old, though the police records make her two years younger. The husband was about the same age and had married her about eight years ago. There were no children. Almost from the first the woman, who was really pretty—and who tried to add to her beauty by artificial means, such as waxes of hair and various rouges and toilet preparations—shown by pots and boxes found on her bureau—attracted the attention of other men.

So far as the crime itself is concerned, mystery surrounds it. The house, which stands on a corner, is thickly populated. The Klunks live next to the Geisers and Dr. Slinger on the floor below but no one in the house heard the fatal shot fired.

the crest of the hill he would bring the speed down to 20 or 25 miles an hour. There were three curves on this particular point of the route. On the long curve, near Ferguson's house, he always put on a heavy application of the brakes, which he released just as the train entered the "Shoe."

George Hincheliff, who was working with the witness Mossop near the accident, described the speed as greater than that of an ordinary train running on a level track. He placed the speed at a mile a minute.

Charles Hutchings, who was also working with the Mossop gang, described the approach of the train. It was going so rapidly that for safety's sake he clambered over the fence. He placed the speed at 50 miles an hour.

Mr. Arthur Smith, superintendent of No. 2 Division, of the C. P. R., described the duties of conductors and engineers. He said that the conductor had control over the engine, and with the air valve in every car could bring the train to a standstill irrespective of the engineer.

Mr. Preston, when shown the photograph of the wrecked engine, also failed to find any trace of the brake shoe, which is alleged to be missing. He added that Hodge told him that he examined his engine at Orangeville and found the brake shoes and everything else intact.
