

NEW BRUNSWICK

Baptist Seminary,

A CLASSICAL AND HIGH SCHOOL FOR YOUNG LADIES AND GENTLEMEN.

Corners Dorchester and Carleton Streets, and Princess and Charlotte Streets, St. John, N. B.

This institution was re-opened in the city of St. John, in October, 1882. Its promoters felt that the time had arrived for the Baptist body in this province to revive the system of higher education formerly carried on by them, but which for a number of years had been suffered to decline. Accordingly at a meeting held in St. John, in August, 1882, it was resolved to take immediate steps towards opening an Academy in this city, under the direction of the New Brunswick Baptist Education Society. The results have justified the convictions of those who felt the necessity for such an institution. Its object is to afford at moderate expense the advantages of a thorough and refined education—to retain the home influence as far as possible by bringing students into close domestic relation with christian and sympathetic teach-

ers, that a healthy moral growth may be combined with intellectual culture. The school is conveniently situated, very easy of access from all parts of the city and suburbs. Although within five minutes walk of the I. C. R. Station, it is quite removed from the noise and bustle of traffic. A magnificent view of the entire city and harbour is obtainable from the upper rooms in school building. The location of the Seminary in the city brings it into contact with the best talent and culture of the Province, and affords opportunities for improvement not presented to students in many institutions.

ADMISSION.

Candidates for admission to the Seminary are supposed to be acquainted with the common English studies, to understand fractions in Arithmetic, and be familiar with the outlines of British and Canadian Histories. Students are recommended to enter upon one of the regular courses of study in order to receive the benefit of systematic and continued training. Those who cannot take the regular work are permitted to select such subjects as suit their requirements, it being at the option of the principal to increase the number of subjects if he sees the pupil has insufficient work.

All who enter classes in the institution are supposed to conform to such rules and regulations as shall from time to time be found necessary.

Courses of Study.

These comprise a Classical Course and a Literary Course.

THE CLASSICAL COURSE.

The Classical Course is designed for students who wish to enter upon the Arts Course in College, or for those who purpose to take up immediate professional study. It requires three years study of Latin and two of Greek, although one prepared in other subjects of the course could accomplish the Classics in less time.

THE LITERARY COURSE.

This course is adapted to young ladies and gentlement who do not intend to enter College, but who wish to pursue a comprehensive and carefully selected course of study. Such subjects have been chosen as will be of greatest practical benefit, while of highest service in quickening the intellectual faculties, and securing discipline of mind.

Students who are well qualified upon entering can complete either course in three years. Those who are not prepared to enter upon the full work of the Junior year may be assisted in preparatory work, entering upon the work of the middle year after two years of study. Diplomas are granted to graduates in these courses.

JUNIOR YEAR.

FIRST AND SECOND TERMS.

Arithmetic, Penmanship, Reading and Spelling, British History, Geography, English Grammar, Latin or French, Composition.

THIRD AND FOURTH TERMS.

Arithmetic, Algebra, Penmanship, Reading and Spelling, British History, Geography, English Grammar, Latin or French, Botany, Composition.

MIDDLE YEAR.

FIRST AND SECOND TERMS.

Arithmetic, Algebra, Book Keeping, Physical Geography, Physiology, Ancient History, Latin or French, Greek or German.

THIRD AND FOURTH TERMS.

Arithmetic, Geometry, Natural Philosophy, Botany, Medieval and Modern History, Rhetoric, Latin or French, Greek or German.

SENIOR YEAR.

FIRST AND SECOND TERMS.

Geometry, English Literature, Moral Philosophy, Chemistry, Latin or French, Greek or German.

THIRD AND FOURTH TERMS.

Mensuration, Geology, Mental Philosophy, English Literature, Latin or French, Greek or German.

Written themes semi-monthly throughout the year.

Accomplishments.

The foregoing courses of study are designed to impart thorough mental discipline. There are other studies refining and cultivating in their tendency that are essential, not only as accomplishments and social adornments, but also as forming a necessary part of a curriculum in securing the highest cultivation of taste. Principal among these are Music and Painting, in which departments this institution enjoys especial facilities.

INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC.

This department will be divided into two courses, the Artist and Amateur.

The Artist is designed more particularly for pupils preparing for teachers and organists.

Diplomas will be awarded to those who work out the full course as arranged.

In the Amateur department Testimonials will be given for satisfactory progress made while attending the Seminary.

Pupils taking lessons in any branch of music will receive Free Instruction in the Harmony and Thorough Bass Classes.

Organ lessons given on a first class Pipe Organ, upon which pupils will be permitted to practise.

VOCAL MUSIC.

In the department of Vocal Music, instruction will be given both individually and in classes.

Latest and most approved methods are adopted in the cultivation of the voice.

PAINTING AND DRAWING.

Attention is invited to our facilities for conducting these important studies. In addition to special classes, instruction in Mechanical Drawing is given to the school without extra charge twice during the week.

The special course includes:

Drawing in Pencil, Crayon and Charcoal, from the flat or round.

Monochrome Drawing in Sepia, India Ink, Neutral Tint or Bistre.

WATER COLOURS OR OILS, from Nature, flat or copies.

Boarding Accommodation.

The large and convenient building on the corner of Dorchester and Carleton Streets will be ready for occupation in September. The house is fitted with modern improvements and is well adapted to the convenience of its inmates. Students will be constantly under the direction of the teachers, who will reside in the building in order to afford the fullest guarantee of careful oversight.

Regulations.

The purpose of our government is to lead pupils to cultivate self-control. Rules will be framed with that object as well as to enforce healthful discipline.

Students are asked to fix upon a place of worship which they are required to attend once every Sabbath. All attend the Sabbath afternoon Bible-class conducted by one of the teachers.

A daily record is kept of each pupil's standing in scholarship and deportment. At the end of each quarter reports are sent to parents and guardians.

Prizes.

Several valuable Prizes have been offered by gentlemen for competition during year 1883-84. Particulars of these will be made known at the opening of Fall Term.
